BULLS CARRY MOMENTUM INTO '23

The University at Buffalo football team enters its third season under head coach Maurice Linguist and is doing so riding a bit of momentum. The Bulls defeated Georgia Southern in the 2022 Camellia Bowl for their third bowl win in program history.

The Bulls return 15 players that started in the bowl game, including four All-MAC selections.

Leading the way are a pair of defensive first-team All-MAC selections in linebacker **Shaun Dolac** and safety **Marcus Fuqua**, who was also an All-America selection after leading the nation in interceptions. They are two of five starters returning on the defensive side of the ball.

On offense, Buffalo returns six starters led by offensive lineman **Gabe Wallace** who was an All-MAC Third Team pick in 2022. Quarterback **Cole Snyder** returns under center after starting all 13 games a season ago.

Kicker **Alex McNulty** also returns as the reigning MAC Special Teams Player of the Year and is the program's career leader in nearly every kicking category.

Here is a position-by-position breakdown as the Bulls enter fall camp.

QUARTERBACK

Cole Snyder joined the program just a season ago, but has since developed into a reliable signal-caller for the Bulls. He started all 13 games in 2022 and became just the third quarterback in program history to throw for 3,000 yards.

Snyder, a local product who transferred to UB from Rutgers, threw for 3,030 yards and 18 touchdowns last season, joining Drew Willy and Tyree Jackson as the only quarterbacks to eclipse 3,000 yards in a single campaign.

Snyder will be the grizzled vet in the quarterback room as no other quarterback has taken a single snap for the Bulls.

Redshirt-freshman **Mike DePillo** is the only other returning quarterback. However, he didn't see any action last year.

The Bulls were able to bring in three transfer quarterbacks to help with the depth.

CJ Ogbonna is a transfer from Southeast Missouri State. A junior, Ogbonna spent two seasons with the Redhawks after transferring from Hutchinson Community College. He led the Blue Dragons to the 2020 national title.

Gunnar Gray is a JUCO transfer from San Diego Mesa College where he was a two-time first-team All-Conference selection. Gray threw for 4,048 yards and 40 touchdowns over 18 games.

Richie Watts is a JUCO transfer quarterback who spent last season at the College of San Mateo. In his lone season with the Bulldogs, Watts threw for 2,148 yards, 21 touchdowns to only two interceptions while completing 63 percent of his passes. He helped lead San Mateo to a 12-1 record and a CCCAA Football state title.

Mason Cumbie is a true freshman dual-threat quarterback from Hopewell High School in Virginia. He threw for 1,312 yards and 12 touchdowns as a senior.

Anthony Policare is a walk-on from Endwell, NY who adds depth to the position.

RUNNING BACK

The Bulls have significant depth at running back, returning three players who made at least one start in 2022.

Ron Cook is one of the most versatile backs on the Bulls roster and continues to be a key weapon. In 2022, he started the first 10 games of the season before suffering an injury. He rushed for 600 yards and four touchdowns and added 16 receptions for 207 yards.

Mike Washington showed promise as a redshirt-freshman in 2022. He led the Bulls in rushing with 625 yards and had a team-high seven rushing touchdowns. He added 23 receptions for 135 yards and a score.

Sophomore **Al-Jay Henderson** also showed flashes that he's ready to break through as a featured back. In 2022, he rushed for 301 yards and three touchdowns on the season. His 5.1 yards per carry average was tops among UB running backs.

New to the running back room is JUCO transfer **Dylan Kedzior**. The Oklahoma native transferred from Hutchinson Community College where he was a JUCO All-American after rushing for 1,090 yards and 11 touchdowns in 2022.

Fellow JUCO transfer **Jacquez Barksdale** joins the program from Coffeyville Community College where he played two seasons. He rushed for 553 yards on 90 carries for a 6.14 career yards per carry average.

2023 BUFFALO FOOTBALL

Lamar Sperling is a true freshman who was named 2022 Ohio Mr. Football after posting eye-popping numbers at Archbishop Hoban. He broke the Ohio state single-season record by rushing for 3,984 yards and 59 touchdowns his senior season.

Adding depth at running back include redshirt-freshmen **Mark Anthony Scott** and **Joseph Giggie**.

WIDE RECEIVER

The Bulls will have new faces at the wide receiver position after losing their top two targets, Justin Marshall and Quian Williams, to graduation.

Fifth-year **Marlyn Johnson** is the most experienced returning receiver. He appeared in all 13 games and made four starts in 2022. He had 17 catches for 133 yards on the year.

Graduate student **Cole Harrity** also appeared in all 13 games in 2022 and had 13 receptions for 170 yards and a touchdown on the season.

Bobbie Curry enters his second season with the Bulls after transferring from Arizona. He appeared in eight games a season ago and had six catches for 73 yards. His role will likely increase in 2023.

Buffalo has turned to several transfers that it hopes will be able to help immediately.

Darrell Harding is a graduate transfer from Duke where he spent four seasons. He appeared in 42 games and made five starts for the Blue Devils and totaled 35 catches for 452 yards (12.9 ypc) over his career.

Chance Morrow is a transfer Louisville where he redshirted in 2022 after a standout career at West Charlotte High School in North Carolina.

Qua Sanders is a JUCO transfer from Jones College. An all-conference selection, he totaled 63 catches for 702 yards and five touchdowns in his time with the Bobcats.

Micah Woods is a JUCO transfer from Hutchinson Community College where he spent two seasons and helped the Blue Dragons earn a birth in the 2022 JUCO National Championship game.

Also returning in 2023 and looking for a more expanded role are senior **Javien Cuff** and redshirt-freshman **Nik McMillan**.

Walk-ons **Tadd Barr**, **Aidan Walline** and **Jeremy Yancy** all add depth to the wide receiver unit.

TIGHT END

Tight end is another area in which the Bulls will have new names as UB doesn't return a single tight end who registered a reception a season ago.

Sophomore **Nicholas Fronczak** saw action in 10 games but primarily on special teams. He was an Academic All-MAC selection.

Cameron Ball is a redshirt-freshman who appeared in one game a season ago.

Senior **Wyatt Molinich** returns as well.

With the lack of experience at the position, the coaching staff turned to the portal and brought in four transfers.

Zion Carter is a transfer from Dartmouth where he spent four seasons and excelled as a blocking tight end.

Jake Orlando is a local product who transferred to Buffalo after spending four years at UMass. He played in 21 games over the last two years.

Ryan Daly is a transfer from the City College of San Francisco. In seven games at CCSF, he had 13 catches for 135 yards and four touchdowns.

Andrew Schnackenberg is a junior transfer from Coffeyville College. He totaled 13 receptions for 144 yards and two touchdowns while averaging 11.1 yards per catch.

Mitch Viviano is a freshman from Fork Union Valley Military Academy where he was a standout as both a tight end and a defensive end.

OFFENSIVE LINE

The Bulls return three starters on the offensive line and have turned to the transfer portal for added veteran experience.

Gabe Wallace has started every game of the last two seasons. He is a versatile offensive lineman who has played both guard and tackle. He was an All-MAC Third Team selection as a guard in 2022.

Junior **Tyler Doty** made a big leap from his redshirt-freshman to sophomore seasons a year ago. He appeared in all 13 game and started the last 10 games at right guard in 2022.

Isaiah Wright made an immediate impact after transferring from Rutgers prior to the 2022 campaign. He started all 13 games at left tackle and will likely return to the role in 2023.

Caelan Shepard is entering his fifth season and continues to develop.

He worked his way into the rotation in 2022, appearing in 10 games.

Dom Polizzi appeared in nine games and made one start at right guard in 2022. He has also been taking snaps at center.

Graduate transfer **Sidney Walker** missed last season with an injury but should be healthy and able to help in 2023.

Other returners to the offensive line include **Matt Pajuste, James Carington, Konrad Krzyszton, Andrew Kerwin, Liam Hamilton.**

The Bulls did bring in a trio of transfers that could make an immediate impact.

Nick Beans is a transfer from Notre Dame College in Ohio where he was a three-year starter at center. He was a three-time All-MEC First Team selection.

Trevor Brock is a transfer from Iowa Western where he was a first-team All-American. He helped lead the Reivers to the 2022 National Championship.

Alex Heininger hails from Rochester and is transferring from Buffalo after spending one season at Central Michigan.

DEFENSIVE LINE

One of the strengths of the 2023 UB football team should be the defensive line. The Bulls should be especially stout in the middle of the defensive line as they return four players who saw significant action a season ago.

Daymond Williams has had two strong seasons at defensive tackle. A 2021 All-MAC selection, Williams has had 19 tackles for loss and 10 sacks over the last two seasons.

Jaylon Bass has been a nice compliment to Williams at the other defensive tackle spot. He started all 13 games in 2022 and had 21 tackles, four tackles for loss and half a sack on the season.

A senior, **George Wolo** started at defensive tackle in 2020 and 2021 and is a veteran of the defensive line. He has 67 career tackles as well as 9.5 tackles for loss and eight sacks.

Entering his third year with the Bulls, **Daishon Folsom** has been a reliable reserve over the last two seasons. He has totaled 30 tackles and 4.5 tackles for loss over the last two years.

Redshirt-freshmen **Ja'Mori Coard, Devin Morgan** and **Cornell Evans** should all factor into the defensive tackle rotation.

Walk-on **Nick Zikuski** will also add depth at the defensive tackle position.

Like defensive tackle, Buffalo returns depth at defensive end as well.

C.J. Bazile has seen time in the starting lineup in each of the last two seasons. Over those two seasons, Bazile started 11 games and totaled 61 tackles and 7.5 tackles for loss.

Max Michel has also seen time in the starting lineup in each of the last two seasons. In 2022, he played in 10 games and had 16 tackles, 1.5 tackles for loss, a sack and a forced fumble.

Kyler Laing was the Bulls' starting defensive end in 2022, before suffering a season-ending injury in just the second game of the season. He continues to rehab the injury and should be ready for the opener in September.

Kameron Olds made an immediate impact as a true freshman in 2022. He appeared in 11 games and registered six tackles and a tackle for loss.

Sophomore **Solomanie Bambara** and junior **Michael Tetteh** will also look to play a more prominent role in 2023.

JUCO transfer **Devonyal Lofton** is new to the Bulls this season. Over two seasons at East Mississippi Community College, he had 74 tackles, 15.5 tackles for loss and 11 sacks.

Redshirt-freshman **Joey Hawryschuk** and true freshmen **Nick Roy** and **Junior Poyser** add depth at defensive end.

LINEBACKERS

The linebacker unit is led by All-MAC First Team pick **Shaun Dolac** who is coming off one of the best seasons by a linebacker in program history. The senior led the Mid-American Conference and ranked second in the nation in tackles with 147. He posted a school-record 97 solo tackles which was tops in all of FBS.

While Buffalo has the fortune of returning one starting linebacker, the Bulls will need to replace three-time All-MAC linebacker James Patterson.

Senior **Caleb Tate** will look to have more expanded roles in 2023 and could challenge for a starting role. He has seen action primarily on spe-

cial teams over his career.

Khalil Murdock redshirted last season as a freshman but did appear in five games and looks to be ready for a more expanded role.

Walk-ons **Jake Zimmer** and **Justin Piwowarczyk** add depth to the position.

The coaching staff utilized the transfer portal and were able to bring in an FCS All-American in **Joe Andreesen**. A local product, Andreesen spent five seasons at Bryant where he set a school record with 116 tackles in 2022.

Dion Crawford is a freshman linebacker who enrolled at UB in January.

Jyaire Stevens is a transfer from Lafayette where he played four seasons. As a senior, he had 40 tackles, seven tackles for loss and 2.5 sacks.

Fellow transfer **Gio De Leon** spent the last two seasons at Cerritos College. He totaled 101 tackles, 8.5 tackles for loss and three sacks over his career.

Junior **Jalen McNair** and redshirt-freshman **Pershaun Fann** will likely battle for the nickelback job.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

The defensive backfield is led by safety **Marcus Fuqua** who is coming off one of the best seasons by a safety in program history. Fuqua led the nation in interceptions with seven en route to earning Associated Press All-America Third Team honors.

Injuries forced **Devin Grant** into a more prominent role as a true freshman in 2022. He appeared in eight games and was UB's starting safety in the Camellia Bowl.

Solomon Brown, entering his second season after transferring from Minnesota, played in nine games a season ago.

Demetrius Harris, a graduate transfer from Cornell, should also factor in at safety. He played in 30 games over three seasons with the Big Red.

Junior **Caron Robinson** made the move from running back to safety in the spring.

Also adding depth at safety include walk-ons **Jonathan Capo**, **Caleb Arena** and **Brennan Clasgens**.

Local standout **Jayden Lewis** from Bennett High School as well as Rochester-native **Jamiere Munson** join the team as freshmen.

At cornerback, the Bulls return one starter, **Caleb Offord**, who appeared in 12 games and made nine starts. He had 30 tackles, two tackles for loss, an interception, a team-best eight pass breakups and a fumble recovery on the season.

One of the most intriguing stories heading into 2023 in **Clevester Hines**. Originally recruited as a wide receiver, injuries forced the coaching staff to move Hines to cornerback for the Camellia Bowl. Hines was up for the challenge and against Georgia Southern, totaled seven tackles and three pass breakups in his first career start at the position.

Jayden Oliver started three games in 2022 before suffering a season-ending injury. He is healthy and will likely challenge for a starting role in 2023.

Sophomore **Demarco Cuffey** saw action in 2022 and could have a more expanded role in 2023.

The Bulls dipped into the transfer portal to help sure up the cornerback position. Joining UB in 2023 are **Marquis Cooper**, a junior transfer from Colgate, **D'Andre Greely**, a sophomore transfer from Colorado State and **Amonte Strothers**, a redshirt-fifth year from Delaware.

In addition, **Charles McCartherens**, a freshman from Kennesaw, GA, enrolled at UB in January.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Buffalo has the benefit of returning one of the strongest special teams units in the Mid-American Conference.

Alex McNulty returns for his fourth season as the Bulls starting kicker. He had arguably the finest season by a kicker in program history, making a single-season school record 24 field goals in 2022. He became the first UB player to be named MAC Special Teams Player of the Year.

Punter **Anthony Venneri** was a pleasant surprise for the Bulls. After walking on to the team, he started the final 10 games of the season and averaged 43.0 yards per punt - a single-season school record. He was named to the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) Freshman All-America Team.

Jackson Baltar has seen time at kicker and punter for the Bulls and has shown to excel at both positions.

Evan Davis is back for his fifth season as long snapper.

Maurice Linguist is in his third season as head coach of the UB football program. Considered by many as one of the top young minds in all of college football, Linguist was named the University at Buffalo's 26th head coach on May 8, 2021. It was a homecoming of sorts for Linguist who was the Bulls' defensive backs coach in 2012 and 2013.

In 2022, only his second season with the program, Linguist led the Bulls to a 7-6 record, capped by a 23-21 victory over Georgia Southern in the Camellia Bowl. It was just the third bowl win in program history. He led Buffalo to a 5-3 record in Mid-American Conference play, the seventh time, since the joining the league in 1999, the Bulls had a winning record in MAC play.

A coach with extensive experience on the defensive side of the ball, it was of little surprise several of UB's defensive players had standout seasons. Safety Marcus Fuqua led the nation with seven interceptions and became just the third UB player to be named an Associated Press All-American. Linebacker Shaun Dolac ranked second in the nation with 147 tackles, including a school-record 97 solo stops which were more than any player in the FBS.

The Bulls had seven players named All-MAC, including kicker Alex McNulty who became the first player in program history to be named MAC Special Teams Player of the Year.

In his first season as the helm, Linguist led the Bulls to a 4-8 record with an injury-riddled squad.

Seven Bulls were named to the All-MAC team, including James Patterson who was a first-team selection at middle linebacker. A program-best 19 Bulls were named to the Academic All-MAC team, including offensive lineman Jack Klenk who was also an CoSIDA Academic All-District selection.

Linguist is regarded as one of the nation's top recruiters and has excelled in coaching at both the Power Five level and the NFL. He came to UB from Michigan where he served a brief stint as defensive backs coach/co-defensive coordinator since January. He joined the U-M coaching staff after spending the 2020 season as cornerbacks coach with the NFL's Dallas Cowboys.

In Dallas, Linguist directed a secondary that forced 10 interceptions while allowing the fifth-fewest passing first downs in the league (180). The Cowboys were also ranked in the top half of the league in pass yards allowed (11th), completion percentage against (10th), and takeaways (ninth). Linguist coached rookie cornerback Trevon

Diggs (three interceptions) to a strong first season in the league. Three of Dallas' four leading tacklers in 2020 were starters in the secondary, including former Wolverine Jourdan Lewis who set a career-high with 59 stops.

Linguist has worked with college secondaries at nine programs. Prior to heading to the NFL, he coached cornerbacks at Texas A&M (2018-19), defensive backs at Minnesota (2017), safeties at Mississippi State (2016) and defensive backs at Iowa State (2014-15)

At A&M, Linguist's secondaries limited opportunities for opponents and played tight coverage in key situations. Teams converted just 31.2 percent of third down tries (102-of-326) over his two seasons and A&M ranked ninth nationally in that category in 2018. The Aggies intercepted their opponents 19 times in his two seasons and made a habit of getting off the field. During the 2018 season, the defense was top-15 nationally in first downs allowed (221) and faced the fewest snaps against among all SEC teams.

Linguist helped the Aggies produce back-to-back top-six recruiting classes nationally in 2019 and 2020. He was the lead recruiter for five-star safety Jaylon Jones, the first five-star defensive back to sign with Texas A&M.

In his season at Minnesota, Linguist's secondary helped anchor a defense that finished No. 11 nationally with 174.5 yards allowed per game after listing 73rd in the NCAA a year earlier. The unit surren-



dered 16 touchdowns, a top-25 figure nationally and also ranked among the nation's best in first downs allowed (11th) and total defense (30th). Linguist was the lead recruiter for Rashod Bateman, the Big Ten's Wide Receiver of the Year. Linguist was promoted to assistant head coach following the 2017 season before accepting a position at Texas A&M.

At Mississippi State, Linguist led the safeties group which was responsible for seven of the team's 14 interceptions. Three safeties eclipsed the 50-tackle mark for the Bulldogs: Brandon Bryant (62, three PBUs), Kivon Coman (58, four PBUs), and Mark McLaurin (51, seven PBUs) were among the team's leading tacklers. The defense scored four touchdowns (No. 8, NCAA) and totaled 14 interceptions (No. 35, NCAA) during the 2016 season.

Prior to his time in Starkville, Linguist coached defensive backs at Iowa State (2014-15). He coached players to three All-Big 12 honors in his two seasons at Iowa State, including safety Kamari Cotton-Moya, a first-team All-American freshman team selection by the Football Writers' Association of America (FWAA). Cotton-Moya led the team in tackles and was named the conference's Freshman of the Year on defense. Linguist would help direct cornerback Brian Peavy to be a finalist for the award the following year.

In his time at UB, Linguist helped the Bulls finish second in the MAC East and reach the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl in 2013, at the time, the program's second bowl appearance. The unit ranked second in the league in interceptions (15), points per game allowed (24.4), and yards per game allowed (382.2). Linguist coached Najja Johnson to first-team all-conference honors and a career total of 38 pass breakups, second in program history. Johnson led the MAC in interceptions the year earlier as part of a Bulls unit that was tops in the conference in pass completion percentage allowed while ranking second in pass defense.

Linguist spent three years at James Madison, helping the program pull in the top FCS recruiting class during the 2012 cycle while the team reached the second round of the NCAA Football Championship Series Playoffs. Linguist's first full-time position was at Valdosta State, working with defensive backs and special teams. The Blazers went 9-3 and earned a No. 12 national ranking in Division II.

Linguist began as a graduate assistant at Baylor, his alma mater, working as a graduate assistant with the strong safeties and rover backs. During his career at Baylor, he was a defensive MVP and honorable mention All-Big 12 selection. He made 24 starts in 42 appearances as a strong safety from 2003-06. A native of Dallas, Texas, Linguist graduated from Baylor with degrees in communications (2006) and a master's in health, human performance and recreation (2007). He was an Academic All-Big 12 honoree.

Linguist and his wife, Stacie, have one daughter, Maura, and two sons, Lance and Leon.





DJ MANGAS

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR/TIGHT ENDS
WILLIAM & MARY '12
FIRST SEASON AT BUFFALO

DJ Mangas begins his first season as offensive coordinator and tight ends coach. He brings over 11 years of coaching experience at both the collegiate and NFL levels.

Mangas had two stints at LSU where he served as an offensive analyst in 2019 and the team's pass game coordinator in 2021. As offensive analyst, he helped put together the most prolific offensive in SEC history, averaging 48.4 points and 568.4 total yards per game in 2019. That year, LSU won the national championship, scoring 50 or more points seven times and winning all but two games by double-digits.

He spent the 2020 season in the NFL as an offensive coaching assistant with the Carolina Panthers. He was part of a Carolina offensive coaching staff that produced four players with over 1,000 scrimmage yards in a season as the Panthers become only the fifth team in the Super Bowl era to accomplish such a feat.

Mangas served five years on the William & Mary coaching staff from 2014-18. He coached running backs for three seasons and then was elevated to offensive coordinator for his final two years with the Tribe.

Mangas had four players earn all-conference honors during his first year as offensive coordinator. Two of his former players – offensive linemen Chris Durant and Connor Hilland – signed free agent NFL contracts.

Under Mangas' direction as a running backs coach for William & Mary, both Mikal Abdul-Saboor (3,108) and Kendall Anderson (3,082) etched their names in the Tribe's record books and finished their illustrious careers as two of the most productive running backs in school history, ranking fourth and fifth, respectively, on the program's all-time rushing list.

He began his coaching career as the quarterbacks coach at Hampton-Sydney College in 2012 and running backs coach at Georgetown in 2013. Most recently, he served as a defensive analyst at UCF this past season.

Mangas is a 2012 graduate of William and Mary where he was a wide receiver for the Tribe. A four-year letterwinner at W&M, Mangas led the Tribe in receptions (45), receiving yards (591) and touchdown catches (5) during his senior season in 2011. Additionally, he earned the team's 2011 Inspirational Award, which is given to the player who exemplifies great leadership.

He is the older brother of Robbie Mangas who was the Bulls' starting tight end in 2022.

Robert Wright is in his first season as UB's defensive coordinator.

Wright came to Buffalo from Duke where he served as a senior defensive analyst in 2022. Working with defensive coordinator Robb Smith, he helped lead the Blue Devils to a 9-4 record and a victory over UCF in the 2022 Military Bowl.

Wright spent the 2021 season at Iowa State as a Special Teams Analyst. While in Ames, IA, Wright was responsible for organizing all aspects of the special teams unit, including meetings, daily practice plans, scouting reports and game plans. During his short time with the Cyclones, Wright helped the program to a 7-6 record, including an appearance in the 2021 Cheez-It Bowl. He also mentored kicker Andrew Mevis, who garnered Lou Groza Award semifinalist accolades.

Prior to Iowa State, Wright spent two seasons (2019-20) at Texas A&M University as a defensive graduate assistant where he worked with Linguist. During his time in College Station, Texas A&M posted an overall record of 17-6, including consecutive

bowl game victories over No. 25 Oklahoma State (2019 Academy Sports + Outdoors Texas Bowl) and No. 13 North Carolina (2020 Capital One Orange Bowl).

Before that, Wright served in two different roles at the University of Illinois for the 2016-18 seasons. He joined the Illini as a defensive graduate assistant (2016-17) before being elevated to a defensive quality control analyst for his final year (2018). While in Champaign, Wright worked primarily with the linebackers and nickelbacks.

Wright got his coaching start as a special teams quality control coach at his alma mater the University of Miami. He spent the 2015 season helping coach punter Justin Vogel, who was a Ray Guy Award semifinalist, who recorded 67 punts for 2,846 yards (42.5 avg.) that year. The Hurricanes finished the season with an 8-5 mark, including an appearance in the Hyundai Sun Bowl.

Before his coaching stint with the Hurricanes, Wright was a member of the football program at Miami for the 2011 season. He later went on to earn a bachelor's degree in economics from the University in 2015. He also obtained his master's degree in sport administration from Illinois in 2017.



RON WHITCOMB

QUARTERBACKS/RECRUITING COORDINATOR

THIRD SEASON AT BUFFALO

Ron Whitcomb is in his third season as an assistant on Linguist's staff. After serving as tight ends coach in 2021 and 2022, he will coach the quarterbacks beginning in 2023. He also serves as UB's recruiting coordinator.

In 2022, tight ends combined for 32 receptions for 300 yards on the season, led by Robbie Mangas who had 16 catches for 141 yards - the most receptions by a UB tight end since 2019.

Tight ends Trevor Borland and Nicholas Fronczak were both named to the Academic All-MAC team.

He helped lead the Bulls to a victory over Georgia Southern in the Camellia Bowl for UB's third bowl win in program history.

Under Whitcomb in 2021, there was an increase in productivity from the tight end position over the previous two seasons. Tight ends accounted for 27 receptions for 276 yards and three touchdowns in 2021 - their highest output since the 2018 campaign.

Tight ends Jake Molinich and Trevor Borland were both named to the Academic All-MAC team.

Whitcomb began his career at UB in 2020 as the team's scouting coordinator and offensive analyst. The Rochester native spent the previous 12 seasons as quarterbacks coach at Old Dominion.

Whitcomb guided quarterback Blake LaRussa to a 3,000-yard season that saw the junior signal-caller finish No. 14 in FBS with 274.1 passing yards per game. That number jumps to 300 yards per game when taking out the two games where he played sparingly. In ODU's 49-35 stunner over No. 13 Virginia Tech, LaRussa passed for 495-yards and four touchdowns. The 495-yards was a C-USA high in 2018 and the second most ever allowed by a Tech defense. LaRussa earned multiple National Player of the Week awards and was named C-USA Player of the Week. LaRussa finished second in C-USA with 274.1 yards per game and led league quarterbacks with six, 300-yard passing games.

LaRussa was the second quarterback in ODU history to throw for 3,000 yards in a single-season, throwing for 3,015, and joining current NFL QB Taylor Heinicke in that regard. LaRussa earned C-USA honorable mention honors, becoming the third ODU quarterback in the Monarchs' five years in the league to earn All-C-USA honors, joining Heinicke and David Washington.

A year after graduating senior quarterback David Washington, the ODU offense was taken over by true freshman Steven Williams in 2017. Williams' first career start came at Virginia Tech and the improvement each week from the then 17-year old was noticeable. In the final four games of the year, Williams completed 68 percent of his passes for 664 yards, two touchdowns and no turnovers, while rushing for 101 yards and two more touchdowns. Williams was named to the Conference USA All-Freshman Team.

Whitcomb groomed quarterback David Washington to the second-best



touchdown to interception ratio in the country in 2016 to help ODU to a 10-3 overall record and victory in the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl. Washington passed for 2,836 yards and 31 touchdowns in his first full season as a starter, after playing wide receiver most of the previous two seasons.

Whitcomb guided current Washington Football player Taylor Heinicke to a tremendous four-year career as 2015 was the first time since 2011 that Heinicke was not behind center. Shuler Bentley and David Washington split the QB duties, combining to complete 234-for-432 for 2,2587 yards and 20 touchdowns. Bentley started the year at quarterback and led a come-from-behind win at Eastern Michigan in the opener and a win over Norfolk State before Washington came in vs. Charlotte for the second series, going 25-of-43 for 365 yards and four touchdowns for a dramatic 37-34 win over the 49ers. Washington led ODU to wins over UTSA and UTEP before suffering a season-ending injury at Southern Miss.

Whitcomb guided four-year starting quarterback Taylor Heinicke to one of the best statistical careers of any Division I quarterback ever. Heinicke ranks third all-time among FBS quarterbacks in total yards of offense with 16,279 and sixth in career passing yards with 14,959. Heinicke's 132 career touchdown tosses is fourth most all-time, just two behind Texas Tech's Graham Harrell for third place.

In 2012, the Monarchs led the FCS in scoring offense with 45.15 points per game, passing offense at 393.85 and total offense with 548.23 yards per game. Whitcomb helped lead Taylor Heinicke to the most prolific season by a quarterback in FCS history. Heinicke led the nation in passing yards, passing yards per game, touchdown passes, total TD's, total offense and points responsible for. Heinicke set FCS single-season record for passing yards and completions. Heinicke threw for 5,076 passing yards surpassing Steve McNair's record of 4,863 he set for Alcorn State in 1994. Heinicke's 398 completions broke Brett Gordon's mark of 385 he set in 2002 for Villanova. Heinicke won the Walter Payton Award given to the Best Player in the FCS, becoming just the second sophomore ever to win the award. The 2012 season also saw Heinicke earn CAA Offensive Player of the Year honors and first-team All-CAA honors. He received First-Team All-America honors by seven organizations and won the Dudley Award for the best Division I Player in the state of Virginia.

Under Whitcomb's watch, the Monarchs had a two-time Walter Payton Watch List member in Thomas DeMarco in 2010 and 2011 and the College Football Performance Awards FCS National Performer of the Year, Jerry Rice Award Runner-Up, and the Payton Award Winner in Heinicke.

Before joining the Old Dominion staff, Whitcomb was a four-year starter at the University of Maine from 2003-2006.

Whitcomb, departed as the Black Bears' all-time leader in completions (755), total offense (8,801) and touchdown passes (68). His 8,183 passing yards ranked second, as did his .592 completion percentage. One of three senior captains at Maine in 2006, Whitcomb was named the Atlantic-10 and Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Rookie of the Year as a redshirt freshman after passing for 2,428 yards and 21 touchdowns. The passing yardage was the most by a freshman in Atlantic-10 history and he also established a new school record with touchdown passes in 11 straight games.

A standout off the field as well, Whitcomb was honored as the 2006-07 Atlantic-10 Student-Athlete of the Year. He earned his B.S. in education from Maine in 2006 and a M.S. Ed. in educational leadership at Old Dominion University in 2009.

For the last three seasons, Whitcomb has participated in the annual Lauren's First and Goal Football Camp at Lafayette College. The one-day clinic features nearly 275 college coaches who volunteer their time to teach aspiring football players the in-and-outs of the game and raise money for Lauren's First and Goal, a charitable organization created to support pediatric brain tumor research and support local pediatric cancer services.



MATT STANSFIELD

OFFENSIVE LINE
DUQUESNE '07
THIRD SEASON AT BUFFALO

Stansfield is in his third season as the Bulls' offensive line coach.

In 2022, Buffalo's line blocked for an offense that ranked in the top five in the conference in scoring offense (28.5), total offense (377.2) and passing offense (235.3).

For the second straight season, two offensive linemen were named All-MAC as right tackle Desmond Bessent and left guard Gabe Wallace were both named All-MAC Third Team. In addition, Tyler Doty and Dom Polizzi were named Academic All-MAC.

He helped lead the Bulls to a victory over Georgia Southern in the Camellia Bowl for UB's third bowl win in program history.

Stansfield came to Buffalo in 2021 and, in his first season, the Bulls ranked second in the MAC in fewest sacks allowed with 16. In addition, UB ranked fifth in the MAC in rushing - averaging 195.5 yards per game. The line blocked for running back Dylan McDuffie who rushed for 1,049 yards - the 10th best single-season effort in program history.

Two starters on the offensive line were named to the All-MAC team. Left tackle Jake Fuzak was named to the second team and guard Jack Klenk was named to the third team. In addition, five members of the offensive line were named Academic All-MAC.

Stansfield came to UB after spending the previous five seasons as run game coordinator and offensive line/tight ends coach at Duquesne. A former player and coach at Duquesne, he returned to his alma mater after serving as offensive coordinator at Waynesburg for four seasons.

Duquesne, which has ranked among the Top 50 nationally in rushing offense in each of the past five seasons, has seen five backs combine to post 33 100-yard games since Stansfield's return to The Bluff.

Last season, running back A.J. Hines capped his standout career becoming the program's all-time leading rusher with 4,629 career rushing yards. The running back earned his fourth consecutive All-NEC award, sharing the backfield with fellow All-NEC selection Mark Allen. The pair became the first two running backs to garner All-NEC honors in the same season since the Dukes joined the conference in 2008.

A big part of the the Duquesne duo's success running the ball was the Dukes' offensive line, keyed by All-NEC picks Sterling Jenkins and Gabe Spurlock. Stansfield and the Duquesne O-line ranked 26th in the country with the fewest sacks allowed at 1.55 per game.

In 2018, Stansfield and the Dukes' running game enjoyed a standout campaign which saw Duquesne claim its fifth NEC crown, as the Dukes earned their second Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) Playoff berth and won their first FCS Playoff contest in program history.

Running back A.J. Hines garnered NEC Offensive Player of the Year honors and was recognized as a finalist for the STATS FCS Walter Payton Award for the top offensive player at the FCS level. He closed out the season third in the country in rushing yards and sixth in the nation in rushing touchdowns, tallying a program-record six-straight 100-yard rushing performances during a six-game winning streak for Duquesne.

Hines - who has earned three straight First Team All-NEC nods with three 1,000-yard seasons in a row - enters his senior season in 2019 as the FCS active leader in career rushing yards and rushing touchdowns.

Stansfield also coached a pair of All-NEC performers on the offensive line in Alex Conley and Matt Fitzpatrick, who helped pave the way for Hines' 20 100-yard rushing games over the last three seasons.

Additionally under Stansfield's guidance, tight end Stew Allen finished with five touchdown receptions on the season.

In 2017, the Dukes paced the NEC in rushing offense (198.5 ypg.) keyed by Hines, who posted his second consecutive 1,000-yard season.

In 2016, Hines ran for 100 yards seven times on his way to winning the STATS FCS Jerry Rice Award.

Prior to returning to Duquesne, Stansfield guided Waynesburg's offense to



new heights, as the team averaged over 400 yards per game in 2014. In 2013, Waynesburg averaged 387.3 yards per game, including a 283.8 ypg. through the air. The 2012 offense featured a physical running attack that averaged a conference-best 201.9 yards per game while allowing just five quarterback sacks all season.

Prior to his appointment at Waynesburg, Stansfield was Duquesne's running backs coach and run game coordinator from 2009-11.

In 2011, Duquesne (9-2) rushed for an average of 212.8 yards per game - a mark that led the NEC and ranked 15th nationally. Then-junior Larry McCoy spearheaded the ground game with 1,381 yards. McCoy's 117.4 yards rushing per game ranked 11th nationally.

Prior to his stint at Duquesne, Stansfield spent one year (2008) at Howard University, where he worked with the school's defensive line.

Stansfield played center for Duquesne from 2003-07, where he was a member of five MAAC championship teams. The Meadville native, who served as a team captain as a senior, earned all-MAAC honors in 2006 & 2007. He was a Don Hansen honorable mention FCS Mid-Major All-American in 2006.

Stansfield graduated from Duquesne in 2007 with a degree in accounting. He added an MBA from his alma mater in 2010 and completed a second master's degree in education at Waynesburg in 2015.

Stansfield and his wife, Jamie, have two sons, Jack and Luke.



CEDRIC DOUGLAS

DEFENSIVE LINE
NORTHERN MICHIGAN '11
THIRD SEASON AT BUFFALO

Cedric Douglas is in his third season as UB's defensive line coach.

Following his second season, Douglas was selected to participate in the 35 Under 35 Coaches Leadership Institute.

He helped lead the Bulls to a victory over Georgia Southern in the 2022 Camellia Bowl for UB's third bowl win in program history.

The Bulls had an aggressive defensive line in 2021. UB ranked second in the Mid-American Conference in sacks per game (3.1). In Buffalo's win over Akron, the Bulls had a program-record 11 sacks, including a school-record 3.5 sacks by defensive end Kyler Laing.

Defensive tackle Daymond Williams was named All-MAC Second Team. The JUCO transfer led the Bulls and ranked sixth in the MAC in sacks with 6.5. He added 46 tackles and 10.5 tackles for loss while playing both defensive tackle and defensive end.

Prior to coming to Buffalo, Douglas spent two seasons as defensive line coach at Massachusetts. Douglas joined the program following time spent coaching at the scholastic and collegiate levels over the prior seven years.

Douglas' efforts are focused on the defensive tackles, an area that emerged as a strong point on the UMass defense in 2020.

Douglas worked with the youthful defensive line throughout the 2019 season, that featured 13 different starters throughout the season due to injuries. In total, the defensive line accounted for 215 tackles on the year, including 22.0 TFLs.

Most recently, Douglas helped Arkansas State reach back-to-back bowl games in 2017 and 2018, during which he was a graduate assistant working with the defensive line. His efforts in guiding the defensive line led to a pair of major awards for Red Wolves standouts as Ja'Von Rolland-Jones won 2017 Sun Belt Player of the Year and Ronheen Bingham followed as the 2018 Sun Belt Defensive Player of the Year. Both also won All-Sun Belt First Team during their respective seasons.

The 2018 Arkansas State team went 8-5 overall, including five wins in the Sun Belt and earned a berth in the NOVA Home Loans Arizona Bowl. The defensive line featured prominently into the team's success as the Red Wolves' overall defense ranked among the nation's leaders in tackles for loss (No. 13), total defense (No. 17), first down defense (No. 21) and red zone defense (No. 27).

Arkansas State finished Douglas' first year with the team sporting a 7-5 overall record, a 6-2 mark in the Sun Belt and an appearance in the Camellia Bowl. The defense again ranked among the nation's most prolific, including a spot in the

top-10 with 8.8 tackles for loss per game (No. 6).

Douglas spent 2016 as defensive line coach and academic liaison at Hutchinson Community College in Kansas. During his lone season at Hutchinson, the Blue Dragons defense ranked No. 12 in the nation in scoring defense (18.0 ppg), No. 10 in total defense (242.0 ypg) and No. 13 in rushing defense (91.0 ypg).

Hutchinson's defense at Hutchinson led the conference and ranked 14th nationally in sacks with 44, and the defensive line accounted for 24.5 of those to go along with 74.5 tackles for loss.

Douglas tutored two All-Region VI First Team selections, including Ronheen Bingham and J.J. Holmes. He also coached second team all-conference pick Tayland Humphrey, the No. 1 JUCO defensive tackle in the nation for his signing class.

Douglas went to Hutchinson after serving as the tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator at Coffeyville Community College in Kansas during 2015. The Red Ravens posted an 8-3 record, while their offense ranked No. 5 in the nation in scoring (over 50 ppg) and No. 8 in total offense (over 480 ypg). He coached Second Team All-Jayhawk Conference selection Trevor Neloms as well.

The 2013 and 2014 seasons saw Douglas coach at Ave Maria University in Florida in multiple roles.

Working as the running backs and return specialist coach in 2013, Douglas was part of the staff that achieved the program's first winning season while also being recognized as the NAIA Independent Conference champions. The Ave Maria staff was selected to coach the NAIA All-Star Team in the NAIA vs. Division II All-Star game.

During 2013, Douglas tutored USCAA All-America running back Scott Jones, who led the team with 12 rushing touchdowns, while the kick return unit averaged 23.2 yards per attempt. Ave Maria went 8-2 overall on the year, the most wins in a single season in the history of the program.

Douglas was promoted to recruiting coordinator in 2014 and also moved from running backs coach to wide receivers coach. The 2014 season saw his receiving corps post over 2,200 receiving yards and 20 touchdowns, both of which led the conference. He coached Travis Makauskas, who led the league in receptions, yards and touchdowns and was selected for the 2014 NAIA vs. D2 All-Star Game.

Douglas began his coaching career at Lincoln High School in the fall of 2012, operating as the varsity outside linebackers and running backs coach. He helped lead the team to a 6-3 record, and the squad produced three all-conference players.

The Milan, Michigan, native was a member of the Northern Michigan University football team from 2007-11, appearing in 35 games as a linebacker and defensive end while recording 89 tackles, 9.0 sacks and two interceptions.

Douglas earned his bachelor's degree in special education/secondary education in 2011.



KEVIN SHERMAN

WIDE RECEIVERS
FERRUM, '92
SECOND SEASON AT BUFFALO

Kevin Sherman is in his second season as wide receivers coach.

In his first season at UB, he oversaw a very productive wide receiver unit. Justin Marshall had 64 catches for 837 yards and Quian Williams had 61 grabs for 743 yards. It marked just the second time in the last 13 years that two UB receivers registered over 700 receiving in the same season.

Williams was named All-MAC Third Team and finished his two-year career in Buffalo 10th in program history with 125 receptions. Marshall was named the MVP of the Camellia Bowl after hauling in 11 catches for 127 yards and a touchdown against Georgia Southern. His 11 receptions were two shy of the single-game school record.

Sherman has over 30 years of coaching experience, coaching in four BCS bowl games and 11 bowl games total. He most recently was the assistant head coach and coached the wide receivers at Murray State. In his time with the Racers, LeMarte Brooks was an All-OVC First Team selection and Jacob Bell earned second-team All-OVC honors.



From 2000-18, Sherman worked with power five programs, including three ACC teams. He coached in five ACC Championship games, winning three titles.

From 2015-18, Sherman was the wide receivers coach at Pittsburgh. He coached the Panthers' all-time leading receiver Tyler Boyd.

From 2013-14, Sherman was the wide receivers coach at Purdue. He coached Deangelo Yancey who was named to the 2013 Big Ten All-Freshman Team.

Sherman spent seven years at Virginia Tech as wide receivers coach (2006-12). He coached standouts Jarrett Boykin and Danny Coale, at the time, the top two receivers in Hokies' history in terms of receptions and receiving yards. Both starring at Tech from 2008 to 2011, Boykin finished his collegiate career with 184 receptions for 2,884 yards and 18 touchdowns, while Coale recorded 165 catches for 2,658 yards and eight scores. During his time at Virginia Tech, the Hokies went a combined 60-22 with seven bowl appearances, including four BCS bowl bids (2007 Orange, 2008 Orange, 2010 Orange and 2011 Sugar).

Prior to Virginia Tech, Sherman spent five seasons at Wake Forest University (wide receivers), four at MAC-foe Ohio (wide receivers), four at Virginia Military Institute (recruiting coordinator), two at Methodist College (wide receivers) and one at his alma mater Ferrum College (student assistant).

A native of Radford, VA, he graduated from Ferrum in 1992, after serving as the team captain of the football team and being elected as the team MVP as a senior in 1990. He was inducted into Ferrum's Hall of Fame in 2012.



KEVIN CORLESS

LINEBACKERS
NORTHWEST MISSOURI STATE
SECOND SEASON AT BUFFALO

Kevin Corless is in his second season as linebackers coach at Buffalo.

Corless made an immediate impact with the Bulls as the linebacker unit was one of the strongest on the

team in 2022. Starting linebackers Shaun Dolac and James Patterson were both named All-MAC.

Dolac was a first-team selection after leading the Mid-American Conference and ranking second in the nation in tackles with 147. He had a school-record 97 solo tackles which was tops in the nation. Patterson was named to the All-MAC Second Team after totaling a career-best 120 tackles and finishing his career with 417 tackles, fourth in program history.

He helped lead the Bulls to a victory over Georgia Southern in the Camellia Bowl for UB's third bowl win in program history.

Corless brought over 30 years of coaching experience to Buffalo, most recently serving as linebackers coach at Samford.

He was the linebackers coach for Samford's 2021 spring and fall seasons. Upon his arrival, the Bulldogs made dramatic improvements, including moving from last to first in the Southern Conference in takeaways, interceptions and opponent third-down conversion.

Corless arrived at Samford from Army West Point, where he served as the inside linebackers coach from 2014 to 2019. He helped lead the Black Knights from a 2-10 season in 2013 to averaging nearly 10 wins a season over the 2016, 2017 and 2018 campaigns, earning 29 wins. The 2018 team won 11 games, the most in school history.

Prior to Army, Corless spent two seasons at Georgia Southern. In 2012, he guided the linebackers and then served as co-defensive coordinator with Jack Curtin in 2013. The 2012 squad advanced to the FCS national semifinals and the 2013 team beat Florida, but was not eligible for postseason play as the Eagles made the jump to FBS.

Prior to joining the Georgia Southern staff, Corless spent nine years at Arkansas State. He was the co-defensive coordinator for the first seven years before handling the defense solely his last two seasons. In addition, he oversaw the linebackers and punt return units.

Rivals.com named Corless the Sun Belt "Defensive Coordinator of the Year" for the accomplishments of his 2009 Red Wolves' defense. That season capped a four-year run that saw the defense claim either first or second in each of the league's five major defensive statistical categories.

Corless has guided seven players who have been selected in the NFL draft since 1998, including second-round choice Tyrell Johnson, the 2007 Sun Belt Conference Defensive Player of the Year. Corless mentored Alex Carrington to the league's top defensive honor and a third-round selection by the Buffalo Bills. DeMario Davis is the most recent of Corless' charges to be drafted when he was chosen in the third round by the New York Jets in 2012. He guided 10 All-Sun Belt Conference linebackers and three Freshmen All-America choices.

Corless was at Northwestern State in 1995 as a defensive line coach and was elevated to co-defensive coordinator in 1999 with oversight of the linebackers during his final three seasons. Northwestern State made NCAA FCS playoff appearances in 1997, 1998 and 2001 and won two Southland Conference titles.

Corless played and graduated from Northwest Missouri State and spent two seasons as a graduate assistant where the team went 10-2 and qualified for the national playoffs. He moved to Montana Tech to mentor linebackers and serve as special teams coordinator. During his eight seasons, he helped the Orediggers transform from winless in three seasons into conference champions and an NAIA playoff team in 1992.

Corless and his wife Stacey have three children, Anne, Caitlin and Joe.



BRYAN APPLEWHITE

RUNNING BACKS
NORTHERN COLORADO '98
FIRST SEASON AT BUFFALO

A coaching veteran of over 20 years, Bryan Applewhite is in his first season as running backs coach at Buffalo. He comes to UB from Nebraska where he spent the 2022 campaign.

In his lone season with the Huskers, he coached Anthony Grant who rushed for 915 yards, the highest total by a Husker since 2018. True freshman Ajay Allen showed his potential by averaging 5.8 yards per carry over the season's first four games before he suffered a season-ending injury.

Prior to arriving at Nebraska, Applewhite spent two seasons at TCU. He helped the Horned Frogs rank in the top 30 nationally in rushing both seasons. TCU was the Big 12 rushing champion in 2020, averaging 214.7 rushing yards per game to rank 20th nationally in rushing. The Horned Frogs then finished 30th in the country in 2021 at 196.3 rushing yards per game. In 2020, TCU had three running backs top 100 yards in a single game, with true freshmen Zach Evans (7.7 ypc) and Kendre Miller (7.2 ypc), posting the second- and fifth-best yards per carry averages in Horned Frogs history, respectively.

Applewhite spent five seasons as running backs coach at Colorado State from 2015 to 2019. He also took on the added responsibility as the Rams' recruiting coordinator in 2018 and 2019. In his time at CSU, the Rams posted two of their top five season marks in total offense and points per game. Colorado State reached three bowl games in five seasons while Applewhite was on staff.

Applewhite's Colorado State running backs posted 24 individual 100-yard rushing games. Ram running backs Izzy Matthews and Dalyn Dawkins each finished in the top eight on the CSU career rushing list under Applewhite's guidance.

Applewhite coached for five years at Louisiana-Monroe from 2010 to 2014, working with the running backs and coordinating the Warhawks' recruiting efforts. He coached two all-conference running backs while at ULM. In 2012, his running backs combined for 19 total touchdowns as the Warhawks finished with eight wins and played in the Independence Bowl, the school's first bowl games since joining the FBS in 1994.

He spent one season at FCS Montana State in 2009. In his lone season, Applewhite coached a running back tandem that combined for more than 1,100 rushing yards and 10 touchdowns.

Applewhite was at Wyoming for six seasons as running backs coach from 2003 to 2008. While at Wyoming, Applewhite tutored two of Wyoming's four all-time leading rushers in Devin Moore and Wynel Seldon.

He spent four seasons from 1999 to 2002 coaching at his alma mater, Northern Colorado. He first served as a graduate assistant in 1999 and was elevated to a full-time assistant coach in 2000. The Bears played in the Division II playoffs in both 1999 and 2002 while Applewhite was on the coaching staff.

Applewhite was a standout fullback at Northern Colorado from 1994 to 1998. He



played on teams that won two NCAA Division II National Championships (1996 and 1997), competed in the Division II Playoffs four straight seasons (1995-98) and won North Central Conference crowns during his junior and senior seasons.

He graduated with his bachelor's degree from Northern Colorado in 1998 and his master's degree in 2001.

Applewhite has served as a member of the American Football Coaches' Association (AFCA) Minority Advancement Committee since 2006 and was recently reappointed to the Committee. In 2007, he was named to the AFCA Assistant Coaches' Committee and participated in the 2004 AFCA Coaches' Academy.



HOLMAN COPELAND

DEFENSIVE BACKS
CLARION '07
FIRST SEASON AT BUFFALO

Holman Copeland is in his first season as defensive backs coach.

It's a homecoming of sorts for Copeland who was a graduate assistant on the UB staff in 2012 and 2013. He spent the last four seasons at as cornerbacks coach at Delaware. He was promoted to recruiting coordinator prior to the 2022 campaign.

In 2022, the Blue Hens went 8-5 and advanced to the second round of the FCS playoffs. Delaware led the CAA in total defense, passing defense and scoring defense. They totaled eight interceptions and 33 pass breakups on the season. Cornerback Justin Henley was named as All-CAA Second Team selection.

In 2021, the Delaware defense ranked fifth in the CAA in passing defense, allowing just 204.9 yards per game through the air. UD's cornerbacks had a stellar season as they combined for five interceptions and 16 pass breakups. Nijuel Hill was an All-CAA Second Team selection and eventual signed with the Washington Commanders as an UDFA.

During the Blue & Gold's run to the FCS Semifinals in the 2020-21 spring season, the defense was absolutely dominant leading the CAA in both scoring defense (14.4 ppg) and passing defense (118.4 ypg). Hill earned his first All-CAA nod as he was named to the second team while also earning Second Team All-American (Stats Perform) honors.

Prior Delaware, Copeland spent two seasons (2017-18) at William & Mary where he was the secondary coach and an assistant special teams coordinator. During his first season in Williamsburg, Copeland was instrumental in developing W&M's secondary. He helped mentor two of the league's top players in Aaron Swinton and Raeshawn Smith and safety Corey Parker was an All-CAA Third Team selection.

The Tribe had two members of its secondary earn All-CAA honors in 2018, led by safety Isaiah Laster earning a second team nod. Parker earned his second-straight postseason honor as he was named to the All-CAA Second Team. In addition, Copeland helped push the secondary at William & Mary to a top-25 national ranking in passing yards allowed (190.0 ypg) in 2018.

Copeland joined the Tribe's staff after a three-year stint (2014-16) as an assistant at Central Connecticut State where he served as the outside linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator. During his successful stint at CCSU, Copeland produced four all-conference selections.

Copeland worked as a graduate assistant at UB for two seasons (2012-13). In addition to mentoring and helping develop NFL first-round selection Khalil Mack as a linebackers assistant in 2012, he coached the secondary the following season and helped the Bulls rank second in the Mid-American Conference in both total defense and scoring defense. Buffalo also earned a bid to the Idaho Potato Bowl in 2013.

Copeland's resume also includes a pair of one-year stints as the secondary coach at East Stroudsburg University (2011) and the University of New Haven (2010). He produced a pair of all-conference cornerbacks during both seasons, while his unit helped ESU lead the league in interceptions during the 2011 campaign. Additionally, New Haven won the NE-10 Championship in 2010.

He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at East Stroudsburg and then spent a season as the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at Harry S. Truman (Levittown, PA) in 2009.

Copeland was a two-year letterwinner at Clarion University of Pennsylvania where he played safety. He graduated from Clarion in 2007 with a Bachelor of Science degree in communications and a minor in sport management. He earned his Master of Science degree in sport management from East Stroudsburg.



MIKE CAPUTO

SAFETIES

FIRST SEASON AT BUFFALO

Mike Caputo is in his first season as safeties coach.

Caputo came to Buffalo from Wisconsin where he spent the 2022 season as a defensive assistant. Along with working with the outside linebackers coach, he assisted with defensive game planning as well as special teams game planning.

Prior to Wisconsin, Caputo spent two seasons at Baylor where he was a defensive quality control coach. He helped coach the defensive backs, working with the safeties and nickels in 2020 and the cornerbacks in 2021. He helped lead the Bears to a 12-2 record, BIG XII Championship and Sugar Bowl victory in 2021.

In 2019, Caputo was the safeties coach at Utah State. Also assisting with special teams opponent game planning, he help lead the Aggies to an appearance in the 2019 SERVPRO First Responders Bowl.

Caputo began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at LSU. In his two years with the Tigers (2017-18), they won 19 games and played in two New Year's Day bowl games, including a victory in the 2019 Fiesta Bowl.

Caputo played safety at Wisconsin from 2011-15. In all, he played in 53 games, making 40 starts, and was part of a senior class that posted a 38-16 record over four years, including wins in the Outback (Jan. 1, 2015) and Holiday (Dec. 20, 2015) bowls, in addition to the 2012 Big Ten Championship and 2014 Big Ten West Division title. For his career, he recorded 244 total tackles, including 10.0 tackles for loss, while adding three interceptions, 20 passes defensed, four forced fumbles and five fumbles recovered, while notching six career double-digit tackle games.

In all, Caputo started 39 out of a possible 40 games during his final three seasons in Madison and earned second-team All-America honors from the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) following his junior campaign. As a junior, he led the Badgers with 106 tackles, which included a sack and six tackles for loss, while adding four forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one interception and six passes defensed.

Caputo played in the 2016 East-West Shrine Game and earned Defensive MVP honors after recording three tackles and two interceptions.

Following his collegiate career, Caputo received a training camp invitation from the New Orleans Saints and later signed a free agent contract with the Los Angeles Rams prior to the 2016 season.

Caputo graduated from Wisconsin in 2015 with a degree in life sciences communication and a certificate in entrepreneurship.

CONWAY, SC – The University at Buffalo football team dropped a 38-26 decision to Coastal Carolina on Saturday afternoon at Brooks Stadium. The UB defense forced four turnovers, but it wasn't enough to overcome some of their own miscues.

On Coastal Carolina's first play from scrimmage, Shaun Dolac forced a fumble that was recovered by James Patterson. The Bulls were able to convert the turnover into points as Alex McNulty drilled a 36-yard field goal to give the Bulls a 3-0 lead.

McNulty was automatic on the day. The senior kicker made all four of his attempts on the day, also connecting from 47, 42 and 26 yards. He became the first UB kicker to make four field goals in a game since A.J. Principe made four at Syracuse in 2007.

The Bulls were able to take the lead into the locker room when Cole Snyder found Justin Marshall for a 15-yard touchdown with just 36 seconds left in the second quarter.

After McNulty's fourth field goal gave the Bulls a 19-14 lead late in the third quarter, the Chanticleers rattled off 17 straight points, including a touchdown on a fumble return to take a 31-19 lead.

Snyder found Quian Williams over the middle for a 10-yard touchdown catch with 5:36 left to cut the Coastal lead to 31-26. However, the Bulls were unable to get the stop they needed as the Chanticleers scored on a long touchdown play on their next possession to ice the game.

Snyder threw for 264 yards and two touchdowns in the game. His favorite targets were Marshall and Williams who each had eight catches. Marshall finished with 88 receiving yards and Williams had 62. Jamari Gassett and Marlyn Johnson had five and four catches, respectively, career high for both.

Patterson led the defense with nine tackles and added a tackle for loss and a fumble recovery. Cornerback Caleb Offord had his best game as a Bull, finishing with eight tackles and a fumble recovery. Safety Jahmin Muse sparked the Bulls early with three tackles, a forced fumble, a fumble recovery and a pass breakup.

The four forced turnovers by the Bulls were the most they had in a game since forcing five at Northern Illinois in the opener of the 2020 campaign.

Snyder later punched it in. Late in the half, Williams returned a kickoff 75 yards to set up an Alex McNulty field goal as time expired. On Ohio's first possession of the third quarter, Keyshawn Cobb picked off Ohio quarterback Kurtis Rourke and returned it 26 yards for a touchdown and just like that it was 24-17.

After Ohio answered with a touchdown to go up by 14 points, Snyder hit Mike Washington on a short pass for a touchdown to again bring the Bulls to within seven, 31-24, with 1:46 left in the third quarter. The touchdown was set up by a fumble forced by Cobb and recovered by Marcus Fuqua near midfield.

Unfortunately, turnovers hurt the Bulls in the fourth quarter as they fumbled twice, thwarting their comeback effort.

Snyder finished with 234 yards passing and two scores. Marshall and Quian Williams each had six catches in the game. Robbie Mangas added a career-high four grabs for 41 yards.

Defensively, Buffalo was led by the linebacker duo of James Patterson and Shaun Dolac. Patterson had a career-high 16 tackles, including 1.5 tackles for loss. Dolac had 10 tackles in the game.

It was all Buffalo early on as the Bulls built a 24-7 halftime lead. UB controlled the line of scrimmage and got three rushing touchdowns in the first half. The first was a short run by Mike Washington, followed by a 25-yard run by Ron Cook, Jr. and a 30-yard run by Al-Jay Henderson.

Alex McNulty tacked on a 42-yard field goal with just 20 seconds left in the first half.

McNulty drilled a 54-yard field goal with 9:42 left in the fourth quarter to give the Bulls the lead, 27-24. It was McNulty's second field goal of the game and 18th of the season, setting a school record for single-season made field goals.

Unfortunately for the Bulls, Central Michigan responded with a touchdown with 7:29 remaining to take the lead for good.

The Bulls rushed for 240 yards in the game, led by Cook's 100. His second 100-yard game in the last three games. Henderson added 72 yards on the ground.

BUFFALO, NY – The University at Buffalo football team fell in overtime to Kent State, 30-27, at UB Stadium on Saturday afternoon. The Golden Flashes spoiled the Bulls' opportunity to become bowl eligible and they will now need to beat Akron on Friday for their sixth win.

It was a very windy day at UB Stadium and the conditions effected both teams. Capitalizing on a strong tailwind, the Bulls were able to score twice in the third quarter to take a 24-10 lead.

Matt Myers, who saw his first playing time of the season was a big spark for the Bulls. The senior quarterback rushed for a career-high 110 yards and all three of UB's touchdowns in the game. He tied Buffalo's FBS record for rushing yards in a game by a quarterback, tying Alex Zordich who also rushed for 110 yards at Ohio in 2012.

However, with the help of the wind in the fourth quarter, Kent State was able to rally and score 14 points to tie the game at 24-24 with one minute left in regulation and send the game into overtime. Buffalo scored first in OT on a 30-yard field goal by Alex McNulty, his second of the game. The Golden Flashes countered with a 7-yard touchdown pass for the walk-off win.

Linebacker Shaun Dolac had another stellar game for the Bulls, finishing with a game-high 14 tackles, nine of which were solo. He broke the single-season school record for solo tackles with 86, surpassing the previous record of 80 set by Craig Guest in 1996. Fellow linebacker James Patterson had 10 tackles, including 1.5 tackle for loss. He is now just one tackle shy of becoming just the fifth UB player to amass 400 career tackles.

Cole Snyder completed 20-of-28 passes for 165 yards in the game. Quian Williams had four catches for 63 yards and Mike Washington had four receptions for 23 yards to lead the receivers.

BUFFALO, NY – Cole Snyder connected with Quian Williams on a fourth-down, 16-yard touchdown pass with just 1:15 left in the fourth quarter to help rally Buffalo to a 23-22 victory over Akron at UB Stadium on Friday afternoon. The win was UB's sixth of the season, assuring the Bulls will play in a bowl game.

Playing without several key players due to injury, including running backs Ron Cook, Jr. and Al-Jay Henderson, the Bulls turned to the passing game to mount the comeback.

Snyder threw for 264 yards and three touchdowns in the game. Justin Marshall had six catches for 83 yards and a pair of scores, including a 38-yard touchdown grab with just 30 seconds left in the half and a six-yard TD grab late in the third quarter that gave the Bulls a brief lead.

Buffalo was trailing 22-17 with 3:07 left in the game. It looked bleak for the Bulls until Jaylon Bass jumped on a loose ball to give UB possession at its own 40-yard line. The Bulls marched down the field on completions to Williams, Marlyn Johnson, Trevor Borland and Marshall. On 4th-and-10 at the Akron 16, Williams made the play of the game, catching a pass from Snyder near the goal line and before getting knocked out of bounds, reached the ball back behind his head and over the goal line for the game-winning score.

On the ensuing Akron possession, Marcus Fuqua sealed the win with his second interception of the game. The All-MAC first-teamer has seven interceptions on the season – the most by a UB player in its FBS era.

Buffalo fell behind to the Zips, 16-0, but the defense kept the Bulls in the game until the offense could get things going. Linebacker Shaun Dolac had another big game, finishing with a game-high 12 tackles and 2.5 sacks. James Patterson, playing in his final game at UB Stadium, had 11 tackles and two tackles for loss. He became just the fifth player in program history to surpass 400 career tackles.

MONTGOMERY, AL – For the second time in three years, the University at Buffalo football team hoisted the Camellia Bowl trophy over its heads as bowl champions, defeating Georgia Southern, 23-21, at the Cramton Bowl on Tuesday afternoon. An undermanned Bulls squad had reserve players step up all day to help UB win its third bowl in program history.

Players like Clevester Hines, who before this week was a wide receiver, was forced to start at cornerback and finished with seven tackles and three pass breakups. He helped the Bulls slow down a pass-happy, high-powered Georgia Southern offense. On the offensive side of the ball, running back Tajay Ahmed was pressed into action due to injuries and responded by rushing for a career-high 98 yards and a touchdown.

While several new faces stepped up, the usual old reliables paced the Bulls, especially early. Wide receiver Justin Marshall had 11 catches for 127 yards, both career highs, and scored UB's first touchdown of the game enroute to being named the bowl's Most Valuable Player.

Marshall was the favorite target of quarterback Cole Snyder who threw for 265 yards and a score. He became just the third quarterback in program history to throw for 3,000 yards in a season. Snyder also connected with Quian Williams five times for 100 yards.

Buffalo took a 14-6 lead late in the first half on a short touchdown run by Ahmed.

Georgia Southern responded early in the second half by quickly tying the game on a long touchdown pass. However, the Bulls answered with consecutive Alex McNulty field goals to take a 20-14 lead into the fourth quarter.

Early in the fourth quarter, Dylan Powell came up with his first career interception to set up UB at the Georgia Southern 40-yard line. The Bulls were able to drive down the field and McNulty hit a chip shot to extend the UB lead to nine. It was McNulty's third field goal of the game and 49th of his career, breaking the program's all-time record.

The Eagles scored a touchdown, with 3:38 left, to cut the UB advantage to two points. However, the Bulls were able to get two key first downs and Georgia Southern never got the ball back.

Linebacker Shaun Dolac led the UB defense with 13 tackles and added a forced fumble that was recovered by Jalen McNair to set up a UB field goal. Fellow linebacker James Patterson, making his 56th and final career start for the Bulls, had eight tackles, including a tackle for loss.

It was the third straight bowl win for the Bulls after winning the 2019 Bahamas Bowl and 2020 Camellia Bowl.

The year was 1894. Fourteen University at Buffalo medical students got together, bought uniforms and practiced after classes, splitting time at Brown's Riding Academy on East North Street and John's Riding Academy on East Utica. After honing their skills carefully, avoiding remnants of horses that grazed their practice pastures, they put on their blue jerseys, tight pants, and leather boots and stepped onto a baseball field on East Ferry Street to face Hobart College. As they kicked off to the visitors, no one among those first UB football players could have foreseen the journey they were embarking upon. They were not merely kicking a football, they were kicking off UB's quest for intercollegiate competition.

UB's football program began modestly when the University, then a private institution consisting of schools of dentistry, law, medicine and pharmacy, formed an athletic association. The athletic association in turn started the first football program. That first team was led by captain A. B. Stein who was joined by founding members J.B. Crofts, Irving Johnson, William Potter, Gray McCutcheon, St. John Green and "Dinky" Johnson. During the first three years of its existence, the football team played squads from the University of Rochester and Hobart College and experienced little success, compiling a record of 0-2-4. Most importantly however, the team gained recognition from UB during this period when the University granted the team usage of an on-campus field for its home games.

UB football savored its first taste of success in 1897 when the team compiled a 7-0 record under manager E.J. Meyer and coach C.W. Dibble. Crowds began to flock to UB's home games, and in response the university moved many of the team's more popular contests to Civic Stadium in 1900.

The UB football bandwagon really gained momentum when the team played in an exhibition match at the 1901 Pan-American Exposition. UB played in front of a Chinese representative who "...did not understand much about the game, was delighted to see the sport." This high point was short-lived however, as UB was dealt a crushing 128-0 defeat by national powerhouse University of Michigan in what remains the worst defeat ever suffered by a UB squad. That loss seemingly was symbolic of the hard times to come as poor support and organization for the following two seasons forced UB's athletic association to cease football operations after the 1903 season.

Frank M. Pleasant awoke the hibernating UB football program in 1915 when he revitalized the program as the team's first full-time, professional head coach. UB adopted the Bison as its mascot that year and proceeded to a 3-3 record.

Art Powell took over the reins of the program in 1916, helping UB to improve with each season. UB football hit a peak in 1918 when the squad compiled a 3-1 record. The Bisons also enjoyed their most lopsided victory to date during the '18 campaign, an 81-0 defeat of Hobart.

The 1923 season brought many changes to UB's football program. James Batterson took over as head coach and the Bisons played their first

game at Rotary Field, dedicated by the Rotary Club of Buffalo. Dr. James Ailinger, a standout basketball player for UB and a member of the 1922 football team, recalled UB's humble facilities on opening day at Rotary Field.

"The first season we played here we had to dress up in Hayes Hall and run to the field," said Ailinger. "In between there was a farm, so we had to run through potato and vegetable fields to reach the stadium. Only the end zone was marked. There were stones everywhere and the end zone on the side near the present medical school was six feet higher than the other side. Winning the toss was important because we could choose to play uphill or downhill."

UB struggled the first season in its new home, compiling a 1-5 record. The six seasons that followed under head coaches James Bond (1923) and Russell Carrick (1924-28) were rather bleak as well. The Bisons did not have a winning season over that period, tallying a record of 7-36-3. By 1929 it was quite evident that UB's football program desperately needed resuscitation once again. The man to jump start UB was head coach Jay "Biffy" Lee, former roommate at Notre Dame of legendary coach Knute Rockne. Some of Rockne's majestic motivation must have rubbed off

as Lee led UB to a 5-2 record in what would be the Bisons' only winning campaign in 16 seasons. Lee upgraded UB's schedule during the following two seasons and the Bisons' record suffered once again as they fell to squads from Fordham, Carnegie Tech, Dartmouth and the Notre Dame B team.

In 1931, the team changed its mascot to the Bull in order to distinguish UB from the professional teams in the Queen City.

Jim Peelle was hired as the 12th head coach in Bulls' history in 1936 with the burden of ending six consecutive losing campaigns. Peelle rejuvenated the program by notching five victories against three losses in his inaugural season. That success was short-lived however, as UB failed to post another winning

season until 1942 when Peelle's squad went 6-2 once again with impressive victories over Hobart, St. Lawrence and Johns Hopkins.

UB heeded the call of its nation after the 1942 season by suspending all intercollegiate athletics due to the country's involvement in World War II. The Bulls returned to the field in 1946 and staged their second consecutive winning season for the first time since 1899. Civic Stadium became the home site for all UB home games in 1946, a relationship which lasted until 1954.

Frank Clair was hand-picked by Peelle to be his replacement in 1948. Clair extended UB's consecutive winning seasons mark to five during his two-year stint. The highlight of Clair's tenure was a 48-13 victory over the heavily-favored Louisville Cardinals.

The Canadian Football League lured Clair away in 1950 and UB Athletic Director Jim Peelle brought back a familiar face to lead the Bulls, former head coach James Wilson. Despite severe cutbacks in the football program's budget and mediocre seasons, the Bulls drew 26,126 fans to

HISTORY OF UB FOOTBALL





Civic Stadium, setting a single-game attendance record, in a 47-13 loss to Colgate.

In 1955, Clifford C. Furnas was named Chancellor of the University and instituted a five-year plan aimed at upgrading UB's athletic programs. Richard "Dick" Offenhamer was tabbed to lead the Bulls back to respectability and did so by posting a 4-4-1 record in his initial season. Fran Woidzik, a standout on the 1955 squad, went on to become the first Bull to be taken in the National Football League draft. Offenhamer's first season was a prelude of good things to come for the Bulls, as he would end his career with UB's best career winning percentage.

The year 1958 will forever be remembered as one of the greatest seasons in UB football history. On the strength of an 8-1 record that included victories over Harvard and Columbia, UB claimed the prestigious Lambert Cup, emblematic of Eastern small college supremacy. Team captains Nick Bottini and Lou Reale accepted the award on the Ed Sullivan Show on December 14 of that year before a national audience. The Bulls also earned an invitation to the Tangerine Bowl in Orlando, Florida but declined the offer to protest the discriminatory policies of the bowl's stadium, which refused to allow black athletes to compete on its field.

After posting an 8-1 record and finishing second in the Lambert Cup competition to Delaware in 1959, UB moved up to University Division status in 1960.

UB football made great strides in the early 1960s with stars like quarterback John "Long John" Stofa and defensive tackle Gerry Philbin. Stofa rewrote UB's passing records during his career while Philbin was named to the All-East team and played in the North-South and Coaches All-American post-season games. Both Stofa and Philbin would go on to play in the NFL following their UB careers.

UB reached another pinnacle in 1962, being recognized as "major" by the NCAA. UB also received attention in 1964 when its contest at Boston University was televised to a national audience.

Doc Urich handled UB's coaching duties for the 1966-68 seasons after Offenhamer stepped down. Urich guided UB to its finest season at the "major" level with a 7-3 record, losing only to Iowa State, Boston College and Villanova.

Bob Deming took over as head coach for the 1969 and '70 seasons and led the Bulls to wins over Boston College and Villanova in 1969. In 1970, ABC-TV regionally televised a 16-0 UB victory over Holy Cross at Rotary Field in the only game in UB history to be broadcast from Buffalo by a major network.

The black day in UB football history came in January of 1971 when due to expenses and the political climate on campus, football was dropped as a varsity sport.

In the fall of 1977, with the support of students, alumni and administration, UB restarted its football program with head coach Bill Dando at the reins. UB played four games in that first season, playing RIT to a 7-7 tie in its very first game back, the last tie in UB school history.

The Bulls built back to respectability quickly and did not have a losing season from 1980-1984, posting a 30-21 record.

In 1985, UB moved to the greener pastures of the Amherst Campus and the 4,000-seat UB Stadium. The Bulls defeated Villanova, 29-27, in Philadelphia in 1986 and once again talk of a possible upgrade of UB's program was alive.

New University President Steven Sample appealed to the Intercollegiate Athletics Board (IAB) in 1985 to upgrade UB to Division I-AA status. The IAB granted that request and after approval by the SUNY system in February of 1986, the "Run to Division I" had begun.

Former UB great Sam Sanders was hired in 1990 to replace Bill Dando and lead the Bulls from Division III and into the spotlight of Division I. After two rebuilding years under Sanders, the program took a hard hit when the head coach was forced to step down for medical reasons. Jim Ward, UB's offensive coordinator under Sanders, became the 20th head



coach of the University at Buffalo's football program in 1992.

Under the direction of Athletic Director Nelson E. Townsend with the strong support of University President William R. Greiner, UB completed its "Run to Division I" on September 4, 1993, playing its first game at the Division I level in more than 20 years against the University of Maine. UB unveiled its \$22 million, 16,500-seat UB Stadium on the Amherst Campus, site of the 1993 World University Games. In front of 14,179 fans, the Bulls put on quite a show, taking the lead with 51 seconds remaining in the contest. Maine spoiled UB's return, however, scoring a last-second touchdown to earn a 31-27 win.

In January of 1995, the Bulls came full circle when they hired UB alum Craig Cirbus ('80), who had spent the previous 11 years as an assistant under legendary coach Joe Paterno at Penn State.

A few months later, the Bulls wowed Western New York when they announced that they would be heading to Division I-A and the Mid-American Conference in 1999.

The 1996 season will go down as one of the finest in school history. The Bulls finished 8-3 on the season, earning the first Top 25 ranking in school history and earning Cirbus I-AA Independent National Coach of the Year honors. In addition, three Bulls (Ed Ellis, Craig Guest and Gerald Carlson) signed NFL contracts with Ellis being picked in the 4th round by the New England Patriots.

In 1999, UB rejoined the ranks of major college football with its entrance into the Mid-American Conference. The Bulls were back in the big-time for the first time in nearly 30 years.

The Bulls earned their first Division I-A victory in 30 years on September 23, 2000 when they nipped Bowling Green, 20-17, at UB Stadium. Buffalo would go on to defeat Kent State and finish 2-4 in the MAC East in 2000.

On November 30, 2000 Athletic Director Bob Arkeilpane announced the hiring of Jim Hofher as the 22nd head football coach in UB history. Hofher brought with him to Buffalo 22 years of Division I coaching ex-



perience, including stints as an assistant at Tennessee, Syracuse and North Carolina and eight years as head coach at Cornell University.

On December 16, 2005 Athletic Director Warde Manuel announced that Turner Gill, who was part of three national championships as a coach at the University of Nebraska and a Heisman Trophy finalist as a player, agreed to a five-

year contract to become the 23rd head football coach at the University at Buffalo. In his first season with the Bulls, UB scored 220 points, the most by a Buffalo team since moving to I-A.

Buffalo had its most successful season since returning to the Division I-A ranks in 2007. The Bulls finished the year 5-7 overall and 5-3 in the Mid-American Conference for a share of the East Division regular season title. Turner Gill was named MAC Coach of the Year and a UB record eight players were named to the All-Conference Team. Junior quarterback Drew Willy completed a school-record 258 passes and had the highest pass efficiency rating in school history and sophomore running back James Starks became the Bulls' first 1,000-yard rusher in the I-A era with 1,103 yards.

On December 5, 2008 the Bulls defeated 12th-ranked and undefeated Ball State to win the MAC Championship for the first time in school history.

The Bulls had an 8-6 record in 2008. The eight wins were the most in the Bulls' Division I-A era and one shy of the school record for wins in a season.

The 2008 season featured one of the most explosive offenses in school history. Gill, who handled the play calling, commanded an offense that scored a school-record 424 points. Quarterback Drew Willy threw for a school-record 3,304 yards and 25 touchdowns, running back James Starks ran for a school-record 1,333 yards and 16 touchdowns and wideout Naaman Roosevelt established school records of 104 receptions, 1,402 yards and 13 touchdowns.

The Bulls played in their first ever bowl game when they faced off against Connecticut in the 2009 International Bowl.

The Bulls finished 2009 season 5-7 and featured an offense that averaged 405 yards per game - the highest average in UB's Division I-A era. Numerous Bulls wrapped up record-breaking careers. Although he missed the entire season with a shoulder injury, Starks finished his career as the school record holder for rushing (3,140 yards) and rushing touchdowns (34). He was selected by the Green Bay Packers in the sixth round of the NFL Draft. Naaman Roosevelt set the school record for receptions (268) and receiving yards (3,551) and signed with the Buffalo Bills.

Jeff Quinn was hired as Buffalo's 24th head coach on December 22, 2010. Quinn has produced record-breaking offenses throughout his 27-year college coaching tenure and has won conference and national championships at his last three stops, including five conference crowns in the past eight seasons. He most recently spent three seasons as the offensive coordinator at Cincinnati.

In 2010, Davonte Shannon broke the school record for career tackles with 461 enroute to being named to the All-MAC First Team for the fourth straight year. He became just the fourth player in the history of the Mid-American Conference to earn that distinction. Cornerback Josh Thomas was selected in the fifth round (143rd pick) of the NFL Draft by the Dallas Cowboys.

in 2011, Branden Oliver rushed for a school-record 1,395 yards and added 13 touchdowns en route to earning first-team All-MAC honors. Chazz Anderson transferred from Cincinnati to play his final season at Buffalo. The UB signal caller threw for 2,454 yards and 11 touchdowns on the year. He set a single-game school record with 35 completions against Northern Illinois (10/22). Khalil Mack ranked third in the nation in tackles for loss with 20.5.

The Bulls had a strong finish to the 2012 campaign by winning three of the final four games. Using a plethora of running backs, the Bulls rushed for 2,120 yards - the third highest total in school history. Khalil Mack was named All-MAC First Team for the second straight year in a season in which he set the school record for career tackles for loss (56) and forced fumbles (11).

UB had one of its finest seasons as a Division I-A program in 2013. The Bulls went 8-5, including a 6-2 record in the MAC. It was their most MAC wins since joining the conference in 1999. UB advanced to the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl for just its second ever bowl appearance in school history.

Branden Oliver finished his career as the Bulls all-time leading rusher with 4,409 yards. Alex Neutz broke the school record for career touchdown receptions with 31. And then there was Khalil Mack. The All-American linebacker broke the NCAA record for career forced fumbles with 16 and tied the NCAA mark for career tackles for loss with 75. He went on to become the Bulls' highest drafted player in school history as he was picked fifth overall by the Oakland Raiders in the 2014 NFL Draft.

Anthone Taylor rushed for 1,403 yards in 2014 - the second-highest single-season effort in school history. Lance Leipold was named the 25th UB football head coach on Dec. 1, 2014. Kristjan Sokoli was selected in the sixth round of the 2015 NFL Draft by the Seattle Seahawks.

The Bulls went 5-7 under first-year head coach Lance Leipold. Quarterback Joe Licata capped off his stellar career by setting nine different school passing records, including career passing yards (9,485) and career touchdown passes (76).

In 2016, Jordan Johnson rushed for over 1,000 yards on the season, including a then school-record 282 yards in a game vs. Akron. Linebacker Khalil Hodge finished the season with 123 tackles, just two shy of the FBS-era record for a single season.

The Bulls won the final three games of the 2017 season to finish 6-6 and earn bowl eligibility for just the third time in school history. In his first season at UB, junior wide receiver Anthony Johnson burst onto the scene with 76 catches for 1,356 yards and a school-record 14 touchdowns.

2018 was arguably the best season in the FBS era. The Bulls won a school-record 10 games, including a 7-1 mark in conference play - their best since joining the MAC in 1999. Buffalo played in the MAC Championship game for the second time in school history, dropping a 30-29 heartbreaker to Northern Illinois. UB played in its third bowl game in program history, falling to Troy, 42-32, in the Dollar General Bowl. Quarterback Tyree Jackson was named the MAC Offensive Player of the Year - the first time a UB player won the award.

Even with the departure of key personnel, the 2019 season proved to be a special one for the Bulls. UB finished with a record of 8-5 and finished the campaign by winning six of its last seven games, including a 31-9 victory over Charlotte in the Bahamas Bowl for the school's first bowl game victory. Sophomore running back Jaret Patterson set single-season school records with 1,799 yards rushing and 19 rushing touchdowns and paced a rushing attack that set a school record with 3,256 yards. A program-record 12 players were named to the All-MAC team.

The 2020 campaign was shortened due to the COVID-19 pandemic. However, once the season started in early November, the Bulls quickly established themselves as one of the best teams in the MAC. UB blazed through the regular season a perfect 5-0 and even made an appearance in the Top 25 for the first time in program history. The Bulls lost to Ball State in the MAC Championship game, but rebounded to win their second bowl game in as many years, defeating Marshall, 17-10, in the Camellia Bowl. Jaret Patterson was the story of the 2020 season. The junior running back rushed for 1,072 yards and 19 touchdowns in only six games. He led the nation in rushing average (178.7 ypg) and eclipsed 1,000 yards in his fifth game, tying the FBS record for earliest game to reach 1,000 yards. He was the MVP of the MAC and earned All-America honors.

Maurice Linguist was named the 26th head coach in program history on May 8, 2021. He led the Bulls to a 4-8 record in his first season. Running back Dylan McDuffie rushed for 1,049 yards and 11 touchdowns on the year.

The Bulls went 7-6 in 2022 and won their third bowl game in program history, a 23-21 victory over Georgia Southern in the Camellia Bowl. Safety Marcus Fuqua led the nation in interceptions with seven en route to becoming just the third player in program history to be named an AP All-American. Kicker Alex McNulty made a school record 24 field goals and was named MAC Special Teams Player of the Year.

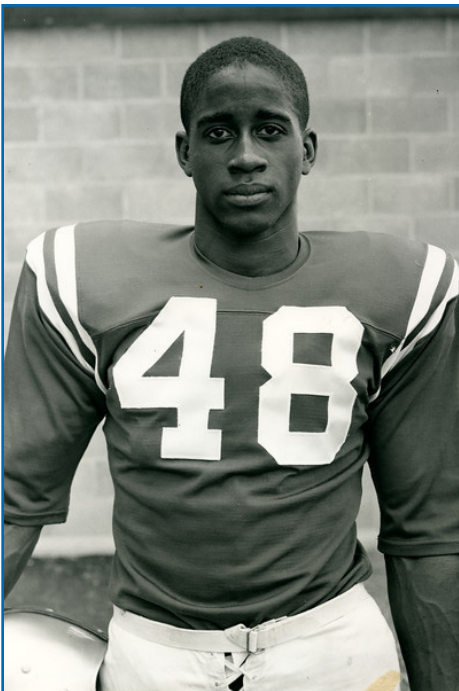
1931 - Local pro teams adopt "Bisons" nickname. UB takes the "Bulls" moniker.

1943 - University's Policy and Coordination Committee votes to suspend all intercollegiate athletics for the duration of World War II.

1949 - Squad goes 6-3, post-war record is 27-8-1.

1950s

1951 - UB goes 4-4, drawing a record crowd of 26,126 in a 47-13 loss to Colgate at Civic Stadium.

1955 - Dick Offenhamer named head coach. New UB Chancellor Dr. Clifford Furnas institutes five-year plan to upgrade athletics. Bulls return to Rotary Field for home games.

1958 - Team goes 8-1, wins Lambert Cup for small eastern college supremacy, beating Harvard and Columbia. Bulls receive Tangerine Bowl bid, but Peelle declines because black players were not welcome. Offenhamer named National Coach of the Week after win over Columbia.

1959 - Another standout 8-1 season; Bulls are second to Delaware in Lambert Cup voting.

1960s

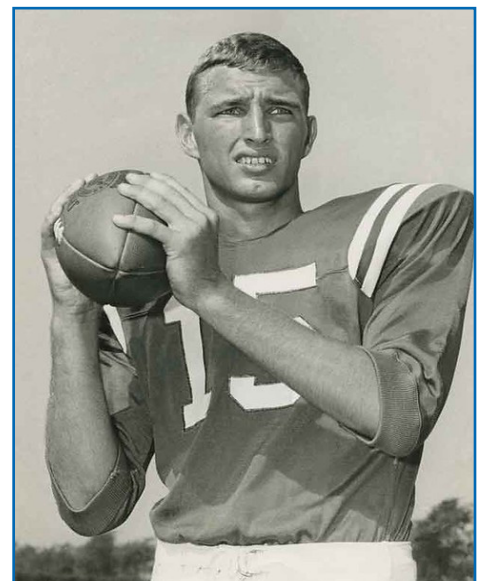
1960 - UB moves up to University Division status. Team goes 4-6.

1961 - First annual East-West All-America football game played at War Memorial Stadium. Quarterback John Stofa, who would later play for the Miami Dolphins and Cincinnati Bengals,

was the game's Most Valuable Player.

1962 - UB recognized as "Major" by the NCAA. Team goes 6-3.

1963 - UB becomes part of the SUNY system; squad finishes 5-3-1. Defensive tackle Gerry Philbin became first modern Bull to be named All-East and played in the North-South and Coaches All-America post-season games before being drafted by the New York Jets where he was an All-AFL selection and played on the 1969 World Champion team.

1964 - Team goes 4-4-1; game at Boston University is televised nationally.

1966 - Offenhamer resigns; former Notre Dame assistant to legendary Ara Parseghian, Richard W. (Doc) Urich is named head coach.

1968 - Team goes 7-3, ranked 9th in Lambert Cup voting.

1969 - Bob Deming, a 10-year assistant under Offenhamer, becomes head coach. Squad goes 6-3.

1970s

1970 - Buffalo's last season in "Big Time" football for over 20 years. ABC refuses to show UB Marching Band's halftime protest of the Vietnam War on its coverage of the UB-Holy Cross game.

1971 - Financial problems forced the school to drop the program in January.

1977 - The program is reinstated at the Division III level with student, alumni and faculty support; squad goes 0-3-1 under new coach Bill Dando.

1980s

1983 - UB earns an 8-2 record, its best since 1959. Quarterback Marty Barrett is named Upstate NY Player of the Year.

1986 - In one of the most successful campaigns in the program's history, the Bulls post a 9-2 record. Bulls ranked as high as No. 15 in national polls.

1990s

1990 - Sam Sanders replaces Dando who leaves as UB's all-time winningest coach. Team goes 2-8.

1992 - Sanders forced to retire due to medical reasons. Offensive coordinator Jim Ward named head coach. Schedule upgrade continues, featuring a number of Division I-AA opponents. Team posts a 4-6 record, and set seven offensive records, including most points in a season (319).

1993 - Bulls return to Division I for the first time in over 20 years. 14,179 fans witness season opener in New UB Stadium.

1995 - In January, the University names UB alum Craig Cirbus ('80) as their 21st head coach. Later that summer, Director of Athletics Nelson Townsend announces that UB will be moving to Division I-A football in the Mid-American Conference in 1999.

1996 - The Bulls finish the regular season 8-3, the most wins against a Division I schedule since 1959. The Bulls are ranked in the Top 25 as a Division I program for the first time in school history on Nov. 18. Head coach Craig Cirbus is named the Division I-AA Independent Coach of

the Year. Ed Ellis (fourth round to New England Patriots) becomes the first Bull in modern Division I era to be drafted.

1998 - UB surpasses NCAA mandated attendance count by averaging nearly 20,000 fans per game to gain admission to Division I-A football and the Mid-American Conference.

1999 - The Bulls join the MAC and begin play in the newly-expanded 31,000-seat UB Stadium, bringing I-A football to WNY. All-time leading receiver Drew Haddad selected in seventh round by Buffalo Bills.

2000s

2000 - Buffalo posts its first victory over a Division I-A opponent since 1970 when the Bulls score a dramatic 20-17 come-from-behind win over MAC rival Bowling Green on Sept. 23, 2000. After the season, Athletic Director Bob Arkeilpane appoints Jim Hofher (Cornell, '79) as the 22nd head coach in UB football history.

2001 - The Bulls score one of the historic wins in school history with a 26-19 win at Army one week after posting their first Mid-American Conference shutout with a 44-0 win over Ohio.

2002 - Buffalo earns its first-ever victory over a Bowl Championship Series (BCS) team when it posts a shocking 34-11 win at Rutgers of the Big East.

2005 - The Bulls win at Kent State, 10-6, for their

first Mid-American Conference road victory. Following the season, Athletic Director Warde Manuel appoints Turner Gill as the 23rd head coach in UB football history.

2006 - New head coach Turner Gill led the Bulls to a 2-10 record with wins over Temple and division-leading Kent State. The Bulls scored the most points in a season (220) since moving to

Turner Gill was named MAC Coach of the Year. A UB record eight players were named All-MAC, including James Starks who became the Bulls' first 1,000-yard rusher in the I-A era with 1,103 yards.

2008 - Bulls have their most successful season in Division I history. Finish the year 8-6, win the MAC Championship and play Connecticut in the International Bowl for first bowl appearance in school history. Quarterback Drew Willy finishes his career by breaking nearly every school passing record. Only a junior, James Starks breaks the school record for career rushing with 3,142 yards. Naaman Roosevelt records 104 catches on the season - one shy of the Mid-American Conference record.

2009 - The Bulls finished 5-7 and featured an offense that averaged 405 yards per game - the highest average in UB's Division I-A era. Naaman Roosevelt set the school record for career receptions (268) and receiving yards (3,551). Davonte Shannon became the first UB player to be a three-time All-MAC First Team selection. Following the season, Athletic Director Warde Manuel appoints Jeff Quinn as the 24th head coach in UB football history.

2010s

2010 - New head coach Jeff Quinn leads the Bulls to a 2-10 record. Davonte Shannon broke the school record for career tackles with 461 en route to being named to the All-MAC First Team for the fourth straight year. Josh Thomas was selected by the Dallas Cowboys in the fifth round of the NFL Draft.

2011 - Branden Oliver rushed for a school-record 1,395 yards on the season. Khalil Mack ranked third in the nation in tackles for loss with 20.5. Both players earned first-team All-MAC honors.

2012 - The Bulls finished the season strong by winning three of the final four games and went 4-8 overall. Steven Means was selected by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the fifth round of the NFL Draft.

2013 - UB went 8-5 and played San Diego State in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl for just its second ever bowl game. Running back Branden Oliver broke both the single season (1,535) and career (4,049) rushing records. Record seven Bulls were named All-MAC, including five to the First Team. Linebacker Khalil Mack earned All-American honors and was selected fifth overall by the Oakland Raiders in the NFL, becoming UB's highest ever NFL draft pick.

2014 - In a season in which the Bulls went 5-6, Anthonie Taylor rushed for 1,403 yards - the second best single-season effort in school history. Joe Licata broke the single season (29) and career (60) passing touchdown school

record. Kristjan Sokoli was selected in the 5th round of the NFL Draft by the Seahawks. Following the season, Athletic Director Danny White named Lance Leipold the 25th head coach in program history.

2015 - Under first-year head coach Lance Leipold, the Bulls finished 5-7. It was the most wins by a first-year head coach since Bob Deming won six games in 1969. Joe Licata finished his career holding numerous passing records, including career passing yards (9,485) and passing touchdowns (76). Matt Weiser was named an Academic All-American after shattering the single-season school record for receptions (63) and receiving yards (625) by a tight end.

2016 - Jordan Johnson rushed for a school-record 282 yards in a win over Akron. Mason Schreck had 651 receiving yards - the most ever by a tight end in school history. Schreck was selected in the 7th round of the NFL Draft by the Cincinnati Bengals.

2017 - UB went 6-6 and earned bowl eligibility for just the third time in school history. Anthony Johnson ranked second in the nation in receiving, averaging 113 yards per game and scored a school-record 14 touchdowns. Linebacker Khalil Hodge ranked second in the nation in tackles with 154 - a school record in the Bulls' FBS era.

2018 - The Bulls won a school-record 10 games, finishing with a 10-4 record. They won the MAC East Division and earned a spot in the MAC title game for the second time in school history - losing to Northern Illinois, 30-29. UB played Troy in the Dollar General Bowl, the team's third bowl

appearance in program history. Quarterback Tyree Jackson was named MAC Offensive Player of the Year and running back Jaret Patterson was named MAC Freshman of the Year.

2019 - The Bulls made history by winning their first ever bowl game, defeating Charlotte, 31-9, in the Bahamas Bowl. Jaret Patterson set a school-record by rushing for 1,799 yards on the season. UB ranked second in the nation in sacks allowed (8) and fourth in the country in rushing defense (94.2). A school-record 12 Bulls were named to the All-MAC team.

2020 - In a COVID-19-shortened season, the Bulls went 5-0 to win the MAC East Division and earn a spot in the MAC Championship Game. Despite losing to Ball State in the title game, UB rebounded to defeat Marshall in the Camellia Bowl for their second straight bowl win. The Bulls were ranked nationally for the first time in program history, reaching as high as 23rd in the AP poll. Jaret Patterson rushed for 409 yards (second in NCAA history) and eight touchdowns (tied NCAA record) against Kent State. Defensive end Malcolm Koonce was drafted in the third round (79th) by the Las Vegas Raiders.

2021 - On May 8, 2021 Athletic Director Mark Alnutt introduced Maurice "Mo" Linguist as the 26th head coach in program history. The Bulls went 4-8 in his first season.

2022 - In only his second season at Buffalo, Linguist led the Bulls to a 7-6 record and a victory over Georgia Southern in the Camellia Bowl for the third bowl win in program history. Safety Marcus Fuqua led the nation in interceptions with seven en route to being named a Associated Press All-American. Linebacker Shaun Dolac set a school record with 90 solo tackles that were also tops in the country. Alex McNulty made a school-record 24 field goals and was named the MAC Special Teams Player of the Year.

2008 INTERNATIONAL BOWL

JANUARY 3, 2009 • TORONTO, ONTARIO



TORONTO, ONTARIO - The University at Buffalo's magical 2008 season was derailed by a powerful Connecticut team that was able to dominate both lines of scrimmage en route to a 38-20 win over the Bulls at the third annual International Bowl at Rogers Centre. The game was played in front of an International Bowl record 40,184 fans, of which roughly 30,000 were wearing the Royal Blue and White of the Bulls.

The Bulls late-season magic seemed to be ready to carry into 2009 when Buffalo used five UConn turnovers to race to a 20-10 first-half lead. However, the Huskies (8-5) scored the last 28 points of the game behind 261 yards by the nation's leading rusher, Donald Brown, to subdue the Bulls.

Buffalo (8-6) still had an opportunity to win in the game's final minutes, but a pass by senior quarterback Drew Willy was broken up in the end zone and returned 100 yards for a score by Dahan Deleston with 2:15 remaining. The loss did not dampen head coach Turner Gill's feelings about his team.

After falling behind to the Huskies, 10-3, early in the second quarter, the Bulls' late-season propensity for forcing turnovers showed itself again in a huge way, leading to Buffalo scoring on three straight possessions.

The Bulls first big break came when freshman punter Peter Fardon boomed a 54-yard punt that was mishandled by Jasper Howard into his own end zone where Buffalo freshman Ray Anthony Long fell on it for his first career touchdown. That tied the score 10-10 with 11:36 left in the half.

The very next possession, UConn quarterback Tyler Lorenzen was sacked by UB's Anel Montanez and Andrae Smith, with the ball coming loose and being recovered by defensive end Jerry Housey at the UConn 18-yard line.

The Bulls, however, had to settle for a 29-yard field goal by sophomore A.J. Principe that gave Buffalo its second lead at 13-10 with 8:22 left before half.

The magic continued on the ensuing kickoff, when UConn's Robbie Frey fumbled the kickoff into his endzone, was crunched by linebacker Justin Winters at the six-yard line and coughed up the ball, recovered by UB's John Syty at the Huskies four-yard line.

One play later, junior tailback James Starks ran over a Huskie defender at the one-yard line to put Buffalo up 20-10 – after the PAT – with 7:55 left in the second quarter.

In that incredible sequence, UB scored 17 points in 3:41 of game time while running four offensive plays.

The game's momentum, however, began to swing back to the Connecticut side late in the first half. That's when Brown, on a first-and-10 from the UConn 12-yard line, busted a 75-yard run to the UB 13-yard line. Lorenzen scored on the game's next play and cut the Buffalo lead to 20-17 at intermission.

For the remainder of the game, UConn's stout defense and outstanding offensive line would dominate, allowing the Huskies to rush for 358 yards in the game. The Bulls, meanwhile, would suffer through their worst offensive performance of the year. UConn held Starks to just 46 yards on 24 touches (13 carries, 11 receptions), while Willy finished 29-of-43 for 213 yards, but was held without a touchdown pass for just the second game this season.

Flanker Naaman Roosevelt capped an incredible campaign with eight receptions for 90 yards, becoming the first UB receiver to ever record 100 catches in a season – finishing just one away from the all-time MAC record with 104 catches for 1,402 yards – both easily UB school records.

The Bulls defense, which played valiantly by forcing four fumbles – was paced by sophomore Davonte Shannon who had 15 tackles – one for loss – including 10 solo stops and added his first career blocked kick. Winters added eight tackles and a forced fumble, while Montanez had three tackles, a half-sack, a two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery.

2013 FAMOUS IDAHO POTATO BOWL

DECEMBER 21, 2013 • BOISE, IDAHO



BOISE, ID – Playing in just its second bowl game in school history, the University at Buffalo football team lost to San Diego State, 49-24, in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl at Bronco Stadium on Saturday night. The Bulls end their season with an 8-5 record.

Buffalo, a team which prided itself on taking care of the football all season, turned the ball over three times in the game. The Aztecs capitalized by scoring 21 points off those turnovers.

San Diego State jumped out to a 14-0 lead early in the second quarter before the UB offense awoke. The Bulls drove 75 yards and cut the lead in half when Joe Licata connected with Branden Oliver on a 10-yard screen pass to make the score 14-7 with 7:51 left in the half. For a player who has had 33 rushing touchdowns over his career, it was surprisingly his first career receiving touchdown.

After the Bulls defense forced a San Diego State three-and-out on its ensuing possession, they were back in business. UB drove to the Aztec 27-yard line and a Patrick Clarke 38-yard field goal cut the lead to 14-10 with 4:01 left in the half.

However, the Aztecs scored on their next possession and then with just over a minute to play in the half came up with an interception off a tipped pass. Just one play later, they punched it into the endzone to take a 28-10 lead with 38 seconds left in the half. The way the end of the half transpired seemed to take the wind out of UB's sails.

Things didn't get better for the Bulls as they fumbled the opening kickoff of the second half and San Diego State quickly struck for another touchdown to take a 35-10 lead. The Aztecs extended their lead to 42-10 before the UB offense got on the board again. Licata connected with Alex Neutz on a 23-yard touchdown strike to cut the lead to 42-17 with 14:53 left in the game. Neutz finished his career with a school-record 31 touchdown receptions.

San Diego State running back Adam Muema was dominant in the game and his third touchdown of the day put San Diego State ahead, 49-17. Muema was the MVP of the game after rushing for 229 yards and three scores.

The Bulls scored their final touchdown of the game when Licata found Fred Lee from 10 yards out with just 36 seconds left to make the final score, 49-24.

After a slow start, Licata finished the game by throwing for 196 yards and three touchdowns. He finished the season with 23 touchdown passes, one shy of the school record of 24 set by Drew Willy in 2008.

Oliver was named the Player of the Game for Buffalo after rushing for 114 yards. It was his 20th career 100-yard game – seven more than any other player in school history. He finished his outstanding career rushing for a school-record 4,049 yards. He is just the 13th player in Mid-American Conference history to rush for over 4,000 yards.

Defensively, the Bulls were led by Adam Redden who had nine tackles, a sack and a forced fumble.

San Diego State ran most its plays away from All-American linebacker Khalil Mack as he was limited to six tackles. He did add a pass breakup and a fumble recovery. The loss brings an end to the storied career of Mack, arguably the greatest linebacker, if not player, in school history. He holds the NCAA record for career forced fumbles with 16 and tied the NCAA record for career tackles for loss with 75.

2018 DOLLAR GENERAL BOWL DECEMBER 22, 2018 • MOBILE, ALABAMA



MOBILE, AL – The University at Buffalo football team uncharacteristically turned the ball over four times and it proved to be the difference in a 42-32 loss to Troy in the Dollar General Bowl held at Ladd-Peebles Stadium on Saturday night. The Trojans were able to score 14 points off turnovers and had possession of the ball for much of the second half.

It started out well for the Bulls as, like they had done many times this season, went right down and scored on their first possession of the game. After Antonio Nunn hauled in a deflected pass for a 51-yard gain, Jaret Patterson scored on an 11-yard touchdown run to give Buffalo a quick 7-0 lead.

Troy needed just three plays to tie the game, as Trojan quarterback Sawyer Smith hit a streaking Tray Eafford in stride for a 60-yard touchdown.

The Bulls mounted a 14-play, 96-yard drive, early in the second quarter, and Kevin Marks capped the drive with a 1-yard touchdown dive to give the Bulls a 14-7 lead with 11:06 left in the half.

After the Trojans tied the game at 14-14 with 6:15 left in the second quarter, the Bulls mounted a 10-play, 41-yard drive and Adam Mitcheson drilled a 41-yard field goal with 52 seconds left to give UB a 17-14 lead at the half.

The Trojans took the opening kick of the second half and kept their offense on the field for the entire third quarter. After mounting a 75-yard scoring touchdown drive on their first possession to take a 21-17 lead, Troy surprised the Bulls with an onside kick and got the ball right back. However, with the ball inside the UB 5-yard line and it looking like Troy was going to score again, James Patterson came up with a big hit to jar the ball loose from the Trojans quarterback. Safety Tyrone Hill scooped it up and dashed 93-yards for a touchdown to put the Bulls back up, 24-21.

However, a gassed UB defense remained on the field and Troy capitalized. The Trojans needed 12 plays to drive 69 yards and scored on a 2-yard touchdown pass to regain a 28-24 lead early in the fourth quarter. Following a 3-and-out by the Bulls, Troy struck again, connected on a 45-yard touchdown pass to build its lead to 35-24 with 11:25 left in the game.

The Bulls didn't give up. K.J. Osborn made a spectacular one-handed touchdown grab to cut the deficit to 35-30. On the ensuing 2-point conversion try, Tyree Jackson scrambled, eluded rushers and found Nunn in the endzone for the conversion. The Bulls trailed 35-32 with 7:24 left in the game.

Following a Wesley Scott third-down sack, the Bulls got the ball back on their own 21-yard line with 3:28 left and trailing by three. However, on the first play of the drive, Jackson was sacked and fumbled the ball. It was recovered by Troy. On the very next play, the Trojans ran it in for a touchdown to extend their lead to 42-32.

Despite the loss, a number of Bulls finished the season by hitting significant milestones. Patterson rushed for 67 yards in the game to put him over 1,000 for the season. With 1,013 yards on the year, he became the first freshman running back in school history to rush for 1,000 yards in a season.

Anthony Johnson had 67 yards on five catches to go over 1,000 yards on the year. He became just the third player in school history to have two 1,000-yard seasons in a career.

Jackson threw for 274 yards in the game to put him over 3,000 for the season. He joined Drew Willy (2008) as just the second quarterback in school history to throw for 3,000 yards in a single season with 3,131.

NASSAU, BAHAMAS – History was made on Saturday afternoon as the University at Buffalo football team won the first bowl game in school history by defeating Charlotte, 31-9, in the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl played at Thomas Robinson Stadium in Nassau, Bahamas

Sophomore running back Jaret Patterson was named the Offensive Most Valuable player after rushing for 173 yards and two touchdowns in the game.

While Patterson paced the offensive attack, it was the defense that shined in the Bahamas sun. Charlotte, one of top rushing teams in Conference USA, and 25th nationally, was limited to just 80 yards on the ground. Junior defensive end Malcolm Koonce was named the Defensive Most Valuable Player after tallying five tackles, two sacks and a forced fumble. He had two of UB's five sacks in the game.

The Bulls wasted little time getting on the board as they scored on their first possession. Kyle Vantrease connected with Antonio Nunn on a 12-yard fade pattern to give UB a 7-0 lead with 9:12 left in the first quarter.

Vantrease called his own number with a quarterback sneak, with three minutes left in the half, to give the Bulls a 14-0 lead.

Linebacker James Patterson made one of the biggest defensive plays of the game when he came up with an interception on Charlotte's first play of its ensuing possession. The Bulls were able to convert that into a 31-yard Alex McNulty field goal to take a 17-0 lead at the half.

Buffalo extended its lead to 24-0 on a 6-yard Patterson touchdown run, his first of the game, with 5:22 left in the third quarter.

Charlotte finally got on the board late in the third quarter on a 51-yard touchdown pass. Linebacker Matt Otwinowski sniffed out the 49ers' two-point conversion try to keep it a three-score game, 24-6.

After Charlotte kicked a field goal to make the score 24-9 with 10 minutes left in the game, the offense put together its most impressive drive of the game. The Bulls mounted a 16-play, 75-yard drive that took over nine minutes off the clock. Patterson put the game on ice with a 10-yard touchdown run with 1:43 left.

With a couple injuries on defense, reserve players had to step up. Junior cornerback Ali Abbas was one of those players as had a career-high nine tackles and a big pass breakup.

Seniors Joey Banks and Devon Russell finished their career on a high note with nine and seven tackles, respectively. Fellow senior Ledarius Mack's sack was the final play of the game.

MONTGOMERY, AL – Kevin Marks, Jr. scored on a 2-yard touchdown run with just over one minute to play and the defense withstood a late rally to lift the University at Buffalo football team to a 17-10 win over Marshall in the 2020 Camellia Bowl on Friday afternoon in Montgomery, AL. It was the second straight year the Bulls were victorious in a bowl game.

While the offense got the headlines all season, it was the UB defense that had its finest performance of the year to hold off the Thundering Herd. The Bulls held Marshall to 248 yards of total offense.

Marks was named the game's MVP after rushing for 138 yards and a touchdown in the game. The junior running back was effective early rushing for 117 yards in the first half. This against a Marshall squad that was ranked second in the nation in rushing defense.

The Bulls opened the scoring on a 1-yard touchdown run by Vantrease early in the second quarter. Alex McNulty added a 25-yard field goal with 5:33 left in the half to extend the UB lead to 10-0.

Marshall got a spark late in second quarter by scoring a touchdown with just 42 seconds on the clock to cut the UB lead to 10-7 at the half. The Thundering Herd came out and kicked a short field goal on their first possession of the second half and suddenly the game was tied, 10-10.

The score would remain tied until late in the contest. After Eric Black came up with a sack on third down, the Thundering Herd punted the ball back to the Bulls. UB started its game-winning drive at its own 12-yard line with 7:27 left on the clock.

The Bulls methodically marched down the field behind the arm of quarterback Kyle Vantrease. The junior signal-caller first connected with Jovany Ruiz to pick up a 3rd-and-7 at the UB 44. The key play on the drive was a 26-yard completion to Antonio Nunn, setting up the Bulls at the Marshall 18. After two short runs, the Bulls were faced with another third down. Vantrease threaded the needle to Nunn for a 12-yard completion and UB had the ball at the Marshall 1-yard line. Two plays later, Marks waltzed into the endzone for the game winning score.

On Marshall's ensuing possession, it drove all the way down to the UB 20. However, Kadofi Wright broke through the line for a sack. Two plays later, on fourth down, Black thwarted the comeback attempt with his second sack of the game.

James Patterson had a team-high nine tackles in the game and Cory Gross, Jr. finished with eight. Max Michel had the best game of his career, finishing with six tackles, a sack, 1.5 tackles for loss and a forced fumble.

Vantrease finished 16-of-27 for 140 yards. Ruiz, who was just awarded a scholarship the night before, was his favorite target. The Fredonia native finished with seven catches for 61 yards, both career highs. Nunn had four catches for 49 yards.

The Bulls finished the season 6-1 and bowl champions for the second straight season. It was the second bowl win in program history.

MONTGOMERY, AL – For the second time in three years, the University at Buffalo football team hoisted the Camellia Bowl trophy over its heads as bowl champions, defeating Georgia Southern, 23-21, at the Cramton Bowl on Tuesday afternoon. An undermanned Bulls squad had reserve players step up all day to help UB win its third bowl in program history.

Players like Clevester Hines, who before this week was a wide receiver, was forced to start at cornerback and finished with seven tackles and three pass breakups. He helped the Bulls slow down a pass-happy, high-powered Georgia Southern offense. On the offensive side of the ball, running back Tajay Ahmed was pressed into action due to injuries and responded by rushing for a career-high 98 yards and a touchdown.

While several new faces stepped up, the usual old reliables paced the Bulls, especially early. Wide receiver Justin Marshall had 11 catches for 127 yards, both career highs, and scored UB's first touchdown of the game enroute to being named the bowl's Most Valuable Player.

Marshall was the favorite target of quarterback Cole Snyder who threw for 265 yards and a score. He became just the third quarterback in program history to throw for 3,000 yards in a season. Snyder also connected with Quian Williams five times for 100 yards.

Buffalo took a 14-6 lead late in the first half on a short touchdown run by Ahmed.

Georgia Southern responded early in the second half by quickly tying the game on a long touchdown pass. However, the Bulls answered with consecutive Alex McNulty field goals to take a 20-14 lead into the fourth quarter.

Early in the fourth quarter, Dylan Powell came up with his first career interception to set up UB at the Georgia Southern 40-yard line. The Bulls were able to drive down the field and McNulty hit a chip shot to extend the UB lead to nine. It was McNulty's third field goal of the game and 49th of his career, breaking the program's all-time record.

The Eagles scored a touchdown, with 3:38 left, to cut the UB advantage to two points. However, the Bulls were able to get two key first downs and Georgia Southern never got the ball back.

Linebacker Shaun Dolac led the UB defense with 13 tackles and added a forced fumble that was recovered by Jalen McNair to set up a UB field goal. Fellow linebacker James Patterson, making his 56th and final career start for the Bulls, had eight tackles, including a tackle for loss.

It was the third straight bowl win for the Bulls after winning the 2019 Bahamas Bowl and 2020 Camellia Bowl.



A DIFFERENT TIME IN A DIFFERENT WORLD

Looking back at one of the most influential football teams in University history 50 years later

"Picture Buffalo as it is today...and then forget about all of the suburbs - they weren't there. The nightlife downtown, you had a big nightclub called the Town Casino, you had all of these theaters downtown, it was just so different than what exists today that you can't even imagine."

Stanley Kowalski, left guard for the 1958 Bulls football team, said the above reminiscing about his memories of the city of Buffalo. While this image of Buffalo remains dear to him, another issue clouds his memories – the scandal of the 1958 Tangerine Bowl.

The 1958 football season at the University at Buffalo was one of extreme highs and even more extreme lows; marked by an appearance on the Ed Sullivan show after an 8-1 season, sullied by racism and segregation.

After finishing the season as the Lambert Cup champions, Buffalo was invited to play in the Tangerine Bowl in Orlando, FL. However, after accepting the invitation, University Chancellor Clifford Furnas, along with the entire team, made the decision to not play in the game; they learned that their two black players, Willie Evans and Mike Wilson, would not be allowed to play as per the request of the hosting school district.

In a statement made about his decision, Furnas said, "They are two of our finest young men, and have greatly contributed to our fine showing this season. The possibility of discrimination against any member of the team prevents our appearance at the game."

Being a member of the football team made Evans, the star running back for the team, a hot commodity around campus. The fact that he was one of very few minorities on campus made it tough for him at times.

"It was subtle. I didn't have the luxury of cutting class, because having made a little name for myself in athletics, professors knew who I was. Not to mention, I was usually the only black person in the class," Evans said.

One reason Kowalski believes there was not blatant racism within the team was that several players grew up without having relationships with minorities. Since there was no history of racism in their background, Kowalski believes it allowed the players to come in with open minds towards both Wilson and Evans.

"I grew up in a small mill town in Pennsylvania... we didn't have any blacks living there, so you didn't have prejudice built up ingrained in your head by your parents or your uncles," Kowalski said.

In the first game of the season, the Bulls were to face Harvard, one of the most respected teams in the nation at the time. Evans remembers this win being the first sign that the team could do something special.

"If you went back the year before, we were 5-4. I can remember vividly our coach saying before our last game versus Temple, he wanted us to win our last game so we could go in to the next season with a win, when we played Harvard," Evans said.

"[Beating Harvard] got us off to a good start – it was a different feeling. We had no notion of winning the Lambert Cup, we didn't even know about it. We just wanted to win football games."

According to Kowalski, the Bulls were in a unique position due to the fact that they were the only team in or near Buffalo. This gathered media attention.

"Most of the teams that played football after the Second World War had already dropped it," Kowalski said. "We were the only game in town and the papers started to give us all kinds of press, which was kind

changed so dramatically...we couldn't compare to the teams that are put on the field today, but at that time, we were a very respectable team."

In the final game of the regular season, the Bulls defeated Bucknell 38-0 to earn their first Lambert Cup. This game was especially important for Kowalski, who played in front of friends, family and his old high school football coach. Kowalski did not disappoint, returning an interception for a touchdown en route to Buffalo's victory.

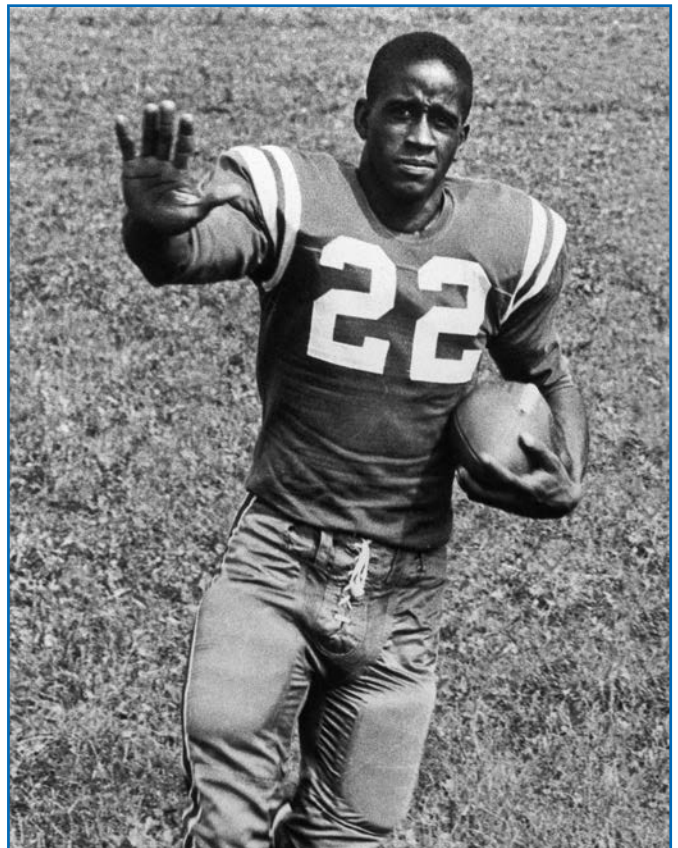

"It was a big deal for Buffalo at the time," Evans concurred. "Blacks weren't included in the paper at all for any reason, yet we were on the front page. When we were coming back from Harvard, the pilot told us that there were a couple thousand students waiting for us at the airport. It was great support."

It was not a coincidence that the Bulls were peaking in 1958; the senior class was the first class to play all four years on scholarship, meaning the team was as cohesive as ever and also had as much talent as possible. While Kowalski understands that football has changed immensely in the past 50 years, he is proud of the accomplishments the team made, and how they stuck together in the face of adversity that followed the end of the regular season.

"We stand very high, simply because of the celebrity that was given to us, that opportunity that we had to make a mark...we were the first team to go into the UB Hall of Fame," Kowalski said. "Obviously the whole game of football has

Colleges.”

Along with the victory came an invite to the Tangerine Bowl. When news broke about the Bulls being invited to their first bowl game, the team was skeptical, as it would have meant missing a week of classes and work. Several players on the team were married and needed to continue to work to support their family. After much debate however, the team decided to accept the invite.

The decision was quickly changed when Buffalo was informed that if the team was to play, they would have to do so without Evans or Wilson, who were both black.

“Our initial feelings were good. We never even thought about playing in a bowl game. The issue of race didn’t even come up in the beginning,” Evans said. “The only thing I recall is the first meeting we had where we decided we wanted to go as a team. I found out (about the racism issue) as I walked out of the house after Thanksgiving, and a neighbor said to me ‘I guess they don’t want you black boys down there...’ I got the newspaper and there was my picture on the front page of the Courier Express with Mike Wilson, outlining the position Chancellor Furnas took on the issue, where if myself and Mike couldn’t play, UB would not take part in the contest.”

The field that had been rented for the game belonged to an Orlando school district that had a strict rule that blacks and whites could not play on the field at the same time, the team discovered. In response, the Bulls held a second meeting where they decided not to play in the game if Evans and Wilson would not be allowed to play. While the Elks Club, the sponsor of the game, offered to find another field, Chancellor Furnas was the man charged with making the ultimate decision.

“Chancellor Furnas was a prominent individual... his credentials were impeccable,” Kowalski said. “He was a physicist. He was an Olympic sprinter. He was the assistant secretary of defense for research and development in the Eisenhower administration... there wasn’t anybody capable of criticizing him. The way he put it was he would not demean any

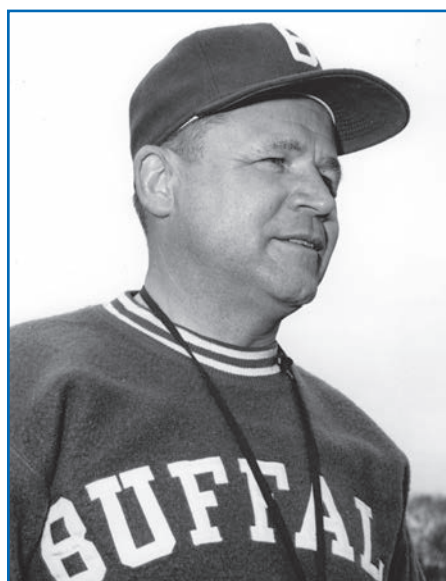
of his players, or even present an opportunity for anyone to be uncomfortable in the Florida setting.”

As the image of Buffalo’s first bowl came and went, Evans carried the experience of racism with him after college. It followed him to the professional level, as he entered the American Football League. Evans had never visited any of the southern states.

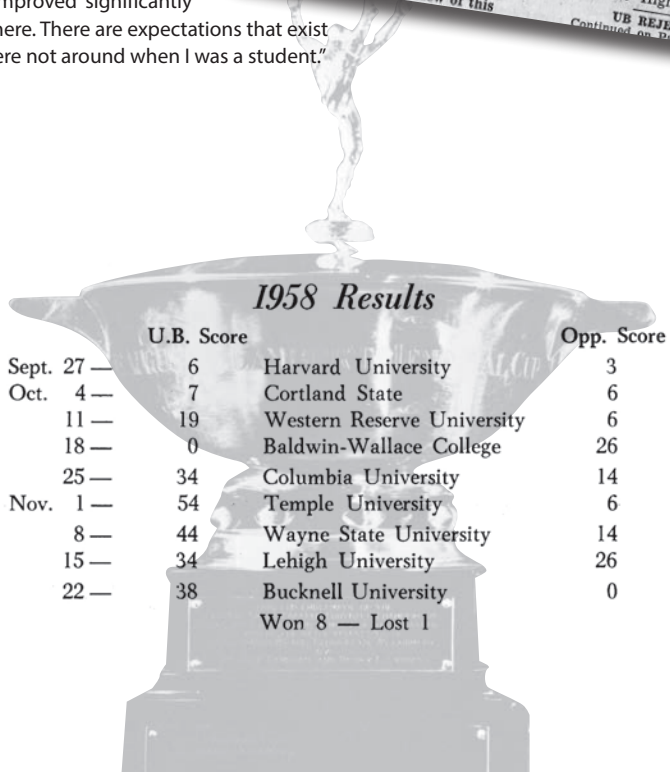
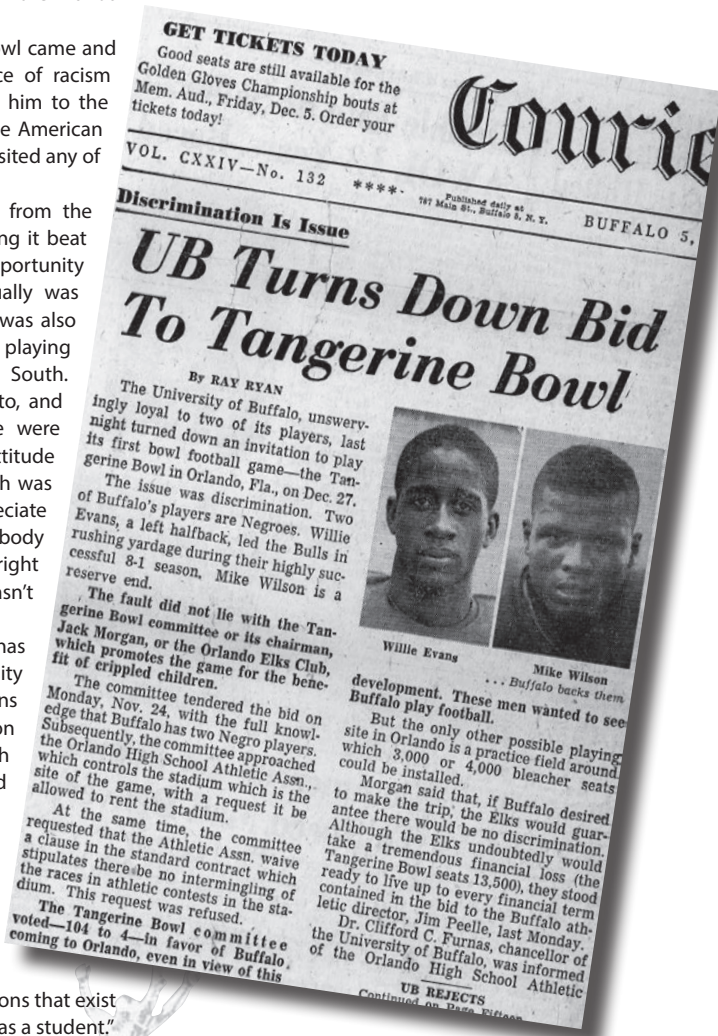
“I had a chip on my shoulder from the experience. It was a matter of letting it beat you down or not. I saw it as an opportunity to show my athleticism. I eventually was drafted by the Buffalo Bills, which was also an experience. It was my first time playing with white ball players from the South. There were players I never spoke to, and they never spoke to me, yet we were ‘teammates.’ That hardened my attitude about the idea of racism. Our coach was from the South, and I didn’t appreciate being called ‘boy.’ He called everybody ‘boy.’ I ended up getting released right before the season began, but I wasn’t too upset about it.”

Since his playing days, Evans has remained active in the University Buffalo community, holding several positions on the Alumni board and serving on the committees that brought both Athletic Director Warde Manuel and President Simpson to Buffalo.

“One reason why I’m still with the university is the way things have come,” Evans said. “Diversity is something that has caught on with the campus. We’re not there yet, but it has improved significantly since I was here. There are expectations that exist now that were not around when I was a student.”

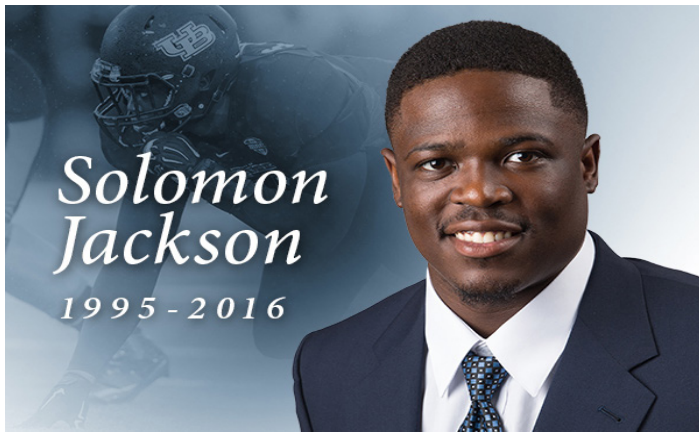
