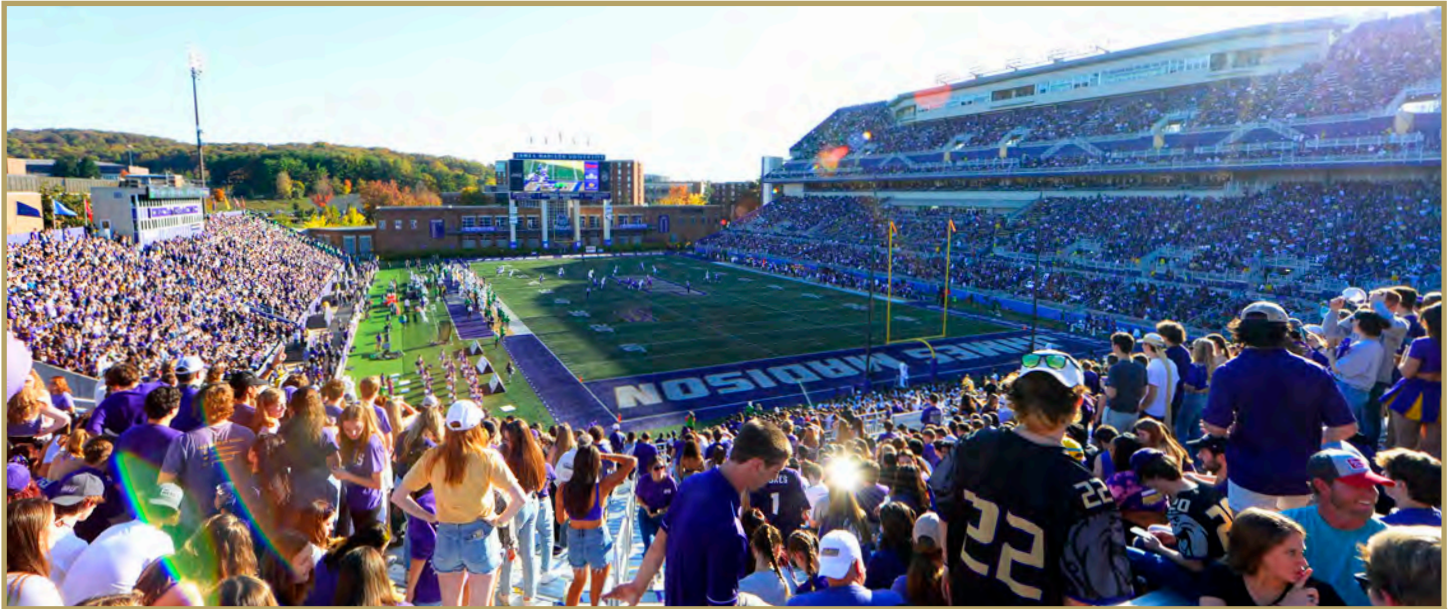

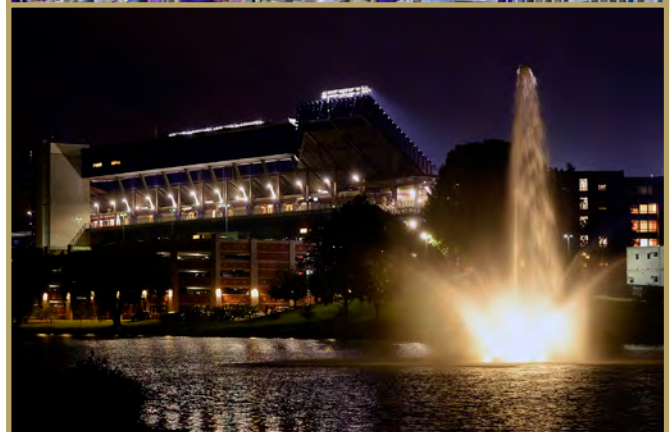
Bridgeforth Stadium Facts & Figures

- Full Name: Bridgeforth Stadium/Zane Showker Field
- Capacity: 24,877
- Surface: FieldTurf
- Attendance Record: 26,159 (Oct. 22, 2022 vs. Marshall)
- First Game: Oct. 12, 1974 (JMU 41, Bridgewater 13)

Bridgeforth Stadium/Zane Showker was built in 1975, enlarged in 1981, and in 2011 completed a major \$62 million renovation that increased seating capacity to 24,877, added multiple amenities and made it one of the premier facilities to accompany what is already one of the best game day atmospheres among college football peer institutions.

The stadium is named for William E. Bridgeforth of Winchester, Va., a long-time JMU supporter and board of visitor member whose family remains very active with JMU. The playing field, which is Field Turf, is named for Harrisonburg-area businessman Zane Showker, a long-time JMU supporter and university board rector and for whom JMU's business school facility is named.

The facility originally functioned as a multisport venue with field hockey, lacrosse, track and field and soccer. It became an exclusively football facility in 2003 and had its flat turf surface replaced with an in-fill synthetic surface in 2006, which was later replaced and upgraded again in 2013.

Harrisonburg History

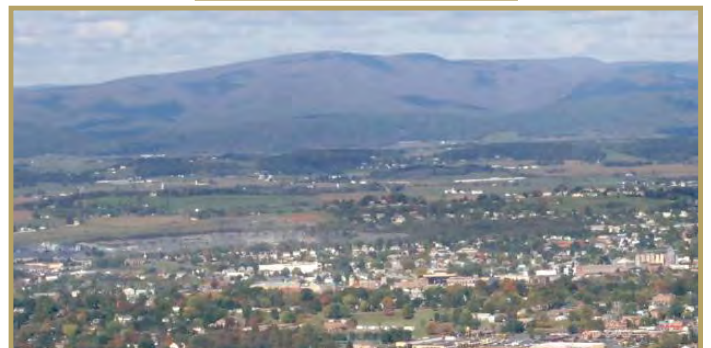
- Founded: 1779

- Nicknames: The Friendly City, The 'Burg, Rocktown
- Elevation: 1,352 feet above sea level
- 12th Largest City in Virginia

Harrisonburg, Virginia is an independent city located in the central Shenandoah Valley region of Virginia. Harrisonburg is located right along Interstate 81 and is only two hours away from both Richmond, Virginia and Washington, D.C. Harrisonburg is recognized as the county seat for Rockingham County.

In 1779, the City of Harrisonburg was born when Thomas Harrison deeded two and a half acres of his land to Rockingham County, which had been organized by the Commonwealth the year prior. The county used the land to build the first courthouse on what is still Court Square.

The next year, an additional 50 acres were added from the Harrison holdings and Harrisonburg was recognized as the county seat in Rockingham.

In 1789, the Masonic Order was formed in the city, making it the oldest organization still in existence today in Harrisonburg.

On March 14, 1908, Governor Claude A. Swanson signed the General Assembly bill creating the State Normal and Industrial School for Women at Harrisonburg. The initial enrollment the following year was 150 with a faculty of 15 on a campus of around 50 acres. In 1911, the first 20 graduates received diplomas.

It was shorted to the State Normal School for Women at Harrisonburg in 1914 and was renamed the State Teachers College at Harrisonburg 10 years later. In 1938, the school was renamed Madison College in honor of President James Madison and became James Madison University in 1977.

JMU Athletics is home to four national championships, with two in football (2004, 2016) and one each in field hockey (1994) and lacrosse (2018). JMU has 18 NCAA Division I programs that compete in the Sun Belt Conference, as well as an associate membership in the American Athletic Conference for lacrosse.

Requesting Credentials

Requests for press credentials and working space for James Madison University home football games must be made via email to Chris Brooks and Katie Hamlin in the JMU Athletics Communications Office no later than Tuesday at noon ET (11 AM CT) prior to a specified home contest. The request should be made by the sports director of the newspaper, magazine, radio or television outlet wishing to send reporter(s) and/or photographer(s) to the game.

Confirmation of the request will be made by Wednesday the week of a game by JMU Athletics Communications personnel. Approved media members and visiting team personnel may pick up their credential on game day at the JMU Athletics Ticket Office at Bridgeforth Stadium, next to Gate A. Credentials are no longer mailed in advance.

Credentials ARE NOT issued to spouses, friends or children, in accordance with the working code of the College Sports Information Directors of America and the Football Writers Association of America. The press box is a working area, and cheering or inappropriate behavior will be grounds for removal.

Parking on Game Day

Media parking is located in the Champions Drive Parking Deck, next to Bridgeforth Stadium, or in a lot nearby. All media members and visiting team personnel will be issued single-game parking passes via email in the form of print-at-home PDF files. Mobile versions will not be accepted, so please plan to print your parking pass ahead of arriving to Bridgeforth Stadium.

Entering Bridgeforth Stadium

Once parking and obtaining credentials at the JMU Athletics Ticket Office, next to the Champions Deck, media and visiting team personnel will enter the stadium through Service Gate 2, located between the ticket booth Gate A. All credentialed individuals will have their bags checked prior to entry.

Media Game Day Information

The James Madison Athletics Communications staff will provide game notes and updated cumulative statistics for both teams to credentialed media prior to all games via JMU's DropBox. Game notes are no longer printed on game days, however flip cards will still be provided. Stats will only be printed in-game for television and radio personnel, though full game packets will be printed for all media during postgame.

A media meal will be provided for all credentialed personnel from the time gates open through the conclusion of the first quarter. Personnel may pick up their meal in the corner room located at field level nearest the Service Gate 2 entrance. That meal is allowed in the press box either at a high-top table or your press seat. Snacks and water will also be available throughout the game in the press box.

Field Access

Field access for media in game is limited to videographers, photographers and radio sideline personnel. No writers are permitted at field level once the game begins unless that individual is also the media entity's photographer. All representatives working at the field level must check out a green photo/video vest in the press box.

Photographers and videographers must present a valid ID to JMU Athletics Communications game day personnel to check out a media vests. All vests must be returned to the press box and check back in either at halftime or postgame. If no one is at the vest checkout table, please see Chris Brooks or Katie Hamlin in the press box.

Failure to return the media vest will result in you being charged for the cost of the vest. Due to HIPAA regulations, we ask all photographers, both television and print, not to photograph any injury evaluations done in the bench/sidelines area. Additionally, per the credential policy, there is no selling of game photos taken by media members without the express written agreement from James Madison University.

External media members are at no time authorized to enter team sideline areas. Field-level personnel must stay within the dotted line boundaries outside the team areas. Please note: External media must stay behind the second set of dotted lines at field level, as the first line is designated for the ESPN production crew/camera operators.

Press Box Seating

All credentialed personnel, both external and visiting team will be issued a seat in the press box on level six. Visiting team communications and primary beat reporters will be given priority in the seat selection process. There will be overflow seating in the photo/video workroom, located next to the open space in the press box by the drink fridge.

Visiting Team Radio

Visiting radio stations have a separate booth on the top floor in the press box at Bridgeforth Stadium. Visitors receive one reciprocal phone line for their game broadcasts. Those requiring Ethernet access for their broadcast must submit a MAC address for the radio unit no later than Tuesday the week of the game to clear through JMU's firewall. Should more lines be needed, please contact Chris Brooks for arrangements at least two weeks in advance of the game.

Game Day Interview Policy

James Madison's postgame press conference with Head Coach Curt Cignetti and select players will occur in the team room inside the Plecker Athletic Performance Center. The visiting team press conference will be held across from the visiting team locker room, located in the East Side Conference Room on the opposite side of the stadium from the press box. No additional individual interviews, outside of live TV broadcasts previously agreed upon, will be permitted with any JMU personnel. In addition, the JMU locker room is closed to the media.

We will accept postgame media requests during the fourth quarter of the game. Written media wishing to attend the postgame press conference may proceed with a JMU Athletics Communications game day staff member to the field in the southwest corner of the stadium with a few minutes remaining in the game.

Non-Game Day Interview Policy

James Madison's weekly media schedule will be emailed out to members of the media on Sunday. That will include information of Head Coach Curt Cignetti's Sun Belt Conference media call and post-practice availability, as well as availability for approved student-athletes. Other media requests for print, radio or TV purposes will be handled on an individual basis. Advanced notice for one-off requests is greatly appreciated.

JMU The Head Coach

James Madison Director of Athletics Jeff Bourne named Curt Cignetti the eighth head coach in the history of the JMU football program on December 14, 2018.

Cignetti, who led JMU into its transition into the Football Bowl Subdivision and the Sun Belt Conference, has climbed the ladder throughout a 40-year football coaching career.

His resume includes multiple FBS stops as an assistant coach and a 108-34 record (.761) in 12 seasons as a head coach, with six at NCAA Division II Indiana University of Pennsylvania (2011-16), two at Elon (2017-18) and four at JMU (2019-present).

In four seasons with the Dukes, he's compiled a 41-8 record with a 24-3 mark in conference play between the Sun Belt and Colonial Athletic Association. Prior to JMU's jump to the FBS level, Cignetti guided JMU to three straight CAA championships and FCS playoff berths, reaching the 2019 national championship and FCS semifinals in both 2020 and 2021.

Cignetti is a two-time Virginia Sports Information Directors State Coach of the Year and 2019 Eddie Robinson Award finalist. While at JMU, he's mentored 27 total players to All-America status, with 25 at the FCS level between 2019 and 2021 and two in JMU's inaugural FBS season in 2022. Additionally, three players have been recipients of major national awards in Ron'Dell Carter (2019 Phil Steele FCS National Defensive Player of the Year), Cole Johnson (2021 CFPA FCS National Performer of the Year) and Ethan Ratke (2021 Fred Mitchell Outstanding Place Kicker Award).

At the conference level, Cignetti's Dukes have earned three Offensive Player of the Year honors, in addition to one Defensive and one Special Teams Player of the Year awards. JMU has totaled 55 all-conference laurels in his four years at the helm. That includes Todd Centeio being voted 2022 Sun Belt Offensive Player and Newcomer of the Year, as 12 Dukes earned spots on the All-Sun Belt Team.

In JMU's first FBS campaign, the Dukes made an immediate impact in their new league, going 8-3 overall with a 6-2 mark in conference play to finish tied for first in the Sun Belt East Division. JMU opened the season with a 5-0 record, earning its spot in the AP Top 25 Poll for the first time.

JMU's first Sun Belt season was highlighted by wins against Middle Tennessee in its first home FBS game, a thrilling comeback at App State in which it trailed 28-3 in the second quarter, and a dominant 47-7 victory in the regular-season finale versus #23 Coastal Carolina to become Kings of the East. Two Dukes were named Honorable Mention FBS All-Americans in wide receiver Kris Thornton and defensive lineman Isaac Ukwu.

The Dukes ranked top 15 nationally in 12 statistical categories, which included second in rushing defense (79.5), tackles for loss per game (8.6) and first downs allowed per contest (13.82). JMU also ranked fourth in sacks per game (3.45), fifth in total defense (289.5), sixth in both third-down defense (.284) and time of possession (33:44), seventh in both yards per completion (14.54) and fumble recoveries (13), 13th in scoring offense (37.0) and 14th in both takeaways (24) and pick-sixes (2).



Prior to JMU's move up to FBS, the Dukes concluded their time in the FCS as one of the best squads each season.

In his first season at the helm in 2019, Cignetti guided the Dukes to a 14-2 record and earned a trip to the NCAA Division I Championship game. The Dukes reeled off 14 consecutive wins after a narrow 20-13 defeat in the season opener at Big 12 foe West Virginia. JMU went 8-0 in league play to obtain the outright CAA title and notched eight nationally-ranked wins, with three in the top 10.

The Dukes led the country in total defense (270.2) while ranking third in scoring offense (40.0), scoring defense (15.7) and rushing defense (74.8) and 10th in both total offense (465.8) and rushing offense (242.9). A total of 10 players earned All-America status, including Carter who was runner-up for the Buck Buchanan Award.

In year two, which JMU would play in its only spring season ever, the Dukes went 7-1 and reached the FCS semifinals, falling just short to eventual national champion Sam Houston.

Nationally, JMU was second on fourth-down conversions (.857), third in rushing defense (72.4), fifth in total defense (243.4), sixth in rushing offense (232.6), yards per completion (14.82), time of possession (34:20) and pass efficiency defense (100.74), seventh in pass efficiency offense (156.28), eighth in scoring defense (16.5) and 10th in third-down conversions (.484). Five players earned All-America status in Buchanan Award finalist Mike Greene, Ethan Ratke, Percy Agyei-Obese, Raymond Gillespie and Kyle Davis.

In his third season and JMU's last in the FCS, it finished 12-2 and once again reached the national semifinals, falling to eventual champion North Dakota State by a single score. The Dukes capped off the season with another CAA title, which was the program's sixth in seven years.

Special teams earned the spotlight as kicker Ethan Ratke broke NCAA all-division records for career field goals (101) and scoring by a kicker (542) after making a JMU-record 29 kicks in 2021. Cole Johnson also turned in the program's best passing season in the 50-year history, as he took fourth on the Walter Payton Award voting after throwing for JMU records in passing yards (3,779) and passing touchdowns (41).

JMU produced 10 All-Americans for the second time in three seasons and 14 Dukes were all-conference honorees. In the FCS ranks, JMU led the country in turnover margin (+1.36), takeaways (31) and field goals per game (2.07) while ranking top 10 in 18 statistical categories. Some included being second in tackles for loss (8.2), third in completion percentage (.676), fourth in interceptions made (18), fifth in scoring offense (38.3) and third-down defense (.272), seventh in scoring defense (15.4) and eighth in total defense (275.2), rushing defense (89.0) and fewest interceptions (5).

Prior to his hiring at JMU, Cignetti paced the sidelines as head coach at Elon, amassing a 14-9 record in two seasons after inheriting a program that went 12-45 in the previous five campaigns. The Phoenix qualified for the FCS Playoffs in both 2017 (8-4) and 2018 (6-5) to attain just the second and third Division I playoff appearances in program history (2009).

The Phoenix achieved a six-win turnaround in Cignetti's first season, going 8-4 after a 2-9 ledger the year prior. Cignetti was named Colonial Athletic Association Coach of the Year as Elon finished second in the CAA, at 6-2, dropped a tough 28-27 decision to Furman in the First Round of the FCS Playoffs and finished 20th in the national rankings.

In 2018, Elon went 6-4 in the regular season before dropping a 19-7 decision at #12 Wofford in the playoffs to finish 6-5. Elon's other losses came to FBS South Florida and against three CAA teams that qualified for the playoffs. All three losses also came after injuries impacted key performers at quarterback and running back. Elon's season was highlighted by the ninth-ranked Phoenix winning at No. 2 JMU 27-24 in October to achieve the program's first-ever win over an FCS top-five opponent and becoming the first CAA team to beat the Dukes following a streak of 22 straight JMU wins over league foes.

Walking in the footsteps where his father coached for 20 years, Cignetti earned his first head coaching job at IUP and went 53-17 in six seasons with three appearances in the Division II playoffs and four top-25 finishes in the national rankings. The Crimson Hawks went 33-11 in the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference after going 4-10 in the two seasons prior to Cignetti's arrival. IUP was 4-3 in its three NCAA appearances during his tenure and finished as high as 12th in the 2016 final rankings.

An offensive-minded assistant coach at the FBS level for 27 seasons, Cignetti was an original member of Nick Saban's first coaching staff at Alabama, filling the role of recruiting coordinator and wide receivers coach for 2007 through 2010. He was part of a staff that returned the Crimson Tide to national prominence, going 12-2 in their second season in 2008 while Cignetti concurrently compiled the nation's top-ranked recruiting class. Alabama went undefeated as national champions the following season in 2009, the only undefeated final record during Saban's run in Tuscaloosa, pending the conclusion of the 2018 campaign. Alabama went 10-3 in Cignetti's final season before he earned his first head coaching job at IUP.

Cignetti joined the staff at Alabama after spending seven seasons (2000-06) as the recruiting coordinator at North Carolina State while also coaching tight ends from 2000-02 and 2005-06 and quarterbacks during the 2003 and 2004 campaigns. NC State qualified for five bowl games during that time, including the 2002 Gator Bowl, when the team set a school record with 11 victories. One of his last recruits before moving to Alabama was quarterback Russell Wilson, who played at NC State before moving on to Wisconsin as a senior.

The first recruiting coordinator role for Cignetti came during a seven-year stint (1993-99) at Pittsburgh. He also coached the Panthers' tight ends and quarterbacks at various times under College Football Hall of Fame head coach Johnny Majors. Cignetti began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Pitt during the 1983 and 1984 seasons and was part of the team's Fiesta Bowl participant his first year. He coached quarterbacks and receivers at Davidson in 1985 and was the quarterbacks coach at Rice (1986-88) and Temple (1989-92).

A quarterback letter winner at West Virginia, Cignetti is a 1982 graduate of WVU with a bachelor's degree in business administration. He is married to the former Manette Lawer. Curt and Manette have three children: Curtis John, Carly Ann and Natalie Elise, who was an honorable mention All-American in volleyball at IUP.

The sport of football runs deep in the Cignetti family. His father, Frank Cignetti, is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame after playing at IUP and compiling a coaching record of 199-77-1 at West Virginia (1976-79) and IUP (1986-2005). The field at IUP is named in his honor (Frank Cignetti Field @ George P. Miller Stadium).

Nick Saban coached under Frank Cignetti before later employing Curt Cignetti at Alabama. Curt's younger brother, Frank, Jr., is offensive coordinator at Pitt and worked in the NFL with the Packers, Giants, Rams, 49ers, Saints and Chiefs.

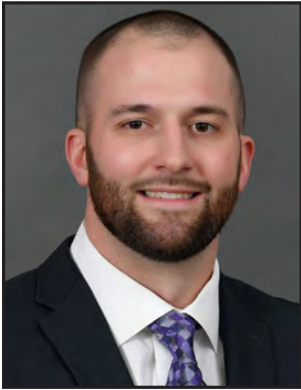

Mike Shanahan

Offensive Coordinator/Wide Receivers
5th Season | Pitt '12, '15

Mike Shanahan was hired on Dec. 17, 2018, as an assistant coach with the James Madison University program, working primarily with the wide receivers. Ahead of the 2021 season, he was promoted to offensive coordinator.

Shanahan previously served as the program's recruiting coordinator prior to his promotion to lead the offense.

In 2022, Shanahan's offense ranked top 30 in the FBS in six categories. That included being ranked sixth in time of possession (33:44), seventh in yards per completion (14.54), 13th in scoring (37.0), 16th in pass efficiency (157.2), 29th in total offense (452.5) and 30th in passing scores (27).

Quarterback Todd Centejo was voted Sun Belt Conference Offensive Player and Newcomer of the Year, and five offensive players were named All-Sun Belt. That included wide receiver Kris Thornton, who was a Pro Football Network Honorable Mention All-American and First Team All-SBC member after he became the program's first two-time 1,000-yard receiver. He recorded 59 catches for 1,015 yards and seven touchdowns, ranking second in the SBC in receiving yards and fourth in touchdowns.

In JMU's final FCS season in 2021, JMU set program single-season records for passing yards (3,868), passing average (276.3) and passing touchdowns (43), as All-American quarterback Cole Johnson finished fourth in the voting for the Walter Payton Award and won the CFPA FCS National Performer of the Year. Nationally, the Dukes were third in both completion percentage (67.6%) and pass efficiency (171.0), fifth in both scoring (38.3) and 17th in passing yards per game and eighth in fewest interceptions (5).

The high-octane passing attack helped produce two JMU receivers earning All-America status in Antwane Wells Jr. and Thornton. The duo co-set the new JMU single-season record with 83 receptions. Wells Jr. also reset the record books by setting new marks with 1,250 receiving yards and 15 receiving touchdowns. His yards total was third-most in the FCS and he co-led the country in receiving scores.

During the spring 2020-21 campaign, Thornton earned First Team All-CAA status after recording 26 catches for 428 yards and three scores, while Wells Jr. had a big late-season push to finish with 33 grabs for 603 yards and six touchdowns to earn Freshman All-America status.

In his first season with the Dukes, Shanahan coached Brandon Polk to Second Team All-CAA status, as he turned in one of the best single-season performances in school history. Polk and running back Percy Agyei-Obese became the first JMU tandem to have 1,000 receiving yards and 1,000 rushing yards in the same season.

Polk produced 74 receptions for 1,179 yards and 11 touchdowns, which all ranked second in JMU single-season history at that point. He ranked fourth in the CAA in receiving scores, eighth in receiving yards per game (73.7) and ninth in receptions per game (4.62). Additionally, Riley Stapleton made 65 catches for 788 yards and 10 scores, ranking third at JMU in both catches and receiving touchdowns and eighth in yards.

Shanahan came to JMU following two seasons at Elon, where he also led the receiving unit for the Phoenix. While at Elon, he guided Kortez Weeks to Third Team All-CAA and Freshman All-America laurels. The receivers aided in Elon averaging more than 50 passing yards per game from 2016 to 2017, tallying 205.5 receiving yards per outing.

Shanahan followed Cignetti to Elon after spending the 2016 season as wide receivers coach at Indiana (Pa.), helping it to the second round of the DII playoffs. He also began his career as a volunteer assistant and graduate assistant at his alma mater, Pitt (2014-15).

Shanahan graduated from Pitt in 2012 after four years on the gridiron where his 159 receptions and 2,276 yards both rank in the top 10 in school history. The two-time team captain earned Second Team All-Big East honors in 2012 while helping the Panthers to a BBVA Compass Bowl appearance.

After graduation, Shanahan had stints as a member of the New York Jets and Tampa Bay Buccaneers' preseason squads. He was also a member of the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian Football League as a wide receiver and tight end.

He earned both his degrees from Pitt with a bachelor's in history and master's in social studies education.



Bryant Haines

Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers
5th Season | Ball State '09

Bryant Haines, who was hired on Dec. 17, 2018, serves as the program's defensive coordinator and linebackers coach. He was promoted from co-defensive coordinator after his third season with the Dukes and ahead of the 2022 campaign.

In each of his four seasons, the Dukes have ranked top 10 nationally in both the FCS and FBS in total defense. It was also top 10 in the FCS in scoring defense while ranking top 25 in the program's first FBS season in 2022.

This past season, which was JMU's first as a member of the Sun Belt Conference and in the FBS, the Dukes remained as one of the country's best defenses, as they were top 10 in seven categories and top 25 in 10 total areas.

JMU was second nationally in rushing defense (79.5), tackles for loss per game (8.6) and first downs allowed per contest (13.82). It was also fourth in sacks per game (3.45), fifth in total defense (289.5), sixth in third-down defense (.284) and seventh in fumble recoveries (13). The Dukes were also 14th in both takeaways (24) and pick-sixes (2) and 23rd in scoring defense (20.9).

Seven defenders were named to the 2022 All-Sun Belt Team, highlighted by defensive lineman Isaac Ukwu, who was a Pro Football Network Honorable Mention All-America. Both of his first-year starting linebackers were named All-Sun Belt, with Taurus Jones earning Third Team honors and Jailin Walker taking Honorable Mention status.

Walker accounted for both of the team's defensive touchdowns, as his unit collectively tallied 199 total tackles, 17.5 tackles for loss, two sacks, four interceptions, nine breakups, two fumble recoveries and three forced fumbles.

In JMU's final FCS season in 2021, his linebacking corps also shined, with Diamonte Tucker-Dorsey and Kelvin Azanama combining for 218 total tackles. Tucker-Dorsey was named to three All-America teams, highlighted by being a HERO Sports Second Team All-American. In addition to his First Team All-CAA honor, Azanama joined him as a Third Team selection. The position group tallied 21 tackles for loss, five sacks, five interceptions, 11 pass breakups and three fumble recoveries.

JMU's defense ranked top-10 nationally in 10 separate categories, which included a #1 ranking in both turnover margin (+1.36) and turnovers forced (31). The Dukes were second in tackles for loss (8.2), third in fumble recoveries (13), fourth in interceptions (18) and fifth on third down (27.2%). They were also seventh in scoring defense (15.4), eighth in both total defense (275.2) and rushing defense (89.0) and 10th in pass efficiency defense (111.86).

In year two, which was JMU's only spring football season, he guided linebackers Azanama and Tucker-Dorsey to All-CAA accolades. The defense ranked third in the FCS in rush defense (72.4) and interceptions (12) while ranking fifth in total defense (243.4), sixth in pass efficiency defense (100.74) and eighth in scoring defense (16.5).

In his first season at JMU, Haines mentored a pair of linebackers to all-conference honors in Dimitri Holloway and Landan Word. Holloway would later earn spots on three All-America teams, including Second Team honors from both the Associated Press and HERO Sports. His position group combined for 28 tackles for loss, 5.5 sacks, 12 pass breakups, two interceptions and three fumble recoveries in the 2019 national runner-up season.

Haines came to JMU following two seasons at Elon, where he also led the Phoenix's linebacking corps. This is the third school Haines has been under Curt Cignetti, as he also coached on his staff at Indiana (Pa.). He mentored Warren Messer to back-to-back seasons on the All-CAA First Team, which included him earning All-America accolades in both seasons. Bryant also coached Matt Baker to Third Team All-CAA status in 2018 after he ranked tied for seventh in the conference with 7.5 sacks.

Prior to Elon, Haines spent the 2016 season as the linebackers coach at UC Davis where he helped Nas Anesi to Second Team All-Big Sky honors.

Before UC Davis, Haines was on Cignetti's staff at IUP for two seasons (2014-15). During his time there, he helped the Crimson Hawks lead the Pennsylvania State Athletics Conference in scoring defense, total defense, third-down defense and red-zone defense in 2015. IUP was fourth among all Division II teams in rushing defense in 2014 and 13th nationally in 2015.

He's also worked at Ohio State (2013), Indiana (2012), Adrian College (2010-11) and Manchester College (2009).

Haines played Ball State, where he was one of the nation's top linebackers. He earned College Football News Second Team Freshman All-America honors in 2005 and was later named to the All-Mid American Conference Team and the watch list for the Dick Butkus Award in 2008, which is given annually to the top linebacker in the FBS. He is a 2009 graduate from BSU, where he earned a bachelor's degree in general studies.



Damian Wroblewski

Offensive Line/Associate Head Coach for Offense
5th Season | Lafayette '99

Damian Wroblewski was hired on Dec. 17, 2018, as James Madison University's assistant head coach, working primarily with the offensive line. Prior to the 2021 season, he was promoted to associate head coach for offense.

Over his four seasons with the program, he's coached three players to a combined four All-America honors and five linemen to a collective seven all-conference accolades. He also helped produce a pair of Touchdown Club of Richmond Offensive Linemen of the Year in Liam Fornadel (2019) and Nick Kidwell (2021).

In JMU's first FBS campaign in 2022, his line aided JMU in ranking top 30 nationally in six offensive categories. The Dukes were sixth in time of possession (33:44), seventh in yards per completion (14.54), 13th in scoring (37.0), 16th in pass efficiency (157.2), 29th in total offense (452.5) and 30th in passing touchdowns (27). JMU was tops in the Sun Belt in possession time, yards per pass completion and scoring. Following the season, Kidwell was named Second Team All-Sun Belt.

In 2021, JMU's offense set single-season records for passing yards (3,868), passing average (276.3) and passing touchdown (43), as it ranked third nationally in both completion percentage (67.6%) and pass efficiency (171.0), fifth in scoring offense (38.3), 12th on third down (.444), 14th in the red zone (.885) and 17th in both passing yards per game and total offense (435.4). Two Dukes were honored postseason, as Fornadel was a Second Team All-American and Kidwell was a Sophomore All-American and First Team All-CAA.

During JMU's lone spring season in 2020-21, the offensive line aided JMU in ranking second on fourth down (.857), sixth in rushing (232.6), seventh in pass efficiency (156.28), 10th on third down (.484), 11th in total offense (447.5) and 14th in scoring (33.6). Raymond Gillespie was named an All-American, while both he and Truvel Wilson were First Team All-CAA selections.

In his first season, JMU's 2019 offense ranked third nationally in scoring (40.0) and 10th in total offense (465.8). The Dukes led the FCS on fourth down (.889) while also ranking second on third down (.536), third in first downs (24.81), fourth in pass efficiency (169.44), sixth in the red zone (.917) and 10th in rushing (242.9). Two were named All-Americans, led by Fornadel's first team honors and Mac Patrick's third team laurels. Joining them on the All-CAA Team was Wilson.

Wroblewski came to JMU following a five-season stint at Elon (2014-18), where he also led the offensive line.

During his final two seasons in 2017 and 2018, Wroblewski's line propelled the Elon offense to greater heights, leading to a pair of FCS Playoff appearances. In 2018, he guided a pair of seniors to All-America status in Oli Udoh and CJ Toogood. Udoh also shined at both the East-West Shrine Bowl and Reese's Senior Bowl to earn a spot at the 2019 NFL Combine.

Wroblewski came to Elon following two seasons as the offensive line coach at Rutgers (2012-13). In 2012, Rutgers allowed just eight sacks all year, ranking eighth in the FBS. Rutgers claimed a share of the Big East Conference championship and earned a trip to the Russell Sports Bowl. The following year, the Scarlet Knights reached the Pinstripe Bowl at Yankee Stadium. While at RU, he coached Kaleb Johnson, who would move on to the Baltimore Ravens.

He also had coaching stops at Delaware (2007-11), Stony Brook (2006), Hofstra (2004-05), Penn (2002-03) and Bryant (1999-02).

His time at UD was highlighted by appearances in both the 2007 and 2011 national championship games, and he also worked with future NFL linemen Gino Gradkowski, Mike Byrne and Shea Allard. While at Hofstra, he mentored NFL lineman Willie Colon, who won a Super Bowl title with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

A four-year member of the Lafayette College football team as a center, Wroblewski was a two-time All-Patriot League selection and earned the team's Stony Jones Award as the team MVP as a senior. He earned his degree in history in 1999.



Grant Cain

Special Teams Coordinator/Tight Ends/Assistant Head Coach
5th Season | Catawba '03, Coastal Carolina '07

Grant Cain was hired on Jan. 3, 2019, as an assistant coach with the James Madison University football program, working with the tight ends and serving as special teams coordinator. Ahead of the 2022 season, Cain was promoted to assistant head coach.

This past season, he coached a pair of players to postseason honors in tight end Drew Painter and punter Sam Clark.

Painter was an Honorable Mention All-Sun Belt selection in 2022 after corralling 19 catches for 221 yards and two touchdowns. JMU's top tight-end target was JMU's fifth-leading receiver. His tight ends unit, which consisted primarily of Painter and Zach Horton, combined for 32 catches for 380 yards and four touchdowns.

On special teams, Clark was named Virginia Sports Information Directors Second Team All-State after averaging 43.2 yards per punt, the third-highest average in JMU single-season history. Of his 50 kicks, 16 went inside the 20 and nine over 50 yards with only four touchbacks.

Prior to JMU's jump to the FBS, Cain's special teams units ranked as some of the nation's best year in and year out, highlighted by the NCAA's all-time leading kicker, Ethan Ratke. During the 2021 campaign, Ratke set the NCAA all-divisions record for career field goals (101) and scoring by a kicker (542) while finishing second amongst all FCS players and 13th by any player from any division in career scoring.

In 2021, JMU led the country in field goals per game (2.07) while ranking fourth in kick-return average (26.5) and field goal percentage (.906), seventh in kickoff-return defense (15.25), eighth in punt-return defense (3.7), 12th in blocked punts (2) and 20th in net punt average (38.8).

Ratke hit a JMU single-season record with 29 field goals, which included a record six converted kicks in a single game at William & Mary on Nov. 13. He capped off the season by earning Consensus All-America status for the second straight year. Ratke, along with long snapper Kyle Davis took home FCS All-America honors. Solomon Vanhorse, who averaged 27.6 yards per kick return with a touchdown, was a Sophomore All-American as well.

During the spring 2020-21 campaign, Ratke produced his first Consensus All-America nod, while Davis was also a First Team All-American. Ratke was a perfect 14-for-14 on field goals to pace the country in field goal percentage while ranking sixth in field goals per outing (1.75) and seventh in scoring (9.1).

In his first season at JMU, Cain began the molding of the special-teams corps into a national power. The Dukes led the country in blocked kicks (9) while ranking sixth in kickoff-return average (24.16) and field goals per game (1.69), 16th in punt-return average (12.76), and 25th in punt-return defense (5.67). Ratke kicked home a then-JMU and CAA record with 27 field goals in 2019 to earn Third Team All-America accolades. His leading tight end, Dylan Stapleton, was also named Second Team All-CAA that season.

Cain came to JMU after spending six seasons on the staff at Mercer where he led the special teams unit and inside linebackers (2013-18). He was also assistant head coach in 2017 and 2018, seasons in which the Bears were one of the nation's top teams in terms of special teams.

During the 2018 season, Cain guided the Bears to top-12 rankings nationally in four statistical categories, which included leading the country in net punting (40.58). He mentored Matt Shiel to the eighth-best punting average (43.6) in the FCS. Mercer also led the Southern Conference and ranked ninth nationally in kick-return average (25.57) while ranking 12th in both punt-return average (14.17) and punt-return defense (4.35).

In 2017, the Bears paced the nation in kick-return defense while also ranking 10th in punt-return average and 18th in kick returns. Mercer produced top-15 rankings on special teams in five of his six seasons. That season also marked the fourth straight season the team had at least 21 turnovers, registering 25. The Bears also led the country with 16 fumble recoveries.

Prior to Mercer, Cain spent seven years at Coastal Carolina (2005-12), where he held various positions for the Chanticleers. He was part of three Big South Conference titles (2005, 2006, 2010).

Cain is a 2003 graduate of Catawba, where he earned a bachelor's degree in business administration. He also received a master's degree in instructional technology from Coastal Carolina in 2007.



Marcus Hall-Oliver

Safeties/Recruiting Coordinator

4th Season | Minnesota State '14, Eastern Michigan '16

Marcus Hall-Oliver was hired on Feb. 10, 2020, as an assistant coach with the James Madison University program, starting as defensive tackles coach while transitioning to safeties coach in his second season. He also added the title of recruiting coordinator following the 2021 campaign.

In his three seasons, JMU's defense has ranked as one of the best in both in the FCS and FBS.

This past year and JMU's first in the Sun Belt Conference, his safeties unit helped the defense rank second nationally in first-down defense (13.82), fifth in total defense (289.5), sixth in third-down defense (.284), seventh in fumble recoveries (13), 14th in takeaways (24) and 23rd in scoring defense (20.9).

He coached Sam Kidd to Honorable Mention All-Sun Belt and Second Team All-State accolades, and three of his safeties had at least 30 tackles. His unit combined for nine pass breakups, two interceptions one fumble recovery and one forced fumble.

In 2021, JMU's defense ranked top-10 nationally in 10 different categories, which included leading the FCS in turnover margin (+1.36) and turnovers forced (31). The Dukes ranked fourth nationally in interceptions (18), fifth on third down (27.2%), seventh in scoring defense (15.4)

and eighth in total defense (275.2).

In his first season, while working with the defensive tackles, JMU was third in the country against the run (72.4) while also ranking fifth in total defense (243.4), sixth in pass efficiency defense (100.74) and eighth in scoring defense (16.5). James Carpenter was voted Virginia Sports Information Directors Defensive Rookie of the Year after earning a starting role after originally joining the program as a walk-on.

Hall-Oliver came to JMU after spending the 2019 season at Indiana out of the Big Ten Conference, where he was a defensive graduate assistant with the defensive line. In his one season with the Hoosiers, the team finished 8-5 and reached the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl.

Prior to his stop in Bloomington, Hall-Oliver was defensive line coach and defensive run-game coordinator for the 2017 and 2018 seasons at Division II University of Sioux Falls. During his time there, he helped the Cougars to a 16-7 record, reaching the NCAA Division II Central Region title game in 2017. The 2017 team ranked second nationally in both scoring defense (12.5) and total defense (244.3), third in rushing defense (67.8) and ninth in sacks (3.33).

Hall-Oliver also spent two seasons at Eastern Michigan (2015, 2016) as a defensive graduate assistant. He worked primarily with defensive line and linebackers while in Ypsilanti, helping the Eagles become bowl eligible for the first time 21 years in 2016, reaching the Popeye's Bahamas Bowl.

He began his coaching career at his alma mater, Division II powerhouse Minnesota State in Mankato. After finishing his playing career, he was a student coach in 2013 with the linebackers before being elevated to a graduate assistant with the cornerbacks in 2014. Hall-Oliver and the Mavericks reached the Division II national championship game in 2014, going 14-1 on the year.

A two-year letterwinner at MSU, Hall-Oliver was a two-time First Team All-NSIC selection in 2011 and 2012 and Honorable Mention All-American in his senior season. He helped the Mavericks reach the 2012 national semifinals and led the team in tackles in 2011 at the linebacker position. He began his collegiate career at Nebraska-Omaha, where he started the 2009 and 2010 seasons.

Hall-Oliver is a 2014 graduate of Minnesota State, where he earned his bachelor's degree in sports management. He also gained his master's in sports management from Eastern Michigan in 2016.



Eddie Whitley Jr.

Rovers

4th Season | Virginia Tech '12

Eddie Whitley Jr. was hired on Feb. 4, 2020, as an assistant coach with the James Madison University program, where he works primarily with the rovers. He began his JMU career as the safeties coach before transitioning to rovers prior to the 2021 season.

In his first three seasons, JMU's defense has ranked as one of the nation's best both at the FCS and FBS levels. That includes ranking top 10 nationally in total defense in all three and in scoring seasons over his first two campaigns.

This past season, his rovers group helped JMU rank second in the FBS in first-down defense (13.82), fifth in total defense (289.5), sixth in third-down defense (.284) and 23rd in scoring defense (20.9). His top rover, Chris Chukwuneke had a hand in six tackles for loss, one break-up and a fumble recovery while Jarius Reimonenq added a TFL and a pair of breakups in the secondary.

In 2021 and his first season working with the rovers, JMU led the country in turnover margin (1.36), as his group accrued five of the team's 31 takeaways. The Dukes were also seventh in scoring defense (15.4), eighth in total defense (275.2) and 21st against the pass (186.2). Chris Chukwuneke led the group with 60 tackles, 5.0 TFL and three fumble recoveries, while Hampton had an interception and blocked kick.

During his first year in the spring 2020-21 season, JMU ranked fifth in total defense (243.4), eighth in scoring defense (16.5) and 18th in passing defense (171.0). Safeties MJ Hampton and Que Reid were the third and fourth-leading tacklers on the team with a combined 80 stops. Hampton was voted First Team All-CAA after adding a JMU second-best 6.5 tackles for loss, while Reid was second for the Dukes with a pair of interceptions.

Whitley came to JMU after spending three seasons at nearby Bridgewater College, where he was the secondary coach and pass defense coordinator from 2017-19.

His time with the Eagles was highlighted by their 2019 season, in which they finished 10-1, won the Old Dominion Athletic Conference championship and advanced to the NCAA Division III Football Championship for the first time since 2005.

BC's defense ranked ninth in Division III and led the ODAC in scoring defense (13.4). It ranked 12th in pass efficiency defense (100.25), which was an improvement of 118 spots from the year prior. The Eagles were also 19th in turnover margin (+1.09) and 22nd in total defense (281.8). He coached three players to all-conference status in safety Matt Dang and cornerbacks Chase Rosenthal and Luke Barnum. Both Dang and Rosenthal also earned all-region honors.

In his second year in 2018, Bridgewater finished 6-4 and he mentored Dang and cornerback Davonta Womack to All-ODAC honors. His first season also saw cornerbacks Isaac Evans and Josh Brooks earn all-conference laurels.

While at BC, Whitley worked with the Washington Redskins during OTAs in 2018 as part of the Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship, working with his former safeties coach at Virginia Tech, Torrian Gray.

Prior to his coaching career, Whitley spent time with five different NFL franchises, originally being signed by the Dallas Cowboys as a rookie free agent out of college. He also had stints with the San Francisco 49ers, Philadelphia Eagles, New Orleans Saints and Arizona Cardinals. Whitley also played one season in the CFL with the Toronto Argonauts.

Whitley is a 2012 graduate of Virginia Tech, where he was an All-ACC performer and captain for the Hokies. He was a Second Team All-ACC honoree as a senior in 2011. He played in 54 career games during his career (2008-11) and was part of VT's 2008 and 2010 ACC championship teams.



Tino Sunseri

Quarterbacks/Pass Game Coordinator

3rd Season | Pitt '13

Tino Sunseri was hired on May 18, 2021, as James Madison University's quarterbacks coach and added the title of pass game coordinator following his first season with the program.

In both seasons with the Dukes, his starting quarterbacks have both major honors while setting top passing performances to lead the offense.

In his second season and JMU's first in the FBS, Todd Centeio was voted Sun Belt Conference Offensive Player and Newcomer of the Year while also being voted Virginia Sports Information Directors Offensive Player of the Year. He was a four-time SBC Offensive Player of the Week and three-time Manning Award Stars of the Week after throwing for 2,697 yards and 25 touchdowns with just five interceptions. Centeio also added 393 rushing yards and seven touchdowns to account for more than 3,000 total yards, as he was named to the Davey O'Brien QB Class of 2022 and midseason watch lists for the Maxwell Award, Manning Award and CFPA National Performer of the Year.

The passing attack aided JMU in ranking top 30 nationally in six FBS offensive areas. That included sixth in time of possession (33:44), seventh in yards per completion (14.54), 13th in scoring (37.0), 16th in pass efficiency (157.2), 29th in total offense (452.5) and 30th in passing touchdowns.

His first season with the Dukes saw one of the top passing performances in single-season program history with Cole Johnson as the signal caller.

Johnson set JMU single-season records for passing yards (3,779), passing touchdowns (41) and completions (287) on his way to winning the CFPA FCS National Performer of the Year and finishing fourth for the Stats Perform FCS Walter Payton Award. In addition to earning multiple All-America honors, Johnson was voted CAA Offensive Player of the Year and a CoSIDA Academic All-District member.

His 2021 quarterback room aided in the Dukes ranking fifth nationally in scoring (38.3) and 17th in passing yards per game (276.3). They were also third in both completion percentage (67.6%) and pass efficiency (171.0) and eighth in fewest interceptions (5). JMU threw for more than 300 yards in six games and had five or more touchdown passes in five outings.

Sunseri came to Harrisonburg after a two-and-a-half years stint on Nick Saban's staff at Alabama, where he served as an offensive analyst, working primarily with the quarterbacks.

While in Tuscaloosa, the Crimson Tide went 24-2 between the 2019 and 2020 seasons, which included going 13-0 in 2020 and winning the College Football Playoff National Championship.

He worked closely with a pair of Heisman Trophy finalists and NFL first-round draft picks in Tua Tagavila and Mac Jones. In 2020, Jones set the national completion percentage record (77.4%) on their way to the national title. Sunseri was additionally responsible for daily breakdown of film, self-scout breakdown, writing scripts for practice and breaking down upcoming opponents.

Prior to Alabama, Sunseri spent the 2018 season at Tennessee and two seasons at on the Jimbo Fisher staff at Florida State (2016-17).

Sunseri is a former starting quarterback at Pitt (2008-12), where he made 39 consecutive starts for the Panthers. While at Pitt, where he was at one point coached by Curt Cignetti's brother, Frank Jr., Sunseri learned and executed four different offensive systems.

A 2010 Big East Conference champion, he completed his career ranking second in Pitt history in total offense (8,591) and third in passing yards (8,590). As a senior in 2012, he completed 65% of his passes, throwing for 3,288 yards and 21 touchdowns with only three interceptions. His passing total was the second-most in single-season history for the program.

After college, he played three seasons in the Canadian Football League for the Saskatchewan Roughriders (2013-15). He was a 2013 Grey Cup champion and helped the Roughriders to the 2014 playoffs as the team's starter.

Sunseri graduated from Pitt with a bachelor of arts in communications with a minor in history. He is the son of Sal Sunseri, a coaching veteran of nearly four decades between the collegiate and NFL ranks. His father currently serves on Saban's staff at Alabama.



John Miller

Running Backs

4th Season | James Madison '18

John Miller was hired on Jan. 19, 2021, as an assistant coach with the James Madison University program, working primarily with the running backs.

Miller, a 2018 graduate of JMU, was a standout athlete for the Dukes from 2014-17, which included him being voted 2017 Colonial Athletic Association Special Teams Player of the Year.

This past season, his running backs group ranked 37th in the FBS in rushing yards per game (186.7). That total was fourth-best in the Sun Belt Conference and the team's 24 rushing touchdowns was third in the conference.

He coached Percy Agyei-Obese to Third Team All-Sun Belt status, after he ranked third in the Sun Belt in rushing yards per game (908) and fifth in yards per carry (5.7). Agyei-Obese finished his JMU career ranking second in both career rushing touchdowns (39) and rush attempts (694), third in both rushing yards (3,503) and total touchdowns (39) and fourth in scoring (234).

Agyei-Obese was also voted 2022 First Team All-State while Kaelon Black was voted Virginia Sports Information Directors Offensive Rookie of the Year after rushing for 333 yards and three scores, averaging 4.8 per rush. His running backs combined for 1,991 rushing yards and 17 rushing scores, helping JMU's offense rank 13th nationally in scoring (37.0) and 29th in total offense (452.5).

His 2021 running backs corps was plagued with injuries, but still managed to rank top 50 nationally in rushing per game (159.1), complimenting one of the best passing attacks in the nation. Latrelle Palmer stepped up, running for 947 yards and three scores, while Solomon Vanhorse was a dual threat in the passing game, reeling in five touchdown catches, which was third-best for JMU.

In his first season back in Harrisonburg, his running backs helped the Dukes lead the CAA and rank sixth nationally in rushing yards per game (232.6) during the spring 2020-21 season. The stacked room was led by All-American Agyei-Obese and All-Conference back Jawon Hamilton, as the two combined for over 1,250 yards and 13 scores in eight games.

Agyei-Obese was seventh in the FCS with eight rushing touchdowns while ranking 11th with 102.4 rushing yards per outing. Hamilton was also top 50 nationally in rushing yards, as he was 10th-best in yards per carry, at nearly 6.1 per attempt.

Miller returned to his alma mater after spending the previous two seasons as offensive quality control coach at the University of Texas. While with the Longhorns, he worked primarily with the wide receivers. In that role, he was responsible for defensive film breakdown, scouting reports, pass-game plan drawings and self-scout while also assisting daily operations with the receivers.

He helped coach a pair of Longhorns to the NFL ranks in 2020 in Devin Duvernay, a third-round pick to Baltimore, and Collin Johnson, a fifth-round selection to Jacksonville. Miller also worked with a pair of former JMU coaches at Texas in Everett Withers and Drew Mehringer.

Prior to Texas, Miller had a short stint during the 2019 spring season at ECU, where he was an offensive graduate assistant with the receivers and tight ends. He began his coaching career with the Dukes, serving as a grad assistant during the 2018 season and working with the same position groups.

As a student-athlete, Miller helped JMU to back-to-back appearances in the national championship game, which included winning the 2016 title. In addition to him being Special Teams Player of the Year as a senior, Miller was a First Team All-CAA punt returner in 2017.

Miller produced arguably two of the biggest catches over the past decade for JMU, scoring the game-winning touchdown in 2015 at FBS foe SMU and recording the insurance touchdown at North Dakota State in the 2016 semifinals.

He finished his career with 86 receptions for 865 yards and five touchdowns in 46 games played. He also scored a pair of touchdowns on punt return and ranks tied for eighth all-time at JMU with 489 punt-return yards. Miller began his career as a running back, accruing 473 rushing yards and five scores.



Pat Kuntz

Defensive Line
2nd Season | Notre Dame '09

Pat Kuntz was hired on Feb. 10, 2022, as an assistant coach with James Madison University football, working as the defensive line coach.

In his first season with the Dukes and their first as a member of the Sun Belt Conference and the FBS, his defensive line wreaked havoc on opposing offenses.

The defensive line unit, led by Isaac Ukwu, James Carpenter and Jamare Edwards, combined for 136 tackles, 34.5 tackles for loss, 19.5 sacks and six breakups. Ukwu was an Honorable Mention All-American and First Team All-Sun Belt honoree, while both Carpenter and Edwards were Second Team All-Sun Belt selections. All three were additionally named to the All-State Team.

His group helped JMU's defense rank as one of the best not just in the Sun Belt but the entire Football Bowl Subdivision. JMU was second nationally in rushing defense (79.5), tackles for loss per game (8.6) and first-down defense (13.82), fourth in sacks (3.45), fifth in total defense (289.5) sixth in third-down defense (.284) and 23rd in scoring defense (20.9).

Kuntz came to JMU following a three-year stint at VMI (2019-21), where he coached the defensive line and served as defensive run game

coordinator.

While in Lexington, he coached four players in his position group to All-Southern Conference accolades. He also assisted VMI's defensive coordinator with third-down planning. In his three seasons, VMI went 17-14, which included a spring 2021 season where the Keydets went 6-2, won the SoCon title and reached the FCS playoffs for the first time in program history.

After the 2021 season, Kuntz was hired at Southern Illinois, where he spent a little over a month as defensive line coach. He also assisted the staff on the recruiting trail, helping sign two student-athletes for the 2022 class prior to his hiring at JMU.

Prior to VMI, Kuntz was a graduate assistant at Indiana (2016-18), working with the defensive line. He began his career in 2010 at his high school alma mater, Roncalli High School in Indianapolis (2010-16).

Kuntz is a four-year letterwinner at Notre Dame (2005-08), starting three seasons at nose guard for the Fighting Irish. He was named Lineman of the Year in 2007 and 2008 and led the country in pass breakups by a defensive lineman in 2007.

After graduating from Notre Dame in 2009 with a bachelor's degree in sociology, Kuntz signed as an undrafted free agent with the Indianapolis Colts.



Jarred Holley

Cornerbacks
1st Season | Pitt '11, '13

Jarred Holley was hired on January 13, 2023, as an assistant coach with the James Madison University football program, working primarily with the cornerbacks.

Holley joins JMU after spending the previous two seasons at North Texas (2021-22), where he held the same position.

In his two seasons in at North Texas, Holley guided a pair of corners to All-Conference USA status, with Ridge Texada earning First Team honors in 2022 and DeShawn Gaddie taking home Honorable Mention status in the same season. His top cornerback duo combined for 27 pass breakups and three interceptions in 2022.

In his first season with the program, North Texas finished fifth in the conference in pass defense and the defense posted the biggest improvement of any FBS program in 2021 by cutting its total yards allowed by nearly 150 yards per game.

North Texas reached the Conference USA championship game in 2022 and earned berths to the Frisco Bowl in each of his two seasons with the Mean Green.

Prior to UNT, Holley was the safeties coach and passing game coordinator at Albany from 2018-20. He was part of a coaching staff to lead Albany to its first FCS playoff win during the 2019 season. The Great Danes finished with a 9-5 record that year, matching their most wins since 2012 and reaching the FCS playoffs for the first time since 2011.

He began his coaching career at Arizona State (2015-17), where he was a graduate assistant and analyst for the Sun Devils, working with special teams and the defensive staff.

Holley was a four-year starting safety at Pitt, where he played from 2008-12. He was twice named to the Big East All-Conference Team, making the first team in 2011 and second team in 2010. He finished his collegiate career with 244 tackles, 11 interceptions, 13 pass breakups and a pair of fumble recoveries. Off the field he was twice named to the Big East All-Academic Team.

He was also college teammates with current JMU Offensive Coordinator Mike Shanahan and Quarterbacks Coach Tino Sunseri. Holley earned two bachelor's degrees from Pitt, with one in communication and rhetoric in 2011 and another in administration of justice in 2013.



Derek Owings

Director of Strength & Conditioning
4th Season | Mercer '16, Utah State '18

Derek Owings was hired as JMU's Director of Strength of Conditioning/APC on Sept. 15, 2020. In this role, Owings oversees the strength program for the football team.

Owings came to JMU after nearly a two-year stint at Texas Tech, where he was Associate Strength & Conditioning Coach with the Red Raider football team. Prior to TTU, he spent one year as Assistant Director of Sports Performance with football at the University of Central Florida.

In both roles, Owings built and utilized position specific workouts, beginning with the demands of on-field performance. He also coordinated all GPS data both for the Red Raiders and Golden Knights.

Owings was lead strength coach for the wide receivers, running backs, tight ends, defensive backs and linebackers at Texas Tech. While at UCF, he oversaw the receivers, running backs, defensive backs and specialists. He also assisted in return-to-play protocols for injured athletes and integrated methods to maximize movement efficiency, injury prevention and rapid recovery this past year in Lubbock.

Before his time at UCF, he was a graduate assistant from 2016-18 at Utah State. Owings also served intern roles at Mercer and Michigan, as well as at Barwis Methods in Plymouth, Mich.

Owings joined the coaching profession following his playing career at Mercer (2014-15), where he was an Academic All-SoCon selection. He also began his career at Eastern Michigan (2012-13).

He graduated from Mercer in 2016 with a Bachelor of Arts in sports management and later earned his Master's of Education in Physical and Sport Education at Utah State in 2018.

Owings holds the following certifications: CSCS-NSCA, USAW-Level 1, Running Mechanics Professional Level 1 and 2, Metabolic Analytics Practitioner, FRCMs, Precision Nutrition Level 1, Body Type Nutrition as well as CPR and AED - ARC.

Matt Transue was hired as the JMU Senior Director of Football Operations in January of 2022 and brings five-plus years of experience at the FBS level as it relates to the day-to-day operations of a football program.

He most recently served as Director of Football Operations at Georgia Southern since March 2021. In that role, he oversaw the daily administrative and operational duties within the GSU football program, handled team travel and other responsibilities to ensure smooth and efficient operations.

Prior to his work with the Eagles, Transue spent five years in Blacksburg with the Virginia Tech football program. Andrew Burkett was hired as the James Madison football program's director of player personnel in August 2022, ahead of the Dukes' inaugural FBS season.

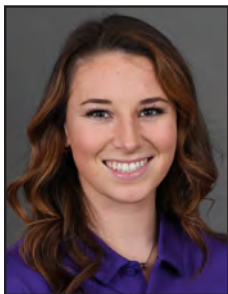

Harris comes to Harrisonburg after spending the past year at UConn, where she held the same role in the 2022 season.

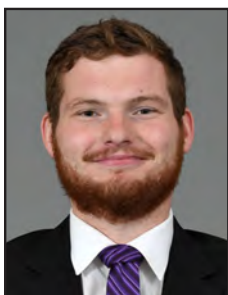

Alex Higgins joined the JMU football program prior to the 2021 season as a graduate assistant and was promoted to offensive analyst ahead of the 2023 season.

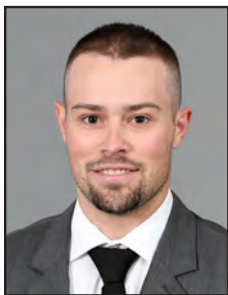
In his role, Higgins works primarily with the offensive line while assisting all other offensive areas, including gameplanning each week.

Reed Relosky serves as an offensive graduate student coach with the JMU football program after being hired prior to the 2023 season.

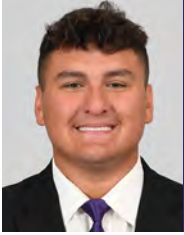

JMU Sun Belt Conference



The Sun Belt Conference (SBC) has established itself as a leader among intercollegiate athletics leagues since its move to the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) in 2001.

Founded in 1976, the Sun Belt now features 14 dynamic member institutions across 10 contiguous states. The Sun Belt boasts broad-based excellence across its 20 sponsored sports, in the classroom and in the communities across the league's footprint.

In the College Football Playoff era (since 2014), the Sun Belt paces the FBS with a .614 bowl winning percentage.

The 2022 campaign—the conference's first as a 14-team football league—was a banner year for the Sun Belt, which defeated four autonomy five programs, hosted ESPN's College GameDay for the second time in conference history and produced a conference-record seven Bowl Season participants—tied for the most among non-autonomy conferences and trailing only the SEC, ACC, Big Ten and Big 12.

- Since 2020, just 10 FBS programs have won more than 75 percent of their games. The Sun Belt is tied with the SEC, Big Ten and Big 12 with two teams on that list—Coastal Carolina (31-7, .816) and Louisiana (29-9, .763).

- The Sun Belt has had multiple 10-win teams for five-straight seasons.

- The Sun Belt has had a team listed in the final College Football Playoff rankings for four-straight seasons.

- The Sun Belt boasted a 53 percent increase in All-American honors in 2022, with 26 student-athletes combining to earn 53 All-America honors.

- The Sun Belt was home to the last two unbeaten teams from a non-autonomy conference, the last one-loss team from a non-autonomy conference and 1-of-2 two-loss teams from a non-autonomy conference in 2022.

- The Sun Belt had the long conference championship game to feature a pair of teams with two-or-fewer losses in 2022 and won the lone bowl game to feature a pair of conference champions.

- The Sun Belt has had at least one selection in 15 consecutive NFL Drafts and has claimed multiple picks in 20-of-22 since it began sponsoring football in 2001. Three of the Sun Belt's five highest NFL Draft totals have come over the past four seasons with seven selections in 2020, six picks in 2022 and a conference-record nine draftees in 2023.

The Sun Belt's success extends far beyond the football field and into a number of team and individual successes in each of its sports:

- The Sun Belt was a multi-bid league in men's soccer, men's golf, softball and baseball in 2022.

- Two Sun Belt men's soccer teams reached the Sweet Sixteen, one softball team reached NCAA Super Regionals and one baseball team reached NCAA Super Regionals in 2022.

- The Sun Belt was 1-of-5 conferences—joining the ACC, Big 12, Pac-12 and SEC—to produce a Super Regional team in both baseball and softball in 2022.

The Sun Belt Conference is showcased nationwide through a media rights partnership with ESPN that runs through the 2030-31 academic year. The Sun Belt enjoyed a viewership of 25 million during the 2022 football season. For the 12th consecutive year in 2022, every Sun Belt home football game will appear on an ESPN platform or another linear network.



The Sun Belt Conference has transitioned to a neutral-site model for many of its championship events to provide an enhanced experience for student-athletes and fans. Pensacola, Fla., will serve as home for the Sun Belt Men's and Women's Basketball Championships through the 2024-25 season. Cross country (Foley, Ala.), women's soccer (Foley, Ala.), volleyball (Foley, Ala.), men's tennis (Rome, Ga.), women's tennis (Rome, Ga.) and baseball (Montgomery, Ala.) have also established long-term agreements.

As part of the Sun Belt's commitment to racial justice, the conference launched BE THE CHANGE during the summer of 2020 - focusing attention on American civil rights, promoting civic engagement, and creating dialogue with law enforcement. The conference also established and encouraged its teams and fans to visit the Sun Belt Conference Civil Rights Trail, which highlights historic sites and landmarks found within the league's geographic footprint.

The Sun Belt supports more than 6,700 student-athletes in sponsoring 20 NCAA sports.

The Sun Belt's 14 member institutions are App State, Arkansas State, Coastal Carolina, Georgia Southern, Georgia State, James Madison, Louisiana, ULM, Marshall, Old Dominion, South Alabama, Southern Miss, Texas State and Troy.

SUN BELT SPORTSMANSHIP

2.4 The Principle of Sportsmanship and Ethical Conduct. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, student-athletes, coaches, and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifest not only in athletics participation, but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each institution to:

(a) Establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution; and

(b) Educate, on a continuing basis, all constituencies about the policies in Constitution 2.4-(a).

10.01.1 Honesty and Sportsmanship. Individuals employed by (or associated with) a member institution to administer, conduct or coach intercollegiate athletics and all participating student-athletes shall act with honesty and sportsmanship at all times to that intercollegiate athletics as a whole, their institutions and they, as individuals, shall represent the honor and dignity of fair play and the generally recognized high standards associated with wholesome competitive sports.

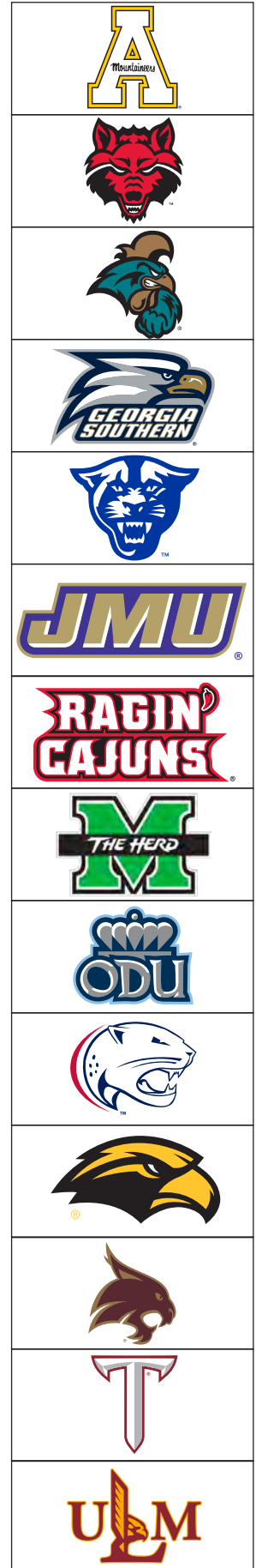

Dukes Trounce Blue Raiders in FBS Debut, 44-7

HARRISONBURG, Va. – James Madison kicked off a new era of college football in style, as Todd Centeio amassed nearly 400 yards and tied the program’s single-game passing touchdown record to lead the Dukes to a dominant 44-7 victory against Middle Tennessee on Saturday night at Bridgeforth Stadium.

The Dukes (1-0) outgained the Blue Raiders (0-1) by a wide margin, racking up 548 yards of total offense while allowing just 119.

Making his JMU debut, Centeio was excellent through the air, going 21-of-33 for 287 yards and six touchdowns, matching Cole Johnson’s JMU single-game mark. He also led the game in rushing, with 14 carries for 110 yards, averaging 7.9 per rush.

Kris Thornton was just shy of a pair of career highs, making 11 receptions for 145 yards on his way to scoring three touchdowns. Reggie Brown also had a career night, as he made five catches for 78 yards and a pair of scores, both in the second quarter to open the game’s scoring.

Defensively, JMU was paced by Jailin Walker’s nine tackles, while Taurus Jones had seven stops, 2.5 tackles for loss, a forced fumble and a recovery. Josh Sarratt also finished with seven tackles, Isaac Ukwu had a two tackles for loss with a sack, and both Jamree Kromah and Jalen Green had 1.5 TFL.

The Dukes scored the game’s first 37 points in of 19:19 between the second and third quarter, holding MTSU’s air-raid offense without a point until its lone touchdown late in the third quarter.

Dukes Breeze Past Norfolk State, Move to 2-0

HARRISONBURG, Va. – James Madison used a balanced offensive attack and stout rushing defense to cruise past Norfolk State, 63-7, in non-conference football action on a rainy Saturday evening at Bridgeforth Stadium.

The Dukes improved to 2-0, while the Spartans fell to 0-2. JMU also moved to 3-0 all-time against NSU, having now outscored the opposition 155-21 in the series.

JMU more than doubled up Norfolk State in total yards, at 462-212, which included a 235-9 margin in the run game.

The Dukes rotated in all three quarterbacks, as the trio combined to throw 19-of-25 for 227 yards and four touchdowns. Todd Centeio, playing just the first half, was 12-of-17 for 165 passing yards and three touchdowns. Billy Atkins had a strong third quarter, going 6-of-7 for 48 passing yards and a touchdown.

Kris Thornton continued his strong start, reeling in seven catches for 102 yards and a pair of touchdowns, as he turned in two-plus touchdowns in consecutive games for the first time in his career. Devin Ravenel had his first career game with two receiving scores, as he made three grabs for 40 yards.

JMU's run game once again shined, as the group averaged 5.3 per rush on 44 carries, totaling five touchdowns from four different running backs. Percy Agyei-Obese led all rushers with 88 yards and a pair of touchdowns, averaging 7.3 per carry. Kaelon Black ran for 54 yards and a score, while three other Dukes had at least 25 yards.

Defensively, James Carpenter had a career outing, making a game-high eight tackles with 2.5 tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks. JMU conceded just 0.3 yards per rush, as the defensive unit has allowed just 21 rushing yards through the first two games. The defense also had a pair of takeaways, while not turning over the ball once.

JMU scored the game's first 35 points, and after NSU's lone score on a 90-yard pass, the hosts scored the final 28.

HOW IT HAPPENED

- Todd Centeio opened the game with a pair of touchdown passes, connecting with Kris Thornton on a 43-yard pass just five plays into the game. On the ensuing drive, he found Devin Ravenel on a 22-yard strike.
- After a Jordan Swann interception, Latrele Palmer found the end zone five plays later to make it 21-0 at the end of the first.
- Percy Agyei-Obese scored his first rushing touchdown early in the second and Ravenel caught his second TD from Centeio to extend the lead to 35-0 at the break.
- After Norfolk State opened the third with a 90-yard touchdown pass, JMU answered back with three more touchdowns, as Thornton, Agyei-Obese and Kaelon Black all crossed the goal line for a 56-7 lead entering the final 15.
- The fourth quarter was only 10 minutes long and JMU kept to the ground heavily, as Sammy Malignaggi scored his first career touchdown to close the scoring.

GAME NOTES

- JMU was +2 in the turnover margin, with Swann's interception and a fumble recovery by Devyn Coles.
- The Dukes did not commit a turnover for the second straight game, marking two consecutive years JMU's offense has not committed a turnover in its first pair of games.
- JMU was over 50% for the second straight week on third down, going 6-for-10, while NSU was just 2-for-10. The Dukes also went 2-for-2 on fourth down.
- JMU was a perfect 7-for-7 in the red zone, while the Spartans were 0-for-1. NSU's lone red-zone chance at the end of the first half was thwarted by a pass breakup by Chauncey Logan on the final play.
- JMU put together three straight scoring drives in the opening 15 minutes, outgaining NSU 178-14.
- Otto Kuhns was 9-of-20 for 203 yards and a touchdown to lead the NSU offense. No NSU rusher gained more than seven yards rushing, as it combined for 26 carries and nine yards.
- Da'Quan Felton had three catches for 141 yards with the 90-yard touchdown reception for NSU.

JMU Storms Back to Win Thriller in Sun Belt Debut at App State

BOONE, N.C. – James Madison found itself down 28-3 before mounting a historic comeback, scoring 29 unanswered points to rally past App State, 32-28, in its Sun Belt Conference football opener on Saturday afternoon in front of 33,248 spectators at Kidd Brewer Stadium.

The Dukes improved to 3-0 and 1-0 in Sun Belt play, while the Mountaineers fell to 2-2 and 1-1. It was JMU's first win in Boone since Sept. 21, 1991, as the Dukes won for the third time in 10 tries at App.

App State put together four consecutive touchdown drives in the second quarter to capture a 25-point lead. After making it a 28-10 score at the half and 28-17 after three, the Dukes owned the fourth.

Todd Centeio put together a five-play, 92-yard drive that was capped off by a 36-yard strike to Terrance Greene Jr. for the touchdown. A Centeio to Kris Thornton two-point conversion made it 28-25 with 11:28 to play.

On the ensuing play Chase Brice was picked off by Jailin Walker, who returned his first career pick down to the nine yard line. Two plays later, Kaelon Black punched it in from two yards out to put JMU back in front, 32-28, with 10:36 to go. JMU forced App into a three-and-out and proceeded to run 13 plays and 7:07 off the clock, giving the Mountaineers just 2:06 to work with for their final possession.

App's last-ditch effort was thwarted by a fourth-down stop after Que Reid made a huge hit on Christian Horn for the incompleteness. JMU ran out the final 49 seconds to earn its first Sun Belt win in program history.

Centeio finished 16-of-28 for 204 yards and two touchdowns while rushing for 61 yards and a score. Black led the ground game with 85 rushing yards and a touchdown and added a 23-yard touchdown catch for his first multi-score game.

Eight Dukes had at least one catch, led by Reggie Brown, who caught four passes for a career-high 81 yards. Greene Jr. also had 46 receiving yards and the fourth-quarter score.

App State was led by Chase Brice, who was 17-of-28 for 235 yards and two touchdowns with an interception. Kaedin Robinson made five catches for 57 yards, while Dashaun Davis had three grabs also for 57 yards. Dalton Stroman and Miller Gibbs each caught touchdowns. Ahmani Marshal finished the game with 40 rushing yards, as App was limited to just 63 as a team and 1.9 per carry.

HOW IT HAPPENED

- JMU opened the game with nearly a seven-minute drive, as Camden Wise booted home a 27-yard field goal for his first career make to give the Dukes the 3-0 lead in the first.
- App State punched it in the end zone on four straight drives during the second quarter, with two coming off JMU turnovers deep in its own territory.
- Touchdowns by Cameron Peoples, Gibbs, Stroman and Nate Noel put the Mountaineers up 28-3 with 6:10 to play before the break.
- After converting a fourth down, Black took a swing pass from Centeio 23 yards to the house for JMU's first touchdown in a Sun Belt game to make it 28-10 at the break.
- JMU held App State off the board in the third and cut into the lead, as Centeio converted a fourth-down conversion and punched it in from two yards on the ensuing play to make it 28-17 heading to the fourth.
- Centeio needed just five plays to go 92 yards, as he connected with Greene Jr. on a 36-yard touchdown and Thornton's two-pointer trimmed the deficit to 28-25.
- Walker picked off Brice on App's next play and Black flew into the end zone two plays later, giving JMU the 32-28 lead with 10:36 to go.
- App State got a stop on defense late but was stalled on fourth down with 49 seconds left.

GAME NOTES

- JMU outgained App State, 376-298, which included an impressive 172-63 lead in the run game. The Mountaineers held a 186-183 yards advantage at halftime.
- The Dukes held App State to just 4-of-12 on third down, as the hosts went 2-of-8 in the second half. JMU struggled as well at 2-for-14.
- JMU was also 3-for-6 on fourth down, as opposed to App's 0-for-2.
- Each team turned the ball over twice, as JMU had a pair of fumbles and App had a fumble and interception.
- JMU held a time of possession lead, at 33:28 to 26:32. That included having possession for 10:29 in the fourth alone.
- Defensively, Jamare Edwards had a career-high eight tackles with 2.5 tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks. Three Dukes also put in seven tackles in Sam Kidd, Taurus Jones and James Carpenter, who finished with 1.5 TFL and a sack.
- Walker added four stops with his interception, and Mikail Kamara had a strip sack, allowing for Isaac Ukwu's fumble recovery.
- JMU's 28-3 deficit matched the largest since Nov. 3, 2018, when New Hampshire opened the game up 28-3 in Durham, N.H.
- JMU's first-quarter field goal marked the first made kick not by NCAA all-time scoring and field goals leader Ethan Ratke since Nov. 17, 2018, spanning 41 games.
- The 33,248 attendance was sixth-largest in Kidd Brewer Stadium history and highest attended JMU-App State game.

Dukes Storm Past Texas State for First Home Conference Victory

HARRISONBURG, Va. – James Madison powered through wet conditions and used scoring in all three phases to run past Texas State, 40-13, for its first Sun Belt Conference home victory on Saturday afternoon at Bridgeforth Stadium.

The Dukes improved to 4-0 overall and 2-0 in Sun Belt play, while the Bobcats fell to 2-3 and 0-1.

JMU's defense was stifling, as it limited the Bobcats to just 246 yards while forcing four turnovers.

Jailin Walker, one week removed from a big interception in JMU's win at App State, collected a tipped pass and returned it 22 yards for a pick-six. Taurus Jones got in on a pair of turnovers, as he finished with a team-high seven tackles, 2.0 tackles for loss, an interception and a forced fumble. Other Dukes with takeaways include Sam Kidd, who had both a forced fumble and a recovery, and Jarius Reimonenq, who recovered a fumble as well.

On the offensive side of the ball, Latrelle Palmer turned in a solid outing on the ground, rushing for 106 yards and a career-high three touchdowns, all of which came in the second half. His 27 carries was a career-high and he registered his third career 100-yard game. He also added 24 receiving yards in the win.

Todd Centeio accumulated 309 total yards, as he was 15-of-25 for 257 passing yards while rushing for 52 yards and a touchdown. Kris Thornton made four catches for 97 receiving yards, as he moved into eighth place all-time at JMU with 1,868 career yards. Reggie Brown also had three grabs for 37 yards.

JMU scored the game's first 26 points, not allowing Texas State to find the endzone until midway through the third quarter.

Texas State was paced by Layne Hatcher, who was 13-of-27 for 140 yards and a touchdown with two interceptions. Lincoln Pare had a solid second half, finishing with 81 rushing yards.

HOW IT HAPPENED

- JMU outgained Texas State 130-40 in the opening stanza, as Centeio threw for 113 yards and found the endzone on the ground on a 2-yard rush to give JMU a 7-0 lead after the first.
- Starting at their own five, Centeio accounted for 65 total yards to set up Camden Wise's 27-yard field goal to extend the lead to 10-0 with 5:27 to play in the first half.
- On the ensuing drive, a high snap over the head of Texas State punter Seamus O'Kelly resulted in a safety to make it a 12-0 lead.

- Texas State's first eight drives featured five punts, two interceptions a safety and four drives of three plays or less.
- JMU has now won seven straight conference games dating back to the 2021 season and eight overall games in a row at home. Since 2016, JMU is 46-2 when playing at home.
- The attendance of 25,188 was the 10th highest in Bridgeforth Stadium history and marked the first sellout of the 2022 season.

Dukes Pull Away from Arkansas State, Move to 5-0 with 42-20 Win

JONESBORO, Ark. – James Madison exploded for nearly 600 yards, as Kris Thornton and Percy Agyei-Obese had career outings to lead the Dukes to a 42-20 victory at Arkansas State in Sun Belt Conference action Saturday night at Centennial Bank Stadium.

The Dukes remained unbeaten, moving to 5-0 on the year and 3-0 in Sun Belt play, while the Red Wolves fell to 2-4 and 1-2 in the team's inaugural meeting.

Todd Centeio finished 28-of-37 for 394 passing yards and four touchdowns. He's now up to 15 touchdown passes with just one interception this season.

Kris Thornton had a big night in the passing game, as he made 9 receptions for a career-high 173 receiving yards to surpass 2,000 career yards with the Dukes and move into sixth on JMU's all-time receiving list. He also finished with an incredible 115 yards after the catch.

On the ground, Percy Agyei-Obese also had a huge night, rushing for a career-high 158 yards and two touchdowns, the 34th and 35th scores of his career. He did so on 21 carries, averaging 7.5 per rush. Latrelle Palmer added 34 rushing yards, as JMU compiled 204 as a team.

Other notable pass catchers included Drew Painter, who had career highs of five catches for 44 yards and a huge fourth-quarter touchdown. Solomon Vanhorse and Devin Ravenel each had multi-catch outings while scoring a touchdown, respectively. Zach Horton also scored a receiving touchdown, the first trip to the end zone of his career.

Defensively, Taurus Jones had a career-high 13 tackles with 2.5 tackles for loss and a sack, one of five JMU collected as a team. Isaac Ukwu contributed six stops with 2.5 TFL and a sack, and Jailin Walker had six tackles with a sack. James Carpenter and Jamare Edwards also each had a sack, as Edwards made a fumble recovery on Ukwu's strip sack.

- After a scoreless first, Arkansas State opened the scoring with 11:09 remaining in the second on a 25-yard field goal from Dominic Zvada.
- The Dukes responded with consecutive touchdown drives to end the half, as Centeio connected on a 13-yard swing pass to Vanhorse and a 10-yard strike over the middle to Ravenel to make it 14-3 at the break.
- The Red Wolves cut into the lead on the first drive of the third, settling for a 37-yard field goal after Walker's third-down sack.
- JMU answered right back on a four-play, 75-yard drive, as Centeio connected on a 54-yard pass to Thornton before Agyei-Obese scampered 17 yards to the pylon for his third rushing score of the year.
- A-State went right back to the air as well, as Jeff Foreman made a diving catch for a 13-yard score to make it 21-13 with 6:13 left in the third.
- Into the fourth, JMU got nice field position on a Josh Sarratt punt return, and three plays later, Centeio found Zach Horton on a nine-yard pass for the tight end's first career touchdown, extending JMU's lead to 28-13 with 11:39 to play.
- On the ensuing drive, a pair of deep completions set up a 10-yard touchdown pass to Te'Vailance Hunt to cut JMU's lead to 28-20 with 10:21 to go.
- Agyei-Obese broke off a tackle on fourth and short and took it 31 yards to the house for his second touchdown with 8:37 to play.
- Less than a minute later after the Ukwu strip sack, Painter caught a 28-yard pass down the sideline to move the lead to 42-20 and cap the scoring.

GAME NOTES

- JMU outgained Arkansas State, 598-267, which included 204-20 on the ground. A-State was held to just 0.7 per rush, while JMU was at 4.7 per attempt.
- This was the third time JMU held an opposing rushing attack to 20 yards or fewer this season.
- JMU limited A-State to just 77 first-half yards, while gaining 255. Aside from a 47-yard catch, the Red Wolves were held to just 30 total yards on the other 22 first-half snaps.

- A-State became the first team this season to score first against the Dukes on its second-quarter field goal.
- Thornton went over 100 yards for the third time this season, his sixth as a JMU Duke, and for the 13th time of his career. He also moved into sixth place all-time at JMU in career receiving yards, as he now sits at 2,041.
- Agyei-Obese's second score was also his 35th total touchdown, which ranks third all-time at JMU.
- JMU becomes the third team to start 5-0 in its first FBS season, joining UTSA in 2012 and Florida Atlantic in 2004.

Georgia Southern Beats #25 JMU in Offensive Slugfest, 45-38

STATESBORO, Ga. – #25 James Madison football suffered its first loss of the season on Saturday night in heartbreaking fashion, dropping a 45-38 decision to Georgia Southern in Sun Belt Conference action at Allen E. Paulson Stadium.

The Eagles improved to 4-3 overall and 1-2 in SBC play, while the Dukes fell to 5-1 on the year and 3-1 in league games.

In a game featuring the Sun Belt's top-two offenses, teams combined for 1,265 yards, including 1,046 through the air.

Kyle Vantrease led the way for GS, as he was 38-of-64 for 578 passing yards and four touchdowns. That was a single-game program passing yards record, and he's also the first opposing quarterback over 400 passing against JMU since Nov. 5, 2016 when Richmond's Kyle Lauletta had 435.

Amare Jones had a big day, making seven catches for 164 receiving yards and two touchdowns. Jeremy Singleton also had 7 catches for 108 yards. Defensively, Derrick Canteen and Anthony Wilson each had double-digit tackles, with 12 and 11, respectively.

For JMU, Percy Agyei-Obese eclipsed the 3,000-yard rushing mark in the game, as he finished with 106 rushing yards. He's the fifth player in school history to achieve the feat, as he sits at 3,055 for his career. It was also his 11th career 100-yard game.

Todd Centeio was 28-of-48 for a single-game program record 468 yards with two touchdowns and three interceptions. He also rushed for 44 yards and a career-high three touchdowns. It was his first career game with multiple rushing touchdowns.

In the pass game, Reggie Brown caught a career-high eight passes for 136 yards and a touchdown in his first career 100-yard game. Thornton also went over the century mark, making five grabs for 126 yards, while Devin Ravenel added four receptions for 75 yards and Terrance Greene Jr. made four catches for 74 yards and a touchdown.

Defensively, Sam Kidd had a team-high 10 tackles, while Jailin Walker tied his career-high with nine. Jordan Swann also set a career-best in tackles with seven stops.

HOW IT HAPPENED

- JMU's offense was prolific in the opening 15 minutes, gaining 206 yards. On its opening drive, Centeio connected on a 51-yard pass to Thornton, setting up a 17-yard quarterback keeper for the score.
- On the opening play of the second, Centeio hit paydirt again on a 13-yard rush for his second touchdown run to make it 14-0.
- The Eagles answered with consecutive touchdowns, as Vantrease used multiple chunk pass plays to set up a 13-yard connection to Amare Jones. On the ensuing drive, a blocked punt in the endzone by the Eagles tied the game at 14-14 with 10:58 to go in the half.
- The Dukes regained the lead on a 26-yard field goal from Camden Wise, his third of the season, to make it 17-14. On that drive, Agyei-Obese surpassed the 3,000-yard mark.
- After a failed outside kick by GS, the Dukes needed just three plays, as Centeio's keeper from 10 yards out made it 24-14.
- On the next play, a near interception turned into a 75-yard touchdown pass from Vantrease to Jones for their second TD connection of the day, bringing the hosts within 24-21 just over a minute into the second half.
- The Eagles tied it at 24-24 up on a short 20-yard field goal by Alex Raynor with 5:39 to play.
- GS took its first lead on a 37-yard touchdown pass to Jalen White to make it 31-24 heading to the fourth.
- The Eagles extended the lead to 34-24 early in the fourth with Raynor's 41-yard field goal.
- JMU wasn't done, as three straight deep passes got the Dukes in the endzone, as Centeio hooked up with Brown on a 28-yard strike to make it 34-31 with 6:24 to play.
- JMU got a huge defensive stop deep in the red zone, as GS settled for a 24-yard field to give the home team a 37-31 lead with 3:53 to go.
- On the ensuing drive, Centeio found Thornton on a fourth down to keep the drive going. He then found Greene who cut over the middle for a 25-yard score, giving the Dukes a 38-37 lead with 2:28 left.
- Vantrease then found Derwin Burgess Jr. from 22 yards out and GS converted the two-point try to take the lead back at 45-38 with 1:10 to play.
- The Dukes got to the Georgia Southern 38 on the game's final drive, but Centeio threw an interception with 18 seconds left which sealed the game.

GAME NOTES

- In the offensive onslaught, JMU outgained Georgia Southern, 675-590, but Georgia Southern had 578 of those yards through the air.
- In the first half, JMU had a 366-147 yards advantage, which included holding the hosts to just 10 rushing yards. However, a blocked punt for a TD, coupled with two interceptions made it a 17-14 game at the break.
- The third quarter saw a flip in yardage, as GS gained 245 yards to JMU's 99, to take a 31-24 lead on the Dukes heading to the final stanza.
- The Eagles were aided by four takeaways, in addition to the block for a score, while JMU had just one interception.
- Time of possession was controlled by the Dukes 32:30-27:30.
- On third down, JMU was 7-of-15, while the Eagles were 6-of-17.
- JMU committed its most penalties of the season, with 10 for a total of 43 yards.
- Centeio passed Vad Lee for the JMU single-game passing mark, as Lee had 433 back on Nov. 15, 2014.
- Thornton moved into fifth place at JMU with 2,167 career receiving yards.

JMU Falls to Marshall on Homecoming

HARRISONBURG, Va. – After a strong opening stanza, James Madison football struggled offensively and Marshall scored 24 unanswered to rally for a 26-12 Sun Belt Conference victory Saturday evening at Bridgeforth Stadium.

The game was played in front of a stadium-record 26,159 fans, which bested the previous record of 26,069 set back on Oct. 24, 2015.

The Thundering Herd improved to 4-3 on the year and 1-2 in Sun Belt play, while the Dukes fell for the second straight week, dropping to 5-2 and 3-2. Marshall improved to 3-0 all-time against JMU.

JMU led 12-2 and gained 129 yards after one quarter but failed to score again, as Marshall held the Dukes to just 118 yards over the final three quarters while forcing five turnovers.

JMU's defense kept the Dukes in the game, which stayed a one-score game until the late stages. Taurus Jones tied his career high with 13 tackles, which led all players in the game. He also made a tackle for loss and recovered a fumble. James Carpenter set a career best with nine stops and a half sack, while three others had six. Isaac Ukwu had a pair of sacks, while Chauncey Logan and Que Reid notched interceptions. It was the first career pick for Logan.

Percy Agyei-Obese ran for 96 yards, averaging 4.8 per carry to lead the rushing offense. Billy Atkins, making his first career start, threw for 164 yards on 13-of-35 passing with a touchdown and four interceptions.

Kris Thornton had four catches for 47 yards, while Terrance Greene Jr. made three grabs for 66 yards. Zach Horton also caught three passes for 31 yards and his second touchdown of the season.

For Marshall, Khalan Laborn rushed for 151 yards and two touchdowns, which included a 61-yard score. Cam Fancher was 15-of-31 for 159 passing yards and a touchdown with two interceptions. Corey Gammage made five grabs for 107 yards and a score.

Marshall's defense was anchored by Owen Porter, who made nine tackles with 4.5 TFL and 3.5 sacks. Charlie Gray made eight stops while intercepting a pair of Atkins passes.

HOW IT HAPPENED

- JMU got on the board first, using a pair of deep completions from Atkins to Greene Jr. to set up a 35-yard field goal from Camden Wise, giving the Dukes a 3-0 edge with 7:07 left in the first.
- The Dukes extended their lead on a 17-yard pass to Zach Horton, but the extra point was blocked and returned for a defensive PAT to make it 9-2. Wise added a second field goal two minutes later to make it 12-2 after one.
- Marshall found the endzone on a 61-yard rush by Laborn, the longest run allowed by JMU this season, to put the visitors within 12-9 at the break.
- After a three-and-out by to start the second half, Marshall needed just one play, as Fancher connected with Gammage on a 57-yard touchdown pass, giving the Herd a 16-12 lead.
- After forcing its third turnover of the day, Rece Verhoff hit a 38-yard field goal to put the Herd up a touchdown, at 19-12.
- After a fourth-quarter interception, Laborn broke off an 18-yard run to cap off the scoring with 4:07 to play.

GAME NOTES

- Marshall outgained JMU by a 326-247 margin, which included a 167-83 advantage in the run game.
- Third down was rough for both teams, with Marshall going 3-for-18, while JMU was held without a conversion, at 0-for-17.
- With the offensive woes, Sam Clark set a JMU single-game record with 12 punts. He averaged 42.5 per kick with a long of 50.
- Marshall made 11 tackles for loss with seven sacks, as opposed to JMU's nine and three. JMU had allowed just eight sacks this season entering the game.
- Marshall held a lead in time of possession, at 31:34 to 28:26, marking the first time this season a JMU opponent led in this category.
- It's also the first time this season JMU has been outgained and outrushed by the opposition.
- The Thundering Herd had a +2 turnover margin (5-3) in the win.
- JMU's 12 points were its fewest scored at home since Oct. 2, 2010 when it scored 10 against Delaware.
- The Dukes suffered losses in consecutive weeks for the first time since the 2015 season (Oct. 24 and 31).

Louisville Pulls Away in Second Half to Down JMU

LOUISVILLE, Ky. – Louisville's offense came alive in the second half, as it scored 27-consecutive points to bridge the halves, downing James Madison 34-10 in front of 42,157 fans Saturday night at Cardinal Stadium.

The Cardinals won their fourth straight, improving to 6-3 on the year to become bowl eligible. JMU fell for the third straight game, dropping to 5-3. This is the first three-game skid for the Dukes since their final three games of the 2013 season.

JMU led 10-7 late in the first half, but the Cardinals tied the game on the final play of the second quarter, sparking its scoring run. Louisville built a lopsided total offense lead, outgaining the Dukes, 467-193, which included 302-49 in the second half.

Percy Agyei-Obese led the JMU offense with 24 carries for 102 rushing yards and a touchdown. That included 83 rushing yards and 5.2 per rush in the first half. It was the 12th career 100-yard game of his career, as he now has 3,253 career rushing yards.

After missing last week, Todd Centeio struggled to find a rhythm, finishing 4-of-15 for passing yards while adding 11 rushing yards.

JMU's defense was paced by career-high tackles from a pair of first-time starters in Francis Meehan and Trent Hendrick. Meehan had 10 tackles with eight solo in his first start at safety, while Hendrick made seven stops with a tackle for loss. James Carpenter and Isaac Ukwu were active up front, as Carpenter tallied seven tackles with a career-high 3.0 TFL, and Ukwu added seven stops with 2.5 TFL and a sack.

For Louisville, Malik Cunningham was 14-of-20 for 223 passing yards and three touchdowns. He rushed for zero yards, as JMU's defense had him net -18 on his final 14 attempts. He also tied Lamar Jackson's school record for touchdown responsibility with 119.

Tiyon Evans provided a boost in the run game, especially in the second half, as he finished with 142 yards with a 71-yard touchdown. Tyler Hudson had six catches for a game-high 142 yards and a score. The Cardinal defense was led by Momo Sanogo's 13 tackles and half TFL.

With the setback, JMU is now 2-10 all-time against Atlantic Coast Conference foes.

HOW IT HAPPENED

- JMU's opening drive lasted more than six minutes, going 58 yards with a strong rushing attack to lead to a 34-yard field goal by Camden Wise, his sixth make of the year.
- Louisville answered six plays later with a one-yard touchdown pass from Cunningham to Isaac Martin to give the Cards a 7-3 lead with 5:49 to go in the first.
- JMU stopped the Cardinals on a fourth-down try and a Mikail Kamara sack helped JMU to outgain LU 64-52 in the first quarter.
- Kaelon Black set the tone with three consecutive big plays, resulting in 41 total yards to set up Agyei-Obese's fifth rushing touchdown on a nine-yard scamper. JMU led 10-7 with 1:43 to go before the half.
- LU ended the half with a 27-yard field goal from James Turner to tie it at 10-10 after JMU halted the offense with three big stops to set up the kick.
- The Cardinals recaptured the lead, at 13-10, on a 57-yard drive, resulting in a 35-yard Turner field goal with 8:59 left in the third. The LU drive was once again halted by a third-down sack by Isaac Ukwu to force the field goal.
- After a stop, Evans burst through the line on the first play of the drive for a 71-yard touchdown run, giving the hosts a 20-10 lead with 6:04 left in the third. That was LU's longest offensive play of the year.
- Early in the fourth, Louisville connected on a 44-yard touchdown pass from Cunningham to Bryan Hudson on third-and-long, making it 27-10 in favor of the hosts.
- Louisville capped off the scoring midway through the fourth on an 11-yard pass to Ahmari Huggins Bruce.

Dukes Win Oyster Bowl in Dominant Fashion, Cruise 37-3 at ODU

NORFOLK, Va. – James Madison returned to the win column in a big way, owning all three phases of the game en route to a 37-3 win at Old Dominion in Sun Belt Conference football action Saturday afternoon at S.B. Ballard Stadium.

The Dukes improved to 6-3 on the year and 4-2 in Sun Belt play, while the Monarchs fell to 3-7 overall and 2-4 in SBC matchups. Saturday marked JMU's first win ever in football against ODU in the teams' third all-time meeting.

JMU also clinched a winning record in their first season competing in the Football Bowl Subdivision while capturing their first Oyster Bowl win in three tries dating back to 1985. Todd Centeio was named MVP of the 72nd annual Oyster Bowl after throwing 18-of-21 for 304 yards and rushing for 12 yards and a score on the ground.

Kris Thornton had a big day in the passing game, making six receptions for 140 yards, which included a pair grabs of at least 40 yards. Percy Agyei-Obese ran for 82 yards and a touchdown, averaging 5.1 per carry, while Kaelon Black combined for 88 total yards, running for 51 and a score and making four catches for 37 yards.

Defensively, Taurus Jones had seven tackles with a tackle for loss, while Jailin Walker made six stops, a pass breakup and a 29-yard pick-six for his second defensive touchdown of the season. JMU had eight tackles for loss and four sacks as a team, which included 1.5 sacks apiece for James Carpenter and Jamare Edwards.

JMU dominated the total-yards category, outgaining ODU by a 492-227 margin. JMU also won the turnover battle, at +2 (2 for JMU, 4 for ODU).

ODU was paced by Hayden Wolff, who threw for 112 yards and two interceptions. No Monarch rusher gained more than 27 yards, as JMU limited the hosts to 78 rushing yards and 2.7 per carry. Jason Henderson made a game-high 18 tackles to set the SBC single-season tackles record.

HOW IT HAPPENED

- JMU opened the scoring on its first offensive drive, going 82 yards for a touchdown. Agyei-Obese rushed for 25 yards on five carries, capping off the drive with a one-yard score with 8:11 left in the first.
- Centeio connected on a deep ball to Thornton, setting up a six-yard touchdown rush by the JMU signal caller early in the second to make it 14-0.
- Teams traded field goals late in frame to make it 17-3 at the break.
- After Wise's second field goal extended the lead to 20-3, Walker picked off Wolff's pass and returned it 29 yards for his second pick-six of the year.
- Wise connected on his career-best third field goal to close the third, bringing JMU's lead to 30-3.
- In the fourth and making a return to his nearby home of Virginia Beach, Black capped off the scoring with a one-yard touchdown run with 5:47 to play, which completed a 91-yard scoring drive.

GAME NOTES

- JMU doubled up ODU in first downs, at 22-11.
- The Dukes held a 110-yard advantage in rushing, as it gained 188 a team.
- JMU average 6.7 yards per play, as opposed to ODU's 4.1.
- JMU was 7-of-13 on third down while limiting Old Dominion to 4-of-13.
- Wise's third field goal of the game, a 44-yard kick, was a career long for the redshirt junior.

Dukes Storm Back for Thrilling 42-40 Victory Over Georgia State

HARRISONBURG, Va. – Early turnovers put James Madison in a hole, but a furious rally in the second half propelled the Dukes to a thrilling 42-40 victory against Georgia State in Sun Belt Conference action on Saturday afternoon at Bridgeforth Stadium.

The win moved the Dukes to 7-3 on the year and 5-2 in Sun Belt play while the Panthers fell to 4-7 overall and 3-4 in league games. JMU also improved to 2-0 all-time against GSU.

Georgia State took advantage of three first-half turnovers by JMU to build a 27-7 lead in the second and later 34-14 at the break. However, the third quarter was all JMU, as it outgained GSU by a 171-5 margin, scoring three touchdowns to take a 35-34 lead entering the fourth.

The Dukes extended their lead to 42-34 with just over 10 minutes remaining on a 16-yard stripe from Todd Centeio to Kris Thornton, which was the fourth passing touchdown for Centeio in the game.

The Dukes then got a stop, but a fumble gave GSU possession in JMU territory with 6:10 to play. The Panthers capitalized, scoring on a Marcus Carroll touchdown run to make it 42-40 with 2:30 to go. JMU's defense forced an incompletion on the two-point try to maintain the lead. After recovering the onside kick a second later, JMU converted on third down with a Centeio 10-yard gain on a keeper to run out the clock.

Centeio had yet another stellar day through the air, finishing 21-of-27 for 274 yards and four touchdowns. That included 15 straight completions to open the game. He added 12 rushing yards to tally 286 total.

Thornton made four catches for 68 yards and two touchdowns for his ninth career multi-touchdown game. Devin Ravenel had a career-high five receptions for 35 yards and a touchdown, while Terrance Greene Jr. caught two balls for 81 yards. That included a season-long 62-yard completion from Centeio in the third quarter. Kaelon Black also added a receiving score, making four grabs for 26 yards.

On the ground, Percy Agyei-Obese rushed for 89 yards and two touchdowns, as he's now found the endzone 39 times in his career.

JMU's defense was led by six tackles apiece from Isaac Ukwu and Jamare Edwards, as Ukwu tied game-high honors with 1.5 sacks. Jamree Kromah was active in the backfield, finishing with 2.0 tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks, while Devyn Coles had a sack, forced fumble and fumble recovery.

GSU was paced by Darren Grainger, who threw for 176 yards and a touchdown while rushing for 25 and a score. Jamari Thrash had four catches for 136 yards and a touchdown.

In all, JMU outgained Georgia State by a 425-257 margin, which included a 271-62 lead in the second half.

HOW IT HAPPENED

- JMU struck first when Centeio connected on a dart over the middle to Thornton, who bounced off a defender into the endzone for a 26-yard touchdown with 5:22 to go in the first.
- GSU scored 10 straight in a 16-second span, as Michael Hayes drilled a career-long, 51-yard field goal. On the ensuing play, Centeio was sacked and Javon Denis picked up a fumble and returned it 21 yards for a touchdown to give the Panthers a 10-7 lead after one.
- After a stop, Grainger drove the Panthers down the field and scored on a 28-yard keeper to extend the GSU lead to 17-7 with 10:12 left in the half. The Dukes fumbled on the kickoff and the Panthers recovered at the JMU four, but settled for a 22-yard field goal to make it a 20-7 game.
- Another offensive miscue immediately turned into points for Georgia State. A fumble by Agyei-Obese resulted in a 31-yard scoop-and-score by Terrell Gordon to give the visitors a 27-7 lead midway through the second.
- JMU ended the drought just before halftime, going 75 yards and capping off the drive with a four-yard touchdown pass from Centeio to Ravenel to bring the Dukes within 27-14.
- GSU wasn't done, going 75 yards on a shovel pass on the next play to extend its lead to 34-14 at the break.
- On its opening possession of the second half, Centeio hit a wide-open Greene Jr. for a 62-yard catch, a season-long for both Dukes, to set up Agyei-Obese's one-yard touchdown.
- Black caught a 15-yard touchdown pass from Centeio with 6:18 left in the third to close within a score at 34-28. After a strip and recovery by Coles, Agyei-Obese burst through the line for a 36-yard touchdown, giving JMU a 35-34 lead after three.
- In the fourth, JMU extended the play, converting a fourth down in GSU territory to set up Centeio's second TD pass to Thornton, this time on a 16-yard catch in the corner of the end zone.
- GSU scored with 2:30 left on a Carroll six-yard rush, but the two-point conversion was stopped when JMU's defense was all over Grainger in the backfield to force the incompletion.
- JMU recovered the onside kick, and with GSU having no timeouts left, the Dukes secured the win on a Centeio first-down carry.

Kings of the East! JMU Dominates #23 Coastal, 47-7, in 2022 Finale

HARRISONBURG, Va. – James Madison rattled off 44 unanswered points and dominated #23 Coastal Carolina, 47-7, to finish atop the Sun Belt Conference East division standings on Saturday afternoon at Bridgeforth Stadium.

The Dukes conclude their inaugural FBS season with an 8-3 overall record and 6-2 mark in Sun Belt Conference play, while the Chanticleers fell to 9-2 and 6-2.

JMU trailed 7-3 into the second quarter, but reeled off 44 consecutive points in a span of 29:03 while holding Coastal to just 80 total yards over the final three quarters.

Todd Centeio combined for five touchdowns and 312 total yards in his final collegiate game, throwing 17-of-32 for 287 yards and four touchdowns while adding 25 rushing yards and a score on the ground.

Devin Ravenel saved his best for last on Senior Day, making five receptions for 102 receiving yards and two touchdowns for his first career 100-yard game. Kris Thornton made a game-high six catches for 93 yards, as he became JMU's first two-time 1,000-yard receiver. Reggie Brown returned this week, going for 55 receiving yards and a touchdown on a pair of grabs, while Drew Painter scored on a 15-yard catch in his final game.

JMU rushed for 215 yards, led by Percy Agyei-Obese's 79 rushing yards on just seven carries (11.3 avg.). Agyei-Obese finished his career ranking third with 3,503 rushing yards. Latrelle Palmer had a big second half, accruing 61 rushing yards and a score, while Kaelon Black added 50.

JMU's defense held Coastal to only 183 yards and 2.8 yards per play. The JMU defense was paced by Jailin Walker, who had a game- and career-high 10 tackles. Chris Chukwunke also turned in career numbers, tallying eight tackles with 2.5 tackles for loss, a sack and a fumble recovery. Taurus Jones also finished with eight stops. James Carpenter made six tackles with a sack, while Jamare Edwards capped off his career with five tackles, 3.5 TFL and a pair of sacks.

HOW IT HAPPENED

- JMU took advantage of a short field off a short punt and drove into the red zone, where Camden Wise drilled his 10th field goal of the year from 32 yards out to give the Dukes a 3-0 lead early.
- Coastal got on the board with 4:50 left in the first, as it converted a fourth down with a 33-yard touchdown pass from Jarrett Guest to Tyson Mobley to give the visitors a 7-3 lead.
- After Wise knocked down his second field goal from 43 yards out, the Dukes took a 13-7 lead. Centeio connected over the middle to Brown, who sprinted 34 yards to the house for his fourth touchdown reception of the season.
- JMU went to the air with multiple big plays to set up a 26-yard touchdown pass from Centeio to Ravenel to give JMU a 20-7 halftime lead.
- The Dukes found the end zone three times in the third to blow the game wide open. Centeio found Painter in the corner of the end zone on a 17-yard touchdown to make it 26-7. The next drive, Palmer ran it in from 13 yards out, followed by Ravenel scoring for the second time on a pass over the middle to extend the lead to 40-7.
- The 2022 season's scoring was capped off with 12:55 to play when Centeio rushed it in from 11 yards out, running over a defender at the goal line.

GAME NOTES

- JMU held a wide margin in total offense, at 502-183. That included 287-93 in the pass game. JMU averaged 7.6 per play on offense.
- Coastal out-gained JMU 103-75 in the first quarter, but the Dukes had a 427-80 lead in yards over the final three quarters.
- JMU was 6-for-6 in the red zone, while Coastal failed to reach the red area one time.
- JMU had five sacks, as opposed to Coastal's one.
- The Dukes forced two turnovers with a Jalen Green interception and a Chukwunke fumble recovery. JMU did not turn over the ball once and had zero fumbles on the day.
- JMU handed Coastal its biggest loss since a 48-7 defeat to Louisiana on Nov. 7, 2019.
- The Dukes also snapped CCU's five-game road win streak, which was tied for third in the FBS.
- For the Chanticleers, Guest finished with 99 passing yards with a touchdown and interception. No rusher gained more than 30 yards, as Reese White had a team-best 29.
- JMU put up at least 40 points for the sixth time in 2022, going 6-0 this season in those games. It also held the opposition to single-digit points for the fourth time, also winning in all four instances.
- Saturday's win was JMU's largest of the season against a FBS team and its first home win over a AP Top 25 ranked team.

JMU Hall of Famer Charles Haley



Former football All-American Charles Haley became the first James Madison student-athlete to be enshrined into a major professional hall of fame as he took his rightful place into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on Saturday, August 8, 2015, at Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium.

Haley was introduced by Edward DeBartolo, Jr., former owner of the San Francisco 49ers prior to his speech to the capacity crowd in Canton. He was one of eight individuals to join pro football's most exclusive club, as he was accompanied by linebacker Junior Seau, guard Will Shields, running back Jerome Bettis, wide receiver Tim Brown, center Mike Tinglehoff and NFL executives Bill Polian and Ron Wolf.

A four-year letterwinner for the Dukes from 1982-85, he was twice named an Associated Press All-American. As a senior, Haley was named the Richmond Touchdown Club's Defensive Player of the Year and a First Team AP I-AA All-American.

"I am truly blessed," Haley said during his enshrinement speech. "I have played with some of the greatest players in the history of football and I've learned a lot. The one thing I learned from all the guys was unselfish play. Team matters - we need to go back to that. It's not about individuals, it's about team and that's the only way we can have success."

Haley capped off his speech by stating, "When I stepped out on the field, I was determined to be the best every play, not just some plays."

He is JMU's all-time leader in total tackles with 506 and led the Dukes in single-season tackles twice in his career, recording 143 in 1983 and 147 in 1984. Haley had a career-high 22 tackles at Shippensburg during the 1983 season, currently tied for the eighth-highest, single-game total in Madison history. A three-time JMU Defensive MVP, he was also named the JMU Male Athlete of the Year in 1985-86. Haley graduated from JMU in 1987 and in 1999 the athletic department named the Defensive MVP award after him.

Haley became the first player in JMU history selected in the National Football League Draft when he was selected by the San Francisco 49ers in the fourth round of the 1986 draft. He immediately made an impact, playing in 16 games as a rookie, recording 12.0 sacks. He played 12 seasons in the NFL, seven with the 49ers in two different stints and five with the Dallas Cowboys.

He earned five Super Bowl rings (two in San Francisco and three in Dallas), the first of two players in NFL history to have played on five Super Bowl champion teams. A five-time Pro-Bowler and two-time First Team All-Pro selection, Haley finished his career with 100.5 career sacks, including a career-high 16 in 1990, the first year he was honored as an All-Pro. He was also a two-time NFC Defensive Player of the Year and played on 10 division championship squads during his 12-year career.

A native of Gladys, Va., Haley was inducted into the Virginia Sports Hall of Fame in 2006.

The Hall of Fame committee consists of 32 votes of writers from the NFL cities, 13 at-large members and one from the Pro Football Writers of America. Each candidate was required to receive at least 80 percent approval votes from the Committee to be enshrined.



JMU Hall of Famer Charles Haley



Former James Madison All-American Charles Haley was enshrined to the College Football Hall Of Fame on July 15-16 in South Bend, Indiana, becoming the first athlete from a Colonial Athletic Association school and sixth overall to be elected to the Hall, as five coaches were previously enshrined.

Haley was a four year starter at JMU from 1982-85. He was a two-time All-American and a three-time Defensive MVP at Madison. As a senior at JMU, Haley was voted a 1985 Associated Press First-Team I-AA All-American and both the Richmond Touchdown Club and Roanoke Times & World News' State Defensive Player of the Year.

He leads JMU's all-time tackles list with 506, including three seasons of more than 100 tackles, and his 22 tackles at Shippensburg during the 1983 season still ranks as the eighth-highest single-game total in JMU history. He also added three interceptions and 17 quarterback sacks to his total.

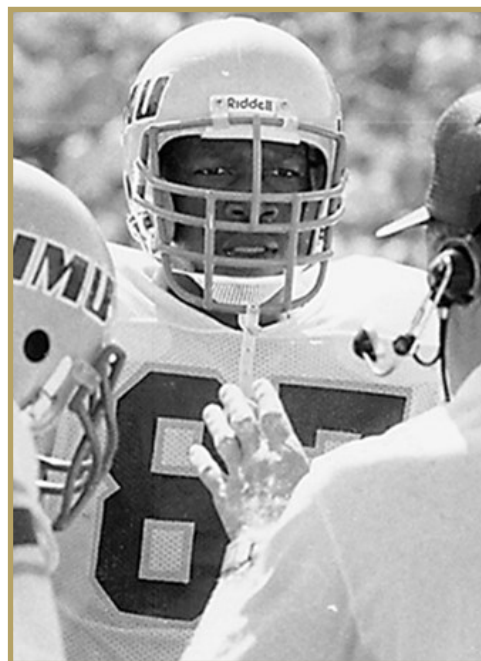
In 1986, after his senior season Haley was selected in the fourth round of the NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers, as he was the No. 96 pick overall, the highest ever in school history. The first ever JMU player to be drafted into the NFL, Haley went on to become the only player in the league's history to win five Super Bowls, two with the 49ers and three with the Dallas Cowboys.

He was also selected to five Pro Bowls during his career, as well as being a two-time First-Team All-Pro and 1990 NFC Defensive Player of the Year. He finished his professional career with 100.5 sacks, including a career-high 16 in 1990. He had eight fumble recoveries and scored one touchdown in the NFL. He retired in 1999 before becoming an assistant coach for the Detroit Lions.

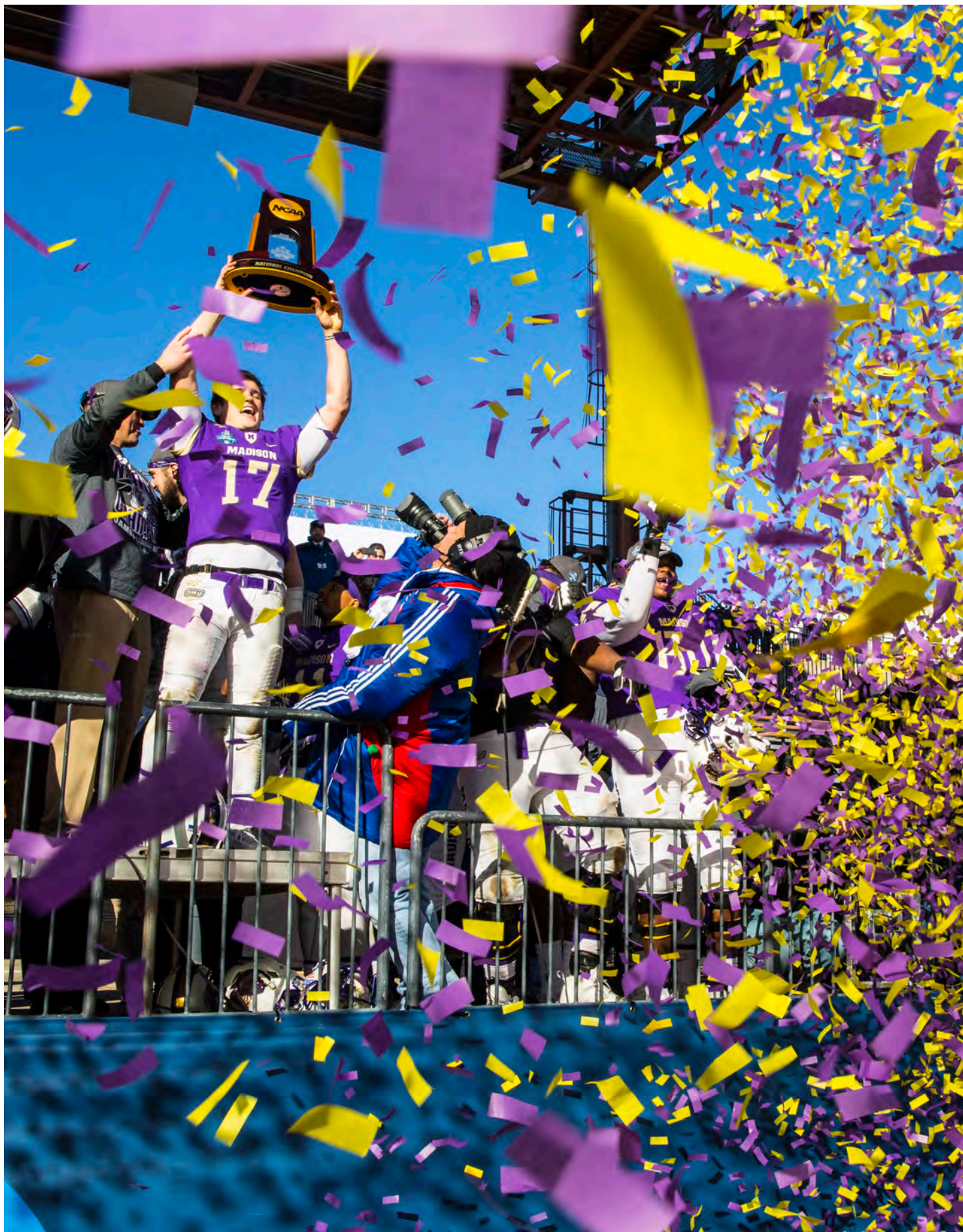
A 2006 inductee to the Virginia Sports Hall of Fame and a member of the JMU Sports Hall of Fame, the Dallas native has also served as a recruiter for the National Marrow Donor Program.

Haley was enshrined with fellow divisional inductees Dexter Coakley (Appalachian State), Mike Favor (North Dakota State), Mickey Kobrosky (Trinity), Mike Kelly (Dayton), and Bill Manlove (Widener, Delaware Valley, La Salle).

Haley joined an elite list from the CAA to be inducted to the College Football Hall of Fame, joining coaches Lou Holtz (William & Mary), Dick MacPherson (UMass), Dave Nelson (Delaware and Maine), Tubby Raymond (Delaware) and Eddie Robinson (Maine).

National Champions!!! Dukes Defeat Montana 31-21

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. – National champion.

That’s a title that forever will be used with the 2004 JMU football team.

The Dukes earned that distinction Friday at Finley Stadium/Davenport with a 31-21 victory over Montana in the finals of the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs.

The Dukes, as they have for most of the season, used a stingy defense, a strong running game, and good special teams play to post the biggest win in their 33-year football history.

JMU allowed a first-quarter touchdown for the only time during the 2004 season and trailed twice, but the Dukes rallied to dominate the final minutes of the game as they did for most of the season.

JMU went in front to stay 24-21 on a one-yard touchdown run by sophomore tailback Maurice Fenner with 3:25 left in the third quarter, added an insurance score on sophomore quarterback Justin Rascati’s six-yard run with eight minutes left in the game, and ran the final 6:14 off the clock after getting an interception from junior cornerback Clint Kent.

The Dukes used 14 straight rushing plays in running out the clock at the end of the game and nine straight rushing plays during the 72-yard drive that put them in front to stay.

JMU ran for 314 yards overall – 257 during the second half – and had a 318-202 overall yardage advantage during the final two periods.

Fenner led JMU’s attack with 164 rushing yards on 29 carries and ran for two touchdowns. Sophomore tailback Alvin Banks added 88 rushing yards on 13 carries, and Rascati ran 11 times for 57 yards and two scores. Rascati also hit on 13 of 18 passes for 132 yards and wasn’t intercepted.

In addition to the score that put JMU in front to stay, Fenner scored on a one-yard run with 0:16 left in the first quarter to give JMU a 10-7 edge. Rascati ran 11 yards for a touchdown on JMU’s first third-quarter series in addition to his fourth-period scoring carry.

“We went into the game planning to throw the ball, but we were making so many yards rushing that we didn’t need to throw,” said sixth-year JMU coach Mickey Matthews.

“Our league is great; that was Atlantic 10 football in the second half,” Matthews added. “Our league is by far the best in the country. Playing in our league really prepared us to play in this environment against Montana. Our guys thought they were going to win.”

The victory was JMU’s fifth straight overall and its fourth in the playoffs away from home. The Dukes completed the year with a 13-2 record and became the second straight Division I-AA champion from the Atlantic 10 (Delaware was the 2003 playoff winner). No other team previously had advanced to the championship with straight road wins.

JMU’s effort off set an outstanding performance by Montana quarterback Craig Ochs, a transfer from Colorado. Ochs completed 29 of 38 passes for 371 yards and three touchdowns, but the Grizzlies had only 44 rushing yards against JMU’s defense.

NATIONAL CHAMPS! JMU Tops Youngstown State 28-14

FRISCO, Texas - James Madison held Youngstown State to 292 total yards on Saturday afternoon and rolled to a 28-14 victory, as the Dukes captured the 2016 NCAA Division I Football Championship, the second title in program history.

The Dukes, who finished the season 14-1 and undefeated against FCS foes, saw their defensive line dominate from start to finish, holding the Penguins (12-4) to just 21 rushing yards after YSU entered the contest averaging 257.5 yards on the ground.

Senior linebacker Gage Steele paced an all-around dominant performance by the JMU defense, racking up six tackles, including five solo stops, a pair of sacks and a pass breakup as the Dukes forced a pair of crucial turnovers in the third quarter to put the game away.

No defensive player had more tackles for the Dukes than junior defensive back Jordan Brown's seven, but nine different players had at least three, while sophomore defensive back Curtis Oliver picked off his second pass of the season and sophomore Darrious Carter scooped up a fumble.

Senior running back Khalid Abdullah ended his career in style, rushing 26 times for 101 yards and a pair of scores for an afternoon that put him atop the JMU record books in career touchdowns, single-season touchdowns and single-season rushing yards.

The Dukes needed just 12 passes to take home the trophy, as junior quarterback Bryan Schor went 7-of-12 for 112 yards with a pair of first-quarter touchdowns to junior tight end Jonathan Kloosterman and senior wide receiver Rashard Davis.

JMU put the Penguins in an early hole, as Abdullah stretched the lead to 21-0 on a 1-yard touchdown plunge with 8:17 to play before halftime, though YSU responded with a touchdown of its own less than five minutes later.

Abdullah scored from two yards out with 10:10 to play in the third quarter for an advantage that proved to be all the Dukes' defense needed, as Youngstown State managed just one more scoring drive that ended with 10 seconds left before the final whistle.



TITLE HISTORY

JMU captured its second NCAA Division I Championship in program history, joining the 2004 team that defeated Montana 31-21 in Chattanooga. The Dukes are the eighth FCS program to earn multiple national titles and the first ever with multiple in the Colonial Athletic Association. JMU ended the five-year national-title run by North Dakota State and became the first CAA national champion since Villanova in 2009.

FINAL NUMBERS

- JMU won its 12th game in a row for the longest active streak in FCS football and second-longest in all of Division I behind Alabama (26)
- JMU's 14-1 overall record included a perfect 14-0 mark against FCS opponents and set a new school record for victories
- JMU finished as the nation's leader in scoring margin at +25.5 points per game, second in points per game (46.7) and 16th in points allowed (21.2)
- JMU went 6-0 vs. ranked opponents this season, all during the last seven contests

DEFENSE WINS CHAMPIONSHIPS

JMU finished the season 16th nationally in points allowed after ranking 77th in 2015 in that category. In addition to allowing 21.2 points per game, the Dukes limited opponents to 16.4 points per game over the last eight games and 15 per game in the playoffs, all against ranked teams. Also, 21 of the 60 postseason points allowed came in the final two minutes of games in which the outcome was already decided.

July 17, 1972 - Athletic Director Dean Ehlers announced that JMU would start football in 1972 and named Challace McMillin head coach.

Oct. 7, 1972 - JMU played its first football game, losing 6-0 to Shepherd's junior varsity team on what is now a practice field adjacent to Godwin Hall.

Sept. 22, 1973 - JMU won its first game, a 34-8 triumph over Anne Arundel Community College, held at Harrisonburg High School.

Sept. 21, 1974 - JMU began its first varsity season with a 24-22 win at Washington and Lee.

Oct. 12, 1974 - JMU defeated Bridgewater 41-13 in the first game ever at Bridgeforth Stadium.

1975 Season - JMU finished 9-0-1 with a season-opening scoreless tie at Glenville (W.Va.), its only non-win of the season. JMU won the Virginia College Athletic Association title and won seven straight games by seven points or fewer.

Sept. 18, 1976 - JMU beat Towson 28-26 at home, raising its record to 3-0 and its winning streak to 12 games, earning a tie for first place with C.W. Post in the NCAA Division III poll.

Sept. 25, 1976 - JMU played in the first Division III regular-season game televised by a major network (ABC), falling 21-14 at Hampden-Sydney.

Oct. 16, 1976 - JMU won 17-12 at Davidson, marking the program's first win against a Division I opponent.

Oct. 14, 1978 - JMU's Board of Visitors unanimously approved moving football to Division I.

Nov. 11, 1978 - JMU won 42-12 at Emory and Henry to finish the year 8-2 and ranked ninth nationally in Division III.

Dec. 18, 1978 - JMU announced it would offer 25 scholarships in 1979. Quarterback Frankie Walker and fullback Joe Curro, transfers from Lees-McRae College, were the team's first scholarship signees on Jan. 17, 1979.

1982 Season - JMU finished 8-3 and appeared in the Division I-AA top-20 poll for seven straight weeks, ranking as high as ninth at the midway point of the season.

Sept. 18, 1982 - JMU earned its first win over a I-A opponent, defeating Virginia 21-17 in Charlottesville.

Jan. 4, 1984 - Wide receiver Gary Clark became JMU's first player to be drafted to a professional football team, going as the sixth overall pick to Jacksonville in the United States Football League Draft.

Dec. 20, 1984 - Joe Purzycki became JMU's second head coach, replacing Challace McMillin.

April 29, 1986 - Linebacker Charles Haley, JMU's first Division I-AA First Team All-American, became the first Duke to be selected in the National Football League Draft, going in the fourth round to San Francisco.

1987 Season - JMU turned in its best record to date during the scholarship era, going 9-3 and reaching the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs for the first time. JMU was nationally ranked for nine straight weeks, ranking as high as third.

Dec. 14, 1990 - Rip Scherer became JMU's third head coach, replacing Joe Purzycki.

1991 Season - JMU reached the second round of the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs for the first time, finishing 9-4 on the year. They were nationally ranked for nine straight weeks and beat four ranked teams, including three on the road.

1993 Season - JMU first played in the Yankee Conference after joining the league in 1991.

1994 Season - JMU set a team record for wins to that point, at 10-3, and reached the second round of the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs for the second time. JMU was nationally ranked for 10 of last 11 weeks and beat four of five ranked teams it faced.

Jan. 23, 1995 - Alex Wood became JMU's fourth head coach, replacing Rip Scherer, who took the head coaching job at Memphis.

1995 Season - The 8-4 Dukes returned to the playoffs for the second straight season and were ranked in every poll during the season by The Sports Network.

1997 Season - The Atlantic 10 Football Conference assumed the operations of the Yankee Conference.

March 19, 1999 - Mickey Matthews became JMU's fifth head coach, replacing Alex Wood, who resigned to take an assistant job with the Minnesota Vikings.

1999 Season - JMU won its first Division I conference crown, tying for first in the Atlantic 10. Mickey Matthews was named Division I-AA Coach of the Year by the Sports Network and Curtis Keaton was drafted to the NFL in the fourth round by Cincinnati. Keaton was A-10 Offensive Player of the Year while Chris Morant was Defensive Player of the Year.

2000 Season - Delvin Joyce became the first Division I-AA player to reach 1,000 career yards in rushing (1,260), receiving (1,009), kickoff returns (1,902) and punt returns (1,488).

2001 Season - Derrick Lloyd won the Buck Buchanan Award, recognizing the Division I-AA's top defensive player.

June 6, 2003 - JMU broke ground on the Robert and Frances Plecker Athletic Performance Facility, adjacent to Bridgeforth Stadium.

Dec. 17, 2004 - JMU won the NCAA Division I-AA national title, beating Montana 31-21 in Chattanooga, Tenn. The 13-2 Dukes set a team record for wins and became the first I-AA team to win three road playoff games in the same season. Mickey Matthews was named Division I-AA Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association.

2006 Season - The 9-4 Dukes made their second playoff appearance in three seasons and held national rankings in every poll by The Sports Network, including a top-10 ranking in the final seven polls.

2007 Season - The Colonial Athletic Association assumed the operations of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference. JMU went 8-4 and made its third NCAA appearance in four seasons, ranking in every poll by both The Sports Network and FCS coaches.

2008 Season - JMU won the CAA title, going 8-0 in conference play, and was the top seed for the NCAA FCS playoffs, finishing 12-2. It was JMU's fourth postseason appearance in five years and Mickey Matthews was named National Coach of the Year by The Sports Network and Liberty Mutual.

Sept. 11, 2010 - JMU stunned No. 13 Virginia Tech 21-16 in Blacksburg, Va., outscoring the Hokies 14-3 in the second half. Drew Dudzik rushed for two touchdowns and threw for a third as the Dukes knocked off the preseason ACC favorites in the second-ever upset of a ranked FBS team by an FCS opponent.

July 16, 2011 - Charles Haley became the first JMU and CAA player to ever be enshrined to the College Football Hall of Fame.

Dec. 20, 2013 - Everett Withers became JMU's sixth head coach, replacing Mickey Matthews.

2014 Season - JMU broke nearly every passing record in program history, going 9-4 to return to the FCS playoffs for the first time since 2011. JMU won its final seven games of the regular season.

Aug. 8, 2015 - Charles Haley became JMU's first player to be enshrined to the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Sept. 26, 2015 - Vad Lee was the first Division I (FCS or FBS) player to pass and rush for 275 yards in the same game, leading JMU to a 48-45 win at FBS foe SMU.

Oct. 24, 2015 - ESPN College GameDay came to James Madison's campus, broadcasting live from the Quad and Wilson Hall. The Dukes broke the Bridgeforth Stadium attendance record (26,069) for Homecoming against Richmond.

Jan. 18, 2016 - Mike Houston became JMU's seventh head coach, replacing Everett Withers.

Oct. 29, 2016 - JMU scored a program-record 84 points in Homecoming win against Rhode Island.

Dec. 9, 2016 - JMU produced the second-largest margin of victory in FCS playoff history with 65-7 victory against previously undefeated Sam Houston State, which was ranked #1 in both major FCS polls.

Dec. 16, 2016 - JMU ended North Dakota State's five-year reign as national champion with a 27-17 win in Fargo, N.D., in the FCS semifinals.

Jan. 7, 2017 - JMU defeats Youngstown State, 28-14, to win program's second national championship in Frisco, Texas.

Oct. 14, 2017 - ESPN College GameDay returned to JMU's campus for its second nationally-televised broadcast from the Quad and Wilson Hall. The Dukes saw more than 14,000 fans attend the show, followed by a victory that afternoon against Villanova.

Dec. 8, 2017 - JMU set a FCS playoff record by forcing 10 turnovers in its 51-16 victory against South Dakota State in the national semifinals.

Sept. 29, 2018 - JMU registered its largest road win in school history with a 63-10 victory at Richmond.

Dec. 14, 2018 - Curt Cignetti became JMU's eighth head coach, replacing Mike Houston.

Dec. 13, 2019 - JMU produced its first postseason shutout, claiming a 17-0 win against Northern Iowa in the FCS quarterfinals. The Dukes held UNI to only 114 yards and zero rushing - both program postseason records.

Feb. 20, 2021 - JMU opens its only spring season ever after CoVID halted the FCS season in the fall of 2020. The Dukes shut out Morehead State 52-0, outgaining the Eagle 556-98.

Nov. 6, 2021 - James Madison University announces it will join the Sun Belt Conference and transition to the Football Bowl Subdivision.

Nov. 13, 2021 - Ethan Ratke made a JMU-record six field goals to break the NCAA all-division record for career field goals, as he finished his career with the all-time record of 101 made kicks.

Dec. 10, 2021 - JMU wins its final home FCS playoff game with a 28-6 victory against Montana, avenging its 2008 defeat at home to the Grizzlies in the same round.

July 1, 2022 - JMU officially joined the Sun Belt Conference.

Sept. 3, 2022 - The Dukes begin their inaugural season in the Sun Belt, hosting an FBS opponent for the first time and rolling to a 44-7 victory against Middle Tennessee. Todd Centeio tied a JMU single-game record with six touchdown passes, as the Dukes outgained the Blue Raiders 548-119.

Sept. 24, 2022 - JMU opens Sun Belt play at App State with one of its biggest comebacks in program history. Trailing 28-3 in the second quarter, the Dukes hold the Mountaineers scoreless in the second half and score 29 unanswered for a thrilling 32-28 conference win.

Oct. 9, 2022 - Following a 5-0 start, JMU is ranked in the AP Top 25 Poll for the first time, coming in at #25.

Nov. 26, 2022 - Kings of the East! JMU finishes its first FBS season with a 47-7 victory against #23 Coastal Carolina to finish the year 8-3 overall and 6-2 in Sun Belt play to finish tied atop the East Division.
