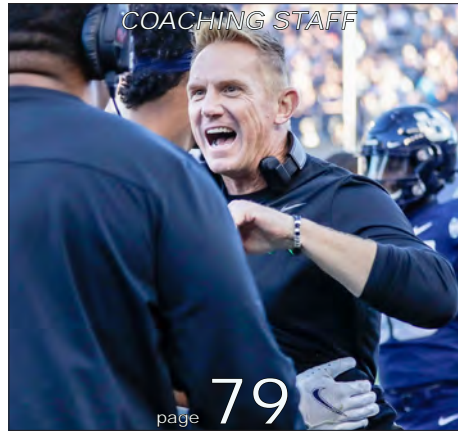

Head coach Blake Anderson will hold a press conference each Monday during the season (contact the USU Athletic Media Relations Office for time and location). Selected players will also be available at the press conference. Video from the press conference will be available at [www.UtahStateAggies.com](http://www.UtahStateAggies.com) each Monday afternoon and will also be e-mailed per request.

Utah State provides broadcast-quality video of Monday press conferences. Game highlights are also available upon request. Contact the Utah State Athletic Media Relations Office for more information.

INTERVIEWS

All requests for interviews with Utah State players and coaches should be made directly through the Athletic Media Relations Office at (435) 797-3714 and should be made at least one day in advance. The best time for player interviews is after practice, while head coach Blake Anderson should be available in the mornings, as well as before or after practice. Player interviews will be conducted through Wednesday each game week.

/// GAMEDAY INFORMATION ///

PARKING

Credentialed media will be allowed access to the C parking lot, located on the north side of the stadium. A parking pass is required for admittance to that area and should be requested at least one week in advance of the game.

PRESS BOX SERVICES

Access to the press level (fifth floor) of the West Stadium Center is located on the northwest side of Maverik Stadium and is limited to those with working credentials. A pregame meal will be served approximately one hour prior to kickoff.

Game programs, game notes, flip cards, statistics and play-by-play information will be provided before and during the game. At the conclusion of the game, a complete statistical book, typed quotes and postgame notes will be available.

Final game statistics, notes and quotes will be e-mailed to media requesting the service.

Wireless internet will be available to media at the game. A limited number of telephones will also be available in the press box on a first-come, first-serve basis. Requests for personal phones should be made through USU Telephone Services at (435) 797-3201 at least one week prior to the game.

PHOTOGRAPHERS' ACCESS

Photographers are allowed to shoot on the sidelines outside the team bench area (team bench areas are between the 25-yard lines). Photographers must remain behind the second set of dashed lines. Team rosters are provided in the press box and inside the Spetman Auditorium.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

The Utah State locker room is closed to the media on game days. Postgame interviews will take place after a brief cooling off period in the Spetman Auditorium, located on the second floor of the Jim and Carol Laub Athletics-Academics Complex. The Spetman Auditorium has wireless internet, so media and photographers can file from there or return to the press box.

DIRECTIONS TO LOGAN

Logan, Utah, is home to Utah State University and is located approximately 80 miles north of Salt Lake City, Utah. From Salt Lake International Airport: Take I-80 East out of the airport to I-215 North, which will run into I-15 North. Follow I-15 North to exit 362 (Highway 89-91) at Brigham City. Follow Highway 89 into Logan, where it becomes Main Street. Stay on Main Street until you reach 1000 North and turn right. Turn left at 800 East and the football stadium will be on your right. The parking lot is located on the west side of the stadium just off 800 East.

CREENTIAL POLICY

Credentials for media members are issued at the discretion of the Utah State Athletic Media Relations Office, based on the following priorities and guidelines:

1. Daily newspapers regularly covering Utah State University, the current opponent or another Mountain West school. Wire services, regional and national publications are also afforded this priority.
2. Originating radio and television personnel involved in a live broadcast.
3. Officially recognized Utah State University student publications or student electronic media outlets.
4. Non-daily newspapers or publications reporting on the game.
5. Non-originating radio and television.

OTHER CREDENTIAL GUIDELINES

- ▶ Utah State University and the NCAA prohibit the issuance of credentials to representatives of an organization that regularly publishes gambling information.
- ▶ Credentials will be issued to websites that are affiliated with national or regional television and news media organizations, e.g. USA Today Online, ESPN.com, SI.com, CBSsportsline.com, etc., non-conference opponents and for the Mountain West.
- ▶ Websites that sponsor "message boards" or "chat rooms" where people are allowed to post anonymous information or rumors are ineligible for credentials or access to media functions.
- ▶ Utah State University reserves the right to deny media credentials to any individual whose website is not affiliated with a recognized news-gathering organization.
- ▶ All credentials are non-transferable and are subject to immediate revocation if transferred to non-working members of a media outlet.

# MERLIN OLSEN FIELD





To honor one of its greatest alumnus and the most decorated football player in school history, Utah State University named the playing field inside Maverik Stadium “Merlin Olsen Field,” making the announcement at halftime of a men’s basketball game in December, 2009. Olsen was in attendance for the ceremony. He passed away at City of Hope Hospital near Los Angeles, California, on March 11, 2010, after a courageous battle with cancer. An official dedication ceremony took place on Oct. 23, 2010, as part of Homecoming festivities in conjunction with the 50th anniversary of Utah State’s 1960 Sun Bowl Team, led by Olsen. During the official dedication of Merlin Olsen Field at Maverik Stadium, a larger-than-life-size bronze statue of Olsen, which was sculpted by nationally-renowned artist Blair Buswell, was unveiled in the southeast corner of the stadium.

Utah State and Maverik, Inc., owners of convenience stores throughout the Intermountain West, jointly announced a long-term naming rights partnership to its football stadium, which was previously known as Romney Stadium, beginning in the 2015 season.

This partnership with Maverik was the catalyst for a major renovation to the stadium, which focused on greatly improving the overall fan experience. On the west side, the West Stadium Center, a five-story premium seating and press box structure, was completed prior to the 2016 season, which includes a state-of-the-art media and game operations area, 24 luxury suites, 20 loge boxes, over 700 covered club seats and a premium club area that is also used to host a student-athlete training table. Major concourse work included significantly increased restrooms, upgraded concessions and an enlarged concourse for better pedestrian traffic flow.

Renovations also included new video boards on both the north and south ends of the stadium, along with a new public address system.

Maverik Stadium’s original seating capacity through 1980 was 20,000. Thanks to a massive volunteer effort in 1980, approximately 10,000 seats were added to the southern bowl. Prior to the 1997 season, approximately 4,000 chairback seats replaced wooded bleachers on the west side of the stadium. The modifications made to accommodate this seating upgrade placed stadium capacity at 25,513 prior to the 2015 season. Following the renovations made to the stadium with the addition of the West Stadium Center prior to the 2016 season, the seating capacity is now 25,100.

Ahead of the 1999 season, new scoreboards were added at each end of the stadium and additional bleacher seats were installed, as well. New aluminum bleachers replaced wooden bleachers on the lower sections of the east side of the stadium in 2001. In 2003, that project expanded to the upper sections.

Prior to the 2005 season, a new south end entrance, improved concession stands and restroom facilities, as well as a widened concourse on the east side of the stadium were completed.

Immediately after the 2006 season, the old north end zone complex was torn down and replaced with the Jim and Carol Laub Athletics-Academics Complex. The Laub Complex is a three-story, 69,000 square-foot facility that serves to meet the academic and athletic needs of all 16 Utah State University intercollegiate sports. The state-of-the-art facility houses the Dale Mildenberger Sports Medicine Complex and the Dr. John Worley Sports Medicine Research Center, the Steve Mothersell Hall of Honor, J. Ken “Ken” Seamons Equipment Room, locker rooms,

coaches offices, meeting rooms, luxury suites, a student-athlete academic center and the Dr. Randall and Julianne Stockham Student-Athlete Academic Hall of Honor.

In December of 2009, USU Athletics renamed the playing field inside Maverik Stadium “Merlin Olsen Field.”

In the summer of 2022, the Astro Turf was replaced with a state-of-the-art FieldTurf. The Astro Turf was installed in 2012, which replaced a SprinTurf that was installed in 2004. Prior to that, USU played on a bent bluegrass field.

Also prior to the 2022 season, new chairback seats were installed on the west side of the stadium.

And prior to the 2023 season, additional restrooms were added and concourse work was done to the south side of the stadium

The stadium was designed specifically for football with all seats, until the 1980 expansion, located between the 15-yard lines and all directed toward the 50-yard line. The first row of seats on the east, west and south sides are elevated eight-feet above the playing field and within 30 feet of the sidelines. Like most stadiums, the field runs north and south.

The stadium was financed by a student body which believed in athletics to the extent of underwriting a special bonding assessment for both Maverik Stadium and the Dee Glen Smith Spectrum, which serves as home to USU’s basketball and gymnastics teams.

The continuing growth of Utah State’s campus prompted University planners to relocate the original Romney Stadium, which was built in 1927 on the grounds where the Health, Physical Education and Recreation building now stands. That facility was dedicated on Oct. 8, 1927, in recognition of legendary football and basketball coach, and athletics director, E. Lowell “Dick” Romney, who spent 29 seasons as the Aggies’ athletics director and head football coach from 1919-48. Romney, who guided the Aggies to four conference championships (1921, 1935, 1936, 1946), compiled a 128-91-16 record (.579 winning percentage) in 29 seasons (1919-48).

That structure served as Utah State’s home for 41 seasons (1927-67). USU played its final game in the old complex on Nov. 11, 1967, as the Aggies defeated Montana, 20-14.

Maverik Stadium was originally built in 1968 and officially dedicated on Sept. 27, 1969. The first game in Maverik Stadium history was Sept. 14, 1968, when Utah State defeated New Mexico State, 28-12. In 55 seasons, USU has posted a 159-115 (.580) record inside Maverik Stadium.

Utah State’s largest crowd to witness a game in Maverik Stadium was 33,119 in a 45-17 loss to Brigham Young on Oct. 4, 1996.

Utah State's student section, known simply as The HURD, supports the Aggies' football team every home game. The HURD is Utah State's spirit club for all athletics. It is currently the largest club of Aggie students at Utah State. The HURD attends coaches' shows, sports nights, tailgate parties, pre-, post- and away-game parties and pep rallies. Additionally, road trips are another activity that The HURD provides at least once a week for all of its members.



Show 'Em Your "A"  
In 1909, the first senior class gift was an "A" placed on the west side of Old Main tower. The "A," now on all four sides of the tower, can be seen throughout the valley, especially at night when lit in white. For special occasions and athletic wins, the "A" shines blue.



Utah State will be taking the field for the 126th season of football in 131 years in 2023. USU took the field for the first time on Nov. 25, 1892, and defeated in-state rival Utah, 12-0.

## GAME DAY



Utah State teams were nicknamed "Big Blue" by the *Logan Journal* as early as 1916, an apparent reference to the Blue Ox of Paul Bunyon stories. USU adopted the official school colors of Blue and White in a special meeting of USU faculty on Nov. 7, 1901.



The Utah State Spirit Squad, consisting of the Aggieettes Dance Team, the Cheer Squad and the Big Blue mascot, encourages enthusiastic student participation at Aggie athletic events, promoting USU pride through new ideas, traditions and activities. The USU Pep Band leads the Spirit Squad and the crowd with the "Hail The Utah Aggies," "The Scotsman" and other musical selections.

When USU athletics began, Utah State was known as the Utah Agricultural College. The first USU athletics teams were nicknamed the "Farmers." Aggies, a contraction of Agriculturalists, first appeared in the late 1890s.

Completed in June of 2013, Utah State's \$6.5 million, 26,329 square-foot iFIT Sports Performance Center features areas for weight training, cardiovascular workouts and speed and agility training, as well as offices for staff. Built on existing university property at the northwest corner of Maverik Stadium, the state-of-the-art multi-level facility alleviated overcrowding in the previous 5,800 square-foot strength and conditioning center and accommodates almost 400 student-athletes from 16 sports programs.

The iFIT Sports Performance Center is the largest such facility in the Mountain West and rivals any strength and conditioning complex in the country. Of the schools Utah State competes against in the MW, Fresno State currently has the second-largest strength and conditioning center(s) at 12,500 square feet, followed by Air Force (12,000 sq. ft.), Boise State (12,000 sq. ft.), Wyoming (11,100 sq. ft.), Hawai'i (10,000 sq. ft.), New Mexico (10,000 sq. ft.), Colorado State (10,000 sq. ft.), San José State (10,000 sq. ft.), UNLV (8,200 sq. ft.) and Nevada (8,000 sq. ft.).

The three-story, 69,000 square-foot, Jim and Carol Laub Athletics-Academics Complex is a state-of-the-art multi-purpose facility that meets all of the athletic and academic needs of Utah State's 16 sports and 400-plus student-athletes. Within the facility, which was completed in the summer of 2008, is the 11,000 square-foot Dale Mildenerger Sports Medicine Complex and Dr. John Worley Sports Medicine Research Center, the Steve Mothersell Athletics Hall of Honor and the 7,000 square-foot J. Ken "Kenny" Seamons Equipment Room. Also located on the first floor are locker rooms for football. The second floor houses coaches' offices and meeting rooms for football, including a 120-seat auditorium, and the student-athlete academics center is located on the third floor, which includes numerous study hall and tutor areas, a computer lab and the Dr. Randall and Julianne Stockham Student-Athlete Academics Hall of Honor.





The Dale Mildenerger Sports Medicine Complex and the Dr. John Worley Sports Medicine Research Center is one of the finest in the nation with over 11,000 square-feet to provide maximum service to Utah State's 16 intercollegiate sports and 400-plus student-athletes. Among the many amenities are 24 treatment tables, a 2,000 square-foot physical therapy and rehabilitation center, and three hydrotherapy pools for non-weight or partial weight-bearing rehabilitation to enhance recovery. The Sports Medicine Complex also houses office space for five full-time staff members and numerous graduate assistants, a team physician examination room and physical therapy office.

With the addition of the new facilities and the continued cooperation between Utah State Athletics, Intermountain HealthCare and HPER/Exercise Science, Utah State University is becoming one of the foremost sports medicine research institutions in the Intermountain West.

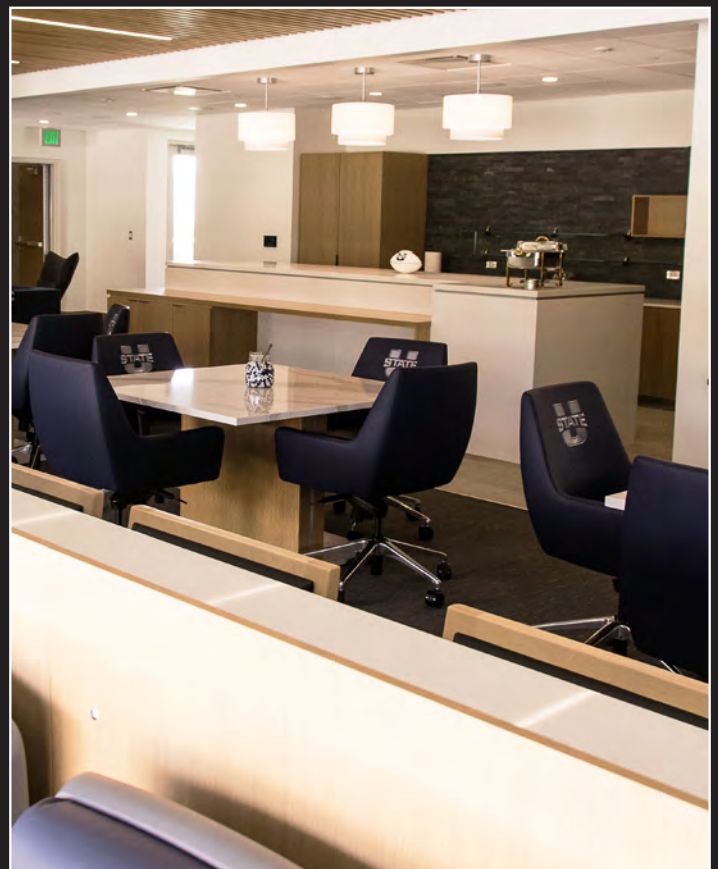

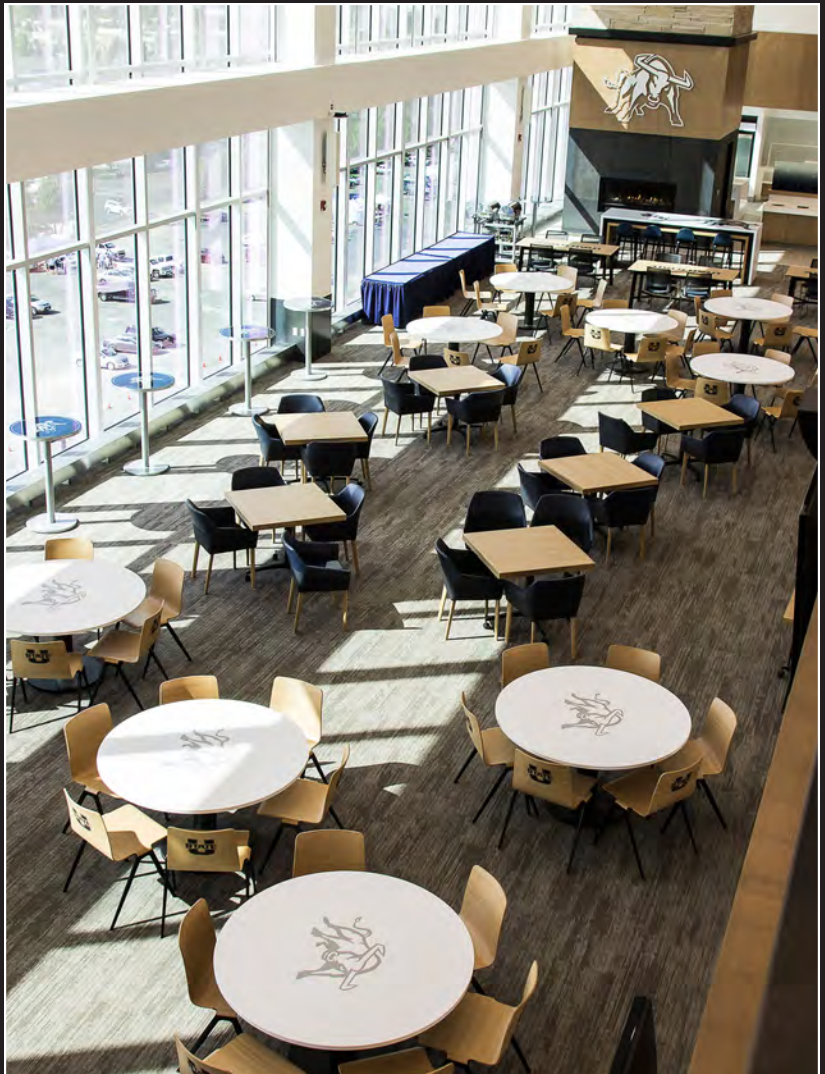
# THIS IS UTAH STATE...



Completed in August, 2016, and located inside Maverik Stadium, Utah State's \$36 million, 85,000 square-foot West Stadium Center is a five-story premium seating and press box structure. It includes a state-of-the-art media and game operations area, 24 luxury suites, 20 loge boxes, over 700 covered club seats and a premium club area that is also used to host a student-athlete training table. In addition to the structure, major concourse work included significantly increased restrooms, upgraded concessions and an enlarged concourse for better pedestrian traffic flow. Renovations also included new video boards on both the north and south ends of the stadium, along with a new public address system.

The Aggie Fueling Station, located on the bottom floor of the iFIT Sports Performance Center, was created prior to the start of the 2016-17 school year by representatives from the nutritional program and athletics, who had a goal of working together to provide student-athletes with the food they need to complement the physical demands of training and nutrition. The fueling station is stocked with appetizing food focused on combining convenience and nutrition. Student-athletes can choose from a variety of fresh fruits and vegetables, cheese, milk, chicken, yogurt, beef jerky, peanut butter, trail mixes and much more. Workers at the fueling station prepare fruits and vegetables, measuring out serving sizes, restock the serving area and plan the daily special. In addition to food preparation, volunteers are on site to answer nutrition questions from student-athletes and give presentations about health and wellness to all 16 of Utah State's sports programs.

Utah State student-athletes are able to attend a training table three times a week during the fall and spring semesters. The menu for the meal is planned by Utah State nutritionists and the strength & conditioning staff to supplement each student-athlete's nutrition needs and to keep each in top physical condition.

Utah State's annual ProTiming Day regularly draws a number of NFL scouts, monitoring and evaluating the Aggies' pro prospects.



In the last 21 years, Utah State has had 17 players selected in the NFL Draft, while over five dozen more have signed free agent contracts. In 2020, QB Jordan Love was selected in the first round (26) by the Green Bay Packers. In 2019, RB Darwin Thompson was selected in the sixth round (214) by the Kansas City Chiefs. In 2017, RB Devante Mays was selected in the seventh round (238) by the Green Bay Packers. In 2016, LB Nick Vigil was selected in the third round (87) by the Cincinnati Bengals and LB Kyler Fackrell was chosen in the third round (88) by the Green Bay Packers. In 2014, S Maurice Alexander was selected in the fourth round (110) by the St. Louis Rams and CB Nevin Lawson was chosen in the fourth round (133) by the Detroit Lions. In 2013, CB Will Davis was selected in the third round (93) by the Miami Dolphins, while RB Kerwynn Williams was taken in the seventh round (230) by the Indianapolis Colts. In 2012, Utah State had three players selected in the NFL Draft as LB Bobby Wagner was chosen in the second round (47) by the Seattle Seahawks, RB Robert Turbin was selected in the fourth round (106) by the Seattle Seahawks and RB Michael Smith was taken in the seventh round (212) by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. In 2011, CB Curtis Marsh was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles in the third round (90). Two Aggies were selected in the 2008 NFL Draft, in Shawn Murphy and Kevin Robinson. Murphy, an offensive guard, was picked by Miami in the fourth round (110), while Robinson, a wide receiver and kick returner, was selected by Kansas City in the sixth round (182). TE Chris Cooley was the 81st overall pick by Washington in 2004. In 2003, WR Kevin Curtis was the 74th overall pick, going to St. Louis in the third round.

Student-Athlete Services is designed to assist student-athletes with academic, vocational and social development. The staff provides services including study sessions, tutoring, registration, academic advising and career counseling.



The Dr. Randall and Julianne Stockham Student-Athlete Academic Hall of Honor opened in September of 2010. Inside the Stockham Student-Athlete Academic Hall of Honor are four permanent displays to feature CoSIDA Academic All-Americans, Joe E. and Elma Whitesides Scholar-Athlete Award winners, current academic all-Mountain West honorees and current Aggie Athletics Endowed Scholarships donors and recipients.

During the 2022-23 academic year, Utah State had 209 student-athletes receive academic all-Mountain West honors, while 194 were named Mountain West Scholar-Athletes. Utah State's student-athletes traditionally rank among the best in the Mountain West with a 90 percent graduation success rate and a cumulative 3.39 grade-point average. Additionally, Utah State's athletics department recognized 224 student-athletes for achieving a 3.2 grade point average at the 29th annual Joe E. and Elma Whitesides Scholar-Athlete Luncheon. To be eligible for the honor, student-athletes must have a cumulative 3.2 grade point average or have posted a 3.2 GPA during the last two semesters. In all, approximately 63 percent of USU's student-athletes earned a 3.2 GPA to qualify for the awards.

The third floor of the Jim and Carol Laub Athletics-Academics Complex houses the academic center for student-athletes. This center consists of a 24-unit computer center, a spacious study center, and several individual one-on-one tutor rooms. Additionally, there are three smaller classrooms that can be used for group study sessions, group tutoring, tutor meetings, and general meeting and study needs. Two of the classrooms can be opened to create one larger classroom. All classrooms have television monitors installed and have data connectivity for PowerPoint, internet and other useful presentations. The study center is completely wireless for student-athletes to connect to the internet anywhere in the facility, but also has sub-floor electrical and data connections throughout. The student-athlete services staff offices are also housed within the academic center.



# STUDENT-ATHLETE SERVICES



The Utah State Student-Athlete Services office administers USU's NCAA Student-Athlete Affairs: Life Skills program and coordinates Aggie Ambassadors, Utah State's student-athlete outreach program. Additionally, the office works with USU's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) and Student-Athlete Mentors Program (SAMs). USU's NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills program has guest speakers who address student-athletes, as well as several community service projects and group activities throughout the year, including working with local elementary schools.

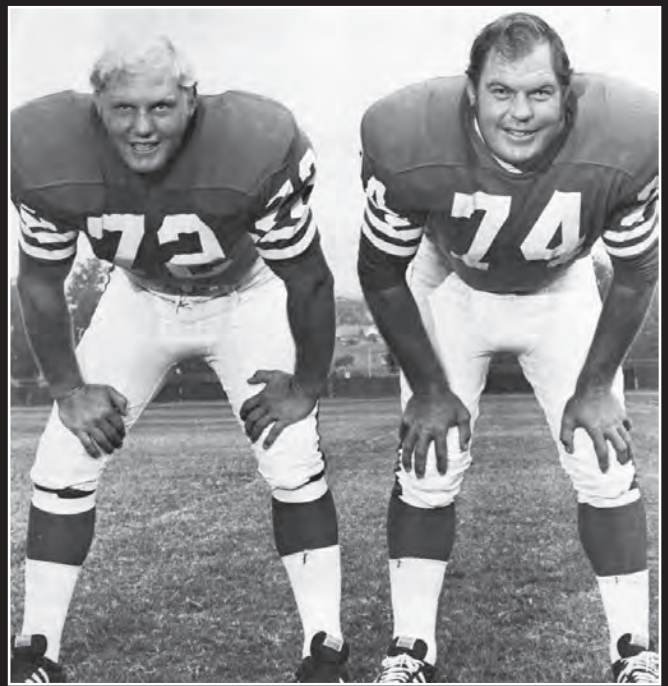

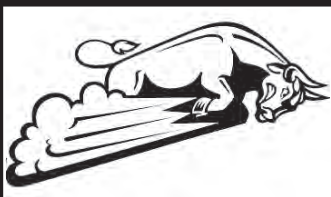

Jose Fuentes holds Utah State career records for passing yardage (9,168), passing completions (704) and passing attempts (1,270).

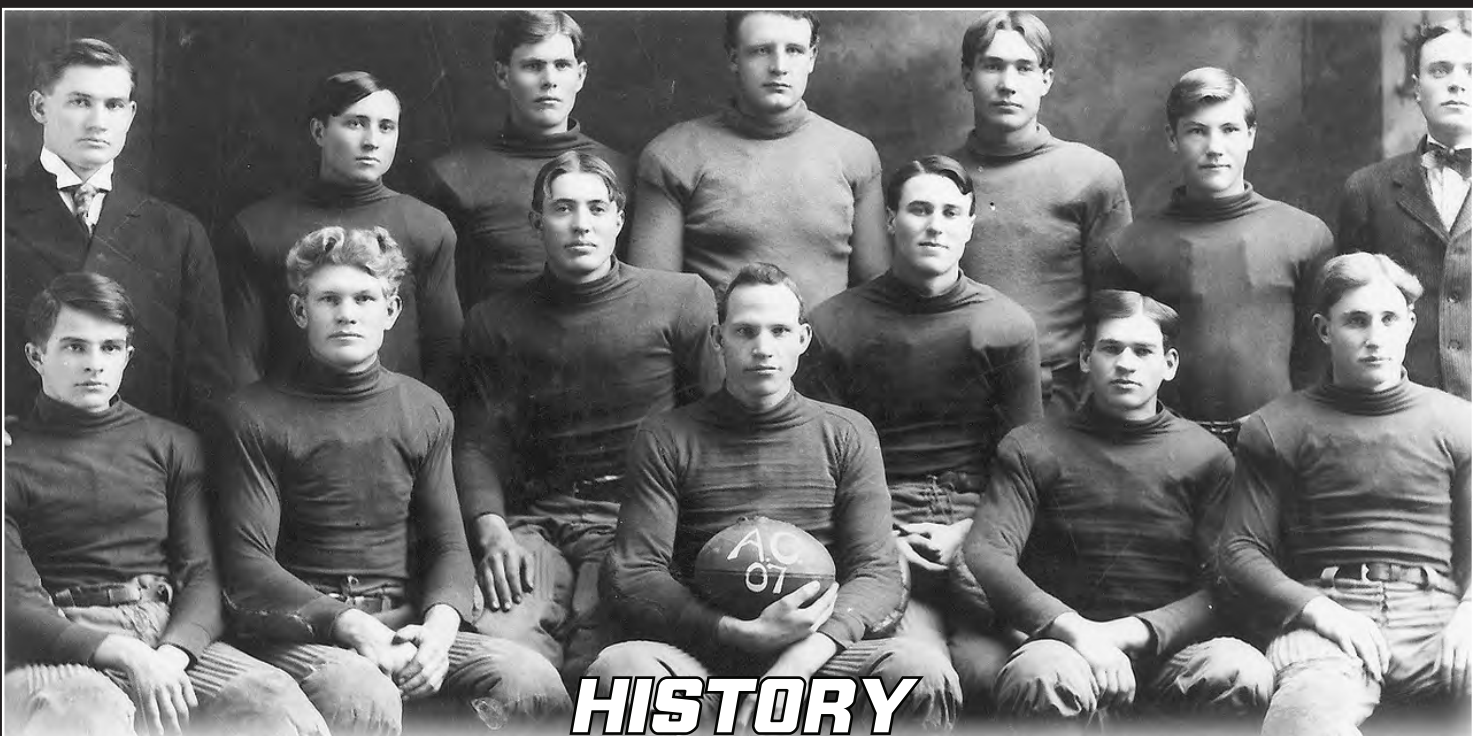


Emmett White set the NCAA record for all-purpose yards in a game with 578 against New Mexico State during the 2000 season.

The 1907 Aggies were the first USU team to post a perfect season — 7-0.

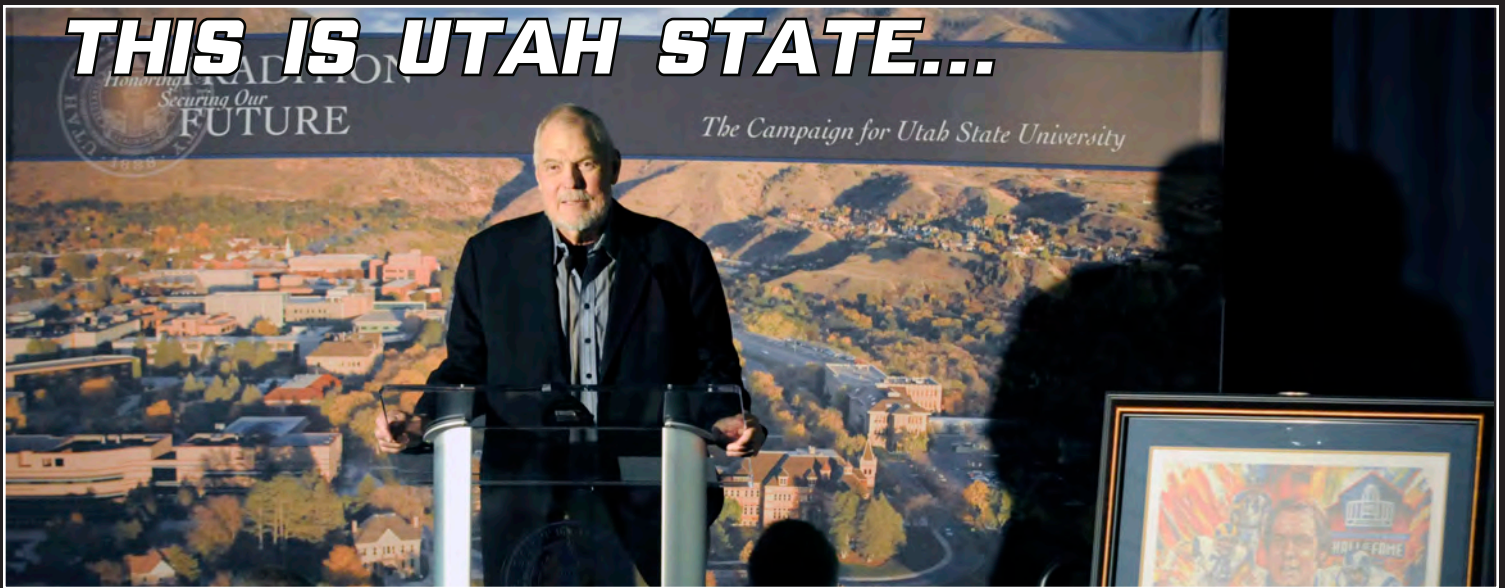

Utah State University honored one of its greatest alumnus and the most decorated football player in school history with the unveiling of a larger-than-life-size bronze statue of Merlin Olsen on Oct. 23, 2010, with a special ceremony on the South Plaza of Maverik Stadium prior to USU's Homecoming football game against Hawai'i. A large crowd attended the ceremony, featuring Olsen's family, friends, former teammates and former USU players among the dignitaries in attendance. Guest speakers for the ceremony included former USU President Dr. Stan Albrecht, former USU Vice President and Director of Athletics Scott Barnes, Steven Perry from the National Football Foundation, the statue's sculptor Blair Buswell, Douglas Mayberry, who was one of Olsen's USU teammates, along with Olsen's widow, Susan. Perry noted that the Super Bowl Pro Football Hall of Fame Luncheon, held the Friday prior to the Super Bowl, will be named after Olsen, one of only two Hall of Fame events named after former players. Buswell singled out his time spent with Olsen while working on the statue, noting that Olsen wanted the sculpture to show his pride in Utah State and Logan. Mayberry told a story about Olsen's hospitality before nearly knocking off your chin strap, noting the only time he saw Olsen relax was when he scored a rushing touchdown. Susan Olsen thanked Olsen's former teammates, friends and the University for their support of the family. She also read a eulogy written by Merlin Olsen prior to his death that wasn't found until after his passing, which talked about Merlin's appreciation of the love and concern from his supporters, former teammates and family throughout his time growing up in Logan, at Utah State, in the NFL and his broadcasting and acting career.

Merlin Olsen's statue was created by nationally renowned Utah artist Blair Buswell and is 25 percent larger than Olsen's 6-foot-4 frame. When mounted on its base the statue is over 11 feet high. The statue depicts Olsen during his college playing days at Utah State, in full uniform and pads, with his helmet under his arm. The base of the statue is adorned with two plaques. One lists many of Olsen's accomplishments as a college and pro football player, as an actor and member of the media, and as a philanthropist and humanitarian. The other plaque lists Olsen's personal mission statement, an inspiring list of Olsen's personal priorities. Additionally, a list of all donors to the Merlin Olsen Field Campaign whose gifts were received prior to August 1, 2010, are mounted adjacent to the statue base. The statue, when set on its base, has at least one unique element. According to Google maps, Olsen's gaze directly faces toward the Olsen family home in Logan where he grew up, roughly two miles in a direct line from where the statue rests. In preparation for the statue to be installed a small courtyard was created with seating areas for contemplation. The block cement was used to convey Olsen's personal strength, and the vertical columns represent his personal mission to celebrate others.



NFL Hall of Famer Merlin Olsen, the greatest athlete in Utah State University history, passed away at City of Hope Hospital near Los Angeles on March 11, 2010, after a courageous battle with cancer. Olsen was a three-year letterman on the offensive and defensive lines for Utah State's football team from 1959-61, earning All-American honors during both his junior and senior seasons. During his senior season in 1961, he won the Outland Trophy as the nation's outstanding interior defensive lineman. Olsen also was a three-time academic All-American at Utah State and graduated Summa Cum Laude and Phi Kappa Phi in 1962 with a degree in finance.

## HOME OF MERLIN OLSEN



Utah State University's Athletics Department unveiled the Steve Mothersell Aggie Athletics Hall of Honor on Sept. 26, 2009. In all, approximately 150 Aggie alumni and friends donated to the 1,800 square-foot Hall of Honor, including 115 former student-athletes. The Hall of Honor is housed on the first floor of the Jim and Carol Laub Athletics-Academics Complex, which is located in the north end zone of Maverik Stadium. Inside Utah State's Aggie Athletics Hall of Honor, fans will find various displays and trophy cases celebrating over 100 years of Aggie sports history. Among the items displayed within the venue are trophies from the 1978 national championship volleyball team, and the 1980 and 1981 national championship softball teams. Other items on display include the 2021 LA Bowl Championship Trophy, the 2021 Mountain West Championship Trophy, the 2014 and 2018 New Mexico Bowl championship trophies, the 2013 San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl championship trophy, the 2012 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl championship trophy, the 2012 Western Athletic Conference championship trophy, the 1993 Las Vegas Bowl II championship trophy, the 1961 Outland trophy presented to Merlin Olsen as the nation's top defensive lineman and a discus donated by L. Jay Silvester from the 1968 Summer Olympics held in Mexico City. As fans tour the Hall of Honor, they will see exhibits displaying Utah State's 16 current sports, a display honoring its past sports and a display highlighting some "Great Moments" in Aggie Athletics. Fans will also see a display paying tribute to those select few former Aggie Greats who are now members of USU's Hall of Fame, the most prestigious honor afforded an Aggie athlete. Another key feature within the venue are two interactive video displays that will give fans an opportunity to watch video highlights of "Great Moments" in Aggie Athletics, as well as highlights of members of USU's Hall of Fame.

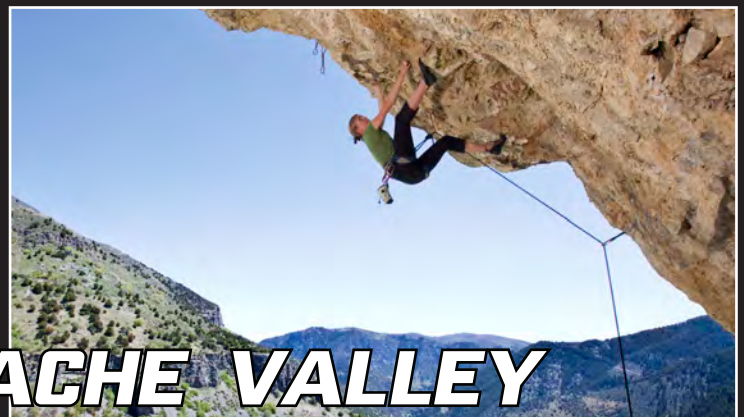

### FALL PREVIEW

Utah State football has established itself as one of the most consistent programs in the Mountain West. And the numbers don't lie.

Over the last 12 years, Utah State has had seven winning seasons, which includes four years with at least 10 wins and three 11-win campaigns, has played in 10 bowl games, and has won a pair of conference championships.

Under the direction of third-year head coach **Blake Anderson**, the 2023 campaign should produce similar results.

In his first two years with the Aggies, Anderson has led the program to a 17-10 record, which includes an 11-5 conference mark, consecutive bowl game appearances and a conference championship.

Despite all of its success, there has been some attrition with both the staff and roster as Utah State enters the 2023 season. Most notable is the added responsibilities for Anderson, who will serve as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach this fall, along with his head coaching duties.

With Anderson once again calling plays, USU's players are confident that their scheme and skill-set will lead to an explosive offense in 2023.

Utah State also welcomes six new assistant coaches this fall in defensive coordinator **Joe Cauthen**, offensive line coach **Cooper Bassett**, defensive line coach **Tevita Finau**, defensive passing game coordinator and cornerbacks coach **Mitchell White**, running backs coach **Rodney Freeman III** and safeties coach **Ethan Morriss**, who spent the last two years on staff as an analyst.

Cauthen has coached with Anderson before as the duo spent five years together at Arkansas State, helping the Red Wolves to a pair of conference championships and five-consecutive bowl games.

Utah State has also seen significant changes to its roster in the past year.

Heading into the 2023 season, Anderson and company welcomes back nine starters (O-4, D-5) and 34 lettermen (O-18, D-13, S-3) from last season's team, to go along with 14 redshirts (O-7, D-6, S-1) and five other returners (O-3, D-2). USU also added 54 newcomers to the program, which includes 12 four-year transfers, 21 junior college players and 21 high school newcomers.

Highlighting Utah State's returners in 2023 are four players that have earned previous all-conference honors in senior P **Stephen Kotsanlee**, senior ILB **MJ Tafisi**, senior WR **Terrell Vaughn** and sophomore S **Ike Larsen**. **Larsen** earned second-team all-MW accolades and was named a College Football News Honorable Mention Freshman All-American in 2022, while



Tafisi and Vaughn both garnered honorable mention all-MW honors. Furthermore, Kotsanlee was named honorable mention all-MW following the 2020 campaign.

Other starters returning for Utah State in 2023 include graduate senior CB **Michael Anyanwu**, graduate senior OL **Wade Meacham**, graduate senior QB **Cooper Legas**, senior DT **Hale Motu'apuaka** senior TE **Josh Sterzer** and senior DT **Poukesi Vakauta**.

In addition to the players mentioned above, Utah State returns four more players with at least four career starts in senior OL **Falepule Alo**, graduate junior QB **Levi Williams**, junior OL **Cole Motes** and sophomore ILB **Max Alford**.

With an offense that stretches the field vertically and plays with tremendous pace, and an attacking defense that thrives on making plays behind the line of scrimmage, Utah State football should once again find itself competing for another Mountain West Championship this fall.

### QUARTERBACKS

Utah State returns a pair of proven winners with plenty of experience at the quarterback position in graduate senior **Cooper Legas** and graduate junior **Levi Williams**.

Legas started eight of the 10 games he played in last season and has appeared in 12 games in his career, which includes two bowl outings. During the 2022 season, Legas was 135-of-221 passing for 1,499 yards with 11 touchdowns and 10 interceptions. He also ran for 303 yards and two more scores. For his career, Legas is 146-of-241 (.606) for 1,670 yards with 13 touchdowns and 11 interceptions.

Legas also led the team to its first-ever bowl win against a Power 5 opponent in 2021. Legas, who was playing in just his second-ever game, was 11-of-20 passing for 171 yards and two touchdowns in USU's Jimmy Kimmel LA Bowl victory.

Another veteran returning for the Aggies here is Williams, who appeared in just six games last season due to injuries in his first year in the program. Williams spent three seasons at Wyoming (2019-21), as he played in 18 games with 12 starts. Overall, Williams was 150-of-278 (.540) passing for 2,210 yards with 13 touchdowns and 10 interceptions, while rushing for 763 yards on 168 carries (4.5 ypr) and 13 touchdowns during his time with the Cowboys. Williams was also named the Offensive MVP of the 2021 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl, as he rushed for a career-high 200 yards on 16 carries (12.5 ypr) and a career-best four touchdowns against Kent State, while also completing 9-of-11 passes for 127 yards and another touchdown.

Another player returning here is redshirt

freshman **Chase Tuatagaloa**.

Utah State also welcomes two newcomers to this group in junior **Zeke Payne** (San Diego, California/Rancho Bernardo HS/New Mexico Highlands) and freshman **McCae Hillstead** (Lehi, Utah/Skyridge HS). Payne was named the Southern California Football Association Co-Offensive Player of the Year as a freshman at Palomar College in 2021, while Hillstead was a three-year starter at Skyridge HS in Lehi, Utah.

#### WIDE RECEIVERS

Despite losing two of its top three wide receivers from last season, Utah State is optimistic that this year's group can produce at a high level as it returns six letterwinners from a year ago.

Utah State does return one starter here in senior **Terrell Vaughn**, who caught 56 passes for 624 yards and five touchdowns last season, as he earned honorable mention all-Mountain West accolades.

Utah State returns five more letterwinners here in senior **Kyle Van Leeuwen**, juniors **Kyrese Rowan** and **Jalen Royals**, and sophomores **Ryder MacGillivray** and **Otto Tia**. Van Leeuwen is the most experienced player in this group as he has played in 19 career games, including starting three in 2022 before missing the remainder of the season due to injury. For his career, Van Leeuwen has 16 receptions for 151 yards and one touchdown.

In addition to the six players mentioned above, Utah State welcomes back three more players in sophomore **Timm Van Leeuwen** and freshmen **Austin Okerwa** and **Quentin Riley**, who both redshirted a season ago.

Along with the nine players mentioned above, Utah State added eight newcomers here with two four-year transfers, three junior college transfers and three high school players. Highlighting this group is graduate junior transfer **Colby Bowman** (Orange, California/St. John Bosco HS/Stanford) and redshirt freshman transfer **Grant Page** (Boulder, Colorado/Fairview HS/Colorado).

Bowman spent four years (2019-22) at Stanford and appeared in 26 games, including one start, while Page had 173 catches for 2,538 yards and 26 touchdowns during his prep career.

The three junior college transfers are junior **Kahanu Davis** (Kapa'a, Hawaii/Kapa'a HS/Southwestern College), junior **Micah Davis** (Atlanta, Georgia/Harrison HS/Iowa Western CC) and junior **Arcellus Johnson** (Woodland Hills, California/El Camino Real HS/Moorpark College). Micah Davis is the most experienced player in this group as he spent two seasons at the United States Air Force Academy and one

year at Iowa Western JC.

Utah State also welcomes three high school freshmen in **Zakkarii Black** (Covina, California/Charter Oak HS), **Cole Christensen** (Highland, Utah/Lone Peak HS) and **Jackson Olsen** (Millville, Utah/Ridgeline HS).

#### OFFENSIVE LINE

Despite only returning one starter from last season, Utah State does return plenty of experience with six lettermen who have combined to play in 144 career games and 32 starts.

Utah State's lone returning starter is graduate senior **Wade Meacham**, who has played in 36 games with 13 starts, both of which are the most on the team for an offensive lineman.

Utah State has two more returners here with starting experience in senior **Falepule Alo** and junior **Cole Motes**. Alo has played in 22 career games with seven starts, while Motes has played in 21 career games with 12 starts.

Utah State returns three other letterwinners here in seniors **Wyatt Bowles** and **Calvin Knapp** and sophomore **Elia Migao**, who have combined to play in 65 career games.

Furthermore, Utah State welcomes back two more offensive linemen in senior **Jackson Owens** and sophomore **Kingsley Holliday** as Owens has 10 career games played. USU also welcomes back four redshirt freshmen in **Teague Anderson**, **Tavo Motu'apuaka**, **Adam Pond** and **Bryce Radford**.

In addition to the 12 returners listed above, Utah State added six newcomers to the offensive line, including one four-year transfer, three junior college transfers and two high school players. Highlighting this group is graduate transfer **Ralph Frias III** (Safford, Arizona/Safford HS/Arizona State), who spent five seasons (2018-22) at Arizona State and appeared in 26 games.

The three junior college transfers include junior **Shively Asoau Fua** (San Francisco, California/Mission HS/Chabot College), junior **Jake Hellmann** (Pleasant View, Utah/Weber HS/College of San Mateo) and sophomore **Aloali'i Maui** (Pago Pago, American Samoa/Tafuna HS/New Mexico Military Institute), while the three freshmen are **Jarvis Griffiths** (American Fork, Utah/American Fork HS), **K'Leyone Iosua** (Lehi, Utah/Skyridge HS) and **Jr Sia** (Herriman, Utah/Mountain Ridge HS).

#### RUNNING BACKS

Despite losing its starter here from last season, Utah State has a plethora of talented running backs heading into the 2023 campaign.

Highlighting this group is sophomore **Robert Briggs Jr.**, who rushed for 353 yards on 74 carries (4.8 ypr) and one touchdown in 2022 as

he played in the first 10 games before missing the rest of the year due to injury. Briggs was also named the Mountain West Freshman of the Week following his performance against UConn in the season opener as he rushed for 85 yards on 10 carries with one touchdown.

Utah State also returns senior **Cooper Jones**, who served as the team's punt returner a year ago.

Joining the two incumbents are six newcomers, which includes one four-year transfer, two junior college transfers and three high school players.

The one four-year transfer to this group is senior **Sione Finau** (Kearns, Utah/Kearns HS/BYU), who spent four years at BYU (2018-21), appearing in 21 games with two starts. As a redshirt freshman in 2019, Finau carried the ball 59 times for 359 yards (6.1 ypc) with two touchdowns for the Cougars.

Highlighting the two junior college transfers is junior **Davon Booth** (North Las Vegas, Nevada/El Monte (CA) HS/Cerritos College). During the 2022 season, Booth earned California Community College Football Coaches Association All-America honors as a sophomore at Cerritos College, as he rushed for 1,442 yards on 223 carries (6.5 ypc) and eight touchdowns. Joining Booth is junior **Rahsul Faison** (Salisbury, Connecticut/Salisbury HS/Snow College). During the 2022 season, Faison rushed for 355 yards on 88 carries (4.0 ypc) and six touchdowns for Snow College.

The three high school players added here include **Jaydon Bailey** (Cibola, Texas/Steele HS/), **Corbin Cottle** (Bountiful, Utah/Bountiful HS) and **Reggie Foster** (North Lauderdale, Florida/American Heritage HS).

#### TIGHT ENDS

Utah State returns its top three tight ends from a season ago in senior **Josh Sterzer**, junior **Broc Lane** and sophomore Parker Buchanan.

Sterzer, who started 11 games a season ago, has played in 26 games with 12 career starts and has caught 15 passes for 150 yards and one touchdown. Lane has appeared in 15 career games and has eight receptions for 48 yards and one touchdown. And Buchanan has played in nine career games and has two catches for nine yards.

Along with the two players mentioned above, Utah State also added two newcomers here in junior college transfer **Isaiah Alonzo** (Irvine, California/Mater Dei HS/Orange Coast College) and freshman **Will Monney** (Springville, Utah/Springville HS).

DEFENSIVE LINE

Potential would be the best word to describe Utah State's defensive line heading into the 2023 season as it returns two starters to go along with four more letterwinners, while adding 12 newcomers, which includes one four-year transfer, six junior college transfers and five high school players.

Highlighting this group is a pair of returning starters in seniors **Hale Motu'apuaka** and **Poukesi Vakauta**.

Motu'apuaka has played in 46 career games with 28 starts and has 82 career tackles, which includes 7.5 sacks and 16.5 tackles for loss. During the 2022 season, Motu'apuaka started 12 games and posted 35 tackles, which included 5.0 sacks and 8.0 tackles for loss.

Vakauta started six of the 12 games he played in last season as he recorded 1.0 sacks and 3.0 tackles for loss as part of his 13 total stops. For his career, Vakauta has appeared in 27 games.

Other letterwinners returning along the defensive line for Utah State include junior **John Ward** and sophomores **Bo Maile**, **Enoka Migao** and **Seni Tuiaki**. Collectively, this group has played in 38 career games with one start as Ward recorded 10 tackles in 10 games in his first season with the Aggies, while Tuiaki had 15 tackles in just four games a season ago before missing the rest of the year due to injury. Maile appeared in 11 games last season and recorded seven tackles, while Migao played in seven games and had three tackles.

Furthermore, Utah State welcomes back two more defensive linemen that redshirted last season in freshmen **Paul Fitzgerald** and **Adam Tomczyk**, to go along with one more player that was part of the program in sophomore **Kaden Jolley**, who was named the Scout Team Defensive MVP.

Along with the nine players mentioned above, Utah State welcomes 11 newcomers along the defensive line, including one players that transferred from a four-year program in redshirt freshman **Sir Mells** (Las Vegas, Nevada/Liberty HS/Oregon), who appeared in one game last season at Oregon.

Utah State also added six junior college players here in juniors **Siaosi Lauingoa** (Kahuku, Hawaii/Kahuku HS/Independence CC), **Vaughn Mamea** (San Jose, California/Independence HS/College of San Mateo), **Clifton Mosley Jr.** (Shreveport, Louisiana/Calvary Baptist Academy/Navarro CC) and **Cian Slone** (Rocklin, California/Rocklin HS/American River College), and sophomores **Iholani Raass** (Lehi, Utah/Skyridge HS/Snow College) and **Maka Tu'akoi** (West Jordan, Utah/Alta HS/Independence CC).

Slone highlights this group as he was named a California Community College Football Coaches Association All-American and the state's Defensive MVP as a sophomore in 2022 at American River College as he finished the season with 84 tackles, which included 12.0 sacks and 22.0 tackles for loss.

Four freshmen round out this group of newcomers in **Zion Andreasen** (Salt Lake City, Utah/East HS), **Emerson Conlon** (Holladay, Utah/Olympus HS), **Tanner Jolley** (Fruita, Colorado/Fruita Monument HS) and **Bryan Vogl** (Eagle Mountain, Utah/Cedar Valley HS).

LINEBACKERS

Utah State returns three lettermen, including one starter, at the linebacker position and also added some much-needed depth with four newcomers heading into the 2023 campaign.

Highlighting this group is senior **MJ Tafisi Jr.**, who earned honorable mention all-Mountain West honors a season ago in his first season with the Aggies as he recorded 69 tackles, including 1.0 sacks and 9.0 tackles for loss, in eight games before missing the rest of the year due to injury.

Utah State also welcomes back a pair of sophomores in **Max Alford** and **Cole Joyce**. Alford played in all 13 games with four starts as a true freshman in 2022 and finished the year with 40 tackles, which included 4.0 tackles for loss. Alford was also named the Mountain West Freshman of the Week following his performance against New Mexico as he had a then-career-high eight tackles, which included a then-career-best 1.5 tackles for loss. Joyce played in all 13 games in his first season with USU, mostly on special teams, and posted one tackle.

Utah State also welcomes back two redshirt freshmen in **Bronson Olevao Jr.**, who did not play a season ago, and **Josh Williams**, who appeared in four games.

Along with the five players mentioned above, Utah State added two talented newcomers via the transfer portal in sophomore **Gavin Barthiel** (Lakeland, Florida/Lake Gibson HS/Washington State) and redshirt freshman **Logan Pili** (Provo, Utah/Timpview HS/BYU), in addition to freshman **Bowen Fjord** (Boerne, Texas/Boerne-Champion HS).

DEFENSIVE BACKS

Utah State has the potential for a deep and talented secondary this fall as it returns two of its starters from last season, to go along with two more letterwinners. In addition, USU welcomes back three more players that have experience in the program, while

adding 13 newcomers, which includes a trio of four-year transfers, to go along with five junior college recruits and five more high school players.

Utah State's two returning starters here are graduate senior cornerback **Michael Anyanwu** and sophomore safety **Ike Larsen**.

Anyanwu started 10 of the 11 games he played in last season and finished the year with 47 tackles, which included 2.0 tackles for loss, to go along with a team-best 11 pass breakups and one interception. In all, Anyanwu has played in 36 career games with 21 starts over four seasons at USU and has 95 tackles and 13 pass breakups.

Larsen was named a College Football News Honorable Mention Freshman All-American and a second-team all-Mountain West selection last season as he played in 11 games with four starts. He finished the season with 33 tackles, which included 2.0 sacks and 3.0 tackles for loss, to go along with a team-best four interceptions and a team-high three blocked kicks, while adding two pass breakups.

Utah State returns two more experienced letterwinners here in graduate senior cornerback **Xavion Steele** and senior safety **Omari Okeke**. Steele has played in 23 games for USU with one start and has 12 career tackles with two pass breakups, while Okeke played in 10 games with one start in his first season with the program a year ago and recorded 18 tackles and one pass breakup.

Utah State also has two redshirts returning in junior safety **Anthony Switzer** and freshman cornerback **JD Drew**. Switzer missed the 2022 season due to injury in his first year with USU. Prior to that, he spent three seasons (2019-21) at Arkansas State, appearing in 24 games with 15 starts. At ASU, he had 91 total tackles, which included 4.0 tackles for loss, to go along with four pass breakups, three forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and one interception. Drew appeared in five games for the Aggies last season and posted four tackles.

Utah State also returns one more veteran here in senior **Dusten Ramseyer-Burdett**, who appeared in a pair of games last season.

Along with the seven players mentioned above, Utah State added 13 newcomers here, including a pair of four-year transfers in sophomore cornerback **Al Ashford III** (Denver, Colorado/Cherry Creek HS/Wisconsin) and sophomore safety **Simeon Harris** (Vallejo, California/Benicia HS/Colorado).

Harris played in 11 games with four starts at Colorado as a true freshman during the 2022 season and finished the year with 21 tackles, while Ashford spent two seasons (2021-22) at Wisconsin. He redshirted in 2021 and ap-

peared in four games on special teams in 2022 before missing the rest of the year due to injury.

The four junior college transfers joining the secondary include junior cornerback **Jaylen Martin** (Los Angeles, California/Roosevelt HS/East Los Angeles College), sophomore safety **Devin Dye** (San Diego, California/Cathedral Catholic HS/Palomar College), sophomore safety **Teeg Stone** (Rocklin, California/Rocklin HS/American River College) and sophomore safety **Javar Strong** (Cherokee, Arkansas/Muscle Shoals HS/Hutchinson CC).

Dye and Strong are the two most experienced players in this group. Dye spent two seasons at Palomar College and recorded 59 tackles, which included 2.0 tackles for loss, to go along with two interceptions in 2022. And Strong earned honorable mention all-conference honors as a freshman at Hutchinson CC last season, as he recorded 48 tackles, which included 0.5 tackles for loss, to go along with one interception, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery.

Six high school newcomers round out this group in cornerbacks **Chase Davis** (Little Elm, Texas/Little Elm HS), **Noah Flores** (Sandy, Utah/Alta HS) and **Ja'kheo Mitchell** (St. George, Utah/Dixie HS), and safeties **Titan Saxton** (Smithfield, Utah/Sky View HS), **Kadiyon Sweat** (Lehi, Utah/Lehi HS) and **Jaeden Wright** (Pleasant Grove, Utah/Pleasant Grove HS).

Sweat highlights this group as he helped lead Lehi HS to back-to-back 5A state championships. He concluded his prep career with 217 tackles, 26 interceptions, 29 pass breakups, 2,882 all-purpose yards and 11 total touchdowns, including four pick-sixes. As a senior, he earned first-team all-state honors, was the Utah Valley Player of the Year, and was named the Utah Class 5A Region 8 MVP, as he had 57 tackles, which included 3.0 tackles for loss, to go along with 10 interceptions and eight pass breakups.

#### SPECIAL TEAMS

Utah State should once again excel on special teams as it returns one of its placekickers, along with its punter and long snapper from last season.

During the 2022 campaign, Utah State's special teams finished the season ranked 16th in the nation based on the Fremeau Efficiency Index (FEI) by FootballOutsiders.com as it ranked first in the Mountain West and 10th in the nation with four blocked kicks (3 punts, 1 extra point).

Utah State also ranked second in the MW and 33rd in the nation in punt return defense

(5.4 ypr), third in the MW and 51st in the nation in punt returns (8.9 ypr), third in the MW and 56th in the nation in net punting (38.9 ypp), seventh in the MW and 66th in the nation in kickoff returns (20.0 ypr), and eighth in the MW and 60th in the nation in kickoff return defense (19.7 ypr).

Utah State does return one player here that has earned all-MW recognition in senior punter **Stephen Kotsanlee**, who earned honorable mention all-conference accolades in 2020. Overall, Kotsanlee has punted 157 times in his career for an average of 42.4 yards per kick, which is the fifth-best average in school history. Last season, Kotsanlee punted 67 times for an average of 43.4 yards, which is the sixth-best single-season average in school history.

Junior placekicker **Elliott Nimrod** also returns after serving as USU's kickoff specialist each of the last two seasons. Nimrod finished last season with 58 kickoffs for 3,492 yards (60.2 ypk) with 22 touchbacks.

Utah State also returns junior long snapper **Jacob Garcia**, who has appeared in all 27 games during the last two seasons. Another specialist returning is redshirt freshman kicker **Ryan Marks**.

Utah State also added one junior college transfer here in junior placekicker **William Testa** (Bergamo, Italy/Bergamo HS/New Mexico Military Institute) along with one freshman in long snapper **Alexander McDougall** (Corona, California/Centennial HS).

Testa spent three seasons (2020-22) at New Mexico Military Institute as he appeared in 31 games. Overall, he scored 232 career points as he was 34-of-52 (.654) on field goal attempts and 130-of-133 (.977) on extra points. During the 2022 season, he was 14-of-23 (.609) on field goals and 26-of-28 (.929) on extra points as he helped the Broncos to a 9-3 record and an HF Sinclair Wool Bowl win.

# BLAKE ANDERSON

- Sam Houston State, 1992
- 10th Season as Division I Head Coach (68-47 Record)
- Third Season at Utah State (17-10 Record)



Blake Anderson (hired on Dec. 12, 2020) is in his third year as Utah State's head coach and is the 29th head coach in program history. He has a 68-47 (.591) overall record, including a 49-23 (.681) conference mark in nine seasons as a head coach. He has posted a 17-10 (.630) record at USU, including an 11-5 (.688) Mountain West record.

Anderson has 29 years of coaching experience and has been part of six conference championships. He has coached in 13 bowl games and won a national championship at the junior college level.

Entering the 2023 season, Anderson will assume the role of offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach, along with his head coaching responsibilities.

During the 2022 campaign, Anderson led Utah State to six wins and its 10th bowl game in the past 12 seasons, including its second in as many years as it appeared in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. USU also tied for second place in the Mountain Division of the Mountain West with a 5-3 mark as the Aggies had nine players earn various all-conference accolades, including graduate senior safety Hunter Reynolds, who was named a ProFootballFocus Honorable Mention All-American and redshirt freshman safety Ike Larsen, who was named a College Football News Honorable Mention Freshman All-American. Additionally, 25 of his players earned academic all-MW accolades.

In his first season at Utah State, Anderson led the Aggies to their first-ever Mountain West Championship with a 46-13 win at No. 19 San Diego State, their sixth bowl win in school history with a 24-13 victory against Oregon State in the Jimmy Kimmel LA Bowl, and a school-record-tying 11 wins after being picked to finish fifth in the Mountain Division of the MW in the preseason polls. USU concluded the season ranked 24th in the nation in the final Associated Press poll, marking just the fifth time ever that USU has finished a season nationally ranked.

Utah State began the 2021 campaign by posting its first road win against a Power 5 opponent since 1971 with its 26-23 victory at Washington State. Following its second-ever MW Mountain Division title, USU posted its first win against a top-25 opponent in six seasons with its victory against SDSU in the MW Championship Game. USU then capped off its season with its first-ever bowl win against a Power 5 opponent in OSU, which gave the program two Power 5 wins in the same season for the first time ever.

Under Anderson, Utah State tied for the best turnaround in the nation in 2021, as the Aggies became the first Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) program ever to go from zero or one win to 11 wins the following season. USU also became the first FBS team in eight years to post a 7-0 road record.

During the 2021 season, Utah State set 10 school records, including 4,248 passing yards and 41 touchdown passes, and tied four more. USU also ranked 15th in the nation in passing offense (303.4 ypg) and 23rd in total offense (445.6 ypg), and was top three in the MW in passing offense, total offense and scoring offense (32.6 ppg).

Anderson, who was named the 2021 AFCA Region 5 Coach of the Year and a finalist for the Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year Award, was the only first-year head coach in the nation to lead his team to nine or more wins. Along the way, he mentored a pair of Aggies that broke several single-season school records in quarterback Logan Bonner and wide receiver Deven Thompkins. Bonner set school records in passing touchdowns (36) and passing yards (3,628), while Thompkins set school records for receptions (102) and receiving yards (1,704).

Overall, Anderson saw nine of his players earn all-MW honors, including Thompkins, who was also named a third-team All-American by The Associated Press, while 18 of his players earned academic all-MW accolades.

Furthermore, Thompkins and Derek Wright both signed NFL free agent contracts with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and Carolina Panthers, respectively.

Anderson joined Utah State after spending seven years as the head coach at Arkansas State, leading the Red Wolves to six-consecutive winning seasons and six-straight bowl games from 2014-19, including a 31-13 win against UCF in the 2016 Cure Bowl and a 34-26 win against FIU in the 2019 Camellia Bowl.

During that six-year stretch, the Red Wolves broke 12 school records, including 494.8 yards of total offense per game, 4,106 passing yards and 38 touchdown passes in 2017, 520 points scored and 69

total touchdowns in 2015, and 6,174 yards of total offense and 1,024 total plays in 2014.

Arkansas State also won back-to-back Sun Belt Conference Championships under Anderson in 2015 and 2016, and competed for another in 2017 in A-State's regular-season finale that was a de facto championship game.

Entering the 2020 COVID season, the Red Wolves had won at least seven games, including at least five league games, every year under Anderson, including a nine-victory campaign in 2015 and eight-win seasons in 2016, 2018 and 2019. In all, Anderson posted a 51-37 (.580) record during his seven seasons at Arkansas State, including a 38-18 (.679) mark in the Sun Belt Conference. Those 51 wins, 40 of which were by double digits, are tied for the third-most in school history.

Furthermore, the Anderson-led Red Wolves were one of just 20 Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) programs, including six from the Group of Five, to post a winning record in six-consecutive seasons from 2014-19. In fact, A-State's 51 wins under Anderson were tied for the 41st-most in the country during his seven seasons at the helm, while his 38 league wins are the second-most in Sun Belt history.

Statistically, Arkansas State annually ranked as one of the top offensive teams in the nation under Anderson. In 2020, the Red Wolves led the Sun Belt Conference and ranked 15th nationally in total offense at 489.7 yards per game. ASU also led the Sun Belt in total offense in 2018 (466.2 ypg), 2017 (494.8 ypg) and 2014 (476.5 ypg), and ranked second in 2015 (438.5 ypg). Furthermore, the 2017 team ranked 10th in the nation in total offense, while the 2018 team was 17th and the 2014 team was 20th nationally.

As for passing offense, Arkansas State led the Sun Belt Conference and ranked third in the nation in 2020 at 364.4 yards per game. In 2019, the Red Wolves finished second in the conference and 10th in the nation with 312.1 passing yards per game. ASU also led the Sun Belt in passing offense in both 2017 and 2018 with 342.2 and 281.5 passing yards per game, respectively. The 2017 team also ranked fifth nationally in that category, while the 2018 team was 21st in the nation.

Arkansas State also led the Sun Belt Conference in scoring offense three times under Anderson as the 2017 team averaged 37.8 points per game to rank 13th nationally, while the 2015 team averaged 40.0 points per game to rank 12th in the nation, and the 2014 team averaged 36.7 points per game to rank 18th nationally. In fact, six of Anderson's seven Red Wolves teams averaged over 30 points per game.

Overall, each of Anderson's first six squads at Arkansas State ranked among the top-45 teams in the nation in at least 23 combined offensive, defensive and special teams categories, including the 2018 team that led the nation in punt return defense (-1.9 ypr), the 2016 team that led the nation in tackles for loss (9.6 pg) and the 2015 squad that led the nation in both defensive touchdowns (8) and passes intercepted (26).

Along the way, Anderson saw 11 of his players earn all-Sun Belt recognition in 2014, followed by 16 in 2015, 2016 and 2019, and a school-record 18 in 2017. All six seasons combined, Anderson coached 65 different players to 97 all-conference selections – the most in the league over that span.

Following the 2019 campaign, Anderson received the Capital One Orange Bowl-FWAA Courage Award and was named the Grant Teaff Coach of the Year, presented annually by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, as he guided the Red Wolves to an 8-5 record and Camellia Bowl championship after his wife, Wendy, passed away prior to the start of the season following a courageous battle with cancer.

The native of Hubbard, Texas, went to Arkansas State after spending the previous two seasons as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at North Carolina, where he helped lead the Tar Heels to an Atlantic Coast Conference Coastal Division title in 2012 and the Belk Bowl in 2013. Under Anderson's direction, North Carolina averaged 432.4 total yards per game in 2013 after setting the school record the previous year with 485.6 yards per contest. Prior to his arrival in Chapel Hill, the Tar Heels had not averaged 400 yards in a season since 1993.

North Carolina's offense posted more than 500 yards of total offense seven times during Anderson's two seasons at the school, including a school-record 721 yards versus Old Dominion in his last season, and scored 40-or-more points in nine games. The Tar Heels also averaged 44.2 points per game at Kenan Stadium (14 games) with Anderson as their offensive coordinator.

Anderson led a passing offense during the 2013 season that ranked 23rd in the nation, averaging 286.3 yards per game. North Carolina posted 27 passing touchdowns, which were the second-most in school history, and just two behind the 29 recorded in 2012. The Tar Heels ranked among the top-44 teams in the nation in total offense, completion percentage, passing offense, red zone offense, scoring offense, passing efficiency, fourth down conversions and turnovers lost in 2013.

North Carolina's offensive success was just a continuation from Anderson's initial season, which saw the Tar Heels establish more than 35 school records. The Tar Heels finished eighth in the country in scoring, averaging 40.6 points per game, and were 14th nationally with 485.6 yards per game. Their passing attack was 26th nationally with 291.8 yards per contest, and the Tar Heels also rushed for 193.8 yards per game, their highest average since 1994.

Anderson went to Chapel Hill after a record-setting run as Southern Mississippi's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. The Golden Eagles set school records for total offense in each of Anderson's last two years. He was part of a Southern Miss staff that won a school-record 12 games in 2012, including the Conference USA championship over previously-unbeaten Houston, and the Hawaii Bowl over Nevada.

Under the eye of Anderson, the Golden Eagles were one of 14 teams in the country that averaged more than 200 yards per game in both rushing and passing in 2011. The Golden Eagles had nearly 6,500 yards of total offense and set a school record with 461.4 yards per game. In addition, USM was 15th nationally in scoring offense, 16th in total offense and 21st in rushing offense. Anderson's offense posted 30-or-more points in 10 of 14 games in 2011, including a season-high 63 in a win over Navy.

In 2010, Southern Miss was 18th in total offense, 20th in rushing offense and 35th in passing offense. The Golden Eagles also averaged 36.9 points per game to rank 15th in the nation. That season,

Anderson's quarterbacks were among the most efficient in the nation with only eight interceptions thrown – including one by a wide receiver – to 24 touchdowns.

Anderson came to Southern Miss after spending the 2007 campaign at Louisiana-Lafayette as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. The Ragin' Cajuns posted the No. 6-rated rushing offense nationally (251.6 ypg) in 2007 and became the Sun Belt's first-ever 3,000-yard rushing team (3,019).

Anderson, who was in private business from 2004-06, previously worked at Middle Tennessee, where he helped direct an offensive unit as co-offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach from 2002-04.

Anderson also spent three seasons at New Mexico, serving as the wide receivers coach in 2001 and running backs coach from 1999-2000. The UNM rushing attack was responsible for a major share of the Lobo offense in 2000. The Lobos averaged 148 yards per game on the ground, which accounted for 56 percent of the team's total offense.

Before joining the FBS ranks, Anderson worked at Trinity Valley Community College (1995-98) in Athens, Texas, where he helped lead the Cardinals to the 1997 NJCAA National Championship.

Anderson began his coaching career at Eastern New Mexico in 1992 (graduate assistant) and 1993 (full-time), where he tutored the wide receivers. He then moved on to Howard Payne University in Brownwood, Texas, to coach the wide receivers as HPU won the Texas IAA conference title in 1994.

A two-year letterwinner at wide receiver for Sam Houston State from 1990-91, Anderson was named Southland Conference all-academic as a senior. He also played for two years as a quarterback and receiver at Baylor (1988-89) before transferring. Anderson graduated with his bachelor's degree in kinesiology from Sam Houston State in 1992. He also attained his master's degree in sports administration from Eastern New Mexico in 1994.

Anderson and his late wife, Wendy, who passed away after a three-year battle with cancer, were married for 27 years and had three children together in daughter, Callie, and sons, Coleton and Cason. Anderson was remarried to his wife Brittany in 2021 and they have two children together in daughters Collins and Ellison. Tragically in February of 2022, Cason was also lost and laid to rest alongside his mother in Anderson's hometown of Hubbard, Texas.





## JOE CAUTHEN

- *Defensive Coordinator*
- *Stephen F. Austin, 1990*
- *34th Year as a Collegiate Coach*
- *First Year at Utah State*

Joe Cauthen (Caw-then) is in his first season as Utah State's defensive coordinator. Overall, Cauthen has 33 years of coaching experience, including 27 at the collegiate level, and is entering his 22nd year as a defensive coordinator. He has been part of five conference championship teams, including one national championship, and has coached in seven bowl games.

Cauthen comes to Utah State after spending the 2022 season as the defensive coordinator at Stephen F. Austin, where he helped the Lumberjacks win the Western Athletic Conference Championship. Cauthen's defense ranked among the best at the Football Championship Subdivision level as it forced 19 turnovers with 11 interceptions and eight fumbles and scored a pair of touchdowns.

Under Cauthen, Stephen F. Austin had nine defenders earn all-WAC honors, including a pair of All-Americans in BJ Thompson and Edward Bobino.

Cauthen spent the 2021 season as the defensive coordinator at Buffalo, where the Bulls ranked 14th nationally in red zone defense (.735), 16th in sacks (3.08 pg) and 36th in tackles for loss (6.5 pg).

Prior to coaching at Buffalo, Cauthen spent four months on staff at Arkansas as a defensive analyst.

During the 2019 and 2020 seasons, Cauthen served as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Houston. In 2020, his defense ranked 16th in the nation in sacks (3.00 pg) and 21st in tackles for loss (7.4 pg).

Cauthen also spent five seasons (2014-18) as the defensive coordinator at Arkansas State under Blake Anderson, helping ASU to a pair of conference championships and five bowl games.

Overall, the Red Wolves ranked among the top-21 teams in the nation in defensive touchdowns during Cauthen's final four seasons with 22. The 2015 campaign saw ASU's defense record an FBS-high eight touchdowns, while also leading the country in interceptions with a school-record 26.

In 2018, Arkansas State ranked 11th nationally in passing defense (177.8 ypg). Individually, defensive end Ronheen Bingham was named the Sun Belt Conference Defensive Player of the Year and was one of six A-State players to earn post-season honors.

During the 2017 season, Arkansas State's defense ranked sixth nationally in tackles for loss (8.3 pg), ninth in fourth down conversions (.364), 19th in sacks (2.92 pg), 21st in defensive touchdowns (3), 21st in third down conversions (.330), 27th in fumbles recovered (10), 29th in turnovers gained (24), 32nd in passes intercepted (14) and 33rd in rushing defense (136.1 ypg).

Following the 2017 season, eight players were named all-Sun Belt Conference, including defensive end Ja'Von Rolland-Jones, who was tabbed the Conference Player of the Year for the second consecutive season.

In 2016, Arkansas State led the nation with 9.6 tackles for loss per game and was sixth nationally with 3.31 sacks per outing. Rolland-Jones was

among nine defensive players named all-Sun Belt, helping the Red Wolves rank fourth in the nation in fourth down conversion percentage defense (.250), eighth in defensive touchdowns (4), 19th in scoring defense (21.5 ppg), 23rd in pass efficiency defense (117.25), 24th in fumbles recovered (11) and 29th in total defense (362.8 ypg).

Cauthen's defensive unit finished the 2015 season ranked second in the country in turnovers gained (34), 11th in fourth-down conversion percentage defense (.333), 19th in third-down conversion defense (.335), 41st in sacks (2.38 pg) and 44th in rushing defense (151.5 ypg).

During Cauthen's first year at Arkansas State in 2014, the Red Wolves ranked 14th in the nation in defensive touchdowns (4), 15th in passes intercepted (16), 17th in team sacks (2.85 pg), 21st in turnovers gained (28), 27th in third down percentage defense (.359), 28th in fumbles recovered (12) and 36th in tackles for loss (6.6 pg).

Prior to Arkansas State, Cauthen spent three seasons at Middle Tennessee, serving as the defensive line coach in 2012 and 2013 after working as the linebackers coach in 2011. He was also the special teams coordinator all three years at MTSU.

The Blue Raiders put together back-to-back eight-win seasons during Cauthen's last two years at the school and played in the Armed Forces Bowl in 2013. In 2013, the Blue Raiders ranked fifth in the nation in turnovers gained with 33, including 15 interceptions and 18 fumble recoveries.

Cauthen also spent four seasons as the defensive coordinator at Valdosta State. In 2010, Cauthen helped lead the Blazers to a Gulf South Conference Championship after his defense ranked 23rd nationally in total defense and 18th in scoring defense. His unit was led by All-American and National Defensive Player of the Year Larry Dean, who had 122 tackles.

Cauthen's defense was dominant during the 2008 season as it finished 24th nationally in scoring defense (18.6 ppg), 31st in total defense (304.6 ypg) and 31st in rushing defense (108.3 ypg).

In 2007, Cauthen directed a unit that finished 14th in the nation in scoring defense (17.6 ppg) as Valdosta State won its second national title. That year, VSU led the nation in passes intercepted with 27 and was second in turnovers gained with 40.

Prior to Valdosta State, Cauthen had coaching stints at Texas A&M-Commerce, Stephen F. Austin and Trinity Valley Community College. During his seven seasons with Texas A&M-Commerce, Cauthen coached six All-Americans, four Lone Star Conference (LSC) Linebackers of the Year, three Defensive Lineman of the Year, one Defensive Back of the Year and 34 defensive players that earned LSC honors.

Cauthen earned his bachelor's degree in health and kinesiology with a minor in biology from Stephen F. Austin in 1990. He also obtained a master's degree in sports administration from Texas-Tyler in 1997. Cauthen is married to the former Annittia Chapman and they share five children: Sam, Brooklyn, Hayden, Dakota and Jackson.

## NICK PAREMSKI

- Special Teams Coordinator
- Wisconsin-La Crosse, 2003
- 20th Year as a Collegiate Coach
- Third Year at Utah State

Nick Paremski (Puh-rem-ski), who has 19 years of collegiate coaching experience, including four seasons as a defensive coordinator and another four years as a special teams coordinator, is in his third season as Utah State's special teams coordinator. Paremski also coached USU's outside linebackers in 2021 and 2022.

In all, Paremski has coached in six bowl games and has been a part of six conference championship teams.

During the 2022 campaign, Paremski helped Utah State to six wins and its 10th bowl game in the past 12 seasons, including its second straight, as it appeared in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl.

In 2022, Utah State's special teams finished the year ranked 16th in the nation based on The Freeman Efficiency Index (FEI), as the Aggies blocked four kicks, with three punts and one extra point, to rank 10th in the nation. USU also ranked second in the MW and 33rd in the nation in punt return defense, allowing 5.4 yards per return, and was also third in the MW in both punt returns (8.9 ypr) and net punting (38.9 ypp).

Paremski also coached a pair of specialists to MW Player of the Week honors during the 2022 season in placekicker Connor Coles and punter Stephen Kotsanlee. Kotstanlee finished the year fourth in the MW and 38th in the nation with an average of 43.2 yards per punt, which ranks as the sixth-best average in school history.

In 2021, Utah State had its best season in school history as it tied the school record with 11 wins (11-3), won its first-ever Mountain West Championship with a 46-13 victory at No. 19 San Diego State, posted a 24-13 win against Oregon State in the Jimmy Kimmel LA Bowl and finished the season ranked 24th in the nation in both polls.

Utah State's defense held each of its final three opponents to 13 or fewer points, doing so for the first time since 1983, and five of its last six opponents to 17 or fewer points.

Utah State's defense finished tied for second in the nation with 114.0 tackles for loss, which is also tied for the second-most in school history. And, USU limited its opponents to just 22 touchdowns on 51 trips into the red zone (.431), which ranked 10th nationally.

Paremski coached kickoff returner Savon Scarver, who had one kickoff return for touchdown in 2021 to tie the NCAA record with seven career kickoff returns for scores. Scarver was named second-team all-MW.

Utah State's special teams shined in the MW Championship game, setting a school record with two blocked punts. Furthermore, USU's finished the season 24th in the nation in punt return defense (4.3 ypr).

Prior to Utah State, Paremski spent five seasons (2016-20) at Arkansas State, including serving as the interim defensive coordinator in 2020. During his time with the Red Wolves, he spent two

seasons as the special teams co-coordinator and safeties coach (2019-20), one season as the outside linebackers coach (2018) and two seasons as a quality control assistant (2016-17).

At Arkansas State, Paremski helped the Red Wolves to four straight bowl games (2016-19) and the 2016 Sun Belt Conference Championship.

As the interim defensive coordinator in 2020, Paremski mentored a pair of all-Sun Belt performers in linebacker Justin Rice (first team) and defensive lineman Forrest Merrill (second team). Rice led the nation with 18.5 tackles for loss.

In 2019, Paremski coached a pair of all-conference safeties in Darreon Jackson and BJ Edmonds. The duo helped A-State force 19 turnovers to rank second in the Sun Belt. In all, the Red Wolves recorded 12 interceptions to rank second in the conference and 31st in the nation.

With Paremski also working as special teams co-coordinator, A-State kicker Blake Grupe and punter Cody Grace were both named first-team all-Sun Belt Conference in 2019.

In 2020, Arkansas State ranked 12th in the nation in kickoff return defense (17.03 ypr).

In 2018, Paremski was part of A-State's staff that helped the Red Wolves limit four of their final five opponents to less than 300 yards of total offense. A-State also surrendered no more than 17 points in each of its final five outings. Along the way, the squad had seven defensive players earn all-conference honors.

Paremski also served as a quality control assistant for Arkansas State during the 2016 and 2017 seasons. In 2016, ASU won the Sun Belt championship and defeated UCF in the Cure Bowl.

Prior to Arkansas State, Paremski spent 10 years at West Texas A&M from 2006-15, including the last three as defensive coordinator.

During his time with the Buffaloes, he helped lead the program to Lone Star Conference (LSC) championships in 2006, 2007 and 2012. The 2012 squad was also Super Region 4 champions and a national semifinalist.

Paremski coached 12 NFL or CFL players at West Texas A&M, while also mentoring 20 first-team all-LSC selections and three LSC Defensive Backs of the Year. Paremski also coached one LSC Linebacker of the Year and two LSC Freshmen of the Year.

Prior to West Texas A&M, Paremski served as a graduate assistant coach at Texas A&M-Kingsville from 2004-05. The 2004 season saw the Javelinas win the Lone Star title and secure an NCAA Division II playoff berth.

Paremski earned his master's degree in business administration from Texas A&M University-Kingsville in 2006, and he also holds his bachelor's degree in business administration from the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse.

Paremski and his wife, Krista, are the parents of one son, Huston, and one daughter, Alani.

## KYLE CEFALO

- Co-Offensive Coordinator / Wide Receivers
- Colorado, 2012
- 11th Year as a Collegiate Coach
- Third Year at Utah State

Kyle Cefalo (Seph-uh-low), who has 10 years of collegiate coaching experience, is in his third season at Utah State. After spending his first two seasons as the passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach, Cefalo was promoted to co-offensive coordinator in 2023.

In all, Cefalo has coached in nine bowl games and been a part of three conference championships.

During the 2022 campaign, Cefalo helped Utah State to six wins and its 10th bowl game in the past 12 seasons, including its second in as many years as it appeared in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. Cefalo also coached Brian Cobbs (second team) and Terrell Vaughn (honorable mention) to all-MW honors and mentored Justin McGriff, who became the 37th Aggie to record 1,000 career receiving yards. Following the season, Cobbs signed an NFL free agent contract with the Arizona Cardinals.

In 2021, Cefalo helped Utah State to its best season ever as it tied the school record with 11 wins (11-3), won its first-ever Mountain West Championship with a 46-13 victory at No. 19 San Diego State, posted a 24-13 win against Oregon State in the Jimmy Kimmel LA Bowl and finished the year ranked 24th in the nation.

Utah State's offense set six school records in 2021, including 41 touchdown passes, 4,248 passing yards and three receivers with 10-plus touchdown receptions. USU also tied a pair of school records, including 13 100-yard receiving games.

Additionally, Utah State's offense produced over 600 yards of total offense twice, and over 400 passing yards three times, all of which rank among the top 16 performances in school history.

Utah State finished the 2021 season ranked 15th in the nation in passing offense (303.4 ypg), 23rd in total offense (445.6 ypg), and 33rd in scoring offense (32.6 ppg). USU was also the only team that had three players with 10 touchdown receptions.

Individually, senior wide receiver Deven Thompkins set three school records in 2021, including 102 receptions for 1,704 yards. Thompkins also tied two school records with six consecutive 100-yard receiving games and nine 100-yard receiving games.

Thompkins, who was named an Associated Press Third-Team All-American and a semifinalist for the Biletnikoff Award, was second in the nation in receiving yards.

Cefalo also coached Derek Wright to honorable mention all-MW honors in 2021, while Thompkins was named first team. Thompkins was also named the MW Offensive Player of the Week twice.

Thompkins (Tampa Bay Buccaneers), Wright (Carolina Panthers) and Savon Scarver (Chicago Bears) all signed NFL free agent contracts, while Brandon Bowling was invited to the Chicago Bears rookie mini-camp.

Cefalo joined Utah State after spending four seasons as the wide receivers coach at Arkansas State, including serving as its special teams coordinator his last two years.

During the 2020 season, Cefalo coached the

Sun Belt Conference Offensive Player of the Year in Jonathan Adams Jr., who was named an Associated Press Second-Team All-American. A Biletnikoff Award semifinalist, Adams was third in the nation in receptions (79) and touchdown catches (12), and fifth in receiving yards (1,111). Adams signed an NFL free agent contract with the Detroit Lions.

Cefalo also coached Bowling to honorable mention all-Sun Belt honors in 2020, as Arkansas State ranked second in the nation in passing offense (364.4 ypg), 14th in total offense (498.7 ypg) and 35th in scoring offense (32.9 ppg).

In 2019, the Red Wolves ranked 10th in the country in passing offense (312.1 ypg), 26th in scoring offense (33.7 ppg) and 33rd in total offense (439.3 ypg).

As special teams co-coordinator, Arkansas State ranked 12th in the nation in kickoff return defense (17.03 ypr). Furthermore, ASU kicker Blake Grupe and punter Cody Grace were both named first-team all-Sun Belt in 2019. Grupe was also a Lou Groza Award semifinalist.

Arkansas State ranked 17th in the country in total offense (466.2 ypg) and 21st in passing yards (281.5 ypg) on its way to the 2018 Arizona Bowl.

Cefalo coached two-time first-team all-Sun Belt selection Kirk Merritt in both 2018 and 2019. Merritt was also tabbed the league's Newcomer of the Year in 2018 after recording 83 receptions for 1,005 yards and seven touchdowns. Merritt signed an NFL free agent contract with the Miami Dolphins.

In 2019, Omar Bayless shattered the school records for both receiving yards (1,653) and receiving touchdowns (17), while also leading the nation in receiving yards per game (127.2). He was a Biletnikoff Award semifinalist and earned Walter Camp and Associated Press Second-Team All-America recognition before signing an NFL free agent contract with the Carolina Panthers.

Cefalo's first season back at Arkansas State in 2017 saw the Red Wolves rank fifth in the nation in passing offense (342.2 ypg), 10th in total offense (494.8 ypg) and 13th in scoring (37.8 ppg).

Cefalo spent the 2016 campaign as a graduate assistant at Maryland, which doubled its wins from the previous year and played in the Quick Lane Bowl.

His three seasons as a graduate assistant coach at Arkansas State saw the Red Wolves compile three of the top five marks, at the time, in school history for total offense, including a school-record 6,194 yards in 2014.

Arkansas State played in three straight bowl games and won league titles in 2013 and 2015.

Cefalo spent the first six months of 2013 as a recruiting intern at Boise State.

Cefalo enjoyed a successful playing career at Colorado, where he walked on in 2009 before earning a scholarship in the fall of 2011. He originally signed to play baseball at Oregon State, but suffered a season-ending arm injury.

A native of Boston, Massachusetts, Cefalo earned his bachelor's degree in history from Colorado in 2012. He was named to the Athletics Director's Honor Roll in 2012, as well.

Mitchell White is in his first season as Utah State's defensive passing game coordinator and cornerbacks coach. White has five years of coaching experience and one conference championship.

White came to Utah State after spending the 2022 season as the cornerbacks coach at Stephen F. Austin, where he helped the Lumberjacks win the Western Athletic Conference Championship. White was part of an SFA defense that ranked among the best at the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) level, forcing 19 turnovers with 11 interceptions and eight fumbles, and a pair of defensive touchdowns.

During the 2022 campaign, Stephen F. Austin had nine defenders earn all-WAC honors, including defensive back Bruce Harmon.

## DJ TIALAVEA

DJ Tialavea (Tee-al-uh-vah-uh) is in his third year as the tight ends coach at his alma mater. Overall, Tialavea is entering his fourth season with Utah State as he spent the 2020 campaign as an offensive graduate assistant coaching the tight ends.

During the 2022 campaign, Tialavea helped Utah State to six wins and its 10th bowl game in the past 12 seasons, including its second in as many years as it appeared in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. USU also tied for second place in the Mountain Division of the Mountain West with a 5-3 mark. Under Tialavea, Utah State had three tight ends combine to catch 19 passes for 177 yards and two touchdowns.

In 2021, Utah State had its best season in school history as it tied the school record with 11 wins (11-3), won its first-ever Mountain West Championship with a 46-13 road win at No. 19 San Diego State, posted a 24-13 win against Oregon State in the Jimmy Kimmel LA Bowl and finished the season ranked 24th in the nation in both polls.

Utah State's offense set six school records during the 2021 campaign, including 41 touchdown passes, 4,248 passing yards and three receivers with 10-plus touchdown receptions. USU's offense also tied a pair of school records with 13 100-yard receiving games and five passing touchdowns in a single game.

Under Tialavea, Utah State had two tight ends combine to catch 15 passes for 134 yards and two touchdowns.

Additionally, Utah State's offense produced over 600 yards of total offense twice, and over 400 passing yards three times, all of which rank among the top-16 performances in school history.

Utah State finished the 2021 season ranked 15th in the nation in passing offense (303.4 ypg), 23rd in total offense (445.6 ypg), and 33rd in scoring offense (32.6 ppg). USU was also the only team in the nation with at least 10 touchdown receptions by three players.

During the 2020 season, Tialavea coached a tight ends group that had three players combine for 73 yards on 10 receptions and one touchdown in USU's shortened six-game campaign due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

As a player, Tialavea was a four-year letterwinner (2010-13) and three-year captain for Utah State along the defensive line and at tight end, helping the Aggies to three-straight bowl games and the 2012 Western Athletic Conference title.

While at Utah State, Tialavea appeared in 40 games with 17 starts and caught 30 passes for 198 yards and five touchdowns. He also earned academic all-Mountain West

honors following his senior season.

Following his collegiate career, Tialavea spent four years (2014-17) in the NFL. Originally signed by Jacksonville as an undrafted free agent, he also spent time with Buffalo in 2014 before joining Atlanta's practice squad in 2015. He spent two seasons with the Falcons before the Chicago Bears signed him to their practice squad in 2017. On Dec. 24, 2016, Tialavea made his official NFL debut in the Falcons' 33-16 win at Carolina, a game in which he caught a 1-yard touchdown pass.

Tialavea graduated from Utah State with a sports management degree in 2013. He later earned his master's degree in education from USU in 2019. In 2014, he received the Utah State Courage Award.

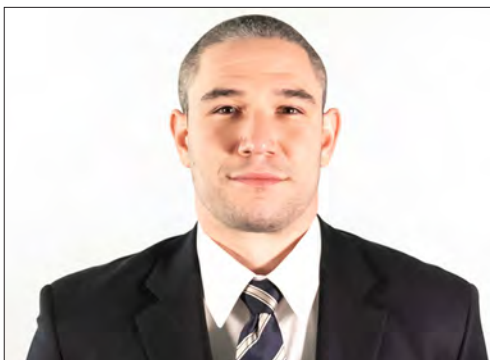

Mike Zuckerman is in his third season at Utah State and first as the linebackers coach after coaching the inside linebackers his first two seasons. In his 10 years as a collegiate coach, Zuckerman has coached in 10 bowl games and been a part of one conference championship.

During the 2022 campaign, Zuckerman helped Utah State to six wins and its 10th bowl game in the past 12 seasons, including its second in as many years as it appeared in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. USU also tied for second place in the Mountain Division of the Mountain West with a 5-3 mark.

Overall, the Aggie defense ranked 11th in the nation in tackles for loss (7.2 pg) and 31st in passing (205.0 ypg) in 2022, led by AJ Vongphachanh's team-best 101 tackles and 10.5 tackles for loss, which were the second-most on the team. Additionally, inside linebacker MJ Tafisi earned honorable mention all-MW honors under Zuckerman, while Max Alford was named the MW Freshman of the Week once.

Under Zuckerman, Utah State's Justin Rice was named the MW Defensive Player of the Week twice and was named to the league's second team at season's end.

Zuckerman arrived at Utah State after spending seven seasons (2014-20) in various roles for the Miami Hurricanes. Zuckerman was a senior quality control analyst for defense during the 2019 and 2020 campaigns. He also spent two seasons (2017-18) as a quality control analyst and was a graduate assistant the previous three seasons (2014-16).

During the 2020 campaign, Zuckerman helped a Hurricanes defense that led the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) in yards per

pass attempt (6.75) and ranked fourth nationally in tackles for loss (8.6 pg), 16th in fumbles recovered (9) and 33rd in sacks (2.73 pg). Miami finished the season with an 8-3 record, including a 7-2 ACC mark, and played in the Cheez-It Bowl.

In 2019, Zuckerman helped a Miami defense that ranked 13th nationally in total defense (309.8 yapg) and 12th nationally in yards per play allowed (4.7). In addition, the Hurricanes ranked fourth nationally in tackles for loss (8.3 pg), sixth in sacks (3.54 pg), 17th in run defense (114.6 yapg) and 18th in pass defense (195.2 yapg).

In 2018, the Hurricanes ranked fourth nationally in total defense (278.9 yapg) and ranked No. 1 in several categories, including tackles for loss (10.5 pg), third down conversion percentage (.253) and passing defense (135.6 yapg).

The Hurricanes ranked among the nation's leaders in several defensive categories in 2017, including first in team sacks (3.38 pg), third in turnovers gained (31), fourth in tackles for loss (8.5 pg), ninth in opponent yards per play (4.3), 15th in passes intercepted (17) and 16th in passing yards allowed per attempt (5.56).

At the conclusion of the 2016 season, Miami was ranked 20th nationally in total defense (345.5 yapg), ninth in yards per play (4.8), 12th in scoring defense (18.5 ppg), fifth in tackles for loss (8.3 pg), 22nd in team sacks (2.85 pg) and tied for eighth in defensive touchdowns allowed. The Hurricanes also ranked 12th nationally in passing yards allowed per attempt (6.30).

Zuckerman returned to Miami after spending nearly two years as a member of the Rutgers coaching staff. He was a player development assistant in 2013 and was elevated to graduate assistant in 2014 before leaving for Miami.

Prior to Rutgers, Zuckerman spent three years working as a student with the Hurricanes. He earned his start as a volunteer operations assistant before serving as a volunteer offensive assistant for Miami.

Zuckerman got his start in coaching at New Rochelle (New York) High School in 2008, working with the offensive and defensive lines as an assistant coach.

Zuckerman earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Miami in business administration and sports administration, respectively, in 2012 and 2016.

Zuckerman was a four-year member of the New Rochelle HS football team, including serving as captain as a senior.

Cooper Bassett is in his first year as Utah State's offensive line coach. Bassett, who has 10 years of collegiate coaching experience, has been a part of two divisional championship teams and has coached in three bowl games.

Bassett came to Utah State after spending the 2022 season as the offensive line coach at Sam Houston State, where the Bearkats rushed for an average of 162.3 yards per game (4.4 yards per attempt) and allowed just 18 sacks in nine outings to rank first in the Western Athletic Conference in sacks allowed and second in rushing offense. At SHSU, Bassett coached Jordan Boatman to second-team all-conference honors.

Prior to Sam Houston State, Bassett spent the 2021 season directing the offensive line at Southeast Missouri, where his unit helped pave the way for a 1,000-yard rusher in Geno Hess. Bassett also coached a pair of offensive linemen to all-conference accolades in Nate Korte and Zack Gieg.

Bassett also spent four years (2017-20) as the offensive line coach at West Texas A&M, including two seasons as the running game coordinator.

In 2020, Bassett's offensive line paved the way for a West Texas A&M offense that ranked 14th in the nation in rushing with 207.6 yards per game. The Buffs led the Lone Star Conference (LSC) in third (41.4 percent) and fourth down (58.3 percent) conversion percentage, and first downs (99). West Texas A&M ranked eighth nationally in first downs, as well.

Prior to that, the offensive line produced 363 yards in total offense per game during the 2019 campaign. Under Bassett's tutelage, the Buffs rushed for 31 touchdowns, their most in a season in over a decade. West Texas A&M ranked first in the LSC and 15th in the nation in sacks allowed that year.

In 2018, Bassett coached a pair Lone Star Conference performers in Parker Hanna and Travis Vornkahl.

After completing his college career at Oklahoma State (2009-12), where the Cowboys compiled a record of 40-12, Bassett coached at Missouri and Maryland. He spent three seasons at Missouri, where the Tigers finished 23-5 and won back-to-back SEC East Division titles. And at Maryland, Bassett worked primarily with the offensive line during the 2016 campaign.

A native of Tuttle, Oklahoma, Bassett was a four-year letterman and senior captain at Oklahoma State, where he played tight end and defensive line. He earned his bachelor's degree in science from OSU in 2012

and master's in education from Missouri in 2015.

Bassett and his wife, Samantha, are the parents of two sons, Bowen and Briar.

Tevita Finau (Teh-vee-tuh Fee-now) is in his first season as Utah State’s defensive line coach. Overall, he has three years of collegiate coaching experience, has coached in two bowl games and been a part of two conference championships.

Finau came to Utah State after spending the previous three years (2020-22) as a graduate assistant/administrative assistant at the University of Utah, helping the Utes to back-to-back Pac-12 Championships and Rose Bowl appearances.

During the 2022 season, Finau was part of a Utes defense that led the Pac-12 in sacks (2.93 pg) and tackles for loss (6.4 pg), and ranked second in total defense allowing 334.1 yards per game.

Finau also worked with the 2022 Bill Walsh Coaching Fellowship, working with the defensive line of the Los Angeles Rams.

In 2021, Finau helped coach a Utah defense that led the Pac-12 in sacks (3.0 pg) and tackles for loss (6.9 pg), and ranked third in total defense allowing 341.6 yards per game.

Finau also helped Junior Tafuna to second-team all-Pac 12 honors during both the 2021 and 2022 campaigns.

Prior to entering the collegiate ranks, Finau spent five years (2015-19) at Orem (Utah) High School, including serving as the team’s co-defensive coordinator for four seasons as he helped lead the Tigers to four-consecutive state championships.

Finau played collegiately at Utah (2010-11) and appeared in 21 games for the Utes, including five starts. During his two years, he recorded 42 total tackles and helped Utah to a pair of bowl games. As a senior, he played in all 13 games with four starts and posted 37 tackles, which included 3.0 sacks and 5.0 tackles for loss. Against Georgia Tech in the Sun Bowl, he recorded a career-high 10 tackles.

Finau also spent three years at Phoenix College (2006-08), where he was named a National Junior College Athletic Association second-team All-American as a freshman in 2007 as he recorded 89 tackles, which included 7.0 sacks and 19.0 tackles for loss, in 10 games, to go along with three forced fumbles. As a sophomore in 2008, he was named the region’s co-Defensive Player of the Year and second-team all-conference as he posted 53 tackles, which included 11.0 tackles for loss, to go along with a forced fumble.

Originally from Hamilton, New Zealand, Finau was raised in Tonga and Hawaii, where he was a three-time first-team all-state honoree from 2002-04. He attended Lahaina High School as a freshman and sophomore, Maui HS as a junior and Kahuka HS as a senior, as he helped the Red Raiders to the 2004 Hawaii state championship.

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Rodney Freeman II is in his first season as Utah State’s running backs coach. Freeman brings 12 years of coaching experience with him to USU.

Freeman came to Utah State after serving as an offensive analyst for Michigan State during the 2022 campaign. Freeman joined the Spartans after spending the spring season as the offensive coordinator/wide receivers coach at Colorado Mesa.

Prior to his appointment at Colorado Mesa, Freeman was the offensive coordinator at his alma mater, Klein Forest High School in Houston, Texas, for the 2020 and 2021 seasons.

At Klein Forest HS, he coached four-star running back Ahmonte Watkins, who signed to play at TCU, to an all-district selection in 2020. In 2021, Freeman coached Kendrick Bradley to an all-district selection as he led the district with over 1,400 yards rushing and 20 touchdowns. Bradley was also named a Houston Touchdown Club finalist and signed to play collegiately at Division II Henderson State. He also mentored both three-star recruit Parker Jenkins and four-star recruit Jelani Watkins to all-district selections that helped contribute to a potent and explosive offense.

Freeman coached three years (2017-19) at West Texas A&M, spending time as both a wide receivers coach and special teams coordinator. The Buffs’ special teams unit excelled under Freeman as they ranked first in the nation in kickoff return defense and punt returns. He also coached Tobias Harris, who ranked second in all of NCAA college football in punt return average. Semaj Mitchell had a breakout year under Freeman as the senior wideout recorded a team-high 32 receptions for 457 yards and six touchdowns. Juwan McCall was equally impressive with 29 receptions for 404 yards and four scores, including back-to-back games with over 100 yards receiving. In 2018, Freeman was instrumental in helping Mitchell earn Lone Star Conference honorable mention honors as he led the team in receptions and receiving yards.

During his two seasons (2015-16) at Abilene Christian as a running backs coach, Freeman coached D’Andre Brown, who earned second-team all-Southland honors.

Freeman spent two years (2013-14) at Missouri Southern in Joplin, Missouri, where he worked primarily with the wide receivers. He served as the wide receivers and tight ends coach at Western State Colorado in 2012, where he was responsible for running and facilitating position meetings, while planning and scripting position segment practices.

Before joining the Mountaineers staff, Freeman spent a season (2011) as the co-

offensive coordinator at Lutheran North High School in Houston. He also was the head freshman coach and assistant varsity coach at Eisenhower High School, where he led the freshman team to a 9-0-1 record and a district championship.

Ethan Morriss is in his third season at Utah State and first as the safeties coach after spending the 2022 season as a senior defensive analyst and the 2021 campaign as a defensive analyst.

During the 2022 campaign, Morriss helped Utah State to six wins and its 10th bowl game in the past 12 seasons, including its second in as many years as it appeared in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl.

Overall, the Aggie defense ranked 11th in the nation in tackles for loss (7.2 pg) and 31st in passing (205.0 ypg) in 2022. Additionally, inside linebacker MJ Tafisi earned honorable mention all-MW honors under Morriss, while Max Alford was named the MW Freshman of the Week once.

In 2021, Utah State had its best season in school history as it tied the school record with 11 wins (11-3), won its first-ever Mountain West Championship with a 46-13 victory at No. 19 San Diego State, posted a 24-13 win against Oregon State in the Jimmy Kimmel LA Bowl and finished the year ranked 24th in the nation.

Utah State's defense held each of its final three opponents to 13 or fewer points and five of its last six opponents to 17 or fewer points.

Utah State's defense finished tied for second in the nation with 114.0 tackles for loss, which is also tied for the second-most in school history. And, USU limited its opponents to just 22 touchdowns on 51 trips into the red zone (.431), which ranked 10th nationally.

Utah State's defense also ranked fourth in the nation in fourth down conversion percentage (.250), eighth with 11 forced fumbles and 27th in third down conversion percentage (.346).

Morriss came to Utah State after spending two seasons (2019-20) at Arkansas State as a defensive graduate assistant. In 2019, he helped the Red Wolves to an 8-5 record and a win in the Camellia Bowl.

Prior to Arkansas State, Morriss spent two seasons (2017-18) at Harding University as a graduate assistant working with the defensive backs. During his two seasons with the program, the Bisons posted a combined 20-7 record and advanced to the NCAA DII playoffs.

The 2018 season saw Harding post a 9-3 record and finish No. 20 in the final AFCA poll. The Bisons ranked No. 6 in the nation the previous year after posting an 11-4 mark and advancing to the semifinals of the Division II playoffs.

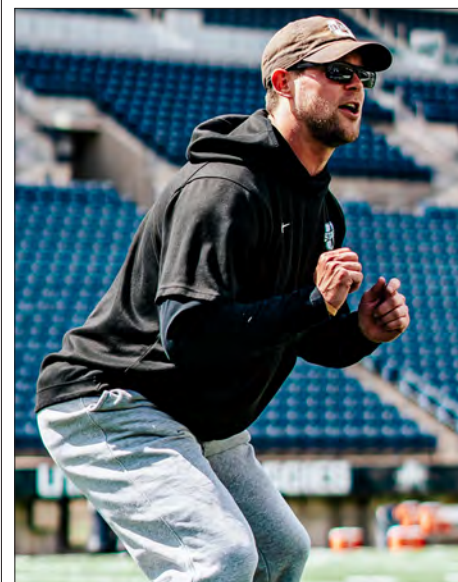
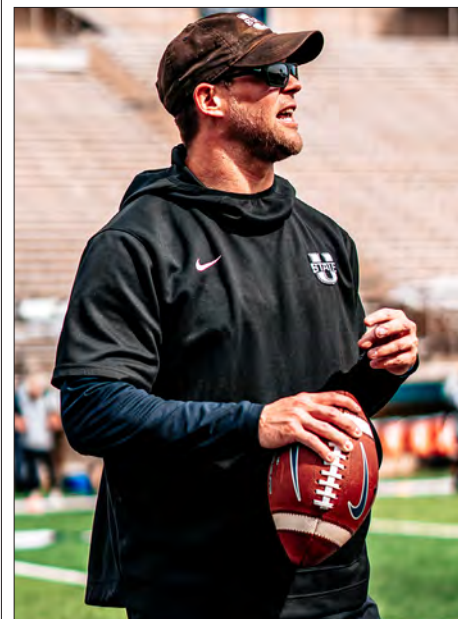

Prior to that, he spent six months as a strength and conditioning intern at South Carolina. He also spent one year as the Director of Sports Performance at Elite Health and Fitness in Stoughton, Massachusetts.

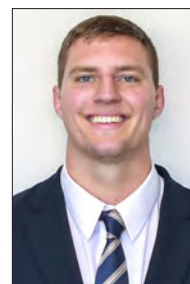

- Second Year at Utah State

Andy Koch is in his second year as a strength and conditioning graduate assistant with Utah State's football team.

During the 2022 campaign, Koch helped Utah State to six wins and its 10th bowl game in the past 12 seasons, including its second in as many years as it appeared in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. USU also tied for second place in the Mountain Division of the Mountain West with a 5-3 mark as the Aggies had nine players earn various all-conference accolades, including a pair of All-Americans.

Koch played on the offensive line for three seasons for his alma mater, helping the Aggies appear in back-to-back bowl games in 2018 (GILDAN New Mexico) and 2019 (Tropical Smoothie Cafe Frisco).

As a sophomore in 2020, Koch appeared in five games with four starts. He played in 217 snaps and finished the season with 6.0 knockdowns, including a season-high 3.0 knockdowns against Boise State.

Koch started the first three games of the year in 2019 at right tackle before missing the rest of the season due to injury. The native of Eastvale, California, played in 204 snaps, including a career-high 81 against Wake Forest in the season opener. He finished the season with 12.5 knockdowns, including a career-high 8.5 against the Demon Deacons.

In his first season as an Aggie in 2018, Koch redshirted as he played in three games, tallying 47 snaps along the offensive line.

Prior to Utah State, Koch earned California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) Southern Section Division 5 first-team honors as a defensive lineman following his senior season at Eleanor Roosevelt High School in Eastvale. That year, he recorded 67 tackles, included 15.5 tackles for loss and 9.0 sacks, to go along with two fumble recoveries that he returned for touchdowns.

Koch graduated from Utah State in 2022 with a bachelor's degree in exercise science.





## TIM BURMEISTER

- Senior Defensive Analyst
- Wis.-Stevens Point, 2015
- Fourth Year at Utah State

Tim Burmeister is in his fourth season with Utah State and first as a senior defensive analyst. He spent the 2022 season with USU as a defensive analyst, the 2021 campaign as a defensive graduate assistant and served as a special teams administrative assistant for the Aggies in 2020. In his role, Burmeister works primarily with the linebackers.

During the 2022 campaign, Burmeister helped Utah State to six wins and its 10th bowl game in the past 12 seasons, including its second in as many years as it appeared in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl.

Overall, the Aggie defense ranked 11th in the nation in tackles for loss (7.2 pg) and 31st in passing (205.0 ypg) in 2022. Additionally, inside linebacker MJ Tafisi earned honorable mention all-MW honors under Burmeister, while Max Alford was named the MW Freshman of the Week once.

In 2021, Utah State had its best season in school history as it tied the school record with 11 wins (11-3), won its first-ever Mountain West Championship with a 46-13 victory at No. 19 San Diego State, posted a 24-13 win against Oregon State in the Jimmy Kimmel LA Bowl and finished the season ranked 24th in the nation in both polls.

Utah State's defense held each of its final three opponents to 13 or fewer points, doing so for the first time since 1983, and five of its last six opponents to 17 or fewer points.

Utah State's defense finished tied for second in the nation with 114.0 tackles for loss, which is also tied for the second-most in school history. And, USU limited its opponents to just 22 touchdowns on 51 trips into the red zone (.431), which ranked 10th nationally.

Utah State's defense also ranked fourth in the nation in fourth down conversion percentage (.250), eighth with 11 forced fumbles and 27th in third down conversion percentage (.346).

Burmeister also helped linebacker Justin Rice earn second-team all-MW honors in 2021.

Working with the special teams in 2020, Burmeister helped Utah State produce the third-most efficient special teams units in the nation. In all, USU led the MW and was 11th in the nation in punt return defense (1.4 yards per return), and was first in the MW and 15th in the nation in kickoff return defense (17.4 ypr). USU was also second in the MW and 15th in the nation with two blocked kicks (1 field goal, 1 punt), third in the MW and 31st in the nation in net punting (40.4 ypp), and fifth in the MW and 20th in the nation in kickoff returns (24.5 ypr).

Burmeister also helped a pair of Aggies earn honorable mention all-Mountain West accolades in junior kickoff returner Savon Scarver and freshman punter Stephen Kotsanlee. Scarver returned one kickoff for a touchdown during the

season and averaged 31.4 yards on 10 returns, while Kotsanlee was fourth in the MW and 66th in the nation in punting (40.7 ypg). On the season, he had four 50-yard punts and 17 punts downed inside the 20-yard line.

Burmeister came to Utah State after spending the 2019 campaign at Washington State, where he split time as an assistant linebackers coach and defensive quality control assistant. During his time at WSU, Burmeister coached Jahad Woods to all-Pac-12 honorable mention honors after he recorded 141 tackles – fourth-most in the country – the most by a Cougar since 1991. Woods also tallied a team-high 10 tackles for loss, three sacks, three pass breakups, two forced fumbles and one interception.

Prior to joining Washington State, Burmeister worked the previous four seasons on the North Texas coaching staff, including the final three as a defensive graduate assistant and spent the spring of 2019 in a quality control position. The native of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, spent the 2015 season as an intern working with the Mean Green defensive backs.

Burmeister moved to coaching the linebackers as a graduate assistant from 2016-18 and helped produce four all-Conference USA linebackers during that span, led by E.J. Ejiya, who earned all-Conference USA first-team honors in 2018 after posting 121 tackles, 25.0 tackles for loss and nine sacks.

Burmeister played defensive back at Wisconsin-Stevens Point from 2011-14 and earned his bachelor's degree in business administration and economics in 2015. He later earned his master's degree in interdisciplinary studies.

Burmeister is married to the former Cassidy Alles and the couple has one son, Bruin.



## BLAISE TAYLOR

- Senior Defensive Analyst
- Arkansas State, 2016
- First Year at Utah State

Blaise Taylor is in his first season with Utah State's football program as a senior defensive analyst. In his role with the Aggies, Taylor will be assisting the defensive secondary.

Taylor comes to Utah State after spending the past four years with the Tennessee Titans. In June of 2021, Taylor was promoted from a scouting assistant to a pro scout, where his duties included preparing opponent breakdowns, position matchup breakdowns and offensive and defensive PFF analysis of opponents on a weekly basis. He also evaluated and graded NFL free agents for free agency.

Before making his way to Nashville, Taylor was a defensive graduate assistant at Duke. While with the Blue Devils, he aided in coaching the linebackers in a 4-2-5 scheme and assisted in all phases of special teams, working with all returners in the process.

Taylor was a four-year starter and team cap-

tain at Arkansas State from 2014-17, earning first-team all-Sun Belt Conference honors as both a defensive back and punt returner. He ended his collegiate career as the Red Wolves' record holder for punt return yards (1,151) and pass breakups (30), and the Sun Belt's all-time leader in passes defended (36). His four punt returns for touchdowns also rank second in league history and he holds three of the top-10 marks in school history for punt return yards in a game and in a season as well as the two highest punt return averages in a game all-time.

Taylor helped lead Arkansas State to three straight Sun Belt Championships and bowl games. Taylor ended his career as a two-time all-Sun Belt selection, an Arthur Ashe Jr. Male Sports Scholar of the Year and William V. Campbell Trophy Finalist.

The native of Waco, Texas, earned his master of business administration (MBA) in August of 2017 with a 3.82 GPA, and he also graduated magna cum laude in August of 2016 with his bachelor's degree in business administration.

A member of the Arkansas State chancellor's list, dean's list, athletics director's honor roll and Sun Belt Conference commissioner's list, Taylor earned both degrees in less than four years, a feat that gave him the distinction of being the only current player at that time in the Football Bowl Subdivision to earn both his bachelor's and master's degrees before the start of his true senior season.

Taylor and his sister, Dr. Starr Taylor, who was a guard on the women's basketball team at Arkansas State, created a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization called "The Power of 1 or 2," which works with underprivileged, at-risk children.

Following his stellar career at Arkansas State, Taylor played in the 2018 NFLPA Collegiate Bowl, where he led the National Team with seven tackles, including 1.0 tackles for loss. He also returned one punt for 10 yards.

Prior to joining the coaching ranks, Taylor participated in the New Orleans Saints rookie minicamp in May of 2018.



## HAYDEN KINGSTON

- Offensive Analyst
- UCF, 2020
- Third Year at Utah State

Hayden Kingston is in his third year at Utah State and first as an offensive analyst after spending his first two seasons as an offensive graduate assistant. He works primarily with the Aggie quarterbacks.

During the 2022 campaign, Kingston helped Utah State to six wins and its 10th bowl game in the past 12 seasons, including its second in as many years as it appeared in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl.

In 2021, Utah State had its best season in school history as it tied the school record with 11 wins (11-3), won its first-ever Mountain West Championship with a 46-13 victory at No. 19 San







Diego State, posted a 24-13 win against Oregon State in the Jimmy Kimmel LA Bowl and finished the season ranked 24th in the nation in both polls.

Utah State's offense set six school records during the 2021 campaign, including 41 touchdown passes, 4,248 passing yards and three receivers with 10-plus touchdown receptions. USU's offense also tied a pair of school records with 13 100-yard receiving games and five passing touchdowns in a single game.

Utah State's offense also produced over 600 yards of total offense twice, and over 400 passing yards three times, all of which rank among the top-16 performances in school history.

Utah State finished the 2021 season ranked 15th in the nation in passing offense (303.4 ypg), 23rd in total offense (445.6 ypg), and 33rd in scoring offense (32.6 ppg). USU was also the only team in the nation with at least 10 touchdown receptions by three players.

With Kingston's assistance, graduate junior quarterback Logan Bonner set five school records in 2021, including 3,628 passing yards, 36 touchdown passes, four touchdown passes in three-straight games and four touchdown passes in six games in a season. Bonner also tied the school record for passing touchdowns in a game with five. Bonner finished the season seventh in the nation in passing touchdowns.

Kingston came to Utah State after spending four years as a quarterback at UCF. Prior to UCF, he began his collegiate career at Wake Forest.

Kingston earned Florida Class 7A second-team all-state honors as a prep senior at Viera High School in Melbourne, Florida, and was the runner-up for the Florida Dairy Farmers Player of the Year. He also earned first-team all-District 12 and first-team all-Cape Coast Conference honors and was named the *FNLR/Spacecoast Daily* co-Offensive Player of the Year and the Brighthouse Networks Football Offensive Player of the Year as a senior. During his senior season in 2015, he threw for 3,876 yards and 42 touchdowns as he led the state of Florida in passing yards and finished second in the state in touchdown passes.

As a prep junior at Viera HS, he completed 72 percent of his passes and threw 23 touchdowns.

Kingston graduated from UCF in 2020 with a bachelor's degree in human communications.



**BOBBY DODD**

- Senior Special Teams Analyst
- Arkansas State, 2016
- Third Year at Utah State

Bobby Dodd is in his third year with Utah State and first as a senior special teams analyst after spending his first two years as a special teams quality control coach.

During the 2022 campaign, Dodd helped Utah State to six wins and its 10th bowl game in the past 12 seasons, including its second straight, as it appeared in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl.

In 2022, Utah State's special teams finished the

year ranked 16th in the nation based on The Freeman Efficiency Index (FEI), as the Aggies blocked four kicks, with three punts and one extra point, to rank 10th in the nation. USU also ranked second in the Mountain West and 33rd in the nation in punt return defense, allowing 5.4 yards per return. USU was also third in the MW in both punt returns (8.9 ypr) and net punting (38.9 ypp).

Dodd also helped a pair of specialists to MW Player of the Week honors in placekicker Connor Coles and punter Stephen Kotsanlee. Kotstanlee finished the year fourth in the MW and 38th in the nation with an average of 43.2 yards per punt, which ranks as the sixth-best average in school history.

In 2021, Utah State had its best season in school history as it tied the school record with 11 wins (11-3), won its first-ever Mountain West Championship with a 46-13 victory at No. 19 San Diego State, posted a 24-13 win against Oregon State in the Jimmy Kimmel LA Bowl and finished the season ranked 24th in the nation in both polls.

With the special teams, kickoff returner Savon Scarver had one kickoff return for touchdown in 2021 to tie the NCAA record with seven career kickoff returns for scores. Scarver was named second-team all-MW.

Utah State's special teams shined in the MW Championship game, setting a school record with two blocked punts. Furthermore, USU finished the season ranked 24th in the nation in punt return defense (4.3 ypr).

Prior to Utah State, Dodd spent the 2019 and 2020 seasons at Arkansas State working as a special teams quality control coach.

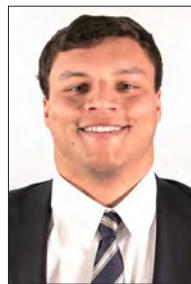
Dodd also spent two seasons at Lamar, serving as the tight ends coach in 2018 and as a quality control coach in 2017.

Overall, the Aggie defense ranked 11th in the nation in tackles for loss (7.2 pg) and 31st in passing (205.0 ypg) in 2022.

In 2021, Edmonds helped the Aggies to their best season in school history as they tied the school record with 11 wins (11-3), won their first-ever Mountain West Championship with a 46-13 victory at No. 19 San Diego State, posted a 24-13 win against Oregon State in the Jimmy Kimmel LA Bowl and finished the year ranked 24th in the nation.

Brandon Bowling is in his first year with Utah State as an offensive graduate assistant.

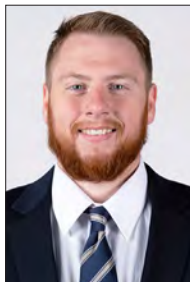

Conley arrived at Arkansas State after spending the 2016 and 2017 seasons as the Director of

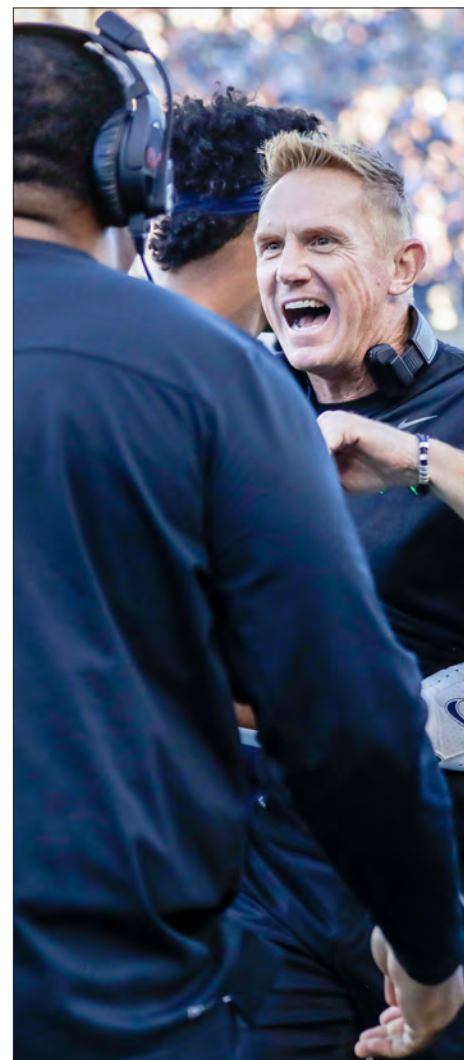

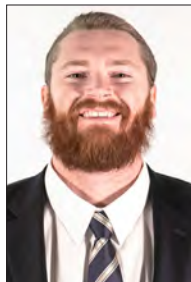

Utah State finished the 2021 season ranked 15th in the nation in passing offense (303.4 ypg), 23rd in total offense (445.6 ypg), and 33rd in scoring offense (32.6 ppg). USU was also the only team in the nation with at least 10 touchdown receptions by three players.

Albrecht came to Utah State after spending four years in the private business sector.

Albrecht spent five years (2012-16) at Utah State and earned honorable mention all-MW honors as both a junior and senior. Overall, he played in 39 games with 28 starts and helped USU to four-straight bowl games and a school-record three-straight bowl wins from 2012-14.

At Alta High School in Sandy, Utah, Albrecht earned second-team all-state honors, was a four-year letterwinner in both football and basketball, and a member of the honor roll all four years.

Albrecht graduated from Utah State in the fall of 2016 with an interdisciplinary studies degree with an emphasis in health and wellness.

Albrecht and his wife Emily have three children, Eli, Milo and Owen.

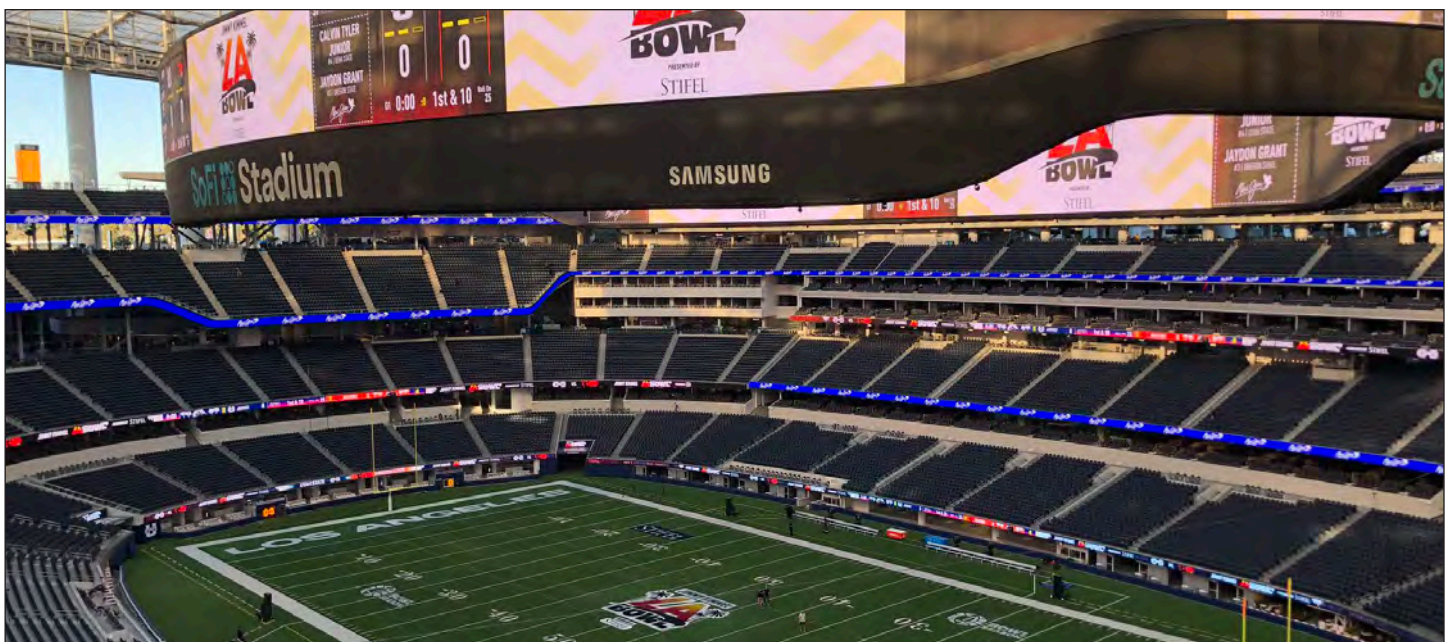

**LOGAN, Utah-** Utah State graduate senior QB Logan Bonner was 20-of-29 passing for 281 yards and three touchdowns, while graduate senior RB Calvin Tyler Jr. gained a career-high 161 yards on a career-best 33 carries to lead Utah State to a season-opening 31-20 home win against UConn on Merlin Olsen Field at Maverik Stadium on Saturday, Aug. 27, 2022.

Utah State, who scored 24 unanswered points to rally back from a 14-point first quarter deficit, made it a habit of rallying from double-digit deficits during the 2021 campaign, as it has now won seven games when trailing by 10 or more points under head coach Blake Anderson.

Utah State had seven players start their first-career game, while 20 players made their Aggie debut on Saturday.

Graduate senior WR Brian Cobbs made his Aggie debut by leading all receivers in the game with a career-high eight catches for a career-best 108 yards and a touchdown. Overall, it was his first-career 100-yard game.

Bonner also threw touchdown passes to junior WR Kyle Van Leeuwen and senior WR Justin McGriff as that duo caught three passes each for 54 and 53 yards, respectively. For Van Leeuwen, his receiving yards are a career-best and his three receptions tied his career high. Junior college transfer Terrell Vaughn added two receptions for 41 yards in his first game for USU.

In all, Utah State amassed 542 yards of total offense, including 261 on the ground.

The Huskies led 14-0 at the end of the first quarter following a 1-yard touchdown run by Ta'Quan Roberson and a 13-yard touchdown pass from Zion Turner to Keelan Marion. Turner was 12-of-31 passing for 109 yards and one touchdown to go along with two interceptions. UConn's Nate Carter led all rushers in the game with 190 yards on 20 carries.

Utah State began its comeback in the second quarter when Bonner found Van Leeuwen from 11 yards to cut the deficit to 14-7 with 12:28 left until the half. The Aggies then scored 17 more points in the final 3:42 of the quarter on a 23-yard touchdown run by freshman RB Robert Briggs, a 14-yard touchdown pass from Bonner to McGriff and a 45-yard field goal by graduate senior PK Connor Coles. Briggs finished the game with 85 yards on 10 carries.

The Huskies pulled within 24-20 with 10:09 left in the fourth quarter following a pair of 47- and 54-yard field goals from Noe Ruelas, but Cobbs' 11-yard touchdown reception with six minutes to go cemented the win.

UConn's final series of the game ended with 4:46 left after redshirt freshman S Ike Larsen intercepted a pass by Turner. Graduate senior S Hunter Reynolds also had an interception for the Aggies.

Junior ILB MJ Tafisi led Utah State in tackles with a career-high 10, including a career-best 2.0 tackles for loss in his Aggie debut, while senior CB Ajani Cater tied his career-high with seven stops and a forced fumble that was recovered by graduate junior DE Daniel Grzesiak in his first game for USU. Junior OLB Kaleo Neves also had a career-high in tackles with seven.

UConn's Jackson Mitchell had a game-high 16 tackles, including 1.0 sacks, to go along with a forced fumble and fumble recovery.

Utah State racked up 11.0 tackles for loss, 11 quarterback hurries and four pass breakups.

**TUSCALOOSA, Alabama** - Reigning Heisman Trophy winner Bryce Young threw five first-half touchdown passes as No. 1 Alabama handed Utah State its first road loss since the 2020 season, 55-0 in front of more than 98,000 fans on Saturday, Sept. 3, 2022, at Bryant-Denney Stadium.

The Aggies (1-1) began the game on offense and started with a bang as graduate senior QB **Logan Bonner** completed a 23-yard pass to graduate senior WR **Brian Cobbs** down the Utah State sideline. The Crimson Tide (1-0) defense stiffened after that, limiting the Aggies to just 35 yards and one first down the rest of the half. Meanwhile, Alabama racked up 350 yards and 22 first downs during the first 30 minutes of play, opening up a 41-0 advantage by the break.

Prior to Saturday night, the Aggies had won their last eight games away from home (seven road, one neutral site), which was the longest active streak in the nation.

Redshirt freshman **S Ike Larsen** shined for the Aggies on defense as he led the team with both a game- and career-high seven tackles, to go along with his second interception in as many games, and a blocked punt late in the fourth quarter, which was the first of his career. For USU, it was its third blocked punt in its last four games as it set a school record with two blocked punts at No. 19 San Diego State in the 2021 Mountain West Championship game.

In limited action, **Bonner** finished 3-of-9 passing for 39 yards, while junior QB **Cooper Legas** was 3-of-8 passing for three yards and sophomore QB **Levi Williams** was 2-of-5 passing for 15 yards.

**Cobbs** finished with two receptions on the night for 33 yards. Ground-wise, freshman RB **Robert Briggs** led Utah State with 28 yards on a career-high-tying 10 carries, while graduate senior RB **Calvin Tyler Jr.** carried the ball 12 times for 13 yards.

The Aggies, who were shut out for the first time since 2007 against No. 19 Boise State, a 52-0 result, finished with 136 yards and only seven first downs.

For just the second time under head coach **Blake Anderson**, USU did not commit a turnover in the game, while intercepting a pass and blocking a punt.

Alabama racked up 559 yards of total offense and 30 first downs. Young, who played into the third quarter, was 18-of-28 passing for 195 yards and those five touchdowns. He also led the Tide on the ground with 100 yards and a touchdown on five carries.

Defensively, Utah State had 5.0 tackles for loss, including 1.0 sacks, to go along with two pass breakups and the one interception. Graduate junior DE **Daniel Grzesiak** had the lone sack for USU, while graduate senior S **Hunter Reynolds** and senior CB **Ajani Carter** both had pass breakups. Other Aggies with tackles for loss included senior CB **Michael Anyanwu**, who finished the game with five tackles, sophomore DT **Tavian Coleman**, sophomore DE **John Ward** and redshirt freshman DT **Seni Tuiaki**, who tied his career high with two tackles.

Junior P **Stephen Kotsanlee** made the most of his opportunities as he tied his career high of 10 punts for an average of 38.3 yards. He also had a career-high four punts of at least 50 yards (51, 52, 53, 60), including a season long of 60, and he had four of his punts downed inside the 20-yard line.

**LOGAN, Utah** - Weber State QB Bronson Barron passed for 202 yards and two touchdowns to help the Wildcats beat Utah State 35-7 in the Aggies' final non-conference home game on Saturday, Sept. 10, 2022, on Merlin Olsen Field at Maverik Stadium. Ranked No. 17 at the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) level, the Wildcats (2-0) snapped an eight-game losing streak to Utah State (1-2).

Junior WR Terrell Vaughn provided the only points for the Aggies when he returned a kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown, giving the hosts a brief 7-3 lead with 5:53 remaining in the first quarter. That kickoff return is tied for the third-longest in school history and is one of eight for at least 100 yards.

Vaughn finished with 176 all-purpose yards on the night as he also hauled in a team- and career-high four catches for career-best 36 yards.

Senior WR Justin McGriff added three receptions for 42 yards, while junior WR Kyle Van Leeuwen tied his career-high with three receptions for 33 yards.

Weber State regained the lead for good less than a minute later when Josh Davis scored on a 17-yard touchdown run to make it 10-7. The Wildcats never looked back from there, but the Aggies had their chances.

Down 13-7 late in the first half, Utah State drove to the WSU 3-yard line, where it faced third-and-goal. The drive ended unsuccessfully when graduate senior QB Logan Bonner was intercepted in the end zone by the Wildcats' Maxwell Anderson.

Bonner finished the game just 12-of-31 passing for 120 yards and three interceptions, while junior QB Cooper Legas was 4-of-9 passing for 37 yards and one pick.

Utah State finished with 283 yards of total offense (157 passing, 126 rushing), while Weber State produced 401 yards (202 passing, 199 rushing). The Wildcats also possessed the ball for 35:54 and limited the Aggies to just 2-of-15 on third downs.

Senior ILB AJ Vongphachanh led Utah State's defensive effort as he had a season-high 11 tackles for his first double-digit tackle outing of the season and the second of his career. He also forced a fumble and had 1.0 tackles for loss.

Graduate senior S Hunter Reynolds had a season-high 10 tackles for the Aggies, which is the fourth double-digit tackle outing of his career. He also intercepted his second pass of the season and the third of his career, to go along with one pass breakup.

Junior ILB MJ Tafisi also had double-digit tackles for the Aggies as he tied his career-high with 10 stops, to go along with a career-high-tying 2.0 tackles for loss, and a career-high-tying one pass breakup.

Senior CB Michael Anyanwu and graduate senior DT Phillip Paea each had an interception for Utah State, which was the first of their careers. Anyanwu also had a career-high nine tackles in the game, including 0.5 tackles for loss, while redshirt freshman DT Seni Tuiaki added a career-best eight stops, which included 0.5 tackles for loss.

Junior P Stephen Kotsanlee had another career day for the Aggies as he had three punts of at least 50 yards (51, 51, 58) and a career-high-tying five punts downed inside the 20-yard line as he punted seven times for an average of 45.7 yards.

**LOGAN, Utah** - UNLV QB Doug Brumfield passed for one touchdown and ran for two others to lead the Rebels past Utah State 34-24 in the Mountain West opener for both teams on Saturday, Sept. 24, 2022, on Merlin Olsen Field at Maverik Stadium.

Brumfield completed 21-of-31 passes for 217 yards and the one touchdown, to go along with touchdown runs of 4 and 1 yards, respectively.

Utah State graduate senior QB **Logan Bonner** was 27-of-41 for a season-best 313 yards and a season-high-tying three touchdowns, to go along with five interceptions. Bonner's 39-yard touchdown pass to junior WR **Terrell Vaughn** pulled the Aggies (1-3, 0-1 MW) to within 34-24 with 6:15 remaining in the game, but that's as close as they would get the rest of the way.

Vaughn was one of three different Aggies to catch six passes in the game as he finished with a career-high 49 yards and a career-best two touchdowns on his career-high six receptions. Senior WR **Justin McGriff** had five receptions for 91 yards and one touchdown.

McGriff and the Aggies scored first when he hauled in a 12-yard touchdown pass from Bonner with 7:21 to go in the opening quarter.

However, Brumfield's two touchdown runs gave the Rebels (3-1, 1-0 MW) a 14-7 lead late in the first quarter. UNLV never trailed after that.

Redshirt freshman WR **NyNy Davis** also had a career-high six catches for Utah State as he finished with a career-high 49 yards, while graduate senior WR **Brian Cobbs** had six catches for 83 yards.

Redshirt sophomore TE **Broc Lane**, who was seeing his first significant action of the season after missing last year due to injury, caught a career-high three passes for a career-best 14 yards.

Utah State finished the game with 101 more yards of total offense as it had 421 yards (325 passing, 96 rushing) as compared to 320 (217 passing, 103 rushing) for UNLV, but USU committed six turnovers in the game with five interceptions and one fumble, while the Rebels did not turn it over once during the game. The Aggies also gave UNLV the ball at the USU 5-yard line following a bad snap on a punt as it failed to convert three of its five fourth-down attempts.

Jeff Weimer led the Rebels in receiving with five catches for 57 yards, while Aidan Robbins had 81 yards rushing and a touchdown on 28 carries.

Junior ILB **MJ Tafisi** and senior ILB **AJ Vongphachanh** led the Aggies on the defensive side of the ball with 10 tackles apiece.

Vongphachanh also had one catch for 12 yards on a fake punt, which led to a first down. Junior P **Stephen Kotsanlee** completed the pass to Vongphachanh.

Utah State senior DT **Hale Motu'apuaka** added seven tackles, including 2.0 sacks and 2.5 tackles for loss, for the Aggies, all of which were career highs.

The Aggie defense finished the game with a season-high 4.0 sacks and a season-best 12.0 tackles for loss, and tied its season high with four pass breakups.

Redshirt freshman S **Ike Larsen** also blocked his second punt of the season, which resulted in a safety for Utah State.

Junior QB Cooper Legas (5) was 19-of-31 passing for 188 yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions in Utah State's 38-26 loss at No. 19 BYU. Legas also rushed for 52 yards, including a touchdown.

**PROVO, Utah** - Junior QB Cooper Legas passed for 188 yards and two touchdowns, and ran for another score, but it wasn't enough as Utah State wrapped up non-conference play with a 38-26 loss at No. 19 BYU on Thursday, Sept. 29, 2022.

Legas, playing in place of the injured Logan Bonner, made his first-career start for the Aggies (1-4) and completed 19-of-31 passes. He also threw two interceptions. His favorite target on the night was graduate senior WR Brian Cobbs, who caught a career-high 10 passes for 96 yards and a career-best two touchdowns.

Jaren Hall was 17-of-27 for 273 yards and three touchdowns for the Cougars (4-1), who outscored Utah State 21-9 in the second half.

BYU finished with 396 yards of total offense, while Utah State tallied 394 total yards, including 206 on the ground.

The Aggies scored on their opening possession for the first time this season when Legas led them on a 12-play, 75-yard drive that he capped with a 7-yard touchdown run, the first of his career. The native of Orem, Utah, finished with a career-high 54 yards rushing on a career-best 20 carries.

Graduate senior RB Calvin Tyler Jr. led all rushers in the game with 104 yards on 18 carries for his second 100-yard rushing game this season and the sixth of his career. Freshman RB Robert Briggs added 10 carries for 46 yards for USU.

Tyler also caught two passes for 18 yards, while junior WR Terrell Vaughn had five catches for 46 yards.

BYU tied the game at 7-all with 9:56 remaining in the first quarter, then grabbed a 14-7 lead less than two minutes later when Max Tooley intercepted a pass from Legas and returned it 34 yards for a touchdown.

A season-long 50-yard field goal from graduate senior PK Connor Coles cut the deficit to 14-10 with 9:34 left in the second quarter. Utah State moved back in front 17-14 when Cobbs caught the first of his two touchdowns, a 14-yarder from Legas with 5:04 remaining.

Coles also made a 33-yard field goal in the third quarter as he finished the game scoring eight points.

The two teams went into the halftime break knotted at 17-apiece after Jake Oldroyd made a 45-yard field goal with 2:32 left in the quarter.

BYU scored 21 of the first 24 points in the second half to pull away from the Aggies, who fought until the very end. Cobbs caught a 27-yard touchdown pass from Legas with 1:09 to go in the game, making it 38-26.

Utah State elected to go for a two-point conversion, but did not get it. The Aggies also tried an onside kick, but the Cougars recovered and ran out the remainder of the clock.

Senior ILB AJ Vongphachanh and graduate senior S Hunter Reynolds had nine tackles apiece for the Aggies, while junior ILB MJ Tafisi added eight stops.

Reynolds also had a tackle for loss and pass breakup for the Aggies, while Tafisi had 1.0 sacks and Vongphachanh had 0.5 TFLs.

Redshirt freshman S Ike Larsen also had a sack for USU, while junior OLB Kaleo Neves tied his career-high with 1.5 tackles for loss.

Junior QB Cooper Legas (5) was 18-of-23 passing for 215 yards with two touchdowns in Utah State's 34-27 Mountain West home win against Air Force. Legas also rushed for 76 yards and another score.

**LOGAN, Utah** - Defending Mountain West champion Utah State kept its hopes alive of repeating with a 34-27 Homecoming victory against Air Force on Merlin Olsen Field at Maverik Stadium on Saturday, Oct. 8, 2022.

Junior QB **Cooper Legas** passed for a career-high 215 yards and a career-high-tying two touchdowns and ran for another score as the Aggies snapped a four-game losing streak.

Legas completed 18 of his 23 pass attempts, and rushed for a career-high 76 yards on 13 carries. His 32-yard touchdown run with 7:00 remaining in the game gave Utah State (2-4, 1-1 Mountain West) a 34-24 lead.

Air Force (4-2, 1-2 MW) cut it to 34-27 with 1:42 remaining to after Matthew Dapore drilled a 51-yard field goal. The Falcons attempted an onside kick, but senior WR **Justin McGriff** recovered it for Utah State, which improved to 57-33-2 all-time in Homecoming games.

Legas and the Aggies finished with 414 yards of total offense, including 199 on the ground. Graduate senior RB **Calvin Tyler Jr.** led Utah State with 109 yards rushing on 19 carries. He scored on a 21-yard touchdown run to give the hosts a 20-17 lead late in the third quarter.

Defensively, Utah State limited Air Force to 359 yards of total offense, including 264 on the ground on 55 carries.

Utah State senior CB **Ajani Carter** tied his career-high with seven tackles, and forced two fourth quarter turnovers with a fumble and interception, while senior ILB **AJ Vongphachanh** and junior ILB **MJTafisi** had 13 stops apiece. Graduate senior CB **Andre Grayson** also had seven tackles and he recovered Carter's forced fumble. Junior DE **Byron Vaughns** added a season-high seven tackles, while sophomore DT **Tavian Coleman** had a career-high five stops.

Air Force QB Haaziq Daniels passed for 95 yards and a touchdown. He also rushed for 34 yards and a score. Brad Roberts led the Falcons in rushing with 136 yards and a touchdown on 29 carries.

Daniels' 40-yard touchdown pass to Amari Terry put Air Force in front 24-20 with 13:33 left in the game, but USU scored the next 14 points to rally for the win.

The Aggies went back in front for good, 34-27, on a 34-yard touchdown pass from Legas to junior WR **Terrell Vaughn** with 10:15 to go.

The Aggies scored on their first three possessions of the game, including a 31-yard touchdown pass from Legas to graduate senior WR **Brian Cobbs** that gave Utah State a 7-0 lead with 9:29 remaining in the first quarter.

Cobbs finished with a career-high 136 yards on eight catches, while Vaughn caught four passes for 52 yards.

Air Force tied it at 7-all on a 1-yard touchdown run by Roberts, but graduate senior PK **Connor Coles** regained the lead for Utah State courtesy of a 30-yard field goal with 1:18 left in the first.

The Falcons grabbed their first lead of the night when Daniels scored from a yard out on a quarterback keeper on fourth down, making it 14-10 with 7:02 remaining in the half.

Another 30-yard field goal from Coles pulled the Aggies to within 14-13 with 2:41 to go in the half.

Graduate senior RB Calvin Tyler Jr. (4) posted his third-straight 100-yard game as he rushed for 129 yards on 24 carries in Utah State's 17-13 Mountain West road win at Colorado State.

**FORT COLLINS, Colorado** - Utah State true freshman QB **Bishop Davenport** passed for 41 yards and rushed for 29 more, including a 4-yard touchdown, to help the Aggies rally for a 17-13 win at Colorado State on Saturday, Oct. 15, 2022.

Davenport, the Aggies' fourth-string quarterback at the start of the season, was on the field after junior **Cooper Legas**, who started against the Rams (1-5, 1-1 Mountain West), left the game due to injury, as did his backup, sophomore **Levi Williams**.

Davenport's touchdown with 7:34 to go in the third quarter proved to be the game-winner and gave Utah State (3-4, 2-1 MW) a 17-10 lead.

The Aggies, who have won two straight after having lost four in a row, finished with 390 yards of total offense, including 252 on the ground. Graduate senior RB **Calvin Tyler Jr.** led all rushers in the game with 129 yards on 24 carries for his third-straight 100-yard game.

Legas was 9-of-12 passing for 85 yards and a 32-yard touchdown to senior WR **Justin McGriff** that gave Utah State a 7-3 lead with 1:54 to go in the first quarter.

McGriff finished with a game-high 63 yards on four receptions, while junior WR **Terrell Vaughn** had a game-best six catches for 48 yards.

Defensively, junior ILB **MJ Tafisi** had a team-high 12 tackles, including 1.5 tackles for loss, while graduate junior DE **Daniel Grzesiak** had five stops, including 3.5 tackles for loss and 3.0 sacks – both career highs – to go along with a forced fumble, pass breakup and quarterback hurry. Senior ILB **AJ Vongphachanh** added nine tackles, including 0.5 tackles for loss, one pass breakup and one quarterback hurry.

Colorado State struck first courtesy of a 23-yard field goal by Michael Boyle with 11:45 to go in the opening quarter. The points came after Cam'Ron Carter intercepted a pass by Legas and returned it 39 yards to the Aggies' 29-yard line.

Colorado State led 10-7 at the break following a 26-yard touchdown run by Avery Morrow, who gained 92 yards on the ground in the first half alone.

Graduate senior PK **Connor Coles** made a 48-yard field goal with 10:57 remaining in the third quarter to tie the game at 10-apiece. Coles also missed a pair of field goals from 45 and 52 yards.

Boyle's final field goal of the night, a 35-yarder, pulled the Rams to within 17-13 with 14:08 to go in the game, following an Aggie fumble inside the 20-yard line.

Colorado State's final offensive possession of the night ended when Utah State graduate senior S **Gurvan Hall Jr.** intercepted a pass by Rams quarterback Giles Pooler. Davenport and the Aggies ran the final 5:16 off the clock from there to preserve the road victory.

Colorado State managed just 262 yards of total offense (99 rushing, 163 passing) and scored six of its points off Aggie turnovers. USU also held CSU to 2-of-15 on third down and 1-for-3 on fourth down attempts.

Colorado State also blocked an Aggie punt that was recovered at the USU 20-yard line, but the Rams ended that possession with a missed field goal.

Defensively, Utah State finished the game with 3.0 sacks and 8.0 tackles for loss to go along with a season-high seven pass breakups. The Aggies also had three quarterback hurries to go along with a forced fumble and interception.

Former Utah State QB Andrew Peasley, now in his first season with the Cowboys, was 13-of-26 passing for 199 yards through air, to go along with 29 yards rushing on six carries.

Wyoming RB Titus Swen led all rushers in the game with 160 yards and three touchdowns on 28 carries.

Wyoming finished with 529 yards of total offense (330 rushing, 199 passing) and held USU to just 217 yards (113 rushing, 104 passing). Both teams also had one turnover in the game as the Aggies recovered a muffed punt that set up Davenport's touchdown, while the Cowboys intercepted a pass early in the third quarter.

Tyler finished the game with 98 all-purpose yards as he had two receptions for 15 yards to go along with his 15 carries for 83 yards, while Davenport was 17-of-26 passing for 104 yards and rushed for 19 yards on 18 carries.

Graduate senior WR Brian Cobbs had five catches for 45 yards for the Aggies, while junior WR Terrell Vaughn had five receptions for 21 yards.

The Cowboys scored the first 14 points of the game before Davenport scored on a five-yard run to make it 14-7 with 3:48 to go in the second quarter.

Wyoming led 17-7 at the break, though, after John Hoyland kicked a 43-yard field goal.

Utah State pulled to within 17-14 with 7:09 remaining in the third quarter after Tyler scored on a 31-yard run. Unfortunately for the injury-riddled Aggies, that's as close as they would get the rest of the way.

Hoyland kicked his second field goal of the game, this time from 51 yards out, to make it 20-14 with 3:06 left in the third, and Swen cemented the win with his third rushing touchdown of the night, a six-yarder with 4:11 remaining in the fourth.

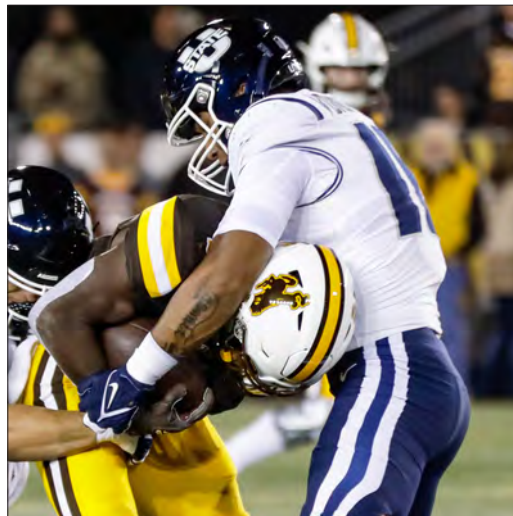
The Cowboys had possession of the ball for more than 35 minutes on the night, and tallied 28 first downs – more than double the Aggies' 13.

Utah State senior ILB AJ Vongphachanh finished with a game-high 10 tackles, which included a career-high-tying 1.0 sacks and 1.5 tackles for loss, while graduate senior S Hunter Reynolds and junior OLB Kaleo Neves added eight stops apiece. Those eight tackles for Neves were a career high.

Graduate junior DE Daniel Grzesiak also tied his career high in tackles with six, while freshman ILB Max Alford had a career-high six stops and red-shirt freshman ILB Sione Moe had a career-high four tackles, including his first-career sack. Junior DE Patrick Joyner Jr. tied his career high with four tackles and sophomore DE John Ward tied his career high with three stops.

Graduate senior S Gurvan Hall Jr. tied his career high with two pass breakups, and junior CB Jamie Nance recovered his first-career fumble following a muffed punt.

Junior P Stephen Kotsanlee had a career high five punts of at least 50 yards, to go along with three punts that were downed inside the 20-yard line.

Graduate senior PK Connor Coles (59) had a career-high-tying 15 points as he scored his first-career touchdown on a 6-yard run on a fake field goal. He was also 2-of-3 on field goals and 3-for-3 on extra points in Utah State's 27-10 Mountain West home win against New Mexico.

**LOGAN, Utah** - Utah State successfully orchestrated both a fake punt and fake field, the latter resulting in the go-ahead touchdown in the third quarter, as the Aggies scored the final 20 points in a 27-10 Mountain West win against New Mexico on Saturday, Nov. 5, 2022, on Merlin Olsen Field at Maverik Stadium.

New Mexico (2-7, 0-5 MW) was leading Utah State (4-5, 3-2 MW) 10-7 with 10:51 remaining in the third quarter when graduate senior PK **Connor Coles** lined up for a 23-yard field goal attempt. Once junior P/H **Stephen Kotsanlee** fielded the ball from sophomore LS **Jacob Garcia**, he wasted little time flipping the pigskin to Coles, who ran untouched into the end zone from six yards out, putting the Aggies on top 14-10.

Not only did Coles score his first-career touchdown on the cold and rainy day, but he also booted a pair of field goals from 49 and 27 yards out, respectively, and made good on all three of his extra points as he tied his career-high with 15 points scored.

Kotsanlee also converted a first down on a fake punt as he rushed for 10 yards on a fourth-and-3 play from USU's own 41-yard line in the second quarter.

Utah State finished the game converting all four of its fourth down attempts, which is a season high. USU was just 3-of-17 on third down, while New Mexico was 6-of-16.

Kotsanlee punted six times on the day for an average of 44.5 yards, including a long of 58. He also had one punt downed inside the 20-yard line.

Utah State's defense also found the end zone as graduate senior S **Hunter Reynolds** returned a fumble 55 yards for a touchdown, giving the hosts a 27-10 lead with 3:00 left in the game.

Reynolds finished with a game-high 10 tackles as the Aggies limited the Lobos to just 258 yards of total offense – a season low for a USU opponent, which included just 42 passing yards. It was Reynolds second double-digit tackle outing of the season and the third of his career, and his second-career fumble recovery.

Junior CB **Jamie Nance** recovered his second fumble in as many games on a muffed punt in the third quarter that led to Coles' 49-yard field goal to extend USU's lead to 17-10.

The Aggies' lone offensive touchdown came on their opening possession courtesy of a 38-yard pass from junior QB **Cooper Legas** to junior WR **Terrell Vaughn**, making it 7-0.

Legas was 13-of-27 passing for 149 yards and the one touchdown as Utah State totaled 280 yards of total offense. Vaughn finished with five catches for a career-high 83 yards, while

freshman RB **Robert Briggs** led the Aggies' ground game with 82 yards rushing on a season-high 19 carries. Graduate senior WR **Brian Cobbs** added four receptions for 31 yards.

Freshman ILB **Max Alford** had a career-high eight tackles, including a career-best 1.5 tackles for loss, while redshirt freshman S **Ike Larsen** also recorded a career-high eight stops.

Graduate junior DE **Daniel Grzesiak** tied his career-high with six tackles, which included 1.0 sacks, while junior DT **Poukesi Vakauta** tied his career-high with three stops. Redshirt junior S **Dominik Tatum** added a season-high six tackles.

Utah State finished the game with 3.0 sacks and 6.0 tackles for loss, while New Mexico had 4.0 sacks and 8.0 tackles for loss.

HONOLULU, O'ahu - Junior QB Cooper Legas had a career-high 238 passing yards and a career-best three touchdowns, graduate senior RB Calvin Tyler Jr., had 163 all-purpose yards and two scores, and redshirt freshman S Ike Larsen intercepted a career-high two passes, returning one for a touchdown, in Utah State's 41-34 Mountain West win at Hawai'i on Saturday, Nov. 12, 2022.

Legas was 16-of-24 passing and threw all three of his touchdowns in the first half as Utah State held a 24-10 lead at the break.

Tyler posted his fifth 100-yard rushing game of the season and the ninth of his career as he gained 113 yards on 25 carries and scored on a 4-yard run in the third quarter to give the visitors a 31-17 lead. Tyler also had a career-high-tying three receptions for a career-best 50 yards, including a 35-yard touchdown in the second quarter.

Utah State finished the game with 374 yards of total offense (136 rushing, 238 passing), but managed just 74 yards in the second half, including negative four yards in the fourth quarter. Graduate senior WR Brian Cobbs led USU with 74 receiving yards on five catches.

Hawai'i had 541 yards of offense (235 rushing, 306 passing), including 275 yards in the fourth quarter alone. However, the Rainbow Warriors committed four turnovers in the game with three interceptions and a fumble, and were penalized 10 times for 115 yards.

The Aggies (5-5, 4-2 MW) took less than 30 seconds to score in their first drive of the game as Legas connected with junior TE Josh Sterzer on a 68-yard touchdown with 10:44 to go in the first quarter.

A 21-yard field goal from graduate senior PK Connor Coles with just under two minutes left in the period extended the USU lead to 10-0.

Hawai'i (2-9, 1-5 MW) scored a touchdown in the opening minute of the second quarter, to trim the margin to 10-7. However, Legas connected with yet another tight end, finding redshirt sophomore Broc Lane in the end zone for the 16-yard touchdown on its next drive.

With just over a minute and a half to play in the second quarter, Legas connected with Tyler on fourth-and-two for the 35-yard touchdown that gave Utah State the 24-10 lead heading into the half.

Hawai'i forced a three-and-out on the Aggies opening drive of the third quarter before making it a one-score game with a four-yard touchdown run to trim the USU lead to 24-17.

Utah State responded by scoring on both of its next two drives as Tyler scored on a four-yard run and Coles booted a 42-yard field goal to give the Aggies the 34-17 lead.

A Hawai'i touchdown early in the fourth trimmed the margin to 34-24.

Larsen then intercepted his second pass of the game and returned it 36 yards for his first-career touchdown to give the visitors a 41-24 lead with 4:33 to play.

The Rainbow Warriors scored twice more on a 69-yard rushing touchdown and 19-yard field goal, but USU held on for the 41-34 win.

Defensively, graduate senior S Hunter Reynolds had a team-high nine tackles and an interception. Larsen finished with six tackles, including a game-high 2.0 tackles for loss, one of which was a sack, and two interceptions. And, senior CB Michael Anyanwu had seven tackles. Junior CB Jamie Nance recovered his third fumble in as many games, all via muffed punts, which led to a USU field goal.

**LOGAN, Utah** - Graduate senior RB Calvin Tyler Jr. scored on a 3-yard run with 2:49 left in the game to lift Utah State to a thrilling 35-31 Senior Night win against San José State on Saturday, Nov. 19, 2022, on Merlin Olsen Field at Maverik Stadium.

With the win, the Aggies (6-5, 5-2 Mountain West) became bowl eligible for the 10th time in the last 12 years.

Utah State extended its winning streak to 10 in a row against San José State and is now 20-20-1 all-time against the Spartans, including 12-8 at home.

Tyler led Utah State's rushing attack as he gained 125 yards and a career-high three touchdowns on 30 carries. As a team, the Aggies finished with 186 yards rushing. Junior QB Cooper Legas was 23-of-35 for a career-high 244 yards and one touchdown, to go along with two interceptions. Legas also had career highs in both completions and attempts.

Utah State graduate senior WR Brian Cobbs caught a career-high-tying 10 passes for 122 yards as the Aggies finished with 430 yards of offense and held the Spartans to 341 yards (257 passing, 84 rushing).

True freshman ILB Max Alford paced the Aggies' defense with seven tackles, including 0.5 tackles for loss. Graduate junior DE Daniel Grzesiak added six stops, including 2.0 tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks, while senior DT Hale Motu'apuaka had a career-high-tying 2.0 sacks and 2.5 tackles for loss as part of his five total stops.

After the Spartans (6-4, 4-3 MW) opened the scoring courtesy of a 36-yard touchdown pass from Chevan Cordeiro to Elijah Cooks, Utah State reeled off 21 unanswered points and was seemingly in control.

Tyler scored on a 14-yard touchdown run to give the Aggies a 7-6 lead late in the first quarter, then found the end zone from two yards out to make it 14-6 with 5:29 left in the second quarter.

Utah State went up 21-6 just before the half when junior CB Jaden Smith fielded a blocked SJSU punt by redshirt freshman S Ike Larsen and returned it 56 yards for a touchdown.

However, the Spartans answered back just before intermission when Cordeiro found Cooks again, this time from 29 yards out, to make it a 21-13 ballgame.

San José State's Taren Schive kicked a 41-yard field goal with 9:22 to go in the third quarter to pare the deficit to 21-16, but Utah State seemingly regained control four minutes later when senior WR Justin McGriff hauled in a 19-yard touchdown pass from Legas, giving the hosts a 28-16 lead.

The Spartans wouldn't go away, though. They scored the next 15 points of the game to move in front for the first time since the first quarter, 31-28 with 6:42 remaining in the contest.

That's when Tyler took over.

On Utah State's go-ahead possession, Tyler touched the ball on six of the team's nine-play drive, accounting for 25 yards, one first down and the game-winning touchdown.

The game wasn't cemented in the Aggies favor, though, until Utah State's defense forced the Spartans to turn the ball over on downs after just four plays on the ensuing possession. USU ran out the remainder of the clock and was aided by a roughing the kicker penalty on a successful field goal.

Utah State's defense finished the game with a season-high five sacks to go along with six pass breakups.

**BOISE, Idaho** - Junior QB Cooper Legas passed for a career-high 306 yards, while junior WR Terrell Vaughn had a career-best 214 all-purpose yards and scored a pair of touchdowns in Utah State's 42-23 Mountain West loss at Boise State on Friday, Nov. 25, 2022.

Following a 41-yard pass from Legas to senior WR Justin McGriff, Utah State had it first-and-10 at Boise State's 15-yard line only down 28-23. A 4-yard run on first down by graduate senior RB Calvin Tyler Jr. moved the ball to the 11, but that's as close as the Aggies would get the rest of the way.

An incomplete pass on second down, followed by a loss of three yards on a quarterback keeper on third down, had Utah State facing a fourth-and-9 play with 1:33 to go. One play later, the drive ended when Legas was intercepted by Boise State's Gabe Hunter, giving the ball to the Broncos at their own 10 with 1:28 remaining.

The Broncos (9-3, 8-0 Mountain West) then proceeded to score two touchdowns within a span of 38 seconds on a 91-yard run by QB Taylen Green and a 48-yard interception return by Seyi Oladipo.

Green accounted for five total touchdowns as he also completed 14-of-23 passes for 220 yards and four touchdowns.

Legas was 23-of-40 for 306 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions as he had career highs in completions, attempts and yards. His favorite target on the day was Vaughn, who caught a career-high eight passes for a career-best 148 yards, including a career-long 75-yard touchdown that pulled Utah State to within 28-17 with 10 seconds remaining in the third quarter.

Vaughn also rushed for a career-high 22 yards on a career-best four carries and scored on a 3-yard run for his first-career rushing touchdown at the end of the first half, sending the Aggies (6-6, 5-3) into the locker room trailing 21-7.

A 22-yard field goal by graduate senior PK Connor Coles with 10:22 left in the third made it 21-10. After Vaughn pulled Utah State to within 11 with his second touchdown of the day, Tyler scored on an 8-yard run to make it 28-23 with 7:59 left in the fourth. The Aggies attempted a two-point conversion, but were unsuccessful.

Tyler rushed for 65 yards on 18 carries to give him 1,043 yards in his career, becoming just the 16th player in school history to rush for 1,000 yards in a single season.

Vaughn finished with a career-best 214 all-purpose yards – the most by an Aggie since Deven Thompkins had 242 at New Mexico State last season.

Cobbs added seven receptions for 75 yards, while McGriff finished the game with a career-high-tying six receptions for 76 yards.

Utah State finished with 468 yards of total offense (306 passing, 162 rushing) – 40 more than Boise State (208 rushing, 220 passing) – and had nine more first downs (24-15). The Aggies also possessed the ball for more than 34 minutes on the day.

Defensively, Utah State was paced by graduate senior S Hunter Reynolds, who had 10 tackles, while senior ILB AJVongphachanh had seven tackles. Junior DE Byron Vaughns added six tackles, including a career-best 3.5 tackles for loss and 1.0 sacks.

Utah State finished the game with 1.0 sacks and 7.0 tackles for loss, to go along with three pass breakups and two quarterback hurries.

**DALLAS, Texas** - Utah State managed just 261 yards of total offense as it lost to Memphis, 38-10, in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl, held at Gerald J. Ford Stadium on the SMU Campus in Dallas Texas, on Tuesday, Dec. 29, 2022.

Memphis QB Seth Henigan passed for 284 yards and three first-half touchdowns, while Jevyon Ducker rushed for 83 yards and two scores, as the Tigers amassed 430 yards of total offense (284 passing, 146 rushing).

Henigan was 15-of-21 for 217 yards and three touchdowns in the first half alone for the Tigers, who finished their season at 7-6. Eddie Lewis was on the receiving end of two of those touchdowns as he caught five passes for 83 yards on the day.

Junior QB Cooper Legas started for the Aggies (6-7), but suffered a game-ending injury in the third quarter and was replaced by true freshman QB Bishop Davenport. Legas was 7-of-12 passing for 34 yards and one interception, while Davenport was 7-of-9 passing for 100 yards with one touchdown and one interception. Sophomore QB Levi Williams also saw his first action since suffering a injury in game seven at Colorado State back in mid-October, and was 1-of-2 passing for one yard and one interception.

Davenport's 44-yard touchdown pass to graduate senior WR Brian Cobbs pulled Utah State to within 24-10 with 11:04 to go in the game.

The Aggies then attempted an onside kick, but the Tigers recovered and put two more touchdowns on the board to thwart off any chance of a comeback by Utah State.

Cobbs finished with six catches for 79 yards, while graduate senior RB Calvin Tyler Jr. ended his Aggie career by rushing for 79 yards on 16 carries. Junior WR Terrell Vaughn caught four passes for 34 yards, while Legas added 25 rushing yards on 12 carries.

Utah State finished with 261 total yards - 135 via the air and 126 on the ground.

Senior ILB AJ Vongphachanh had nine tackles and a career-high 2.5 tackles for loss, while true freshman ILB Max Alford also had nine tackles, a career high, to go along with a career-best 2.0 tackles for loss. Senior CB Ajani Carter added a career-high eight stops.

Graduate junior DE Daniel Grzesiak had 2.0 sacks and 2.5 tackles for loss to go along with a forced fumble that was recovered by junior DE Byron Vaughns. Vaughns also had 1.0 sacks and 2.0 tackles for loss as part of his season-high seven tackles. Junior DT Poukesi Vakauta also had 1.0 sacks and 1.5 tackles for loss, both career highs.

Utah State finished with a season-high-tying 5.0 sacks and a season-high 14.0 tackles for loss. In fact, those 14.0 TFLs are tied for the second-most in a game in school history.

The Tigers dominated practically every facet of the first half as they outgained the Aggies 273-89, had 10 more first downs (16-6) and maintained possession of the ball for more than 19 minutes.

Memphis cracked the scoreboard first when Chris Howard booted a 26-yard field goal late in the first quarter. Utah State answered back with a 3-pointer of its own courtesy of a career-long 53-yarder from graduate senior PK Connor Coles with 12:13 remaining in the second quarter, which is tied for the eighth-longest in school history.

It was all Tigers after that. Memphis scored touchdowns on its final three drives of the half to take a 24-3 lead into the break.

This was the first meeting between Utah State and Memphis since 1977. The Tigers have won three straight over the Aggies and lead the overall series 5-3.

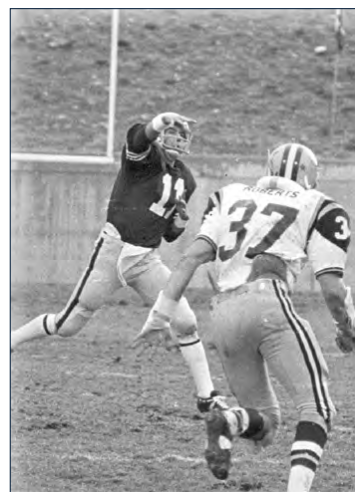

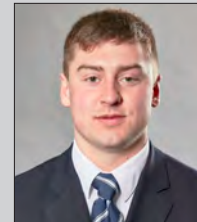

Utah State's 1946 football team played in the school's first-ever bowl as it lost to San Jose State, 20-0, in the Raisin Bowl played in Fresno, Calif., on Jan. 1, 1947. USU finished the 1946 season with a 7-2-1 record and shared the Skyline Conference Championship with a 4-1-1 league mark.

**FRESNO, Calif.** - A powerful San José State college grid team shut out Utah State 20-0 in the second annual Raisin Bowl.

San José State devastated the Aggies 16-7 in first downs, 177-74 in yards rushing, and 110-49 in yards passing.

Utah State's all-conference OC, **Ralph Maughan**, could not offset SJSU's HBs Bert Robinson and Babe Nomura. San José State did all of its scoring in the second and third quarters. Bill Schembel, a substitute halfback, passed to quarterback Bill Jackson for the opening touchdown, then took an aerial from Jackson for score number two. Bill Rhyne, another substitute halfback, crossed the goal line from a yard out to score the third touchdown.

Through the entire game, Utah State threatened to score twice, once in the first quarter when it reached the SJSU 1-yard line, and again at the end of the fourth quarter when the Aggies were within a yard of the goal. Both attempts were denied and Utah State was confined to its own territory throughout most of the game.

Utah State's 1947 football team made it back-to-back bowl appearances as it lost to Pacific 35-21 in the Lodi Grape Bowl. USU went 6-5-0 during the season and finished third in the Skyline Conference with a 3-3-0 record.

**LODI, Calif.** - All-American quarterback Eddie LeBaron led his Pacific Tigers onto victory, defeating the Utah State Aggies 35-21 in Lodi's inaugural Grape Bowl football game.

Only six minutes into the game, Pacific fullback Harry Kane scored on a 72-yard run. Utah State answered with a 70-yard drive to land on Pacific's 1-yard line. Right HB **John Worley** fumbled, allowing halfback Bruce Orvis to recover the ball and run it back 99 yards for Pacific's second score. Early in the second quarter, LeBaron scored on a quarterback sneak from the one, and then threw for a 14-yard touchdown pass to left end John Rohde a few minutes later. Sub halfback Wayne Hardin completed all five conversion attempts.

Utah State came back from halftime facing a 28-0 deficit. QBs **John Caputo** and **John Sorensen** helped the Aggies with two touchdowns, and in the final period, HB **Ernie Groll** intercepted a long pass by LeBaron on the Pacific 42 and ran it back for a pick-six. FB **Buss Williams** converted two of the three attempts.

Utah State ran up 15 first downs against the Pacific's 17. On the ground the Tigers gained 278 yards to the Aggies' 85.

The 1960 Utah State football team finished the season with a 9-2-0 record and won its first of two-straight co-Skyline Conference Championships.

**EL PASO, TEXAS** - New Mexico State, in winning its 15th-straight game, overcame Utah State 20-13 in a bruising Sun Bowl football battle. USU owned a 7-0 lead in the first quarter when HB **Tom Larscheid** ran for 13 yards and a touchdown. The score was set up with a 53-yard punt return by **Ernie Reese**, which set a Sun Bowl record.

New Mexico State answered right back in the second quarter. Quarterback Charley Johnson's 3-yard pitch to Pervis Atkins, along with Atkins' subsequent kick, tied the score.

USU then regained the lead by driving 80 yards in 15 plays with **Dolph Camilli** scoring from the 11. New Mexico State took the lead for the first time in the third quarter when Bob Gaithers ran for a 32-yard touchdown. Johnson led the offense by completing 18-of-26 passes, including two for touchdowns.

Utah State's final effort for victory was denied in the fourth quarter when FB **Doug Mayberry** was stopped short of a first down on a fourth-down play. New Mexico State then ran out the clock.

Johnson threw for 190 yards and was tabbed the Sun Bowl's MVP for the second-straight year. The NMSU defense held the nation's top offense to just 268 total yards.

Utah State's defense was equally as impressive. USU, led by future Hall of Famer **Merlin Olsen**, held the NMSU offense to only 224 yards, including just 44 rushing yards on 32 carries.

The 1961 Utah State football team is the last team in school history to go undefeated during the regular season as the Aggies produced a 9-0-1 mark before losing to Baylor 24-9 in the Gotham Bowl played at the Polo Grounds in New York City. Tackle **Merlin Olsen** was a consensus, first-team All-America and won the 1961 Outland Trophy as the country's top lineman.

**NEW YORK, N.Y.** - Converting four-of-five fumble recoveries into three touchdowns provided Baylor with the win over previously-unbeaten Utah State 24-9.

Baylor's Ronnie Bull scored on a 15-yard touchdown run in the first quarter. Quarterback Don Trull contributed a 2-yard scoring plunge and a 39-yard touchdown pass to end Tom Plumb, and Carl Choate kicked all three conversions and added three points with his 22-yard field goal.

Utah State's first score came in the third quarter when **Jim Turner** kicked a 36-yard field goal. Midway through the final quarter, Ronnie Stanley's pass was intercepted by Utah State's **Bob Novotny** on the Baylor 16. In three plays, Utah State produced a touchdown with **Bill Munson** scoring from the four. An attempted conversion run failed.





Senior QB Anthony Calvillo (13) was named the MVP of the Las Vegas Bowl II as he was 25-of-39 passing for 286 yards and three touchdowns in leading Utah State to its first-ever bowl win with a 42-33 victory against Ball State. Calvillo also rushed for 50 yards on eight carries in the game.

**LAS VEGAS, Nev.** - Senior QB **Anthony Calvillo** tossed three touchdown passes and junior RB **Profail Grier** ran for two scores as Utah State defeated Ball State 42-33 in Las Vegas Bowl II on Dec. 17, 1993, marking the Aggies first bowl victory in their 96-year football history. For Utah State, it was just its fifth bowl game in school history and first since playing in the 1961 Gotham Bowl.

Utah State finished the game with 491 yards of total offense (205-rushing, 286-passing) as compared to 314 yards of total offense (73-rushing, 241-passing) for Ball State. USU recorded 27 first downs in the game and was 10-of-16 on third downs, while BSU had just 14 first downs and went 0-for-11 on third downs. USU also won the time of possession battle, 35:11 to 24:49.

Calvillo completed 25-of-39 passes for 286 yards to earn MVP honors. He also rushed for 50 yards on eight carries. Grier finished the game with 142 rushing yards on 33 carries, to go along with his two scores, and caught two passes for 32 yards. Senior WR **Tony Jenkins** had five catches for 94 yards as eight different Aggies caught passes in the game.

Utah State scored on its first two possessions with drives of 73 and 82 yards, respectively. Calvillo, who completed his first seven passes, hit senior WR **Cotie McMahon** from 22 yards out for the first score just 4:33 into the game. Eight minutes later, Grier reached the end zone on a 3-yard run, capping a 13-play, 82-yard drive that took 5:26 off the clock. With 24 seconds remaining in the first half, senior WR **Aubrey Thompson** scored on a 3-yard pass from Calvillo to make the halftime score 21-0 for USU. On its last drive of the half, USU went 68 yards in 17 plays and used 7:43. The Aggie offense rolled up 329 total yards in the first half and produced 18 first downs.

Ball State scored 10-straight points to open the third quarter on a 7-yard touchdown pass and a 31-yard field goal in the first three minutes, but Utah State got a 15-yard touchdown run from Grier and another touchdown pass from Calvillo, this time to senior WR **Mike Lee** for 16 yards. USU's first touchdown of the third quarter was a 12-play, 75-yard drive that took 5:24, while its second was just a three-play, 24-yard drive in 1:26.

Junior CB **Donald Toomer** iced the game when he returned an interception 32 yards for a score to give the Aggies a 42-19 lead with 11:34 left in the game. Toomer had two interceptions that he returned 39 yards.

Ball State scored the final 14 points of the game on a 2-yard run with 10:34 to play and a 2-yard pass with 5:07 remaining in the contest.

McMahon finished the game with four catches for 54 yards, while Thompson had four catches for 28 yards and Lee added four catches for 48 yards for USU.

Senior CB **Damon Smith** and freshman LB **David Gill** led Utah State with eight tackles apiece, while senior LB **Jermaine Younger** had seven tackles and senior DE **Scott Moala** finished with six stops.

**BOISE, Idaho** - Utah State spotted Cincinnati a 28-point advantage before scoring 19 of the game's final 26 points as the Aggies fell 35-19 in the first Humanitarian Bowl on Dec. 29, 1997.

The Aggies suffered through their second-lowest offensive output of the season in both scoring (16 at Oregon State) and yardage (283 vs. New Mexico) in the game.

Utah State finished the game with just 316 yards of total offense (63-rushing, 253-passing) as compared to 411 total yards (225-rushing, 186-passing) for Cincinnati. The Bearcats also controlled the ball for 42:17 as they converted on 14-of-22 (.636) third downs, while USU had the ball for just 17:43 as it converted just 2-of-10 (.200) third downs. In all, Cincinnati ran 40 more plays (90-50) in the game as it averaged 4.6 yards per play as compared to 6.3 yards per play for USU.

Utah State did not practice outdoors until the two days prior to the game as the Aggies worked out in the USU fieldhouse for the month between the end of the regular season and the bowl game. That rustiness was evident as USU went scoreless in the first half as Cincinnati put up a 21-0 halftime advantage.

Cincinnati's first touchdown of the game was on a 14-yard pass from Chad Plummer to Cornelius Bonner with 4:03 to play in the first quarter. Bonner caught another 14-yard pass, this time from Deontey Kenner, just 48 seconds into the second quarter. The Bearcats' final touchdown of the first half was on a 1-yard run.

After Cincinnati extended its lead to 28-0 with 8:39 to play in the third quarter on a 15-yard run by Plummer, Utah State warmed up, scoring three touchdowns in an eight-minute span, but the Aggies were controlled by a bigger, stronger Cincinnati team. USU's first score came on a 75-yard pass from senior QB **Matt Sauk** to senior WR **Steve Smith** with 7:31 to play in the third quarter. USU scored again late in the third quarter on a 3-yard run by senior RB **Melvin Blue**, and its final touchdown of the day came with 14:18 to play in the game on a 10-yard fumble return by freshman LB **Brent Passey**.

Cincinnati's final touchdown of the game was with 2:28 to play in the third quarter on a 7-yard touchdown run by Orlando Smith to make the score 35-7, before USU scored the final 12 points of the game.

Smith earned USU MVP honors as he had four receptions for 136 yards and a 75-yard touchdown, while also returning two punts for 26 yards and two kickoffs for 58 yards. The game was the final one for head coach **John L. Smith**, who had announced that he had taken the head coaching job at Louisville immediately after the final regular season game at North Texas.

Sauk was 12-of-30 passing for 253 yards with one touchdown and three interceptions. Kenner passed for 124 yards as he completed 10-of-16 passes with one touchdown. Plummer was selected as the Bearcats' MVP after rushing for 53 yards, passing for 62 yards and catching four passes for 64 more yards. Sophomore RB **Demario Brown** was the Aggies' top rusher as he carried the ball 12 times for 56 yards, and senior WR **Nakia Jenkins** added 80 receiving yards on four receptions.

Junior LB **Tony D'Amato** led Utah State with 12 tackles, while junior CB **Johndale Carty** and junior LB **Craig Miller** each posted nine stops.

**BOISE, Idaho-** In a season full of close finishes, the outcome of the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl was no different for Utah State (7-6, 5-3WAC) as Ohio scored with 13 seconds remaining in the fourth quarter to earn a 24-23 win against the Aggies on Dec. 17, 2011, at Bronco Stadium.

After much deliberation on the two plays earlier to get to the goal line, Ohio quarterback Tyler Tettleton scored on a 1-yard touchdown run with 13 seconds left to tie the score at 23-23. The ensuing extra point from Matt Weller gave the Bobcats their first and only lead of the game.

In the Aggies' first bowl game since 1997, senior RB **Michael Smith** ran for a career-high and USU bowl record 157 yards, scoring both of Utah State's rushing touchdowns. Junior RB **Robert Turbin** recorded his eighth 100-yard rushing game of the season with 101 yards.

Utah State ended its historic season with a 7-6 record, its first seven-win season since 1993. The loss snapped the Aggies' five-game winning streak, and gave the Bobcats their first-ever bowl win in their sixth bowl appearance, ending the season 10-4.

The Aggies jumped out to an early 2-0 lead in the first quarter after Tettleton fumbled in the end zone with 9:23 remaining in the first quarter.

USU expanded its lead to 9-0 later in the first quarter when junior QB **Adam Kennedy** connected with senior TE **Tarren Lloyd** for a 3-yard touchdown pass. The USU defense pitched its fourth first-quarter shutout of the season, and second in a row.

Ohio cut that lead to 9-7 early in the second quarter when Derek Roback scored on a 26-yard pass from Tettleton with 4:40 to play in the half. It would be the only score of the second quarter.

The Aggies wasted no time getting on the board in the third quarter when Smith broke off a 63-yard run with 12:19 remaining to put USU up 16-7. It was the longest rush allowed by the highly-touted Ohio defense during the season.

Less than three minutes later, the USU defense was able to hold the Bobcats to a field goal when Matt Weller drilled a 32-yard field goal to cut the Blue and White lead to 16-10.

The high-scoring third quarter continued with Smith scoring his second touchdown of the game on an 11-yard scamper and sophomore PK **Josh Thompson** booted his third extra point of the night to put USU up 23-10 with 5:51 left in the stanza. The frenzied third-quarter scoring wasn't done as Tettleton hit Brazill on a 44-yard scoring strike to pull the Bobcats within 23-17 at the 3:45 mark.

Kennedy was injured late in the third quarter, and freshman QB **Chuckie Keeton** returned under center for the first time since Nov. 5 after starting USU's first eight games of the season, but getting injured in the Hawai'i game. Keeton ran for a 10-yard gain on his first play, but the drive later stalled at midfield.

On USU's first drive of the fourth quarter, Kennedy returned and the Aggies again reached midfield, but couldn't get into scoring territory. The USU defense held Ohio, but Bobcat punter Paul Hershey boomed a 59-yard punt, pinning the Aggies at the USU 7. Utah State couldn't get a first down and had to punt it away to Ohio, and the Bobcats began their winning drive with 2:02 left.

Senior RB Kerwynn Williams (25) rushed for a career-high 235 yards on just 18 carries and scored three touchdowns in leading Utah State to a 41-15 win against Toledo in the 2012 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl. Williams, who added two receptions for 34 yards, was named the game's MVP.

**BOISE, Idaho**- Utah State (11-2, 6-0 WAC) concluded its most successful season in school history with a 41-15 rout of Toledo (9-4, 6-2 MAC) in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl on Dec. 15, 2012, as senior RB Kerwynn Williams was named the game's Most Valuable Player as he ran for a career-best 235 yards and tied his career high with three touchdowns on runs of 63, 5 and 25 yards, all in the fourth quarter.

Utah State led 13-6 heading into the final 15 minutes of play before Toledo cut it to 13-9 following a 29-yard field goal with 7:28 to go. From there it was all USU as Williams scored his first touchdown of the game on a 63-yard run to cap a 2-play, 70-yard drive. Following a three-and-out by the Rockets, Williams rattled off a 56-yard run and then scored from five yards out to give USU a 27-9 advantage. During the drive, Williams accounted for all 62 yards on three carries. Sophomore FS Brian Suite then picked off Toledo's Austin Dantin two plays later, which led to Williams' third touchdown of the quarter on a 25-yard run, upping USU's lead to 34-9 following a 2-play, 39-yard drive. Toledo returned the ensuing kickoff 87 yards for a score, its only touchdown of the day, to cut the deficit to 34-15. Williams then rushed for 32 yards on USU's next offensive play and sophomore RB Joe Hill scored on the Aggies' next play with a 24-yard run for a 2-play, 56-yard drive, making the final score 41-15 as the Aggies scored 28 points in just 5:15.

In the fourth quarter, Utah State gained 228 yards, including 221 on the ground, as Williams rushed for 198 yards on just seven carries to go along with his three touchdowns.

Williams, who ended the game with 269 all-purpose yards, set the Western Athletic Conference record with 6,928 career all-purpose yards to rank 11th in NCAA history at the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) level. Overall, Williams' 235 rushing yards were the second-most in Famous Idaho Potato Bowl history and the 19th-most in a single-game in school history.

Utah State finished with 582 yards of total offense (353-rushing, 229-passing) to rank as the third-most during the year and 14th-most in school history. USU's 353 rushing yards were a season high and the 19th-most in a single-game in school history, while its 28 fourth-quarter points are its most in any quarter since 2011, and tied for the most in any quarter in Famous Idaho Potato Bowl history.

Toledo finished with 315 yards of total offense (173-passing, 142-rushing). Sophomore QB Chuckie Keeton scored Utah State's first touchdown on a 62-yard run in the first quarter to give USU a 7-3 lead after Toledo scored the first points of the game on a 37-yard field goal on its opening series. In all, Keeton rushed for 92 yards on nine carries and added 229 yards through the air as he was 21-of-31 passing to set single-season school records for both completions (275) and passing yards (3,373).

The only other points scored in the first half were on a pair of field goals as Toledo cut the lead to 7-6 early in the second quarter on another 37-yarder, while USU sophomore PK Nick Diaz connected from 27 yards out on the last play of the first half to send the Aggies into the locker room up 10-6.

Diaz added a 44-yard field goal on the Aggies' first possession of the third quarter to up their lead to 13-6 for the only score of the period, before the two teams combined for 37 fourth-quarter points.

Senior LB Bojay Filimoeatu led USU's defense with 11 tackles, while redshirt freshman LB Kyler Fackrell recorded his third interception of the year in the third quarter in the red zone on a pass that was tipped by junior LB Jake Doughty.

In all, Utah State concluded the year with seven-straight wins.

Senior RB **Joey DeMartino (28)** rushed for 143 yards on 23 carries and scored the eventual game-winning touchdown on a 1-yard run in the fourth quarter to lead Utah State to a 21-14 win against No. 24 Northern Illinois in the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl. DeMartino, who added one reception for eight yards, was named the game's Offensive MVP.

**SAN DIEGO, Calif.** - Behind 143 rushing yards from senior RB **Joey DeMartino**, Utah State (9-5) posted a 21-14 win against No. 24 Northern Illinois (12-2) in the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl at Qualcomm Stadium on Dec. 26, 2013.

DeMartino was named the Offensive Most Valuable Player for his efforts, which included one touchdown and a 58-yard rush, a Poinsettia Bowl record. It was DeMartino's seventh 100-yard outing this season.

Senior LB **Jake Doughty** was named the Defensive MVP for his eight tackle, one forced fumble outing. Doughty added 1.5 tackles for loss in the game.

Utah State ended the game with 289 total yards, on 168 rushing yards and 121 passing yards. Northern Illinois had a season-low 315 yards of total offense, tallying 216 yards passing and being limited to 99 yards rushing, also a season low for the Huskies. The 14 points were also a season low for NIU.

Freshman QB **Darell Garretson** was 17-of-28 passing for 121 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions for Utah State, while junior WR **Ronald Butler** and sophomore WR **Brandon Swindall** each had four catches, with Butler tallying 33 yards and Swindall amassing 28 yards and USU's lone touchdown catch.

Junior FS **Brian Suite** led the Aggies' defensive effort with a game-high 11 tackles, one interception and one fumble recovery. Junior LB **Zach Vigil** added nine stops, while redshirt-freshman LB **Nick Vigil** and junior SS **Frankie Sutera** had seven tackles apiece.

Utah State got on the board first with a 31-yard field goal by junior PK **Nick Diaz** for a 3-0 lead with 6:56 left in the first quarter. The field goal was set up by a fumble that was forced by Doughty and recovered by Suite.

Following a missed 37-yard field goal by Northern Illinois, Diaz connected on his second field goal of the game from 39 yards to tie the Poinsettia Bowl record for longest field goal and a 6-0 Aggie advantage just 51 seconds into the second quarter.

Northern Illinois got on the board with a 2-yard scamper by Jordan Lynch with 8:17 left in the second quarter for a 7-6 lead, which they took into halftime.

The Aggie defense made a sudden change on NIU's opening possession of the second half, as Suite intercepted Lynch on the first play from scrimmage, setting up the USU offense at the NIU 31. Later, Garretson hit Swindall for a 5-yard touchdown and Diaz drilled the extra point for a 13-7 USU lead with 11:57 remaining in the third quarter.

Garretson was picked off early in the fourth quarter, giving the Huskies the ball at the USU 13, but the Aggie defense bowed up and held them to a field goal attempt, which they missed for their second miss of the night.

Utah State took over and drove 80 yards in 16 plays that culminated in a 1-yard touchdown run by DeMartino in a drive that took 7:19 off the clock. Garetson then hit sophomore WR **JoJo Natson** for the two-point conversion and a 21-7 Aggie advantage with 4:14 left.

Northern Illinois pulled to within 21-14 with 1:44 left following a 15-yard touchdown pass, but the ensuing on-side kick was recovered by Swindall to seal the win.

Lynch, who finished third for the Heisman Trophy, was 20-of-35 passing for 216 yards and one touchdown, but just 39 yards rushing on 18 carries, for his second-fewest rushing yards of the season. Lynch was also sacked twice by the Aggie defense, tying the most allowed by NIU on the year.



Senior LB **Jake Doughty (51)** had 1.5 tackles for loss as part of his eight total tackles and added a forced fumble against the Huskies as he was named the game's Defensive MVP.

**ALBUQUERQUE, N.M.** - Freshman QB Kent Myers rushed for a career-high 15 times for 70 yards with one touchdown and Utah State gained 279 yards on the ground en route to its 21-6 Gildan New Mexico Bowl win against UTEP at University Stadium on Dec. 20, 2014.

The victory was Utah State school record third-straight win in a bowl game. The Aggies finished the season with a 10-4 record for the second-most wins in a single season in school history. USU was playing in its fourth-straight bowl game, which is also a school record.

Myers was named the Offensive Most Valuable Player of the game as he was 5-of-12 passing for 68 yards, to go along with his 70 rushing yards and one touchdown.

Senior LB Zach Vigil was named the Defensive Most Valuable Player as he finished with 11 tackles, which included 1.0 tackle for loss, while adding one pass breakup and one quarterback hurry. Vigil ended his career with 389 tackles to rank fifth all-time in school history. Vigil also ended his career as the school leader in tackles for loss with 43.5, while his 20.5 tackles for loss this season tie the Mountain West single-season record. Overall, it was Vigil's ninth double-digit tackle outing of the season and the 20th of his career.

Utah State finished the game with 347 yards of total offense, as its 279 rushing yards are its third-most in a game this season, while its 68 passing yards are a season low.

Senior WR Ronald Butler rushed for a career-high 69 yards on just two carries, including a career-long rush of 61 yards. Senior RB Joe Hill added 50 yards on six carries and one touchdown, while junior WR JoJo Natson had 40 rushing yards on five carries, and sophomore LB Nick Vigil gained 34 yards on eight carries with one touchdown.

Utah State had just two players make receptions in the game as junior WR Hunter Sharp caught three passes for 21 yards, while Natson had two catches for 47 yards. With his three receptions, Sharp finished the season tied for ninth all-time in school history with 66 catches, while Natson became the 32nd player in USU history with 1,000 career receiving yards.

UTEP was limited to just 275 yards of total offense, the third-fewest allowed by USU this season. The Miners finished with just 126 passing yards, which is the second-fewest allowed by Utah State this year. Aaron Jones led the Miners with 88 rushing yards on 25 carries.

UTEP scored the first points of the game on a 32-yard field goal by Jay Mattox late in the first quarter after it completed a 53-yard pass on a third-and-10 from its own 26-yard line.

Utah State answered UTEP's scoring drive on its next possession as Myers scored on a 48-yard run to cap a three-play, 75-yard drive that took just 1:18 off the clock.

Both teams had a chance to put points on the board late in the second quarter, but UTEP fumbled the snap on a 25-yard field goal attempt and USU missed a 28-yard field goal attempt on the final play of the half.

Utah State scored its second touchdown of the game on its opening drive of the third quarter as Vigil scored on a 3-yard run to cap a seven-play, 75-yard drive.

UTEP's final points of the game came late in the fourth quarter on a Mattox 34-yard field goal following a 16-play, 54-yard drive that took 6:56 off the clock.

Utah State put the game away on the next series as it drove 65 yards in just four plays as Hill scored on an 11-yard run to seal the win.

Senior FS Brian Suite had 10 tackles for his fourth-career double-digit tackle outing, while junior CB Deshane Hines added a career-high six tackles, and fellow junior CB Tyler Floyd had a career-high four tackles and recorded his first-career interception.

**BOISE, Idaho-** In his final game as an Aggie, redshirt senior QB **Chuckie Keeton** set another school record, but it still wasn't enough for Utah State (6-7) to overcome three turnovers and several missed opportunities in the red zone in a 23-21 loss to Akron (8-5) in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl on Dec. 22, 2015, at Albertsons Stadium.

With the loss, the Aggies had their school-record three-game bowl winning streak snapped. Utah State was playing in its school-record fifth-consecutive bowl game.

Keeton completed 14-of-25 passes for 109 yards with one touchdown and one interception. With his 108 yards of total offense against the Zips, the native of Houston, Texas, became the school's all-time leader in total offense with 8,803 career yards.

Keeton's lone touchdown pass came with 1:12 remaining in the game, a 2-yarder to senior WR **Brandon Swindall** that pulled Utah State to within 23-21. Overall, Keeton's 62-career touchdown passes are also a school best.

After a failed on-side kick attempt, Utah State forced an Akron punt and took over on its own 12-yard line with six seconds remaining in the game. Keeton completed an 8-yard pass to senior WR **Hunter Sharp**, but the clock ran out following a couple of backward laterals.

Sophomore QB Thomas Woodson was 14-of-29 for 168 yards and one interception for Akron, which won its first-ever bowl game.

Like Keeton, sophomore QB **Kent Myers** also completed 14 passes on 20 attempts for 123 yards and two touchdowns as USU had two quarterbacks each throw for 100 yards in the same game for the first time since 1996.

Sharp caught a Utah State bowl-record 11 passes for 93 yards and a touchdown, while **Devante Mays** led all rushers in the game with 124 yards on 12 carries.

Defensively, the Aggies were led by senior LB **LT Filiaga** and senior NG **David Moala**, who had eight tackles apiece. Moala, who also had a career-best 2.5 tackles for loss and 0.5 sacks, tied his career high with those eight stops. Sophomore CB **Jalen Davis** recorded USU's lone turnover of the day when he intercepted a pass in the second quarter.

The Aggies took their only lead of the game when they marched 64 yards to paydirt in seven plays to start the third quarter. Sharp capped the drive with a 19-yard touchdown reception from Myers, giving Utah State a 14-13 lead. Myers set up the score with a 27-yard run on third-and-17 from the Zips' 46.

Akron cashed in on USU's third turnover and went in front for good on a 2-yard touchdown run by senior RB Donnell Alexander, making it 20-14 with 5:43 to go in the third.

The Zips increased their lead to 23-14 with 8:15 to go in the fourth when Robert Stein booted a 46-yard field goal, capping a 14-play drive that ate up nearly seven minutes.

Akron struck first on a trick play when redshirt junior WR Tyrell Goodman threw a 14-yard touchdown pass to Woodson for a 7-0 lead just 4:22 into the first quarter.

The Zips made it 10-0 with 2:53 remaining in the second quarter courtesy of a 33-yard field goal by Stein.

However, the Aggies fought back on the ensuing possession when Myers threw a 9-yard touchdown pass to senior Swindall to pull the Aggies within 10-7 with 1:32 left in the half.

Akron added a 29-yard field goal on the last play of the half, following a USU fumble, to make the score 13-7.

In the first half, Utah State twice reached the red zone only to come away empty-handed as Keeton was intercepted and later muffed a snap on a 35-yard field goal attempt.

**TUCSON, Ariz.** - Senior RB **LaJuan Hunt** capped his Utah State (6-7) career by rushing for 133 yards – the most yardage by an Aggie this season – and one touchdown on 20 carries in Utah State's 26-20 overtime loss to New Mexico State in the NOVA Home Loans Arizona Bowl, at Arizona Stadium on Friday, Dec. 29, 2017.

Hunt, who finished his career with 1,846 yards rushing, the 11th-most in school history, and 18 touchdowns, which is tied for the 10th-most, scored on a 1-yard run with 13:28 remaining in the fourth quarter to give the designated home team a 20-13 lead.

New Mexico State RB Larry Rose III scored the game-winning touchdown in overtime on a 21-yard run after Utah State sophomore PK **Dominik Eberle** hit the right upright from 29 yards out.

New Mexico State (7-6) tied it at 20-apiece on an 11-yard touchdown pass from Tyler Rogers to Jaleel Scott with 6:31 remaining. Rogers completed 29-of-54 passes for 191 yards. Rose led the NewMags in both rushing and receiving as he had 142 yards on 16 carries on the ground, to go along with six receptions for 48 yards.

New Mexico State entered the game ranked fourth in the nation averaging 352.6 passing yards per game, but Utah State limited the NewMags to 191 yards – 161.6 below their season average.

The navy-clad Aggies shined defensively as they forced three turnovers, including interceptions by redshirt freshman LB **David Woodward** and senior BS **Dallin Leavitt**, along with a fumble recovery by junior LB **Chase Christiansen**, who led USU with eight tackles, including 1.0 tackles for loss. Leavitt added seven stops, while Woodward had four stops and a career-best three pass breakups.

Redshirt freshman QB **Jordan Love** was 25-of-44, both of which are career highs, for 254 yards. His favorite target was junior WR **Ron'quavion Tarver**, who caught eight passes for 97 yards.

Utah State had numerous chances to put more points on the board, but four missed field goals and a turnover in the red zone after having a first-and-goal at the 1-yard line spelled doom.

The first half started with a bang as the two teams combined to score 17 points in less than a one-minute span, courtesy of a field goal and back-to-back kickoff returns for touchdowns.

New Mexico State's Dylan Brown opened the scoring with a 23-yard field goal to give the designated visitors a 3-0 lead with 11:15 remaining in the first quarter. On the ensuing kickoff, freshman WR **Savon Scarver** returned the kickoff 96 yards for a touchdown, making it 7-3 for USU just 14 seconds later.

Scarver's kickoff return for a touchdown was the first-ever in a bowl game for Utah State and tied for the sixth-longest in school history.

However, USU's lead was short-lived as NMSU returned the next kickoff 100 yards, giving the white-clad Aggies a 10-7 lead.

Those were the only touchdowns of the first half, though. Eberle tied the score at 10-all with a 35-yard field goal, then New Mexico State regained the lead on a 33-yard field goal.

Brown booted a 33-yard field goal to give the NewMags a 13-10 lead with 11:35 left in the half, but Eberle countered with a 30-yard field goal as time expired in the second quarter, sending the two teams into the break deadlocked at 13-apiece.

Sophomore QB Jordan Love (10) was 21-of-43 passing for 359 yards and four touchdowns in Utah State's 52-13 win against North Texas in the New Mexico Bowl. Love, who was named the Offensive MVP, also rushed for a score.

**ALBUQUERQUE, N.M.** - Sophomore QB **Jordan Love** helped put an exclamation mark on one of the best seasons in school history, passing for 359 yards and four touchdowns, to go along with another on the ground, as Utah State blew out North Texas 52-13 in the New Mexico Bowl on Saturday, Dec. 15, at Dreamstyle Stadium.

Love, who earned Offensive MVP honors, ended the season with a school-record 3,567 yards passing. Love also set a trio of school records for a bowl game with his 362 yards of total offense, 359 yards passing and four touchdown passes.

Utah State (11-2), which tied the school record for most wins in a single season, set a Mountain West record with 618 points scored, breaking the old mark of 608 set by BYU in 2001. The Aggies also accomplished the feat in one less game.

The 52 points scored by Utah State, which racked up 556 yards of total offense – 359 through the air and 197 on the ground – tied the New Mexico Bowl record and set the school record for a bowl game.

Interim head coach **Frank Maile** gets credit for the win as Utah State played the game with only four full-time coaches, as well as the team's graduate assistants, on the sideline after former head coach **Matt Wells** left for Texas Tech, taking many staff members with him.

Defensively, Utah State shut down a North Texas (9-4) offense that lost star quarterback Mason Fine to a hamstring injury early in the game and could never recover as backups Quinn Shanbour and Jason Bean combined to throw four interceptions.

Utah State junior CB **DJ Williams** intercepted two of those passes, which tied a school record in a bowl game. Williams was tabbed the Defensive MVP of the game. Senior S **Aaron Wade** and sophomore LB **David Woodward** had the other picks for the Aggies. Woodward led USU with 10 tackles, while senior LB **Chase Christiansen** had eight and Wade had seven. Junior LB **Tipa Galeai** recorded six tackles, including 3.0 tackles for loss and 2.0 sacks, and forced a fumble, playing in just the second half.

As has been the case all season long, Utah State's quick-strike offense opened the game's scoring as Love threw a 72-yard touchdown pass to senior WR **Aaren Vaughns** to give the designated visitors a 7-0 lead just 40 seconds into the contest. Vaughns finished with two catches – both touchdowns – for 109 yards. He was one of two USU receivers to go over the century mark as senior WR **Jalen Greene** set the school record for a bowl game with 151 yards receiving and one touchdowns on six receptions.

After North Texas tied it at 7-all on a 2-yard touchdown run by DeAndre Torrey, Utah State proceeded to score 31 unanswered points, opening up a 38-7 lead at halftime.

The final three points in that blitz by the Aggies came off the foot of junior PK **Dominik Eberle** via a 42-yard field goal. Eberle scored 10 points in the game and finished the season with a school-record 141 points. Eberle also tied the school record for most field goals attempted in a season with 28.

Junior RB **Gerold Bright** led the Aggies on the ground with 103 yards and a pair of touchdowns, while fellow junior RB **Darwin Thompson** added 93 yards on a career-high 21 carries. Thompson ended the season with 1,044 yards rushing – the 16th-most in school history – becoming the first USU player to rush for 1,000 yards since 2013. Thompson is the 32nd different player in school history to have 1,000 yards rushing.

This was Utah State's seventh bowl game in the past eight seasons. The Aggies improved to 5-8 all-time in bowl games and 2-0 in the New Mexico Bowl.

**FRISCO, Texas** - Utah State closed out the 2019 season with a 51-41 loss to Kent State in the 2019 Tropical Smoothie Cafe Frisco Bowl at Toyota Stadium on Friday, Dec. 20.

Junior QB **Jordan Love** was 30-of-39 passing for 317 yards and three touchdowns, including two to senior graduate transfer WR **Siaosi Mariner**. Love set a USU bowl game record with his 30 completions, while Mariner tied the USU bowl game record for touchdown receptions. Mariner had seven catches for 113 yards. His 11-yard touchdown reception with 3:06 to go in the game pulled the Aggies (7-6) to within 44-41.

However, Kent State recovered a squib kick on the ensuing kickoff and returned it 44 yards, setting up the final touchdown for the Golden Flashes (7-6).

Dustin Crum, tabbed the Offensive MVP of the game, accounted for 436 yards of total offense and three touchdowns. He was 21-of-26 for 289 yards and two touchdowns through the air, to go along with a game-best 147 yards and the one fourth-quarter score on 23 carries.

In his final game as an Aggie, Love set the school record for total offense in a career. He had 333 yards against Kent State, including 16 on the ground, to give him 9,003 total career yards. The old mark of 8,808 yards was previously held by fellow quarterback Chuckie Keeton (2011-15), who was on the sideline cheering his alma mater on Friday night.

Senior RB **Gerold Bright** led the Aggies on the ground with 94 yards and a touchdown on 21 carries. Sophomore WR **Deven Thompkins** scored on a 57-yard run early in the fourth quarter to pull Utah State to tie the game at 34-41.

Thompkins also caught four passes for 51 yards and a touchdown, while junior WR **Jordan Nathan** led Utah State with nine receptions for 71 yards.

Senior PK **Dominik Eberle** ended his stellar Utah State career by kicking a pair of field goals from 41 and 45 yards, respectively, and making all five of his extra points. His 45-yard field goal is the longest by an Aggie in a bowl game.

The Aggies finished with 506 yards of total offense, while the Golden Flashes had 550.

Two players finished with double-digit tackles for Utah State, led by a career-high 14 stops from junior S **Troy Lefeged Jr.**, which is also a USU bowl game record. Redshirt freshman DE **Elijah Shelton** added a career-high 10 tackles. Lefeged also forced a fumble, which was recovered by junior DE **Nick Heninger**.

Utah State got the ball to start the game and scored on its opening possession. Bright capped the 10-play, 75-yard drive with a 4-yard touchdown run to give the Aggies a 7-0 lead less than three minutes in.

Kent State also scored on its opening possession on a 78-yard touchdown pass. The Golden Flashes made it 17-7 late in the first quarter on a 2-yard run and 40-yard field goal.

Utah State pulled within 17-10 when Eberle made a 41-yard field goal with three seconds left in the opening quarter. A 25-yard touchdown pass from Love to Mariner tied it at 17-all with 8:24 left in the second quarter.

Kent State went into the halftime break with a 23-17 lead after field goals of 22 and 36 yards, respectively.

After falling behind 26-17 early in the third, Utah State rallied to take its final lead of the game when Thompkins scored on a 17-yard pass from Love and Eberle booted his 45-yard field goal to make it 27-26 with 2:27 left in the quarter.

Senior WR Deven Thompkins (13) was named the Offensive MVP of the Jimmy Kimmel LA Bowl as he had six receptions for 115 yards, including a 62-yard touchdown, in Utah State's 24-13 win against Oregon State.

**INGLEWOOD, Calif.** - Sophomore QB **Cooper Legas** came off the bench to throw a pair of touchdown passes in just his second-ever game as Utah State (11-3) capped off an incredible season with a 24-13 win against Oregon State (7-6) on Saturday, Dec. 18, 2021, in the inaugural Jimmy Kimmel LA Bowl at SoFi Stadium.

Legas came in when graduate junior QB **Logan Bonner** suffered a knee injury during the first quarter. On Legas' very first play, he connected with senior WR **Deven Thompkins** on a 62-yard touchdown pass to tie the game at 7-apiece early in the second quarter. It was Legas' first-ever collegiate pass. Thompkins, named the game's Offensive MVP, had six receptions for 115 yards. Bonner was 6-of-10 passing for 68 yards and an interception before leaving the contest.

Legas, who was 11-of-20 passing for 171 yards, also threw a 5-yard touchdown to graduate senior WR **Brandon Bowling** to give the Aggies a 24-13 lead late in the third quarter. Legas also had a 34-yard reception on a double pass from senior WR **Derek Wright** earlier in the drive. Bowling finished the game with four receptions for 51 yards, while Wright caught three passes for 33 yards. Senior TE **Carson Terrell** added two receptions for 25 yards.

Graduate junior RB **Calvin Tyler Jr.** ran for 120 yards on a career-high 26 carries against his former team, including a 15-yard touchdown with 4:24 remaining in the second quarter to give the Aggies a 14-10 lead.

Graduate senior PK **Connor Coles** kicked a 25-yard field goal to give Utah State a 17-10 lead following a 13-play, 67-yard drive to start the third quarter.

Utah State finished the game with 383 yards of total offense (273 passing, 110 rushing) and had 27 first downs, its second-most in a game this season. OSU also had three turnovers with two interceptions and a lost fumble.

Graduate senior DE **Nick Heninger** was named the Defensive MVP after recording career-highs with 3.0 sacks and 5.0 tackles for loss as part of his seven tackles. Graduate senior ILB **Justin Rice** led OSU with nine tackles and a forced fumble in the fourth quarter. Graduate senior OLB **Cash Gilliam**, graduate senior S **Shaq Bond**, and junior OLB **Ajani Carter** all added seven tackles in the game. For Carter, it tied for the most tackles in a game in his career.

Graduate junior S **Hunter Reynolds** added an interception late in the fourth quarter for Utah State, to go along with a pass breakup. OSU had three pass breakups overall as junior CB **Cam Lampkin** and junior DE **Byron Vaughns** also had one each.

Junior DT **Hale Motu'apuaka** also had a sack as OSU's defense registered 4.0 sacks and 6.0 tackles for loss in the game. Oregon State entered the LA Bowl having allowed just 10.0 sacks the entire season.

Oregon State received the opening kickoff and scored 58 seconds into the game when **Jesiah Irish** went 20 yards up the left sideline on a jet sweep. That would prove to be the Beavers' only touchdown, though, as their other points came on a pair of field goals by **Everett Hayes**.

The Beavers' **Chance Nolan** was 21-of-30 passing for 263 yards and an interception, while **B.J. Baylor**, who led the Pac-12 in rushing, had 18 carries for 78 yards.

Oregon State finished the game with 415 yards of total offense (263 passing, 152 rushing), but also committed 13 penalties for 91 yards, and had a pair of turnovers with an interception and fumble.

**DALLAS, Texas** - Utah State managed just 261 yards of total offense as it lost to Memphis 38-10 in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl, held at Gerald J. Ford Stadium on the SMU Campus on Tuesday, Dec. 29, 2022.

Memphis QB Seth Henigan passed for 284 yards and three first-half touchdowns, while Jevyon Ducker rushed for 83 yards and two scores, as the Tigers amassed 430 yards of total offense (284 passing, 146 rushing).

Henigan was 15-of-21 for 217 yards and three touchdowns in the first half alone for the Tigers, who finished their season at 7-6. Eddie Lewis was on the receiving end of two of those touchdowns as he caught five passes for 83 yards on the day.

Junior QB Cooper Legas started for the Aggies (6-7), but suffered a game-ending injury in the third quarter and was replaced by true freshman QB Bishop Davenport. Legas was 7-of-12 passing for 34 yards and one interception, while Davenport was 7-of-9 passing for 100 yards with one touchdown and one interception. Sophomore QB Levi Williams also saw his first action since suffering a injury in game seven at Colorado State back in mid-October, and was 1-of-2 passing for one yard and one interception.

Davenport's 44-yard touchdown pass to graduate senior WR Brian Cobbs pulled Utah State to within 24-10 with 11:04 to go in the game.

The Aggies then attempted an inside kick, but the Tigers recovered and put two more touchdowns on the board to thwart off any chance of a comeback by Utah State.

Cobbs finished with six catches for 79 yards, while graduate senior RB Calvin Tyler Jr. ended his Aggie career by rushing for 79 yards on 16 carries. Junior WR Terrell Vaughn caught four passes for 34 yards, while Legas added 25 rushing yards on 12 carries.

Utah States finished with 261 total yards – 135 via the air and 126 on the ground.

Senior ILB AJ Vongphachanh had nine tackles and a career-high 2.5 tackles for loss, while true freshman ILB Max Alford also had nine tackles, a career high, to go along with a career-best 2.0 tackles for loss. Senior CB Ajani Carter added a career-high eight stops.

Graduate junior DE Daniel Grzesiak had 2.0 sacks and 2.5 tackles for loss, to go along with a forced fumble that was recovered by junior DE Byron Vaughns. Vaughns also had 1.0 sacks and 2.0 tackles for loss as part of his season-high seven tackles. Junior DT Poukesi Vakauta also had 1.0 sacks and 1.5 tackles for loss, both career highs.

Utah State finished with a season-high-tying 5.0 sacks and a season-high 14.0 tackles for loss. In fact, those 14.0 TFLs are tied for the second-most in a game in school history.

The Tigers dominated practically every facet of the first half as they outgained the Aggies 273-89, had 10 more first downs (16-6) and maintained possession of the ball for more than 19 minutes.

Memphis cracked the scoreboard first when Chris Howard booted a 26-yard field goal late in the first quarter. Utah State answered back with a 3-pointer of its own courtesy of a career-long 53-yarder from graduate senior PK Connor Coles with 12:13 remaining in the second quarter, which is tied for the eighth-longest in school history.

It was all Tigers after that. Memphis scored touchdowns on its final three drives of the half to take a 24-3 lead into the break.

This was the first meeting between Utah State and Memphis since 1977. The Tigers have won three straight over the Aggies and lead the overall series 5-3.

## ELIZABETH R. CANTWELL

Chicago, 1976  
August, 2023 - Present (First Year)

Elizabeth (Betsy) R. Cantwell will become Utah State University's 17th president on Aug. 1, 2023. Before coming to USU, she was the senior vice president for research and innovation at the University of Arizona, where she was responsible for an \$825 million annual research portfolio; the 1,268-acre UA

Tech Park, one of the nation's premier university research parks; and a research and innovation enterprise that spanned 20 academic colleges with locations across Arizona, 12 university-level centers and institutes, and other major research-related affiliated organizations conducting classified and contractual work.

She also devoted time to student-athlete focused programs and projects, believing that athletics programs have power to help land-grant universities serve the public and raise awareness of the good these institutions do in communities.

Cantwell previously served as Arizona State University's vice president for research development and CEO of the ASU Research Enterprise. She led an organization of 150 and grew the overall research enterprise at ASU from \$435 million to \$680 million over three years, and in her CEO role, she grew the applied research entity from no contracts to \$15 million in annual awards.

Before her work in university research leadership, she served the U.S. national security mission as the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory's director for economic development and director for engineering mission strategy, and earlier as the deputy associate director for global security at the Oak Ridge National Laboratory, where she worked with the U.S. Departments of Energy and Defense, the National Nuclear Security Administration, the Defense Threat Reduction Agency, and NASA.

Cantwell is a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania, Wharton School (MBA, 2003); the University of California, Berkeley (Ph.D., Mechanical Engineering, 1992); and the University of Chicago (BA, Human Behavior 1976).

## JERRY BOVEE

*Utah State, 1992  
June, 2023 - Present (First Year)*

Jerry Bovee is in his fifth year with Utah State Athletics as the Associate Vice President and Deputy Athletics Director for External Affairs.

Bovee leads USU's athletics development staff, including the Big Blue Scholarship Fund and Aggies Unlimited.

Additionally, Bovee oversees USU Athletics' external departments, which includes marketing and promotions, and media relations, while serving as the liaison for ticket operations and sales, and Aggie Sports Properties. Furthermore, he provides sport supervision for softball and men's and women's track and field, and is a liaison for men's basketball and football.

Since November of 2022, Bovee has led the Athletics Department as interim AD. During that time, USU has extended its multimedia rights relationship with LEARFIELD, which will bring more than \$10 million of new funding into the department over the next several years. USU also received a \$1 million gift, which will help fund student-athlete scholarships, upcoming facility enhancements and provide operational support.

And, Utah State restructured its Aggies Unlimited program, creating a more robust model that will provide opportunities and benefits for those who make charitable donations and ticket purchases.

Bovee also conducted a men's basketball head coach search that resulted in the hiring of Danny Sprinkle, who spent four years at Montana State leading the Bobcats to consecutive Big Sky Conference Tournament titles and back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances.

As interim AD, Aggie Athletics has thrived with Bovee at the helm. The USU volleyball team won the Mountain West Tournament and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2010. Men's basketball played in the championship game of the Mountain West Tournament and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the fourth time in the last five seasons and for the 23rd time in school history. Men's cross country competed in the NCAA Championships for the fourth time since 2017. And, men's tennis played in the championship match of the Mountain West Tournament.

Off the field, Utah State's student-athletes combined to earn a 3.39 cumulative grade point average, which is the highest in the history of USU Athletics. Additionally, more than 75 percent of USU student-athletes earned a 3.0 or higher GPA as 68 student-athletes were named to the Dean's List.

Utah State Athletics also inducted its first-ever all female Hall of Fame Class this past spring as part of an inaugural weekend celebration of the 50th anniversary of Title IX, which unlocked access to educational and athletic opportunities for women.

And finally, with its infrastructure, Utah State is adding bathrooms and widening the walkways for easier pedestrian flow within Maverik Stadium. In addition, Bovee is conducting a full-scale review of each of USU's athletics facilities with long-term needs and project prioritization over the next five to 10 years.

Bovee came to Utah State after spending 10 years as the athletics director at Weber State University.



Bovee, who earned his bachelor's degree in business finance from Utah State in 1992, began his career in athletic administration at USU as he worked as the sales and promotions specialist and later as an Assistant Athletics Director for Marketing and Promotions for four years (1992-95).

Bovee oversaw tremendous growth in fundraising and facility upgrades during his time at Weber State, including improvements to Stewart Stadium and the Dee Events Center. The Marquardt Fieldhouse, a state-of-the-art indoor practice facility, opened in 2013. The facility includes strength and conditioning, training and team rooms, along with rehabilitation areas. Furthermore, a new academic facility for student-athlete success was completed in 2016 and a new state-of-the-art athletic complex on the north end of Stewart Stadium opened in August of 2019.

During Bovee's tenure with the Wildcats, the football team saw a huge improvement, including unprecedented back-to-back Big Sky titles in 2017 and 2018 under head coach Jay Hill, who was hired by Bovee in December, 2013. In 2017, Weber State won a school-record 11 games, won a Big Sky title, won two games in the FCS Playoffs and finished the season ranked fifth in the nation. Weber State repeated as Big Sky champions in 2018, again advanced to the FCS Quarterfinals, and was ranked as high as third in the nation, the highest ranking in school history.

In all, Weber State captured 19 conference championships during Bovee's tenure. The Wildcats' men's basketball team won the Big Sky title in 2010, 2014 and 2016, and twice advanced to the NCAA Tournament. Women's cross country captured four Big Sky titles and advanced to the NCAA Championships all four seasons. The WSU softball team won three-straight regular season titles and two postseason tournament titles and advanced to the NCAA's. The men's tennis team won three conference regular season titles and men's track and field, men's golf and women's soccer teams also captured conference titles.

Prior to being named Weber State's athletics director in 2009, Bovee spent two years as the Assistant Vice President for Administrative Support Services at Weber State. Prior to his time at Weber State, Bovee served as Assistant Director of the Utah High School Activities Association for 12 years.

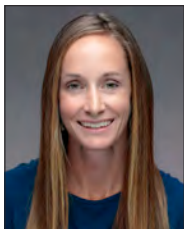

## AMY CROSBIE

*Utah State, 2002*  
**Executive Associate Athletics Director**  
**Internal Affairs**  
 Senior Woman Administrator

In her fifth year at her alma mater, Amy Crosbie serves as Executive Associate Athletics Director for Internal Affairs and Senior Woman Administrator. In her role, she oversees compliance, academics and strength & conditioning, in addition to providing Title IX oversight, and sport supervision for women's basketball, women's gymnastics, women's soccer, men's and women's track & field/cross country, and women's volleyball.

Crosbie came to Utah State after spending nine-plus years as the Senior Associate Athletics Director/Senior Woman Administrator at Weber State University.

Crosbie, who earned her bachelor's degree in family and consumer science from Utah State in 2002, was a four-year letterwinner for USU's volleyball team from 1997-2000 as an outside hitter and helped lead the Aggies to their first-ever NCAA Tournament in 2000. She was named to the Big West Conference All-Freshman team in 1997, earned second-team all-Big West honors as a junior in 1999 and first-team honors as a senior in 2000. For her career, she still ranks second all-time in school history with 1,463 kills, fourth with 3,627 attempts, sixth with 98 service aces and eighth with 120 matches played.

Following her collegiate career, Crosbie spent two years as an assistant volleyball coach for the Aggies. She then began her career in athletic administration at Utah State as she spent seven years as the Assistant Director of Student-Athlete Services, where she was an Academic Advisor and the CHAMPS Life Skills Director. During her time at USU, she fulfilled academic duties for men's basketball, golf, softball, soccer, volleyball, and men's and women's track & field. She also chaired the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and taught the athletics section of connections, USU 1010, which is taught to all incoming student-athletes during the fall semester.

During Crosbie's tenure with the Wildcats, she worked directly with the director of athletics and oversaw student-athletes' well-being, as well as compliance and academics. She was also the sport administrator for softball, volleyball, men's and women's tennis, and men's and women's golf.

Crosbie also participated on various Big Sky Conference and Weber State University committees, and in 2016 was a recipient of the Dixon Award for demonstrating a career of excellence and going above and beyond the call of duty to support students. Crosbie is a graduate of the 2012-13 NCAA Pathway Program class, which is a year-long program designed to enhance the professional skills of women and people of color who seek to become athletics directors through education, training and mentorship.

Crosbie was formerly a facilitator for the National Consortium for Academics and Sport in the Mentors in Violence Prevention and Branded a Leader programs working with intercollegiate athletic departments, NASCAR and the NBA. In addition, she served as a lead trainer for program delivery, working with the NCAA to develop curriculum for their annual Leadership Forum and Leadership Academy Workshop.

Along with earning her bachelor's degree from Utah State, Crosbie earned her master's degree from Weber State in professional communication in 2014. Crosbie was born and raised in Visalia, California, and attended Redwood High School. Amy and her husband Jeff have three children: Kiera, Ellie and Carter.

Waqa Damuni (Wonga Da-moo-knee) is in his 11th year at Utah State and fifth as an Assistant Athletics Director for Student-Athlete Development and Academic Coordinator. Damuni spent his first six years at USU as an Assistant Athletics Director for Football Operations.

In his current role, Damuni's responsibilities include processing and reporting NCAA initial and continuing progress towards degree eligibility, NCAA certification for student-athlete eligibility, while coordinating the academic affairs for all football student-athletes. Damuni also coordinates the A-Game student-athlete development program in the areas of personal, leadership and career development, as well as community engagement. He also serves as the advisor for the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee. He also serves on the Equity Hearing Council on campus and is a member of the USU and Athletics Inclusive Excellence Committee.

Damuni, a former tight end and three-year letter winner at USU from 1996-98, helped the Aggies win back-to-back Big West Conference championships, including a trip to the inaugural Humanitarian Bowl in 1997.

Damuni returned to Utah State after spending five years as the Director of Academic Support for Razorback student-athletes at Arkansas.

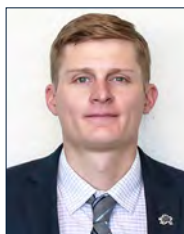

In his role, Smith provides vision and direction to the Student-Athlete Academic Services (SAAS) staff in coordinating academic services and campus resources for all 16 intercollegiate athletic programs, along with providing direct oversight of all functions and programs as they pertain to student-athlete academic achievement, progress toward degree, and eligibility.

Smith also serves on assigned campus committees and councils to maintain collaborative relationships with on-campus offices and resources, assist compliance in processing and submitting Academic Progress Rate (APR) and Graduation Success Rate (GSR) annually, emphasize welfare of student-athletes in all initiatives, and manage the SAAS program budget.

Smith came to Utah State after working as an academic coach for football at Arizona State for five years. With the Sun Devils, he provided strategic and tactical leadership for implementation of programs to achieve student-athlete success objectives. He also worked with compliance to ensure initial eligibility and admission, and oversaw all logistics and budgeting for the spring graduation event and initiatives for Sun Devil Athletics (SDA).

At Arizona State, Smith collaborated with presidents, vice presidents, directors and staff to meet operational objectives, improve programs, coordinate resources, engage students and manage staff for enhanced effectiveness. He also assisted in hiring staff.

Smith also held other positions at ASU, including administrative director for Scholar Baller Initiative (SBI), SDA graduation event director, SDA Tip of the Fork leadership co-director and SDA inclusion committee.

Smith also worked at Weber State, where he was an athletic academic advisor from 2013-15. He worked primarily with the football and men's basketball programs, and also held positions such as assistant compliance coordinator and event management assistant.

The native of Amsterdam, New York., worked as an athletic director, physical education and health teacher at Crittenton Youth Academy (CYA) from 2002-09 in Phoenix, Arizona. He left there to work at Wayland (Mass.) Public School District as both the athletic director and health and wellness curriculum director from 2010-13.

Smith earned a master's degree in secondary education from the University of Phoenix in 2005 and a bachelor's degree in psychology with a minor in education from Boston College in 1996.

While at Boston College, Smith was a running back for the Eagles and helped lead the team to three bowl appearances. A knee injury in his senior year at BC ended Smith's college football career, which was highlighted by his 147 yards and two touchdowns on 27 carries in a 30-11 win over Notre Dame in his junior season.

After two years of rehabbing a torn PCL, Smith got the playing bug out of his system with a year of football with the Rovaniemi Arctic Circle Stars in Finland, where he played in the Suomi League. He helped the Circle Stars to a No. 3 ranking in Finland and led the country in rushing yards.

Returning stateside in 1998, Smith moved to Arizona the following year and spent seven years at Crittenton – a charter school for at-risk youth – as a health educator and athletic director. This led to Smith creating an athletic department from scratch.

Smith, the career rushing leader in Section II when he graduated in 1991 from Amsterdam High School, finished his prep career with 4,124 rushing yards. As a senior, he helped the Rams to an unbeaten season and was named the state Class A Player of the Year.

Smith and his wife, Paige, have three children: daughters Tatum and Phoebe, and one son, Gunnar.

Prior to working at Utah State, Williams worked for Intermountain Health Care in Logan as an athletic trainer and served as the Head Athletic Trainer for the Idaho Stampede of the Continental Basketball Association (CBA).

Williams began his athletic training career at Utah State, where he received his bachelor's degree in exercise science in 1996. He then attended Idaho and graduated with a master's of science degree in sports administration in 1997.

As the Media Relations Director, Hoffman oversees the publicity of Utah State's 16-sport program, working closely with the media, USU staff, coaches and student-athletes, while serving as the football contact.

Under Hoffman, USU's Athletic Media Relations Office has twice (2011, 2015) been recognized by the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) for earning its "Super 11" Award, which annually recognizes the best 11 media relations departments in the nation.

Wade Denniston is in his ninth year at Utah State as an Assistant Media Relations Coordinator.

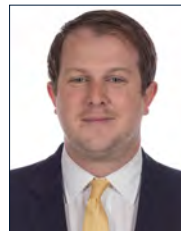
Denniston serves as the media contact for USU's cross country, track & field, golf and gymnastics programs, as well as assisting with a number of other sports, including football.

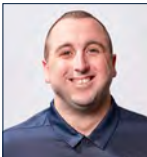

**/// THIS IS THE MOUNTAIN WEST ///**

From its inception in 1999, the Mountain West has been committed to excellence in intercollegiate athletics, while promoting the academic missions of its member institutions. Progressive in its approach, the MW continues to cultivate opportunities for student-athletes to compete at the highest level while fostering academic achievement and sportsmanship. Now in its 25th year, the MW has been assertive in its involvement with the NCAA governance structure and has taken a leadership role in the overall administration of intercollegiate athletics.

The Mountain West has marked several achievements during its first 24 years, most notably becoming the first to establish a sports television network dedicated solely to an intercollegiate athletic conference (The Mtn.). The Mountain West also was the first to experiment with the coaches' challenge in the college football instant replay system and was the first non-automatic-qualifying BCS conference to participate in four BCS bowl games, winning three. In the inaugural year of the new College Football Playoff system, Boise State earned the automatic slot into a New Year's Six bowl game as the highest-ranked champion from the Group of Five 5 conferences. The Broncos defeated then 10th-ranked Arizona 38-30 in the VIZIO Fiesta Bowl. In 2011-12, the Mountain West was among the first conferences to implement a league-wide state-of-the-art basketball instant replay system.

The Mountain West is noted for its geographic diversity. Some of the most beautiful terrain and landscapes in the nation can be found within Mountain West boundaries, including the majestic Rocky Mountain range, which borders five MW institutions (Air Force, Boise State, Colorado State, New Mexico and Utah State). The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,220 feet – the highest Division I campus in the nation) contrast with the desert cities of Las Vegas and Reno, home to UNLV and Nevada, respectively, while Fresno State, San Diego State and San José State add a West coast influence with their locations in Central, Southern and Northern California. The inclusion of the Hawai'i football program extends the Mountain West footprint to the beautiful islands in the Pacific Ocean, while the addition of the women's soccer program at Colorado College gives the MW an additional presence in the Rocky Mountains.

**/// HISTORY OF THE MOUNTAIN WEST ///**

The Mountain West was conceived on May 26, 1998, when the presidents of eight institutions — Air Force, BYU, Colorado State, New Mexico, San Diego State, UNLV, Utah and Wyoming — decided to form a new NCAA Division I-A intercollegiate athletic conference. The eight presidents then hired the league's first commissioner, Craig Thompson, on Oct. 15, 1998. The split from a former 16-team conference re-established continuity and stability among the membership within the new league and signaled the continuation of its tradition-rich, long-standing athletic rivalries. Three of the MW's eight original members have been conference rivals since the 1960s (New Mexico, Wyoming and Colorado State), while San Diego State (1978) and Air Force (1980) were longtime members as well. UNLV and TCU entered the fold in 1996 and the Rebels continued as one of the original eight institutions that formed the MW in 1999. TCU re-joined the group with its first year of competition in the Mountain West in 2005-06. With conference realignment sweeping the nation in recent years, the MW has been proactive in addressing membership changes. Boise State University joined the Mountain West in 2011-12, followed by Fresno State and the University of Nevada on July 1, 2012. Also on July 1, 2012, the University of Hawai'i became a football-only member of the Conference. On July 1, 2013, the Mountain West further expanded when San José State University and Utah State University joined the Conference, bringing to 11 the number of full-time member institutions and 12 football-playing members. On July 1, 2014, the Colorado College women's soccer program became the first non-football affiliate member of the Mountain West, expanding that sport to 12 Conference participants.

When the Mountain West officially began operations on July 1, 1999, the new league had in place a seven-year contract with ESPN, giving the broadcast entity exclusive national television rights to MW football and men's basketball, and three-year agreements to send the league's football champion to the Liberty Bowl and a second team to the Las Vegas Bowl. Then Commissioner Thompson also arranged a third bowl tie-in each of the first three seasons (1999 Motor City, 2000 Silicon Valley, 2001 New Orleans) before securing a four-year deal with the Emerald Bowl in San Francisco in 2002.

An innovator in the postseason bowl structure, the MW engineered many "firsts," as league teams have participated in seven inaugural bowl games (2000 Silicon Valley, 2001 New Orleans, 2002 San Francisco (Emerald), 2005 Poinsettia, 2006 New Mexico, 2015 Arizona, 2015 Cure), as well as placing the first non-automatic-qualifying FBS team into a BCS bowl game with Utah's appearance in the 2005 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and into the College Football Playoff (CFP) with Boise State's selection to the 2014 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl.

On Dec. 31, 2022, Thompson retired after nearly 24 years at the helm of the MW, and Gloria Nevarez was named the league's second Commissioner, beginning her post on Jan. 1, 2023.

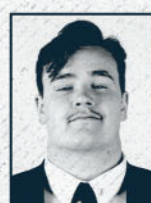
